The Evening Chit-Chat

A society called the "Gideons" which is composed of Christian Travellers has recently started a crusade to place Bibles in the guest-rooms of all the hotels in the country.

Many thousands have been accepted by the managers of all classes of hotels from the most fashionable and expensive hostries to the one night lodging houses.

In New York the Hotel Savoy received a hundred Bibles, the Plaza 700, and the Hotel Astor 800. Now, when they get all the hotels in the country supplied, I have another suggestion for the Gideons and that is that they start a crusade to place Bibles in our homes.

I really think that everyone would be astonished if a census could be taken showing how many homes—houses I would say—are absolutely without a Bible.

You see, the furniture dealers, who advertise to fit out our young people for housekeeping at the rate of forty-nine or ninety-eight dollars for four rooms, probably don't include Bibles in that furnishing. And as for the huge family Bible which used to be such a common wedding present—well how long since you've seen one at a wedding?

But not all of the houses that lack a Bible are of the "four-rooms-for-

marriage exhortation which describes the first cause for which marriage was ordained. A committee recommended that the clause should be:

"It was ordained for the increase of mankind" instead of "It was ordained for the procreation of children."

The Archbishop of Birmingham said he did not think the inclusion of the word "procreation" was at all effective. To a large number of persons it was widely offensive, and, as a priest, he felt it with hesitation and blurred over it, a great deal of the effect of the teaching which the exhortation was meant to convey, and which he regarded as extremely valuable, was lost.

The committee's recommendation was agreed to.

Household Notes.

I know a woman who always keeps a small piece of whetstone in her machine drawer for sharpening needles when they become blunted. It is a great scheme and saves a lot of needles, as I have proved to my own satisfaction.

Here is a suggestion for easily ironing a bonnet with a drawing: by it, clip the string or tape at one side and fasten a small safety pin in it. Smooth out the fullness, letting the pin and string slip back in the casing. When ironed take hold of the pin and run it out.

An excellent treatment for shoes that have been rubbed to the nub is to rub vasoline well into the leather when nearly dry. This will do wonders toward removing the bad effects of the wearing, and prevent the shoes from cracking or becoming hard and uncomfortable to the feet.

I have many a headache during the summer, and have at last found the reason for them: the strong sunlight hurts my eyes. I have learned to wear dark blue glasses while doing many tasks out of doors, such as hanging up the clothes, sprinkling the lawn, etc., and have secured relief from the practice.

Many rust spots on clothes are caused by bits of soap adhering to the fabric when they come in contact with the bluing water. The discovery has been of great help to me because I can now easily avoid having these unsightly marks. I merely cut the soap into small pieces and tie them in a salt bag I keep for the purpose.

People who wear eyeglasses find it very annoying when the glass steams, blurs and gets frosted. To prevent this, take any good glycerine soap rub a little on each side of the glass (use no water), then polish with tissue paper or a soft cloth. It removes grease and grime, also stays polished much longer than with ordinary cleaning.

Before putting my corset over into the wash I tie a piece of ordinary white tape as long as the ribbon to one end and pull out the ribbon at the other; that leaves the tape in while the corset is laundered. When the ribbon is ready to put on, just tie the ribbon to one end of the tape and pull out the tape. You will find that your ribbon is in smoother and quicker.

The following is a fine lustrous polish for furniture: Half-pint of linseed oil, half-pint of olive oil, the white of an egg, one ounce spirits of salts. Shake well before using. A little to be applied to face of soft linen pad and lightly rubbed for a minute or two over the article to be restored, which should first be rubbed with an old silk handkerchief. If well worked it will keep any length of time.

