 An annular eclipse of the sun, March 5th, 1886.
 Begins on the earth generally, March 5th, 7h. 1m.
 Ends on the earth generally, March 6th, 1h. 10m.
 At Toronto, eclipse begins 5.55 p.m.; sun setting eclipsed ; at sunset only 0.13 of the sun diameter is eclipsed.

II. A total eclipse of the sun, August 29th, 1886.

Begins on the earth generally, August 29th, - 10.18 a.m. Ends on the earth generally, August 29th, - 3,32 p.m. Only a small portion of this eclipse will be visable in Canada, and that in the southern part of Nova Scotia.

Venus will be an evening star to February 18th, and a morning star to December 2nd, then an evening star.

Mars will be a morning star throughout the year.


Jupiter will be a morning star till October 9th, then an evening star. Saturn will be a morning star till July 3rd afterwards an evening star. The satellites of Jupiter are invisable from September 10th to November 7th, the planet being too near the sun.



nourishment drawn from the food is carried into every part.

The process by which the food is turned into matter fit to mix with the blood is called digestion. This process we will now briefly describe. The first process to which food is subjected on being placed in the mouth is mastication or chewing-the food being moved about by the tongue is moistened with a liquid called Saliva, which flows into the mouth from six glands called Salivary glands, which serve to effect cer-tain changes in the food, and to moisten the mouth and render swallowing easy. These glands pour saliva into the mouth even at the thought of food, and this is what is meant by "making the mouth water," these glands having much to do with the relish of food in a natural appetite. The food being mixed with the saliva and sufficiently chewed passes down the throat, thence into the passage called the gullet and thence into the stomach, which is like a bag, broader at the upper end than the lower. The opening through which the food enters is called the *Cardice Origoe*. All over the inner coating or mucous membrane of the stomach there are little cups or cells which hold and give out a peculiar fluid called *Gastric* juice; this juice is passed from these cells into the stomach the moment solid food enters -in a similar manner to that mentioned of the salivary glands. The stomach moves about during digestion with a churn-like motion that brings the food in contact with all its sides that the gastric juice may act upon it. The effect of this gastric juice is to dissolve the food in the stomach, which in a healthy state it does in from one to five hours, ac-cording to the kind of the food taken. When more food is taken than the gastric juice can act upon, or when the substance is hard to digest, then great distress is caused. The food is prevented from immediately passing out of the stomach by the closing of the narrow end called the *Pylorus*. This, however, opens from time to time, allowing as much as is dissolved to pass through. The food, when dissolved in the stomach, becomes a thick cream-like liquid called *Chyme*, which, passing out of the Pylorus, enters the first portion of the small intestines called the Duodenum. Into this canal a small tube opens, made up of two others, one of which brings bile from the gall bag, which has been gathered or formed in the Liver, and the other bringing pancreatic juice from the Pancreas. Both of these juices mix with the Chyme or dis-solved food, and not only cause certain changes in it but the bile assists in causing a peculiar motion of the bowels necessary for digestion-healthy bile, therefore, be-ing nature's true cathartic. From the inner coat of the intestines another fluid flows and mixes with the digested matter, thus turning the Chyme into what is called Chyle. This Chyle is therefore the proceeds of

digestion, containing all the nourishment obtained from the food. Now another set of vessels come into action, the duty of which is to absorb or suck up all the juices thus formed and carry them forward to be changed into new blood. The first of these vessels are called Lacteals, or milk vessels. They arise in the lining of the small intestines, being very small tubes with numerous glands. These Lacteals suck in the Chyle and pour it into a tube laying along the spine called the *Thoracic Duct*. Into this same tube another set of absorbing vessels, called Lymphatics, bring a watery fluid, called Lymph, which they have sucked up from various parts of the body, and then the mixture travels up the Thoracic Duct and is poured into a large vein on the left side of the neck, and from there it flows direct to the heart, the grand organ or force pump of circulation, passing through the first chamber or right Auricle of the heart, thence to the right Ventricle or lower chamber, thence through the pulmonary artery into the lungs, where the blood is purified by contact of the air we breathe; returning it goes to the left Auricle, is forced into the left Ventricle, whence it is urred through the Aorta or great actern urged through the Aorta, or great artery, to all parts of the body, returning by the veins to the heart for another round. When all the nourishment has been taken from the Chyle, the waste matter passes through the colon, or straight intestine, down, through and out, as excrement; any retention of this excrement constitutes costiveness or inaction of the bowels, which is the cause of much suffering and disease.

THE BOWELS.

THE IMPORTANCE OF THEIR REGULAR ACTION.

