THE OPPOSITION—AND THEIR HOPES.

"Hope's a speculator,
'Tis not what *weas*, but what *will be*."

A month or so from now, the Opposition will meet the enemy at Phillip's. Mr. A. G. Blair and those who follow him, are, therefore, hopeful. But hope at any rate is a kind of Sister of Charity. It is an angel of joy that waits on everyone; it adds a fringe of silver to the blackest cloud, and to the longest night it gives a dawning, long ere the "herald of the morning" announces the day. Why bless you even Satan, when weltering on a sea of fire and brimstone was hopeful. And of what! Why that he would yet be able to defeat the Al. might, even though He had thunderbolts and fiery hail at his command. And the Titans too, tried to turn Jove out of Heaven. Was not these ambitious fellows that piled Ossa on Pelion? Yes. And the frog too; he was ambitious: A frog one day saw an ox grazing in a field, and Hope visited his semi-comatose breast. He would one day be as large as the ox. So he waxed and grew fat, from "feeding high and living soft," but sad to relate he burst.

The Opposition too is hopeful, and it would be cruel in us to disperse their castles of air and folly. Last winter their opportunity to hurl the Government from power came, if it is ever to come. For the new Government had to bear the sins of the old; indeed Mr. Blair tried them before the Bar of the Legislature for offences they were yet to commit; but wonderful to relate, the verdict was acquittal. Dear only know's what this veteran leader will bring up this session. How would it do for him to try the Government on the sins their sons and grandsons may commit?

There is alas no bright lining to the Opposition cloud. Bridges have been swept away and culverts pulled down, but Providence operating through the elements, regardless of Mr. Blair, is responsible. Times are not as good as they used to be 'tis true, so the revenues have shrunk, but it will be hard to lay this at the door of either Mr. Fraser or Mr. Wedderburn. The cloak has been pulled off the back of the Grand Southern Railway, but nothing horrible has manifested. The people of the province generally, yea, even those who in headlong haste on stubbing their toe against a stone, come back and seek revenge on the inanimate petrification, satisfied that the Government has done all in its power. No department has suffered either through carelessness or profligacy. The member of each has been always at his post when duty called, and given satisfaction when he moved to action. Mr. Fraser is just as honest as ever, and looks nearly as much upon the ethical side of a question as upon the political side. Mr. Wedderburn, Angus like, has had his eye on everything, and he must have more ability than we gave him credit for, who points out where Mr. W.'s efforts are not the result of legitimate causes. Mr. Landry has been late and early at his duty and there is scarce a road or bridge from north to south, from east to west that he has not seen. His expenditures will be beyond honest reproach. And those who have read the STAR need not be told how Mr. Adams has been doing his duty. Indeed he has gone so far in doing what an officer in his position should do, that he has brought down upon his head the censure of unscrupulous papers that support the faction of which Mr. Blair has the honor to be the leader.

And with all this Mr. Blair has hope? We can't believe it.

It just seems doubtful enough now if the Legislature will be able to meet before the middle of next month. It is to be hoped though it will meet before that date.

Horrible to relate St. John has begun to draft the usual grist of bills to present to the Legislature.

It will be observed that the fisheries are an important branch of industry in Newcastle; but it is to be hoped that the large quantities taken will not impoverish the rivers. Some time ago parties fishing for smelt above what is called "Middle Island," took large quantities of young bass, but the authorities seeing that this would soon destroy that fish, forbade smelt fishing in this locality. Bass now is becoming one of the most highly prized of fishes, bringing 10 to 12 cents a pound; they are bought up on the ice the moment they are taken out of the water. It is important, in view of the extent of the fishery operations to the North, and of the valuable nature of those fisheries, that the Department keep its eyes open against the abuse and destruction of such a source of wealth.

The number of partridge exported it will be seen is very large. This is due to the almost fabulous prices they bring in Boston and New York. Shippers in Newcastle who purchased for 25 cents a pair, sold in New York for 60 cents a pair. But whenever an industry becomes a very profitable one, one of two results is almost sure to follow; either an overproduction by that industry—if it is inexhaustible—or a destruction of the industry itself. The latter will be the case with the partridge trade. Year after year our woods are becoming thinner and thinner of partridge, and in a few years that bird will be a thing of the past. We invite the attention of the Legislature to this matter at its next sitting; and not alone to this matter, but to our game laws in general.

