DOES NOT SUIT RUSSIA

The Terms of Peace Not Acceptable to the Czar
A MOST VIGOROUS PROTEST.

Great Britain's Attitude Will be One of Quiet Vigilant Self-Protection—The Japanese Government Denies That an Alliance Has Been Formed—A Grave Situation.

St. Petersburg, April 22.—The newspapers here are unanimous in disapproving of the conditions for the conclusion of peace between China and Japan. They are opposed to the Japanese acquiring territory on the mainland of China. The Novo Vremya declares that Russia cannot tolerate the cession of territory north of the Gulf of Pechili, adding: "Japan may have Wei-Hai-Wei and any territory to the south. A revision treaty by which the European powers is necessary, as we believe that Great Britain inclines to a separate understanding with Japan."

Finally, the Novo Vremya says emphatically: "Russia cannot allow Japan to acquire the Liao-Tung peninsula." The newspaper mentioned urges prompt and vigorous action upon the part of Russia.

Britain's Policy.
London, April 22.—The Standard contends that Great Britain does not need to take the initiative in interfering with China and Japan. If the other powers, it adds, want to modify the treaty of peace, let them act. Great Britain's policy is one of quiet, vigilant self-protection.

A Paris despatch to the Times says that the Journal des Debats comments upon Great Britain's apparent isolation in her pro-Japanese. The paper appeals for European concert to promote a modification of the peace treaty before it is too late.

The Economist, commenting on the China-Japan situation, expresses the opinion that should China become an ally of Japan, Russia will be the only power to receive a serious attack. Any alarm that is felt in Europe over such a contingency, the Economist also believes, is greatly exaggerated. In conclusion the paper regards the treaty of peace as being a serious attack upon the part of the speculators in a sharp rise in silver.

The Standard believes China could borrow the entire amount of the indemnity at 6 to 7 per cent.

The speaker says that most of the industry is likely to remain in London for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the Japanese. The paper also thinks it unlikely that more than the sum of £10,000,000 of indemnity will be paid in silver.

There is no Alliance.
Yokohama, April 22.—The Government has issued a statement denying that it has concluded an offensive and defensive alliance with China and Japan. The statement also declares that the commercial advantages secured by Japan under the terms of the treaty will also be enjoyed by the Government under the "Most Favored Nation" treatment.

Intended to Alleviate Fears.
London, April 22.—The announcement by the Government that it has concluded an offensive and defensive alliance with China has been formed as a result of the conclusion of a treaty of peace between the two countries. It is intended to allay the open expressed fears of Europe in general. It was generally understood that the treaty would contain no clause to that effect, but the impression prevailed, and perhaps will not be altogether dispelled by the Japanese Government's denial that there would be several secret agreements which would not be included in the official treaty. This special point aroused much unanimous opposition that the Japanese Government made haste through its minister to disavow the impression. He denied, with authority, that the treaty contains any provision for an offensive and defensive alliance. It is believed that the treaty will be secretly revised by the European powers, through its minister in order to secure liberty to carry out her plans without interference. Altogether the matter is regarded as a serious diplomatic event since the Berlin treaty was signed.

Germany's Veto.
A despatch to the Times from Berlin says that the North German Gazette (semi-official) publishes an article of similar import to that contained in the Cologne Gazette on Saturday.

The Cologne Gazette on Saturday said in view of the official returns received by the war party in Japan, Germany at the beginning of March, enjoined the negotiators of the great powers as of the terms demanded for peace, urging that the cession of territory upon the mainland of China would be especially calculated to induce the intervention of the powers. When it was shown by the published terms of peace that Japan was not disposed to follow Germany's advice, steps were immediately taken to establish an accord with the powers, and a complete agreement has been reached with Russia and France. The powers, Germany, Russia and France, will now take steps to protect their interests in Eastern Asia. The question of territorial changes will be first kept in view against Japan's desire to bind herself like a solid girdle around China in order to shut off China entirely from Europe. In case of need, the three powers mentioned intend to avert in good time any injury to their interests. It was added, however, that Germany was not prepared to enjoy the fruits of her military prowess on condition that it does not injure German interests.

Transport and Despatch.
London, April 22.—A despatch to the Times from Kobe says that on April 19th and 18th, 25 steamers left Kobe for Tientsin, with 90,000 Japanese troops. It is believed that these troops are destined to make a descent upon Tientsin and Shantung directly the time of the armistice shall have expired.