The Bowels or Intestines begin at the lower orifice of the Stomach, and are about five times as long as the body is tall. The Bowels have a muscular coating and an inner mucous surface, filled with blood vessels and secreting glands. The food is pushed along by the spasmodic muscular contractions. A limited form of digestion is carried on in the Bowels, the bile and pancreatic juice changing the starch into sugar and aiding in the digestion of fats. If nerve power is lost in the absorbing glands of the Bowels, a bad assimulation of the food occurs, resulting in diarrheea and other irregular action.

And we see, too, how much we possess the chances of health in our own keeping.

THE LIVER.

This, the largest of the glandular organs, is located principally upon the right side, under the right lung. It usually weights about 4 pounds, and is of a spongy nature. It forms bile from the venous blood, and a secretion which contributes to animal heat. It also destroys albuminous matter in the food, and forms urea, which the kidneys pass off. Every drop of blood passing through the Liver, that vital fluid is filtered or strained thereby. 

Sulphate of zinc, one grain. Foxglove (digitalis), one grain. Half a teaspoonful of water.

When thoroughly mixed, add four ounces of water ; take a spoonful every hour, dose for an adult.

Either small-pox or scarlet fever will disappear in twelve hours.

For a child, smaller doses, according to age.

That a hot, strong lemonade taken at bedtime will break up a bad cold.

That it rests with you, in sewing, to change your position frequently.

That rusty flatirons should be rubbed over with beeswax and lard.

That a little soda water will relieve sick headache caused by indigestion.

That a cup of strong coffee will remove the odor of onions from the breath.

That tough meat is made tender by lying a few minutes in vinegar water.

That well-ventilated bed-rooms will prevent morning headaches and lassitude.

That a cup of hot water drank before meals will relieve nausea and dyspepsia.

That a fever patient can be made cool and comfortable by frequent sponging off with soda water.

That consumptive night sweats may be arrested by sponging the body nightly in salt water.

That one in a faint should be laid flat on his back, then loosen his clothes and let him alone.

That cold tea should be saved for your vinegar barrel. It sours easily and gives color and flavor.

That to beat the whites of eggs quickly, add a punch of salt. Salt cools and cold eggs froth rapidly.

That the hair may be kept from falling out after illness by a frequent application to the scalp of sage tea.

That you can take out spots from wash goods by rubbing them with the yoke of egg before washing.

That white spots upon varnished furniture will disappear if you hold a hot plate from the stove over them.

It is worth remembering that during the first visit of cholera at St. Petersburg, in 1832, says Iron, a firm of iron founders employing 500 men, informed them that all those who would not take a teaspoonful of powdered charcoal on entering the works in the morning, must leave their employ. The consequence was that they did not lose a single man when myriads were dying around them.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

QUINSY.—Small lumps of ice with a little whiskey, brandy, or extract of ginger on them, swallowed slowly and frequently, will relieve inflammatory sore throat. Yellow Oil is also an excellent remedy for Quinsy.

NOSE BLEED.—Press a wad of brown paper tightly under the upper lip against the nostrils, and plug the nostrils with cold astringents, such as alum water, etc.

^eThe American Dairyman says: Let a drop of fresh milk fall into a glass of pure water. If the milk promptly disseminates itself through the water, the cow that yielded that milk is not with calf, but if it sinks to the bottom of the glass as it falls upon the water, and does not produce but little of a milky cloud, the cow is pregnant. The specific gravity and viscidity of the albuminous milk being heavier than water, thus retains the drop of milk and causes it to sink. We advise dairymen to make a note of this and give it a test. If reliable the information may be of great value to them.

RECEIPTS FOR DYEING.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS.—Everything should be cleau. The goods should be sooured in soap and the soap rinsed out. Dip them into water just before putting them into dye bath, to prevent spotting. Soft water should be used, sufficient to cover the goods well. When goods are dyed, air, rinse well and hand up to dry. Do not wring.

WOOLLEN GOODS.

Chrome Black-Best in Use.-For five pound goods, blue vitriol, six ounces; boil a few minutes, then dip goods three-fourths hour, airing often; take out goods, make a dye with three pounds logwood, boil one-half hour, dip threefourths hour more. Wash in strong suds. This will not fade by exposure to sun.

Wine Color.—For five pounds goods, camwood, two pounds; boil fifteen minutes and dip goods one-half hour; boil again and dip one-half hour; then darken with blue vitriol, one and a half ounce; if not dark enough add copperas, one-half ounce.

Scarlet—Very Fine.—For one pound goods, cream-tartar, one-half ounce, cochineal, well pulverized, one-half ounce; muriate of tin, two and one-half ounces, boil up the dye and enter the goods; work them briskly for ten or fifteen minutes, then boil one and a half hour, stirring goods slowly while boiling. Wash in clean water and dry in the shade.

