



"Little pitchers have big ears" is surely a familiar proverb, and yet how often you meet people who do not seem to credit their children with any ears at all, or at least with the ability to use them. At any rate, that is the only way I can explain their conduct. For while the youngsters are right in the same room, perhaps standing close beside them, listening intently, these people repeat the cute things they have said, describe their funny ways and in general discuss them just as serenely as if they were not there.

And these same fond parents are grieved and puzzled when their children develop huge bumps of self-consciousness! A dear little girl about four years old has visited our neighbourhood every summer since she was born. The last time she came she was the quaintest and most unconsciously adorable little thing you ever saw, and we all looked forward to this summer's visit. But alas! This year she was a totally different creature. She talked incessantly. She repeated her funny little tricks so many times that they soon ceased to be funny, and she never said anything cute without obviously waiting for applause. The change was too great to have been merely the work of time, and as soon as we saw the baby with her mother we realized its cause.

Ever would start to tell a story and

preface it with some funny little remark, and her mother would say in a loud aside, the kind they use on the stage, "She always begins like that; isn't it cunning?" Whereupon little Eye's adorable mouth would curve into a most unadorable smirk of self-consciousness and self-satisfaction.

A Famous Romance of the South Sea

Recent Arrest Recalls Famous Piracy Case.

The arrest of Eugene Degraeve, the convict, on the charge of attempted robbery at Namur Cathedral recalls one of the most famous French criminal cases. In 1889, Degraeve was called "the Belgian Dreyfus."

On August 24 of that year President Loubet, signed Degraeve's pardon. His brother Leonce, had died in penal settlements the year before. In 1889 the sentence on the Degraeve brothers, which the naval court of Brest pronounced in 1892, was held by many to be a gross miscarriage of justice, and there was no pro and anti-Degraevists, as there were Dreyfusards and anti-Dreyfusards.

When Eugene Degraeve was pardoned he published a book—a well-written and very clever book-demanding a retrial so that he might disprove

the charge of piracy and murder on which he and his brother suffered. His case was not retried.

And now Degraeve is once more claiming that he is a victim of judicial errors, for he is in goal on charge of having tried, with four accomplices, to rob the treasures of Namur Cathedral last recently.

Piracy and Murder.

The story of the two Degraeves needs a Stevenson or Louis Becke to write it properly. It is a fascinating, haunting tale of South Sea romance, murder, piracy, and copra—a tale in which dusky half-breeds and poisoned dishes figure, in which—but here! The story needs the space of a whole book to tell, and I have just a column.

The Ninorahiti, Captain Tseatare of Rawavao, left Thiti on December 15th, 1891, for the Tuamotu Islands. She had goods of all kinds to the value of about \$10,000 on board, which her captain intended to trade with the islands for copra and mother-of-pearl.

The Ninorahiti's first officer was Leonce Rorique (and Leonce Rorique was the same man as Leonce Degraeve, for in the South Seas men of many nations change their names as simply as they change their white when clothing. The other men on board were Englishman, William Gibson, who acted as supercargo, Hippolyte Mirey, a half-breed, who was cook and who had signed on at Rorique - Degraeve's recommendation and four natives who formed the crew.

After an eventful trip, the Ninorahiti called at one of the islands named Kankur where Alexander Rorique (alias Eugene Degraeve) had for some months been established as a trader in shell. His brother introduced Eugene Degraeve (under the name of Rorique) to the captain, and introduced him to take him on board as a passenger.

Advertised As Lost.

The Ninorahiti called at several of the islands. She traded with success at Katin, Mackenoe, and Hikuruu But Maroku, where she was expected, never saw her and she was advertised as lost, with all hands supercargo and passenger.

Carrying a Locomotive on Cable.

The giant hands that are refashioning the surface of the earth at man's bidding do something more than merely pile up heaps of rock in river courses that the streams may be diverted to fields where water is needed, or tunnel through mountains or level off hills. Recently it was necessary to carry a railway locomotive from one side of the Rio Grande-River to the other in connection with the construction of the Elephant Butte dam. To run the engine on rails to the nearest switching point and thus get it to its destination would take too long. So the power that has been trained to exert itself at the twist of a switch or the turn of a throttle was called into play and it picked up the engine and carried it across the river. There was a cableway of steel ropes stretched from one side of the river to the other for the purpose of transporting material as needed. The cable swings 200 feet above the surface of the river. The locomotive is a 20-ton affair, was equipped with slings which were in turn attached to the travellers on the cable, and it was easily and quickly transported from one side to the other.

The Morris Tactics.