TENNYSON AGAIN OUT IN ILL-BECOMING COSTUME.

Tennyson has just completed two plays called "The Old Love and the New," and "The Falcon." The poet-Laureate is of course one of the most notorious men in England to-day; and it is not to be wondered at that "The Falcon" has set "the London world agog." The theatre goes of London seem to have been enraptured with this play; but this is due rather to the fame and talents of the author than to the merits of the drama. Quite likely had some "mnte inglorious Milton written it" it would scarce have been breathed of outside the theatre door. Tennyson is not the man to please the throng; above all his talents do not lie in the direction of the drama. He is a "waking sleeper," and the most "upward talking" poet of whom we have any record. Most of his poems require study to be understood, and a peculiar frame of mind to receive them. It would not be found convenient for the groundlings to have to study the lines of "The Falcon" as they heard them repeated. No, Tennyson's laurels are not won from stage poetry. But the Falcon is good in its way.

ATTACKED BY A DOG.—"A SHOCKING STORY."

A pig belonging to Mr. Robert Seaborn, saloonkeeper, was attacked on last Sunday morning by a dog and fearfully torn and cut.—Woodstock cor. Telegraph.

Dear sakes alive, was't that shocking. The idea of a pig, peaceably patrolling the streets, being assaulted and bitten by a dog! But the readers of the Telegraph would like to know how the pig is doing, and what are his hopes of recovery. Even the locality, length, depth or width of the wounds the animal received have not been mentioned. There is not a word even about the surgeon. These should have been a photograph of the hog accompanying the description, for people who get the news in the vague way above are left in painful uncertainty as to the size of the pig, his age, and other important matters. Couldn't Mr. O'Donnell gather the facts? The Telegraph will be on hand to publish them. We sympathize deeply with Mr. Seaborn, the owner of the pig, and with his relatives in their deep affliction.

Bark - A Big Enterprise.
Judging from appearances, a very clearly defined corner in the hemlock bark market is approaching. The Maine tanners have been obliged to succumb to the inevitable and to come into New Brunswick. The Shaw Bros. have lately bought between four and five hundred acres of land in the vicinity of Millville, Carleton Co., from the N. B. Railway Company, on which to erect a tannery, and it is said also contemplate building a mammoth saw-mill just below Pokok, in the great bark country, of the border district, long famous as containing the best and soundest hemlock in the country. [Many years since when Messrs. Hill & Berry, prominent lumber dealers of our city, bought many thousand acres of timber land from the Crown, Messrs Shaw Bros. furnished half the funds for privilege of cutting bark in this vicinity.]
The price offered the N. B. Railway Co. by the Messrs. Shaw was \$1.00 per cord, equivalent to about \$1.00 per thousand feet sup. for the hemlock trees as they stand.
We see the wisdom of Mr. Ryan, member for Gloucester's, remarks before the Provincial Parliament in 1878, in reference to hemlock bark and would call the earnest attention of the Government to the necessity for preserving the splendid hemlock lands near the tip, territorial Railway, north of Moncton, which might be made in the way of stumpage to pay into the Provincial Treasury very large sums of money.

