It can not be scientifically right to be even temporarily and partially paralyzing the nerves day by day, and that is the effect of even a small glass of wine, a teaspoonful of brandy, or a tumbler of beer. No matter how well the drug-drinker may appear to be today, there is a sore and certain tomorrow coming in which nerves will avenge the wrong done them, and refuse at some crisis to do what is required of them.

Second, I believe in total abstinence from the point of view of brain power. To be thoughtful, observant and accurate, the brain must be active, alert and sympathetic. Its atmosphere must be habitually clear and calm, but it must possess the faculty of "taking fire" in inspirational moments. To blunt the capacity for feeling pain is what is accomplished, doubtless, when alcohol is taken to quiet the worried nerves, or to stop some ache or creep up the courage, but at the same time the faculty for feeling joy, the perception of beauty and all the purely spiritual qualities have also been blunted, and the result of frequent blunting is the ultimate deadening.

Third, I believe in total abstinence because as a wife and mother and in a word as a household I am bound to set the best example I can before all—in my unselfish, industrious and orderly ways, and in all matters of food, drink, clothing, conversation, and general conduct, as well as in my ability to give advice, help, reproval, loving service, pleasure and comfort. Not a single prisoner, lunatic, pauper, or "insane" epileptic, but publishes the existence of an unhappy home! The great determining cause of nine-tenths of the misery has been decided by incontrovertible authorities of all kinds to be alcoholic drink. I love my country; how then could I have any respect for a traffic that so beggars her of happy homes, and so disastrously threatens her future? Nay, my lips have from babyhood prayed, "Christ, Thy kingdom come," and every year depends my conviction that each living human being is to help prepare that prayer.
