The Thirteenth Annual Report of the Catholic Sailors' Club bas ust been issued, with a record of December 31, 1908. It suggests much more than that to those who remember the beginnings of the Club in the Spring of 1893. A handful of men, most of them bard workers themselves, had been devoting their leisure to the seaman. ladies consulted with the Jesuit Fathers of St Mary's College, who archbishop gave his blessing and approval to the enterprise. Meetings were held, a loft was rented in and curtained, tables covered with green baize, a few pictures hung on the wall, effected a marvelous transformation. It only required plenty of chairs, a hired piano, some games, stationery and reading matter, and the Club had become a fact. Maritime Union.

The Maritime Board Trade held its annual meeting in this city on Wednesday and Thursday of last week. Representatives from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and conclave and introduced, discussed and passed many reso lutions. Among the resoluwas one in favor of Maritime Union; that is the union of and Prince Edward Island into one Province, with one Legislature, instead of three, as at present.

So far as this Province is concerned, we feel sure that no one who gives the question serious consideration; no one who has our real interests at heart, will favor a union of this kind. It is generally admitted, we believe, by Prince Edward Islanders that we have had all the union we want, or that is to our advantage. It must be patent to even the least observant, that if this should become a real practical question, Prince Edward Island is bound to suffer in any terms that would be satisfactory to theother two larger Provinces. We are suffering severely now in consequence of our phatic protest. small and declining influence in the greater Confederation, and surely we should be careful not to allow ourselves to be placed at a still greater dis advantage by completely submerging our Provincial iden-

In the discussion of the solution under review, the manner of fairplay and equality to be expected by Prince Edward Island in such a union became manifestly apparent. Mr. Johnson, of Halifax, was particular to emphasize the superiority of the Province of Nova Scotia, and to put for ward as a condition upon which that Province would entertain the proposition of union, that the other two Provinces should simply become counties of his favored land. Senator Ross, also of Nova Scotia, was very emphatic in asserting that Nova Scotia would "of course be the capital." He moved an addendum to the resolution, setting forth that the Govern ments of the three Maritime Provinces be requested to appoint committees to come together and consider the question of union. In this rider to the original resolution, the aged Senator found an opportunity for slighting our Province; inasmuch as he named a committee of five from the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick; but only three from the Government of Prince Edward Island. One would think that he, at least, would have re frained from showing his animus as he is on the verge of the grave, and in the natural course of events it can make very little difference to him what unions may or may not take place.

After a multiplicity o speeches the resolution, as amended by Senator Ross, was put to the meeting and carried, with only one dissenting, Mr. A. J. McDonald, of Georgetown. Surely, the most extraordinary phase of this discussion was the atti tude of the Island delegates.