As we said yesterday the defeat of the Morris Government is assured. Everybody knows. Everybody feels it as certain in Newfoundland as the defeat of the Taft administration was certain a few months back in the States. Not only do the people on the street know it, but Government men themselves know it, and they are at present catching at any straw in the hope that a change in sentiment will take place between the present time and next fall that will give them a fighting chance. The Government men were wise in their generation in avoiding a general election this fall. A very large and influential body of men petitioned the general election this year, but the Government turned a deaf ear to their prayer and turned down the proposal. Why did the Government flout this large and important body of electors unless they were afraid to face the music this fall? If the Government men could have avoided this humiliating confession of weakness, would they not have done so? If their faith in their standing in the country was strong would they not have jumped at the chance of establishing themselves firmly for another four years? Would they not face the music this fall, they feared to face a tide of public feeling which was hostile to them. They scouted and flouted the numerous petitions, largely and extensively signed, rather than close on a fight this fall. They preferred to put it off, and wait for something to turn up, in their favour, Micawber like, rather than fight it out this fall. They preferred to throw on the country all the risks of being unable to call the Legislature together, for six months next year, rather than face the electorate this fall. The Daily News is

given to fanning the Opposition with fighting the Burin bye-election. They are welcome to all the comfort the Opposition tactics have afforded them. But what advantage was to be derived from such a contest? One more or less would not have strengthened the Opposition in a material numerical way, nor would it have weakened the Government worth while. There was nothing dependent on the election. But the case of a general election was quite different. There 30 seats were in the balance. If the Government was certain of their ground, a General Election gave them power till 1916. But, on the contrary, if the country had lost faith in them, the Morris party would lose the Government in 1912, and that was the trouble. The hostility of the people was too pronounced. The Morris Party preferred to play a waiting game in the hope of a change. Hence the feverish activity of the Premier. But he knows his doom. He knows the reception he received in Burgeo and La Poile, in St. Barbe's, in Bonaville and in Harbour Grace. He has played a waiting game. He preferred the country should face the peril of being unable to call the Legislature together for six months rather than he should face the risk of defeat this fall. He preferred his party's salvation for a year rather than the country's security. But such tactics will meet the reward they merit and 1913 will see an end of the Morris administration.





LATEST War News

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
Bulgaria is giving the broken Turkish army no time to recuperate. In accordance with the tactics adopted throughout, the Bulgarians are following the defeated Turks with extraordinary energy. Flying columns are pursuing along the coast toward Tchatalja lines. It is believed the main attack will be delivered on Friday. Constantinople appears to have lost hope of stemming the victorious advance even at Tchatalja, and the Turkish Court is ready to cross into Asia. Apparently the Bulgarian Government has no aspirations on Constantinople itself and would be ready to conclude peace provided Turkey will agree to surrender Adrianople and some other positions in the western theatre of war, and to give guarantees to bring no more reinforcements from Asia. The Porte shows no disposition as yet to treat for peace direct with the allies until the big Tchatalja battle has been fought. What will happen then is impossible to foresee. The fall of Monastir is not improbable, the Greeks crossing the Vardar River. The fall of Saloniki is reported imminent.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day.
War vessels of the most of the Powers are on their way to Constantinople. Britannia now has the whole of the Mediterranean battalions together with nine powerful cruisers, a flotilla of torpedo destroyers, in other Eastern waters or in the vicinity. A third battle squadron, comprising eight battleships, six cruisers and auxiliaries, part of the Home Fleet with the base at Gibraltar is proceeding eastward, all prepared to protect the population.

SOPIA, To-day.
The Bulgarian vanguard, it is said, has reached Lake Dorchas, and detachment is passing between the lake and the sea. Another line of Bulgarian advance is reported to be attacking forts from town Tchatalja, while a still another column, which marched down the main road from Tchatalja to Silveri is now advancing on Rogados for the purpose of forcing a passage along the coast of the sea of Marmora. These however are only flying columns, the main body has not yet commenced the attack on Tchatalja fort. Bulgaria will reject mediation until Tchatalja has been captured, and Adrianople fallen although the entry into Constantinople is no part of the allies plan.

THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE.
The Electoral College is constituted by 531 members. Each State is entitled to a membership, which depends on its population. New York State has 45 members, whilst Arizona has three. The party which gains the highest number of votes, no matter how small that majority may be is entitled to the full membership. For instance Roosevelt's Party take the whole 28 members in Pennsylvania, although the vote was some 185,000 and each party obtained over 60,000 votes. It follows therefore that Roosevelt's majority in votes must have been of the slimmest dimension.