E. Clarke, Esq., Alder-House Commissioner, was favored with an order for \$200 for the use of the poor.
Petitions presented by William Lewis, Edward Lucy, John Brown and A. C. Bally, asking for relief from taxation, were referred to the Assessment Appeal Committee.
Petition of N. S. Morgan was handed over to Wellington Ward Councillors.
Report from Clock Committee, that the balance, \$1721.44, due George E. Eneay, Esq., on account of money loaned to the city for the purchase of city stock, be paid in yearly instalments of \$50, at a p. c. interest, on the 1st of December in each year; and one from City Clerk, stating that the Chief Justice had decided that the city had and should have sole control of Queens Ward Market, but that said Market was a free market,—were received and filed accordingly.
In relation to market affairs that had so attracted public attention, Alderman Burchill opened the campaign with the following resolution:
Whereas—a practice has been growing up of regulating the market by means of resolutions arrived at privately by a majority of the aldermen, not in Council assembled, as was lately the case regarding the public markets, which is against law, prejudicial to public interests and dangerous as a precedent, therefore,
Resolved, That in future all such resolutions of Aldermen, or any regulations of public markets, not in Council, be declared null and void, and the rights and duties of their representatives in Council, and under all circumstances to be discontinued; and
Resolved, That it be declared a breach of duty on the part of any officer to follow or be governed by instructions received through any such irregular course or otherwise than by regular order of Council.
This resolution was seconded by Ald. Moore, and on division being taken, resulted in a tie.
Yes—Ald. Burchill, Moore, Richey and Babbitt.
Nays—J. W. Simmons, Vandine Junter and G. H. Simmons.
The Mayor, after assigning some potent reasons in favor of legal procedure in all cases involving the wishes of the citizens, gave the deciding vote in favor of the resolution.
An amount of general business came up for consideration. Cheques were issued in favor of Martin Nowlan, \$50, for taking charge of City Hall heating apparatus; Ald. Gunter \$50 for payment of revisors, and the salaries of policemen and city teamsters, ordered to be paid.
The Market Committee then begged to report.
That pending a decision in the market case, so to the right of the City Council to collect fees in the lower market, the Secretary-Treasurer of the County issued posters, declaring the Lower Market a free market, and the effect of this was that the market was deserted the Phoenix Square Market, thereby reducing the value and standing of this city property; your committee, after consultation with other members of the Board, decided to direct the Clerk of the Phoenix Square Market to collect the same until further notice, which has been done, and your committee now request that their actions be confirmed.
As the opinion of the Hon. the Chief Justice is, that the Lower Market is and must remain a free market, your committee consider that the market should remain in its present state until a new Council come into power who will then be in a position to further deal with the matter. Your committee, however, beg to declare as their opinion that legislative remedy should be sought, and if not obtainable, that a special case should be brought before the court to obtain a full and clear knowledge of the city's rights in the Markets.

Moved by Alderman G. H. Simmons that report be adopted in toto.
Alderman Burchill moved in amendment that the report be received and disposed of section by section. The Council divided themselves on this report as follows: Mayor Gregory gave the casting vote in favor of amendment, and the report was taken up in sectional order.
The question raised with regard to adoption of section number one was decided in the negative, the casting vote of His Honor being again necessary.
Sections two and three, with regard to leaving the matter of the Markets to their successors, and the pending legislation means to effect an understanding, were adopted without division.
The Mayor then reported that he had been served with a rule nisi to show return mandamus in re Owens, and informed the Council in substance thereof it would be necessary to direct the City Clerk to appear at next term of Court.
The motion of Alderman Simmons, supported by Alderman Vandine, to the effect that City Clerk be instructed to appear and show cause accordingly for former section of Council, was decided on question, in the negative.
Yes—Aldermen Gunter, Simmons and Vandine; Nays—Aldermen Burchill, Moore, Babbitt, Richey and J. W. Simmons, 5.
"Our duty will be to see that the effect of this action against showing cause for former resolution, will necessitate a mandamus absolute being issued, and Mr. Owens furnished with license to sell intoxicating liquors as under the old law."

Communications from the St. John Relief and Aid Society and H. Rainsford, Jr., (in reference to Administration of Justice) were laid over till next meeting.
The committee appointed last meeting to report on advisability or otherwise of relieving rising industries from taxation, reported.
That they had the matter their most careful consideration, and beg to recommend that this city do hereafter relieve any company starting a new enterprise or industry of a different description from any at present established in the city from taxation for a term of years from the date of their commencing—this privilege not to take place, however, until at least ten thousand dollars of the capital stock be paid up.

The meeting then adjourned.

SAINT JOHN NOTES.
"GOD HELP THE POOR."
A few weeks ago, some of our local philanthropists, touched with pity at the condition of some poor families in this town, banded together for the purpose of suggesting to the Town Council a measure whereby the distress among the poor could be relieved. They held meetings and framed and passed a resolution appropriating the sum of \$200 from the funds of each Ward. Now it is generally understood that the Wards are not in funds, and the proposed work remains in statu quo,—or, in plain English, at a stand still. Next Spring, when other avenues of work are open, we expect that some of the wise acres will be bestirring themselves.

