[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, April 19. - At the telephor committee today Thomas Begley, of the township of Croton, Grey County, was examined. His company was called the Conn Telephone Company They had 18 miles of line, and bought 3 miles from a doctor, making in all, 21 miles. They paid \$125 for the three miles. The capital was \$1,500. He and his associates put \$1,300 into the line, and it paid six per cent the first seven months. They had seven phones and a connecting one. They were public phones, and it cost 15 cents a message. These messages were delivered. There was a demand among the farmers for phones, and it was the intention to increase the capital stock \$40,000, and extend the line.

#### No Liberals Need Apply.

The meeting of Conservative fisher men at Port Stanley the other day, to which the Journal briefly referred at the time, decided most emphatically not only that licenses were not to be issued to Liberals, but that nets means that Liberals are not even given an opportunity to rent their nets. It is a most arbitrary decision but is not surprising to persons fa-Port at present .- St. Thomas Journal. The Advertiser has been credibly informed that all applications for fishing licenses are to be passed upon by the local Conservative patronage committees, subject to the veto of the Conservative member for the riding, or the defeated candidate, and that a secret circular of instructions has been sent to the party managers. This information is borne out by the statement in the St. Thomas Journal. The fishery department, like the license department, is to be turned over to the spoilsmen. There has been a wholesale removal of license inspectors without the pretense that they have been remiss in their duties. Everyone knows that the retiring inspector in this city has been a model official. The Conservative board of license commissioners testified to this in a formal resolution. It is not claimed that the change has been made in the interest of the stricter enforcement of the law. The temperance people asked that Mr. Brown be retained in office and opposed Mr. Galpin's appointment. The spoils system has applied unblushingly to a department which the Premier boasted would be "taken out of politics." And new fishermen, who happen to be Liberals, are to be deprived of their means of livelihood, and the fisheries of the Province are to be a party preserve. This is an outrageous policy. The Government has not had the firmness and justice to stand out against the spoilsmen, but the head of the Government has the assurance to pose as an idealist, and told an audience a few days ago that he hoped to see patronage and partyism

#### The United States Ambassador

The retiring United States ambassador at the court of St. James is overwhelmed with farewell honors by the British people. Mr. Choate has been a worthy successor of the distinguished men, by whom the republic, to its credit and advantage, has been invariably represented in Great Britain. He is a wit and scholar, a finished and adaptive speaker. The American ambassador is in constant tions, and while the duties may seem and tempers. What more to be mainly social and ornamental, he really plays an important political duchess? role. It is hard to overestimate the contributions of Mr. Choate and some of his predecessors to the solidarity of the English-speaking race. Tre United States has paid Great Britain the compliment of sending to St. James such men as John Lathrop Motley, the historian; James Russell Lowell, the author, and John Hay, the present accomplished Secretary of State at Washington, who have typified the best qualities of the American people and established a tradition of culture and graciousness very far removed from the "shirt-sleeves" diplomacy which has been sometimes the reproach of the United States. It is believed the new ambassador, Mr. Whitelaw Reid, will maintain the dignity of the office. He is the publisher of the New York Tribune, one of the greatest and sanest of American newspapers, which has always thrown its influence on the side of friendly relations with Great Britain, He is already persona grata to the British nation for this reason,

A great change has come over the science and practice of diplomacy in the past 50 years. Formerly the diplomatic service was a sort of system of espionage or deception, and an ambassador was often a glorified spy, with the ethics of a card-sharper. He lived in an atmosphere of intrigue and suspicion, and was supposed to direct the currents of history by some mysterious and occult power. The searchlight of the press and the glare of present-day publicity have dispelled here by three or four newspapers, conthe mists of secrecy, and modern diplomacy now works in the light of day. The ambassador has become a messenger of peace and good will, and makes it his business to ingratiate himself. not merely with courts and official circles, but with the people of the nation to which he is accredited. Russia appears to be one great power which has not thoroughly learned the lesson, and in the present war she is paying the penalty of diplomatic turpitude. The basis of frankness and sincerity, upon which diplomacy is tending more and more to rest, is something the world may be thankful for.

#### The Japanese and the United States.

As in British Columbia, so in the Pactific Coast States there is an agitation against Japanese immigration. The fear in both cases appears to be unfounded. The number of Japanese entering the United States in 1902 was 19,289; in 1903, 16,199; in 1904, 11,929. They are now arriving at the rate of 500 a month, but half as many are returning home. The majority of them do not come from Japan direct, but from Hawaii, an American possession, where they go as contract laborers, because the United States laws excluded the Chinese. During the past

week the cold winds and frost have had a most injurious effect in many sections of the country within a radius of 20 or 30 miles of the city. It is not certain how much damage has been done, as reports are very conflicting. A few warm rains would overcome to a great extent the injury already done. The reports at present are anything but cheerful.

Grain-Oats are about the only of-

fering in this line. Sales are brisk. Prices fluctuated during the week from \$1 25 to \$1 31 per cwt. Present prices are \$1 27 to \$1 28 per cwt. Hay and Straw — Hay has been freely offered. About 135 loads on sale during the past week. Prices are lower at \$8 and \$8 50 per ton for the best loads. If Measure Does Not Go Through Breakwater May Not Be

Built This Year.

That the action of the committee of the Ontario Legislature in laying over the city of London bill re the issuing of debentures for the construction of the West London breakwater is fraught with more danger to the city than is generally known, is the opinion of several of the aldermen who have the interests of West London and the city at large at heart. When the measure came up in com-

mittee yesterday, Mr. I. F. Hellmuth opposed it on two counts. In the first place, he argued that the city should not be given powers of expropriation of land owned by his client, Mr. J. D. Saunby, on the ground that Mr. Saunby is now the appellant in a suit which has been sent by him to the Privy Council, and any agreement he might make with the city in regard to the transfer of land, either by ordinary sale, or by expropriation, might pre-judicially affect his case in the eyes of the Privy Council,

The Objectionable Clause. In the second place, the argument was put forth that it would not be right to allow the city to expropriate or otherwise secure land for the purpose of constructing a breakwater, on the understanding that the city would not be open to actions for damages which might result from the construction of the breakwater. Mr. Hellmuth painted out that his client owns land or both sides of the river, and that if the water is prevented from making its escape in its usual course on the west side it will be liable to flood to a great height on the east side, and it may be that it will result in very serious damage to the Saunby dam, which case it would be most unfair to say that Mr. Saunby shall have no means of redress. It appears, too, that the




