We are pleased to report that substantial progress has bsen
made with the matter of the Nurses' Home project during the year. An organization was effected and a campaign for fund s launched throughout the County which met with a generous and ready re
sponse. The report of the Treasurer of the Nurses' shows the amount of $\$ 22, i+6$. 10 to date available for the con Fund ion of the Home. Competitive plans were asked for from sever Architects, ard those submitted by Mr. F. Neil Brodie of St. John wr re accepted with certain modifications. With the final approval
of the Plans, Public Tenders were asked and the offer of Messrs. Pars mins-Ed Company Led. accepted for $\$ 13290.25$. The Contractars have made excellent progress to date, and we hope that the
Nurses' Home will be a reality before long. It is estimated that it will be necessary to borrow about S2,, 000 . to complete a nd furnish but realizing that the Home was an absolute necessity; decided to commit themselves, relying on the assurance that their action wouid generous support in liquidating the loan as soon as possible,