Cable News. Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 27. Lloyd's war risks against hostilities between Britain and Germany within three months rose rapidly from five to eight per cent., in some cases even ten per cent. was paid. On the risk of war between France and Germany, twelve per cent. was paid.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 27. Premier Asquith made a statement in the House of Commons to-day which fully bore out the description of the situation as one of real anxiety. The position, said the Premier, had reached a point which was bound to become difficult, unless a solution was found. Britain was not a party to conversations proceeding between France and Germany, but earnestly desired to see them result in an arrangement honorable and satisfactory to all parties, and earnestly endeavored to the House not to be kept in the details of the situation at the present moment. The Premier said the Government thought it right from the beginning that in the event of either party failing to make a satisfactory settlement, Britain should become an active party to the discussions. The present incident might provoke re-reminders which, the Premier said, it was desirable to avoid. The question of Morocco bristled with difficulties, and the Government claimed no predominant position, and any statement that they had prejudicial negotiations between France and Germany was a mischievous invention; but it would be a grave mistake to let the situation drift until assertion of British interests might cause surprise and resentment.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 27. The critical deadlock between France and Germany continues, but France expects a way will be found for a peaceful solution, and to this end she is prepared to go to the limit of conciliation, but cannot agree to either evacuate Morocco or hand over huge blocks of African territory merely in return for Germany's reiterated assurance that France will not be bothered in future in Morocco. International peace advocates point out that the real danger of the situation rests in the nations offending Germany's pride by driving her into a corner from which she might strike back. The Matin to-day, in an article to what is styled German bluff, claims that no one in Germany would think of daring to risk a struggle against the triple entente. The paper adds, the Agadir incident demonstrates that Emperor William's efforts to obtain better relations with Britain is a mere hypocrisy, the real aim being to separate Britain.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 27. The Moroccan question is still the subject of anxious attention. The British Cabinet turned to it almost exclusively to-day. Frontless statements by Grey in the House of Commons this evening were awaited with keenest interest. The Foreign Secretary was expected to appeal for the united support of all parties to hold up their hands in defence of what the Government conceives to be Britain's best interests.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 27. There was a lively interlude from Nationalist benches in the Commons this afternoon. O'Brien, leader of the Independent Nationalists, complained that he had been inhibited by London Nationalists for the east division of America, who asserted that O'Brien was a descendant of the most biggamey informer that ever appeared in Ireland. When London refused to retract the statement, O'Brien shouted: "You are an infamous liar and scoundrel!" London made a dive for O'Brien, but friends seized his coat tails, and the incident closed. It had indicated, however, how baseless are all reports of a truce between Nationalist factions.

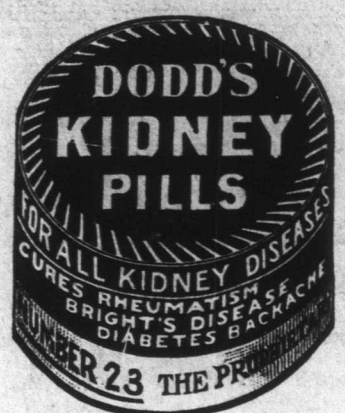

The Morocco Difficulty.

We have no doubt that the public utterances of the leading men of the British Cabinet were meant to clear the atmosphere and to make known the position from which she would not recede. France in particular and Spain in a less degree have been extending the sphere of influence in Morocco, in a sort of way taking control of large sections of Morocco. Germany seized on Agadir in order to be in at the partition, should it take place, as it apparently was taking place, in the July issue of The Empire Review. Mr. Edward Dickey says:

"In these circumstances it is hardly likely that Germany will remain content to see the trade. If not the territory of Morocco divided between France and Spain without making a move of some kind. I should not therefore be surprised if before many days have elapsed some overt action is not taken to assert the rights of Germany in Morocco. It has transpired that before the signing of the Algeiras Act, a secret Treaty was entered into between France and Spain delimiting the territory of the Sultan of Morocco into French and Spanish spheres of influence in the event of the collapse of the Sherifian authority. But according to the Temps no action was to be taken by Spain without France being first consulted. Had Spain therefore admitted France to her confidence as far as France was concerned no difficulty would have arisen. But what about Germany and the other Signatory Powers? A secret treaty could in no way bind them."

What Mr. Dickey expected has taken place, Germany has seized Agadir. On this possible event, Mr. Dickey said:

"Of one thing I am very certain, this country is not going to pull the chestnuts out of the fire for France. Such diplomatic advice as we think fit we shall undoubtedly tender, but the question of 'diplomatic support' will have to remain in abeyance. We are not intending to fall out with Germany to keep France in the commercial saddle in Morocco, and we certainly are not prepared to quarrel with Spain because that power claims equal rights with France in Morocco." Mr. Dickey was astray in his prediction as to the attitude of Britain. That attitude is apparently to give diplomatic support. If need be, to France, to prevent Germany obtaining a permanent lodging in Morocco if France so determines, and in any case to insist that Germany shall not keep a naval port which may menace British trade routes.

5. Wash bars with hot soda water and polish them with blacklead, unless the bars are of steel, when they must be cleaned with emery paper.
6. Clean the brass taps and fittings.
7. Scrape and wash the shelves with hot soda and water.
8. Replace all the parts.