Business Failures in Canada.
Monday was 23 business failures reported from Canada against 30 last week, 31 in the week a year ago and 21 two years ago. Bank clearings at Winnipeg, Toronto, Hamilton, Montreal and Halifax aggregate only \$18,130,000 this week. Last week they were \$17,500,000 and last year for the week \$18,000,000.

TERMS OF THE TREATY.

Chinese Who Furnished Supplies to the Japanese Must Not Be Punished.

Washington, April 20.—The stipulation in the treaty of peace between China and Japan that the Chinese who have been captured by the Japanese and others who have supplied the Japanese troops in their march through Manchuria and Shantung shall not be punished by the Chinese authorities, was inspired, by humane considerations. It is the custom of China to bestow such of her soldiers as fall into the hands of the enemy, and she afterwards returned to their country. During several naval and land engagements upwards of 5,000 Chinese troops were captured by the Japanese and it is to preserve their lives that the foregoing provision was inserted in the treaty. The same considerations influenced the other provision relative to the purchase of supplies from Chinese subjects. The curious stipulation in the treaty that the Chinese shall not be a single prisoner of war belonging to Japan.

Until the beginning of the war between China and Japan each country had a consular jurisdiction over its subjects in the other. It would appear that Japan will no longer grant this privilege to China although stipulating for a consular jurisdiction for herself. The explanation given for this exception is that Japan is now a civilized country with a code of laws based on the highest principles of justice and equity and that she can be safely trusted to deal fairly with the Chinese subjects living within her borders.

China, on the other hand, it is asserted, is still a barbarous country and foreigners residing there are not given the protection of their own country since little, if any, will be afforded to them by the local authorities.

WORKMEN FATALLY HURT.
Three Men Killed and Four Injured by the Fall of a Derrick.

Chicago, April 20.—The lives of two workmen were instantly crushed yesterday by the fall of a derrick which was being used in the yards of the South Chicago Ship Building Co. Three others were hurt about the head and arms, but were able to walk to their homes. Those killed were Harry Black, William Harvey, and William McColl, internally injured. Jack Hawkins, has a broken leg, his legs broken and back injured.

The accident occurred on the deck of the big steel masted derrick which is being built for John Corrigan. The derrick was used for hoisting the masts and plates that were being placed in the hull of the vessel. One of the hoisting apparatus gave way before the workmen could save themselves.

Evangelical Association's Annual Meeting.
Saskatoon, Ont., April 19.—The annual conference of the Evangelical Association met at South Cayuga yesterday for the transaction of annual business. Conference was opened with devotional exercises. Bishop J. J. Fisher, of Chicago, presiding. Rev. H. Maitland, minister of the Presbyterian church, gave an interesting report of the flourishing condition of the publishing establishment at Cleveland, Ohio. He declared an annual dividend of \$24 to the Canada conference. Rev. J. C. Hornberger, of Cleveland, Ohio, after the Living Epistle and the English Sunday school literature, addressed the conference in the evening. He urged the evangelists to greater brotherhood as preachers on the part of the British and Foreign Bible Society, William B. Walker, of Henry Holtzman, of Milwaukee; W. O. Hehn, of Ayles, Wis.; W. W. Wiltner, of Tavistock, Devon, England, and others.

Sixty Business Houses Destroyed by Fire.
Saskatoon, I.T., April 20.—The main portion of Ardmore for six solid blocks on Cadogan street north and south of Main street was destroyed by fire yesterday. Sixty business houses were entirely destroyed. The loss will aggregate \$500,000. The United States court and jail were also destroyed. The heat was so intense that the main portion of the court house were cracked and the court records partly destroyed. The masonic temple was also burned. The loss of the masonic temple was \$100,000. A man named John N. was so badly burned that she cannot recover.

A Negro Executed.
Windsor, Ont., April 19.—Thornton Parker, colored, who assaulted Mrs. Nelson, a white woman, was executed here yesterday. He exhibited wonderful courage on the scaffold and prayed all the time even after the black cap was placed over his face and the rope adjusted. His last words were: "I am going to make my home in heaven and I want you all to meet me. I am the man that done the act and I want to go home."

Income Tax Receipts.
Washington, April 20.—Commissioner Miller, of the Internal Revenue Bureau, said that the official returns received from semi-official estimates he placed the aggregate to be obtained from the Income Tax at \$1,000,000. When the correct returns are all in and the penalties imposed collected the amount will be increased to nearly \$15,000,000.

