CHANGE OF GAUGE ON THE NORTHERN.—On Sunday, June 19, the change of gauge on the Northern railway from Meador to Allandale Junction, and from Allandale to Penetanguishene, will be effected. The straight line from Toronto to Gravenhurst will also be changed as soon after as possible. Arrangements for the change have been fully completed, and no delay in traffic will follow.

THE INCURSIONS OF BRICK BUILDINGS.—The white exhalations which disfigure many brick buildings has given rise to considerable comment. Many think it is the effect of the severe frosts of the winter, but the following from the *American Architect* explains what the exhalation is, and shows how it can be prevented:—"The saltpetre of brickwork can generally be prevented by adding oil to the mortar, at the rate of a gallon to the cubic of lime. If cement is used in the mortar, an additional gallon of oil must be allowed for each cubic of cement. Lined oil is generally employed, but any kind which does not contain salt will answer. The incrustation, once formed, can be removed with hot water, or by the muriatic acid generally used for cleaning down brickwork, but it will reappear again by exhalation from the interior of the wall, and usually leaves a permanent black or brown stain.

BIG BLAZE IN KINCARDINE.

Kincardine, June 12.—At five o'clock yesterday afternoon a fire broke out in the back part of W. B. McLardy's tailoring establishment on King street, and quickly communicated to the stove and tin depot, owned and occupied by Geo. Sturgeon, the drug store occupied by J. R. Wright, and owned by Mrs. Pemberton, the harness and boot and shoe shop occupied by E. Leslie, and owned by Mrs. Pemberton, the photograph gallery of H. M. Legar, and an occupied store owned by Jno. McLeod. Notwithstanding the energy of the fire brigade and citizens, nothing could be done to save the buildings named. Much of the stock was removed in a damaged condition. The buildings are all frame, and burned like tinder, no rain having fallen here for several weeks. A fierce wind was blowing at the time the fire originated, but in about a quarter of an hour afterwards the wind ceased and rain commenced to fall. This proved of great advantage to the fire brigade, who worked throughout like heroes. A fire wall separating the block of wooden buildings from McKibbin's three-story brick block stayed the progress of the flames, and really proved the salvation of the west side of Queen Street. The losses are:—Geo. Sturgeon, \$6,000, on which is an insurance in the British American and Western of \$1,000 on the buildings and \$2,000 on the stock; E. Leslie, loss \$3,000, insured for \$1,000; H. M. Legar, loss \$800, insured for \$400; J. R. Wright, loss \$1,500, insured in the Phoenix for \$800; J. McLeod, loss, \$200, no insurance; W. B. McLardy's loss will probably be covered by insurance.

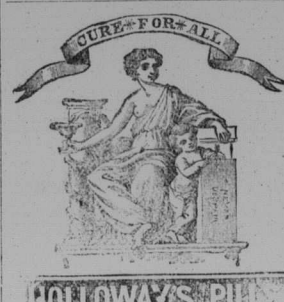

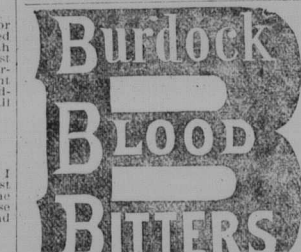

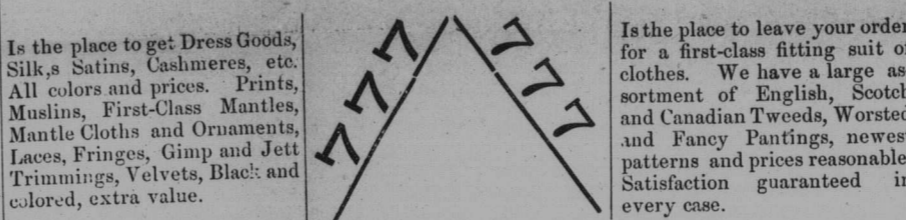