Moroccan Question in Parliament.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
The worst pessimistic views regarding the acuteness of the Moroccan crisis were largely confirmed by the Prime Minister yesterday in the House of Commons, when with a manner as impressive as his words, he read from a manuscript, which had been carefully prepared, a warning that Britain proposed to stand for what she considered her rights to maintain the balance of power in Europe. Further testimony as to the gravity of the situation is given by the fact that the Prime Minister had obviously taken the leader of the opposition into the confidence of the Government, and Balfour's declaration was no less firm than Asquith's. The Prime Minister's statement was couched in diplomatic though not in reassuring language. In promising the support of the opposition to the action of the Government, Balfour said: "If there were any who supposed that we would be wiped off the map of Europe, because we have our difficulties at home, it may be worth while saying that they radically mistake the temper of the British people and the patriotism of the Opposition." Such plain speaking on a question fraught with the possibility of war on a great European scale has not been heard in the British Parliament for many years. The outcome of the situation appears to rest almost wholly on Germany's shoulders. McDonald, the leader of the Laborites, remarked that the gravity of the Premier's statement could not elude anyone. The Labor members were utterly opposed to war, but he hoped no European nation would affect the national spirit. Laborites in Germany, France and England would co-operate to the last moment to seek peace and prevent two professedly Christian countries from resorting to the arbitration of the sword over a difficulty that could easily be settled at the Hague. The Ambassadors and Ministers at London of Germany, France, Russia, Spain, Japan, Sweden and Belgium were present to hear Asquith's statement, which made a profound impression.

Press Comments in Berlin.

Special to Evening Telegram.
BERLIN, To-day.
Asquith's declaration is generally favorably received here. It is believed in most quarters that it will immediately relieve the tension of the Moroccan question. All the newspapers publish Asquith's statement verbatim. Some leading journals make no editorial comment. These are chiefly Conservative Pan-German organs. Others refer briefly to passages in the British Premier's statement that are considered here unnecessarily sharp. Liberal papers acclaim the Premier's speech as one tending towards peace.

The London morning papers give prominence to the statements of Asquith and Balfour on the Moroccan difficulty and believe that the attitude of Britain is revealed in Balfour's statement and will assist in a peaceful solution.

The Delegate at Bell Island.

The Delegate's party arrived here yesterday at one p.m. and sailed at five for St. John's. There was a most enthusiastic reception. The party was escorted to Hall, where an Address was presented. Benediction followed, then luncheon at Rev. J. J. McGrath's Palace. In the afternoon the party visited mines. Six arches were erected and the C.C.C. Band played. There was a great send off. Meeting of Firemen.

A meeting of about 100 firemen took place last night at their rooms in the Star Hall to discuss the trouble between the Union and the Red Cross Steamship Agents here. Firemen who had been paid off on the s.s. Stephano the last trip submitted their complaint against the captain. It was also reported to the meeting that a new gang of stokers that had been taken on in New York were to be paid off from the Florizel this morning at Harvey's. The men who were discharged from the Stephano said that they were unfairly treated and that they had performed their duties well and faithfully. The shipping of the foreign stokers was caused by a false telegram sent to New York to the effect that the St. John's Union intended to bang up steamers to do this. The meeting grew incensed as the discussion proceeded and the majority wanted to record a vote and call out all the firemen on the Red Cross line. Hon. M. P. Gibbs, the solicitor of the Union, who was present, threw oil on the troubled waters and dissuaded the firemen from their intention. Finally it was agreed to adjourn the meeting till 8 o'clock to-night in order that the Red Cross Agent here may have time to reply. The men are firm in saying that they will "go out if the affair is not arranged satisfactorily, and that they will be backed up by the Longshoremen's Union, who will refuse to handle the cargoes of the

Red Cross boats." The firm of Crosbie & Co. was placed on the Union "black list." No Union men will engage on their ships. The Channel branch is in their opinion.

Bankers Arrive.

The Lunenburg banker Parona arrived here yesterday afternoon with her canvas considerably torn in recent stormy weather on the Banks. She left Lunenburg on June 12th, and for a long while was up on the S. W. coast looking for a caplin baiting, but could obtain none. She will get her damaged canvas repaired here. She is now on her third trip, has done poorly, and yesterday came here from Fermeuse to get supplies. The Lunenburg banker Calavera arrived here also yesterday for bait and supplies. She is fishing since the latter part of June and has to date 700 qts. of fish, 500 qts. of which she has landed, and which was caught in the spring. The vessel has Carbonar and other places looking for bait, but was unsuccessful. Captain is reported at Torbay and she will go there for a supply. The Lunenburg banker Alma Nelson arrived off the Banks yesterday afternoon for bait and supplies. While on the Banks she found fish very scarce. When she secures bait she will leave here for another trial. Job Bros. are outfitting her.

War Risks Heavy.

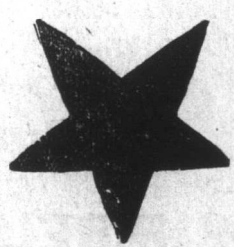

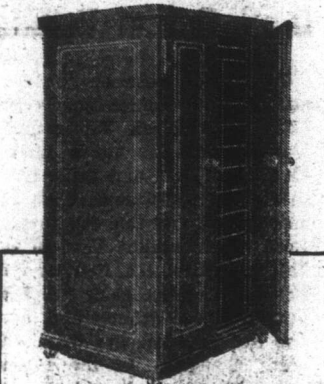