Negatives, Mich., April 20.—The Wheat mine will double its present force as soon as men can be secured and will work to its fullest capacity during the entire season. Recent heavy sales of ore to Chicago consumers have guaranteed activity in the mine during the entire season.

An Increase in Wages.
Providence, R.I., April 20.—The West-bosset Mills have posted notices of an increase in the wages of 25 cents a week to the men employed in the mill. These hands have been receiving lower wages than are paid in the other mills.

Sentenced for Forgery.
New York, April 20.—Jacob S. Herzog, a well-known furrier and a reputed member of the firm of Herzog & Co., who was convicted of forgery, was sentenced to six years and six months in the State prison.

Abducted by a Half-Breed.
Greenburg, Pa., April 19.—Mrs. Julia Holly, wife of a miner at Hunter, and her three children, were abducted by a half-breed Indian, named Joe Dupont, who has been loitering in the vicinity of the Hollis home a few days.

Choked by a Window Sash.
Ottawa, April 20.—Emma Thomas, the seven-year-old only child of Mr. Fred Thomas, painter, became separated from her mother up town and going home tried to get in the house through a window. The sash fell on her neck and choked her to death. A companion first discovered the body hanging out of the window and gave the alarm.

FOUR ELECTIONS HELD

Dr. Montague Elected in Haldimand
by 647 Majority.

M'GREGG DEFEATED IN QUEBEC
Mr. C. A. Geoffrion, the Liberal Candidate Elected in Verchere by 157—Collin McEwen Succeeded in Capetown by 103—John Thompson's Seat.

Cayuga, April 18.—The weather yesterday was beautiful, and in every way favorable for an election day, but the roads throughout the country were in a terrible condition. Polling in this town proceeded quietly and orderly. There was a large Roman Catholic vote here, and it was cast for Dr. Montague.

Reports from outside points state that there was very little excitement, and that only a comparatively small number of votes were polled.

Montague's majorities were: Cayuga, 70; Caledonia, 95; Hagersville, 130; Kohls, 20; Glasgow, 11; Wintonia, 15; Ballville, 49; Zions Hall, Onondia, 5; Onondia, 35; Fisherville, 77; Indiana, 4; York, 30; Felch, 23; Walpole, 26; Nancton, 21; Chambers Hall, Onondia, 10; Hall, Jarvis, 27; Orange Hall, Walpole, 17; Springville, 29; Gurnee, 29; Indian Reservoir, 24; Total majority, 647.

Quebec, April 18.—Mr. R. B. Dobbie was elected in Quebec West by seven majority over Mr. McGregg, the late member. Out of this number three bulletins in favor of McGregg were rejected by the returned voters, and the interpretation of the law governing voting. A recount is spoken of. The vote was: Dobbie, 887; McGregg, 880.

The Result in Verchere.
Verchere, Que., April 18.—The election for the vacant seat in the Commons caused by the demise of the late Hon. F. Geoffrion, which took place yesterday, was closely contested and resulted in the victory of Mr. C. A. Geoffrion, the Liberal candidate by 157 majority, as compared with 103 majority received by the late member in the last general election.

A Liberal Elected in Antigonish.
Halifax, N.S., April 18.—In the contest for the vacant seat in the Commons caused by the death of the late Sir John Thompson, yesterday, resulted in Mr. McIsaac's, Liberal, being elected by a majority.

MRS. PARNELL ROBBED.
The Mother of the Late Irish Leader Robbed by Thieves.

Bordenston, N.J., April 20.—Mrs. Della T. S. Parnell, mother of the late Charles Stewart Parnell, was yesterday assaulted here by highwaymen, who robbed her of a black satchel and a small amount of money, and escaped with the open satchel and scattering its contents around the ground.

Mrs. Parnell was highly hysterical when help reached her and became unconscious. She was carried to a farm house of one of her neighbors, and restoratives were applied. Mrs. Parnell was severely injured on the back of the head. Dr. Shipp visited Mrs. Parnell and declared that his patient's skull is not fractured and that her condition was much improved. She had regained consciousness.

Two tramps were arrested in the vicinity of Mrs. Parnell's house as suspects. Unable to produce evidence, however, they were released with the usual caution. County Prosecutor Ridd ordered Justice Steele to leave nothing undone in his power to capture the highwaymen.