The British troops at last seem to have set their mind on Herat. A disturbance in that refractory city a day or two ago, in which the natives seemed to desire a quarrel with the British, has furnished a pretext for the advance of troops from the Punjab, with a view to bring the troops to Herat. England's only chance is to invest Herat, Cabul, and occupy the passes.
There are rumors of a revolution in Durango, Mexico. Particulars have not been obtained.

Telegraphic News.
CABLE BRIEFS.
A flying column of 1000 men has been formed for service in the Kyber Passes. The Mayor of Dublin solicits aid from America for the relief of distress in Ireland.
The reported movement of Russian troops towards the Austrian frontier is denied.
Further arrests of officers charged with nihilism have been made in St. Petersburg and the Provinces.
It is believed that St. Vallier, the French Ambassador to Germany, has been persuaded to remain at Berlin.
Before the evacuation of Cabul, Mahomed Jan wrote to General Roberts, that although for the present retreating, the Afghans would not cease hostilities until the English are driven entirely out of Afghanistan.
The czar has summoned Prince Don-donok Korsakoff to St. Petersburg to discuss the present condition of affairs in Bulgaria. It is considered that modification of the Bulgarian constitution is necessary.
A Jellalabad despatch says the Moh-lahs are increasing in their attempts to incite a Mahammad rising.
Daoud Shah, commander-in-chief of the army of the ex-Ameer, has been sent a prisoner to India.

MISCELLANEOUS.
London Truth pleads thus for Home Rule—"We must accept facts. Among the Irish Home Rulers there is much exaggeration of language, but this exaggeration would not secure to them the support of the vast majority of their countrymen, were it not that it is felt that there is some considerable amount of justice beneath this exaggeration. It is manifestly absurd that matters on which the Irish are fully competent to judge should be taken out of their hands and decided by an Assembly, the majority of whose members know no more about Ireland than they do about the North Pole."
The condition of Italy just now is sad. The harvest was altogether deficient; the Italian corn, which a large part of the population mainly depend on for food, was almost a total failure; the potatoes are diseased, and very bad and dear; the chestnuts, which are the chief staple of food in the hilly districts, are a poor crop, and now comes winter, unusually early and unusually severe, preventing all out-door work. At Faenza there have been bread riots, and the military had to be called out. At Rome the bakers' shops have been sacked by bands of hungry peasants; at Sorrente like scenes have occurred, and in the provinces the people are clamoring for bread and employment. The number of beggars is greatly increased.
An interesting experiment was lately made in a lake near Berlin in the raising of sunken vessels by means of carbonic acid, according to a method devised by Herr Eidner, of Vienna. In an empty balloon is inserted a vessel containing sulphuric acid, and secured by Bullich's salt. (By turning a screw the vessel is broken, the substances mix, and the carbonic acid, thus generated, fills the balloon, which, being connected with the sunken object exerts an elevated force on it. In the Plöthen Lake a small boat, weighing several hundred weight, was first sunk. A diver went down with the apparatus, fixed it, and set it in action. Hardly was this done when the boat appeared on the surface, held by the balloon. An experiment with five heavy sand bags was equally successful.
The cold weather in England has had a singular effect on the birds. A woodcock was recently found in the Fenlands, a bird which is singularly incident is related from Surrey. A humane lady in that country has, since the frost set in, opened her bedroom window each morning and thrown out a sop of all kinds of good things to the feathered tribe. One severe morning recently she opened her window as usual, but there was considerable delay by her servants in lighting the food to her. The lady returned to her bed, leaving the window open, and fell asleep. Presently the whole household were aroused by her screams, and on going to her room no less than nineteen poor, half-starved rooks were found in it. Eleven of them had entered the bed, and had commenced pecking violently at the bed clothes covering the alarmed lady.

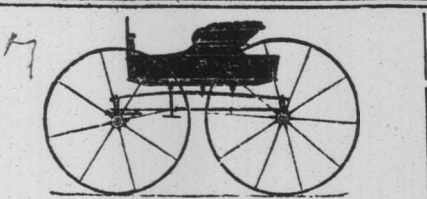