Pink.—For three pounds goods, alum, three ounces; boil and dip the goods one hour; then add to the dye, cream-tarkar, four ouces; cochineal, well pulverized, one ounce; boil well and dip the goods while boiling until the color suits.

Blue-Quick Process.—For two pounds goods, alum, five ounces; cream-tartar, three ounces; boil goods in this one hour, then put goods into warm water which has more or less extract of indigo in it, according to the depth of color desired, and boil again until it suits, adding more of the blue if needed.

Madder Red.—To each pound of goods, alum, five ounces; red, or cream-tartar, one ounce. Put in goods and bring kettle to a boil for one-half hour, then air them and boil for one-half hour longer; empty kettle and fill with clean water; put in bran, one peek; make it nilk warm, and let it stand until bran rises, then skim off the bran and put in one-half pound madder; put in goods and heat slowly until it boils and is done. Wash in strong suds.

Green.—For each pound of goods, fustic, one pound; with alum three and one-half ounces; steep until strength is out, and soak goods therein until a good yellow is obtained : then remove the chips and add extract of indigo or chemic, one tablespoonful at a time until color suits.

Snuff Brown—Dark—For five pounds goods, camwood, one pound; boil it fifteen minutes, then dip goods three-fourths hour; take out goods and add to the dye two and one-half pounds fustic; boil ten minutes, and dip three-fourths hour; then add blue vitriol, ene ounce; copperas, four ounces; dip again one-half hour. If not dark enough, add more copperas.

Orange.—For five pounds goods, muriate of tin, six tablespoons; argal, four ounces; boil and dip one hour, and add again to the dye one teacup madder; dip again one-half hour. Cochineal, about two ounces, in place of madder, makes a much brighter color.

Yellow-Rich.-Work five pounds goods one half hour in boiling bath with three ounces bichromate of potassia and two ounces alum, lift and expose till well cooled and drained, then work one half hour in another bath with five pounds fustic. Wash out and dry.

Salmon.—For each pound goods, one-fourth pound annotta; one-fourth pound soap; rinse goods in warm water, put them into mixture and boil one-half hour. Shade will be according to amount of annotta.

Puxple—For each pound goods, two ounces cudbear; rinse goods well in soap suds, then dissolve cudbear in hot suds—not quite boiling—and soak the goods until of required color. The color is brightened by rinsing in alum water.

Crimson.—Work for one hour in a bath with one pound cochineal paste; six ounces dry cochineal; one pound tartar; one pint protochloride of tin. Wash out and dry.

COTTON GOODS.

Black.—For five pounds goods, boil them in a decoction of three pounds sumach one-half hour, and steep twelve hours; dip in line water onehalf hour; take out and let them drip one hour; run them through the lime water again fifteen minutes. Make a new dye with two and one-half pounds of logwood (boiled one hour), and dip again three hours; add bichromate potash, two ounces, to the logwood dye, and dip one hour. Wash in clear cold water and dry in the shade. Only process for permanent black.

Blue, —For three pounds goods, blue vitriol, four ounces : boil a few minutes, then dip goods three hours ; then pass them through strong lime water. A beautiful brown can be obtained by next putting goods through a solution of prussiate of potash.

Green.—Dip goods in home-made blue; dye until blue enough is obtained to make the green as dark as required; take out, dry and rinse a little. Make a dye with fustic, three pounds; logwood, three ounces to each pound of goods, and boiling dye one hour; when cooled so as to bear hand, put in goods, move briskly a few minutes, and let lie one hour; take out and thoroughly drain; dissolve and add to the dye for each pound of cotton, blue vitriol, one-half ounce, and dip another hour. Wring out and let dry in shade. By adding or diminishing the logwood and fustle, any shade may be had.

Yellow.—For five pounds of goods, seven ounces sugar of lead, dip goods two hours; make new dye with bichromate of potash four ounces; dip until color suits; wring out and dry. If not yellow enough, repeat.

Until color suits; wring out and dry. If not yellow enough, repeat. Orange.—Five pounds goods, sugar of lead, four ounces; boil few minutes, when a little cool put m goods; dip two hours; wring out; make a new dye with bichromate of potash eight ounces, madder two ounces; dip until it suits. If color is too red, take small sample and dip into lime water, and choose between them.

Red.—Muriate of tin, two-thirds teaeup; add water to cover goods; rinse to boiling heat; put in goods one hour, stir often; take out, empty kettle; put in clean water with hiewood one pound; steep one-half hour at hand heat, then put in goods and increase heat one hour—not boiling. Air goods and dip one hour as before. Wash with soap.

IMPORTANT HEALTH HINTS.