Mrs. Parnell is 80 years of age. Bordenston, N.J., April 20.—There is no material change in the condition of Mrs. Parnell since Saturday, as she is still unable to recover intelligently. Owing to her advanced age, however, it is regarded as being critical. While the physicians fear the most is the injury at the base of the brain, the ambulance was not fractured except almost a miracle, as the blow struck by the villain was evidently a terrible one. There is no chance of the perpetrator of the deadly assault.

Mrs. Parnell passed a good night and seemed brighter this morning, but as the day advanced, she grew weaker, and it is doubtful whether she will survive the shock of the operation. The ambulance was developed to throw any light upon the case, although the detectives are still as "work." The theory that the crime was committed by tramps is not believed.

Police Officer Hartmann, Pippots and Johnson, who were on duty at the scene yesterday afternoon on the outskirts of the city and looked them up in the city jail, pending an examination.

Frank Postman Here.
Chicago, April 19.—Reuben Johnson, an expressman, and the small son of John Holden, a manufacturer of fireworks, died yesterday afternoon of cholera. Johnson had gone to Holden's house to haul away a load of fireworks. While there he sent out for a can of beer, bringing it and giving the rest to the child. The child died within a few minutes and Johnson expired in the ambulance while being taken to a hospital. It is believed that some of the poisonous substances used in making fireworks had gotten in the can or into the glass out of which the beer was drunk.

Drowning Accident at Pembroke.
Pembroke, Ont., April 19.—A drowning accident occurred yesterday about three o'clock, five miles from Deseronto. A young man named Edrick Charbonneau, while engaged graveling one of the dams at Pine Sault Creek fell into the water, and was drowned before assistance could be rendered to him. Charbonneau was a native of St. Rose, Lavall County, Que., where his remains will be conveyed. He was about 22 years of age and unmarried.

A Rise in the Price of Leather.
New York, April 19.—A special meeting of the Leather Binding Manufacturers Association was held in this city. It was decided to increase the price of binding 30 per cent over the price now prevailing, the advance to take effect April 22. The reason for the increase in the price of binding is the recent heavy advance in hides and hand leather due to the scarcity of cattle.

Duke of Aosta to Wed Princess Helena.
London, April 19.—The Duke of Aosta, and the Princess Helena of Orleans will be married at Stowe house, Twickenham, on June 8.

Two Sailors Drowned.
Port Townsend, Wash., April 19.—The schooner Behring Sea, from Tacoma, has been found 35 miles west of Cape Flattery bottom up. The crew of ten persons is supposed to have been drowned. The vessel was making her maiden voyage to the halibut banks and was deemed unworthy.

Death of a Farmer from His Home and Shoot Himself in the Saving of a Life.
Boston, Mass., April 22.—Ex-Chaplain John L. Sullivan distinguished himself as a life-saver yesterday afternoon. As John was leaving his boarding house on Dover street, just before four o'clock, he heard a woman scream in the rear house. He ran down the stairs and saw at once that there was a fire in the kitchen and that Mrs. Kearsley, who was the cook, was in danger of burning to death. Her clothing having been ignited she was unable to get out. Sullivan wrapped a big mat around the woman and succeeded in extinguishing the fire. She was badly injured, however, but the chances are favorable for her recovery. Sullivan's hands were burned in several places and he is obliged to consult a doctor, but the wounds are not serious.

RIDDLED WITH SHOT.
Whiteside Decey a Farmer from His Home and Shoot Himself in the Saving of a Life.
Newton, Ala., April 22.—W. R. Blackshear, a well-to-do farmer, living near town, was decapitated from his house by Whiteside Saturday night about 10 o'clock and half a dozen loads of shot poured into his face, breast and abdomen, killing him instantly.

CHURCH REUNION.
London Times Comments on the Pope's Sympathy to the English People.
London, April 22.—In an editorial on the Pope's sympathy to the English people on the re-union of the Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches the Times says the document was doubtless intended to convey that on doctrinal points no compromise could be thought of. Lord Halifax and his friends, the paper adds, would do well to take this salutary lesson to heart. The reunion of the churches is a new dream and the Pope has done his best to make this perfectly plain.

Death of a Cyclone.
Mobile, Ala., April 22.—From Captain J. D. Vick, of the Alabama river steamer Tinsle Moore, which just arrived, is learned the details of a terrific cyclone which passed over Mobile's Landing, 200 miles north of Mobile.
