Underground Railway Soon Ready for Public Traffic.

IS THE BEST IN THE WORLD

Tunnels Are Sixteen Feet Wide and Cars as Large as on Surface Lines.

London, Jan. 18. - Another "tup-Mr. Hays Says Company Asks for penny tube" will be thrown open to the public on Feb. 1. This is the Great Northern and City Railway, between Finisbury Park and Moorgate

This new underground rapid transit line is a distinct advance on the other tube railways in London. Some of those who made the trip pronounced it the best underground railway so far constructed in the world.

The tunnels are sixteen feet in diameter, as compared with eleven feet eight inches of the Central London Railway, and this permits the use of larger rolling stock.

The cars are longer than those in ise on the other tubes. They are be run on any British railway. The bulging sides make for greater comfort. All the seats are crosswise, with a center aisle. Mr. Blair undertook to fight the charges, and then broke down. It is alleged that he twice attempted suicide, but the fact has not been fully verified. His country house in the suburbs was dismantled and everything of value, including his horses and carriages, sold. Mrs. Blair, who was president of the board of lady managers of the world's fair, resigned

REFORMS FOR RUSSIA

Peasants to Have a Say in Loca Legislation.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 18.—Minister of the Interior Plehve has completed the draft of the peasant code, or scheme for the peasant reforms ordered in the Czar's recent manifesto, and it will probably be sent to the local committees, throughout the empire within a few days. Members of the nobility in each province and district will be allowed to elect representatives on these committees, but the Zeemstvos (or elective provincial assemblies, compos ed of landed proprietors and representatives of artisans and peasants) will be appointed by the governors. The committees will be allowed freedom to discuss the project and propose any changes therein except on three points. which the Emperor has reserved from discussion, namely, that the peasant class must remain entirely separate legally, from the other classes; that the commune is to remain untouched by legislation, and that the peasant lands are to remain inalienable. These points stamp the forthcoming legislation as conservative in the main, but the present chaos is so great and so much room is left for the arbitrary conduct of police and the local rep-resentatives of the ministry of the interior, as well as of peasant courts and administrative machinery and their commune town meetings, that the liberals declare that any modification would be in the line of progress. 


