Evangelist Oral Roberts announced that God had spoken to him from a can of Beef-a-roni yesterday, in order to congratulate him.




Eva investigated and came upon a fibrillating, gelatin-like blob that was in the process of ingesting a preserved baby shark.

According to Hunter, God has given him until September to get the Board to reverse their decision.


Myer Horowitz, president of the U of A, apologetically said "so long, Mike."

The recent decision of the Canadian Radio, Television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) to renew, with serious reservation, the broadcasting license of the CTV (Corporate Type Video) Television Network may, in the view of many, possibly be a mistake.


The perceived lack of Canadian identity alleged by some in CTV programming concerns all Canadians concerned with Canadian culture and related socio-political-economic ramifications relative to the deep, but sovereign working terms we have established with our American network friends.

In mandating that the CTV maintain and promote, within the limited jurisdiction fiscal realities impose upon a private corporation — but one which must act as a custodian of the public good, that substantive efforts be made to upgrade Canadian drama content, the CRTC may indeed have made a bold undertaking.

In the spirit of a mixed economy, in which private and public sectors peacefully co-exist, the CRTC recognition that the CCBC (Central Canada Broadcasting Corporation) cannot solely carry the diverse interests which meld into a tolerant and understanding Canada deserves further study, taking into account the various Federal/Provincial concerns, and also respecting the heritage of our Native Canadians.

The balancing of twin concerns, while opposing the undermining of our national sovereignty, thus has been resolved in the minds of many — while opposition still remains.

We at the Jurinal commend the CRTC, while expressing strong reservations, for the strong stand taken by the public watchdog over our airwaves. Much additional work and study must be done, but a clear direction has been established.

What about a return to the old plays: Shakespeare, Moliere, Dryden? None of this pretentious garbage that our modern age has produced. I say let's get some real plays going in this city that dares to call itself a theatre centre.

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

Guido: former student settles into business.

Guido & Co: Spreading 'love' through community

Guido is part of a vanishing species — a civic merchant with a heart.

Although you would have to look pretty hard to find a person who works harder for his community, Guido describes his profession as a labor of love — literally.

"I see myself as being in the 'love and comfort' business," he smiled. "I help the lonely, the depressed, those from out of town."

Guido hit the streets a scant one year ago and the progress he has made is a tribute to hard work, hustle, and street smarts. He now has five employees "working at the street level" he says. And they could not be happier about their boss.

"He's great," says Candy (not her real name). "Like before he came we didn't have union benefits, holiday pay, (sound of gum smacking) or a pension plan. Nothin'."

For his philanthropy Guido now grosses close to 250 G's per annum, a far cry from 1985 when he was a poor second-year business student at the University of Alberta. He left because he couldn't handle what he describes as the "Ivory Tower mentality" of academe.

"I couldn't stand it (school)," he winces. "You know a student is there to learn to improve his mind. They

should be encouraging students to experiment, try new things, not put you on probation the minute you hit a rocky stretch of river. I had to get out."

The university's loss was Jasper Avenue's gain as Guido has taken it upon himself to bolster Edmonton's sagging tourist trade.

"We're tryin' real hard," he says. "Two for one specials. Coupons in the *Jurnal* and *Sun*. Draws for free trips to Hawaii. Prizes for the one millionth customer. All that stuff."

Guido is upset because he feels the community is not behind him on this. "Well, heck, now they're passing laws to arrest and detain the customers for just talking to my staff. Jeez, that's like kicking a customer out of a fancy restaurant because he wants to read the menu. I don't know. I'm really disillusioned. Hey, guys, it's a team effort."

Guido also sidelines as a "financial consultant," making small loans to enterprising young international import/export companies. "I make loans to people you don't normally see at the bank," he explains.

"I really love helping out people — it's a great way to get to know folks — especially their families," he said with a smile, gently fondling his favorite sledgehammer.

The recent economic downturn,

however, has taken its toll on Guido's business. "People take longer to pay back now — but I'm a nice guy, I let people pay over time. I've got a bunch of guys who have been making payments for years."

Guido not only makes money for the community, he pours it back into the community. "I've already installed five heated lampposts down Jasper, making them more comfortable to lean against in winter months. And Harry's Love Shoppe will be adding on a Sodom and Gomorrah wing next month with money from a grant from the Guido foundation."

Guido has had to put up with a lot to see his one-man crusade come to fruition. He mentions the harassment tactics of local law enforcement slime and points nonchalantly to a six-inch vertical scar running down the left side of his rib cage. "This was a gift from someone less civic-minded than myself," he says of the scar. "But," he sighs, "as in any human endeavor you'll find those who are in it only for themselves."

Guido is enjoying himself immensely, but does not see his current position lasting in perpetuity. "I'm saving enough money to go back to school," he says. "I think I want to get into corporate law."

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



Although he was probably the greatest heavyweight champion ever, there are some detractors who think that the Brown Bomber is foolish.

In a bizarre press conference on Monday, the Department of Athletics at the U of A announced that it had committed several recruiting violations over the past year and was turning itself in to the CIAU.



Although most reporters wrote this off as another desperate bid for attention by the Athletic Department, Steadward was quick to put those doubts to rest.


"That's an outright lie, and I'd be happy to give you an exclusive interview