To Chronic Invalids while using Burdock Blood Bitters,

EAT slowly, chewing the food well, never be in a hurry while eating. Avon highly seasoned dishes, such as pastry, pork, gravies, cheese, pickles, greasy food, hot bread, preserves, sweet meats, etc. Never eat too heartily at night, yet do not retire with an empty stomach—a soda biscuit or cup of milk will be something for the stomach to act upon during the night, and prevent faintness, thus often promoting a good night's rest. It is a mistake to go to bed hungry, but *never* overload the stomach.

PARTAKE OF rare beef, lamb chops, fish, oysters, wild game; and most vegetables are wholesome, and fruits when ripe; there is great nourishment in rice, peas, oat meal, beans, asparagus, celery and tomatoes are very wholesome. Greens, such as spinage, dandelion, narrow-leaved dock, etc., are good in season. Oranges, lemons, prunes, figs, bananas, baked apples, jellies, etc., are generally palatable, and good for the invalid. The natural acid of the orange is highly refreshing in fever, and as for nutriment, there is nothing can excel rice and oat meal with cream or milk as a diet.

DRINK.—Do not drink coffee while bilious or when taking medicine—*pure* water is best. See that it is well filtered, if not, always boil it before using. Take milk as much as will agree with you. If milk disturbs the stomach, boil the milk, or mix it with a little lime water. Lemonade, orangeade, tamarind water, crust coffee, slippery elm water, koumiss, charcoal water, etc., are well known and valuable drinks for the sick. Even pure cider is sometimes good for bilious and rheumatic sufferers. Soda mint water is good for sour stomachs. A teaspoonful of Bicarb soda, a half teaspoonful essence peppermint in a glass of sweetened water is good for dyspeptics.

SHUN stimulants of an alcoholic nature; wine, beer, etc., should be avoided. A cup of ginger tea, sage tea, or even black tea, chocolate or cocca, is worth far more as a stimulant, and is harmless.

BATHE daily, or at least twice a week, in water warm enough to be comfortable; avoid a chill. A sponge bath is very refreshing and should never be neglected in fevers. Anointing a restless patient with olive oil or glycerine and rose water, keeps the skin moist, soft, and allays fever and nervous excitement wonderfully; try it, the poor sufferer will bless you for your labor.

EXERCISE all your strength will permit, take exercise of a pleasant, not a tiresome form. Walk erect. *Fill your lungs*

THE BOWELS should move regularly every day, practice going to evacuate them at regular periods to overcome constipation, costiveness and ill health are constant companions.

COLD FEET.—Never sit with cold or damp feet. You need not suffer with cold feet, if you will use a warm foot bath of 1 gallon of water containing $\frac{1}{2}$ a cupful of salt and $\frac{1}{2}$ a tablespoonful of powdered capsicum, soak the feet for ten minutes, rub them dry, and in cold weather wear silk or cotton stockings next the feet, and thick woollen ones over them.

Keep the head cool, the feet warm, the skin clean, and the bowels open; eat, drink, and live temperately, breathe deeply of fresh, pure air, and take cheerful exercise. These rules, though simple, are all important, and speak volumes for good health.

ANTIDOTES FOR POISONS.

In cases where the other articles to be used as antidotes are not in the house, give two tablespoonfulls of mustard mixed in a pint of warm water. Also give large draughts of warm milk or water mixed with oil, butter or lard. If possible give as follows :--

For Bed-bug poison, Blue Vitriol, Corrosive Sublimate, Lead Water, Saltpetre, Sugar of Lead, Sulphate of Zinc, Red Precipitate, Vermilion: give Milk or White of Eggs, in large quantities.

Eggs, in large quantities. For Fowler's Solution, White Precipitate, Arsenic: Give prompt Emetic of Mustard and Salt -tablespoonful of each; follow with Sweet Oil, Butter or Milk. For Antimonial Wine, Tartar Emetic:

For Antimonial Wine, Tartar Emetic: Drink warm water to encourage vomiting. If vomiting does not stop, give a grain of Opium in water.

For Oil Vitriol, Aqua Fortis, Bi-Carbonate Potassa, Muriatic Acid, Oxalic Acid : Magnesia or Soap, dissolved in water or Glutinous drinks, For Carbonate of Soda, Copperas, Cobault : Prompt Emetic; Soap or Mucilaginous drinks.

For Strychnine, Tinct, Nux Vomica: Emetic of Mustard or Sulphate of Zinc, a. ed by warm water. For Nitrate of Silver: Give common

For Nitrate of Silver: Give common Salt in water.

For Chloral Hydrate, Chloroform: Pour cold water over the head and face, with artificial respiration, Galvanic Battery.

For Laudanum, Morphine, Opium: Strong Coffee, followed by Ground Mustard or Grease in warm water to produce vomiting. Keep in motion.