BELGRADE, Nov. 6.
Novo Varosh, the last Turkish position in the Sandjak of Novi Barzar surrendered to the Servian troops without resistance. Six Turkish officers and 275 men were taken prisoners, and 250 rifles were handed over to the victors. The town of Pepsa on the way to Monastir, which surrendered yesterday to the Servians, offered a stubborn resistance, and both armies suffered heavily.

Special Evening Telegram.
QUEBEC, Nov. 6.
The Canadian Northern steamship Royal George, grounded this evening in a dense fog, one mile east of Point St. Laurent, Isle d'Orleans. The Royal George left Grosse Ile Quarantine Station for Quebec, and was evidently going at full speed when she struck the rocks on the north side of the Channel. The damage is not known, but it is thought to be serious. Besides a general cargo for Quebec and Montreal, the Royal George carried 901 passengers.

Special Evening Telegram.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 6.
Medical authorities in the city have been notified to prepare to receive 20,000 wounded from Lale, Buzurg and Viss. It is officially stated that these are, in addition to the 15,000 already in the city. All the hospitals, including those of foreign consulates and university buildings at Stamboul have been converted into hospitals. The installations, however are imperfect. Beds, blankets and linen are lacking and the sanitary arrangements are inadequate.

Special Evening Telegram.
ATHENS, Nov. 6.
The Greek Naval Squadron to-day occupied the Turkish Island of Tenedos, near the entrance of the Dardanelles. The Greek Army operating in the vicinity of Saloniki, has accomplished its object, as the investment of the fortress is nearly completed. Negotiations for the surrender of Saloniki opened on Friday last, but the Turkish Commander demanded that his troops be allowed to march out with their arms and with all the honours of war, and the negotiations consequently fell through. The civil governor is said to have committed suicide. Greek newspapers discussing the proposed armistice say that it can only be accepted on the condition that the Turkish throne be transferred to a Minor, and that reforms for the benefit of the Christian population there must also be introduced.

A man named Rene Foerschler, aged twenty-nine, who is in the Sante Prison (Paris), awaiting trial on a charge of burglary, recently wrote to M. Poncet, the magistrate in charge of his case, confessing to 205 other burglaries. The magistrate at first refused to believe him, whereupon the prisoner offered to take him on a personally conducted tour of the scene of his exploits. The other morning, therefore M. Poncet, the prisoner, and two policemen set out in a cab for a drive round the streets of Paris. In the course of the day Foerschler pointed out thirty-two houses at which he had committed burglaries. The following day the experiment was repeated, and the scenes of forty-two other robberies were pointed out. The two next days also, the magistrate resumed his task. Foerschler has a wonderful memory. He pointed out the different houses without hesitation, and even remembered little details, as, for example, that such and such a house formerly had no carpet. He affirms that in the course of his career he has stolen 900 watches, 1,432 earrings, 192 silver plates, 32 gold fittings, 361 tie pins, and 93 gold brooches.

Burnt—Good sign of codfish and sufficient herring for bait, but no squid.

The Poor Trapper and Furring Season.



Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. SIKTIS, Nov. 6. The Turkish Army, defeated by the Servians at Kumanovo and Kuprili, took up positions in the mountainous districts of Kuprili and Pehle where the roads are practically impassable. As the Servian artillery was unable to follow, the infantry was ordered to advance and, in spite of a murderous artillery fire from the Turks, took position after position at the point of the bayonet. The Servian troops occupied Demerliak, Pehle south-east of Ipek, where they found the big railway bridge intact. The Montenegrin and Servian Army joined hands at Ipek. VIENNA, Nov. 6. King Nicholas of Montenegro discussed the intentions of the Balkan States, to-day, in an interview with the correspondent of the Vienna Tagblatt. He said that while the Balkan nations will settle their affairs for themselves, their victories had not made them so daring as to forget to accommodate their wishes to the general situation in Europe. CONSTANTINOPELE, Nov. 6. The public are dumbfounded at the repeated Turkish reverses, and now recognize that the end has come. The Mussulman population of the towns along the Dardanelles, although they pressed the Sultan to send some anti-Greek incidents of small importance are reported to have occurred in the outlying villages. SOFIA, this a.m. The Turkish Army commanded by Nazim Pasha was completely crushed in the great battle of the last two days. According to semi-official reports, the Turks lost in killed and wounded more than double their losses at Lule Burgas. The Bulgarians are pursuing the defeated enemy. BELGRADE, this a.m. The town of Krushovo, 20 miles north of Monastir, was captured by the Servians, after a short resistance. A number of correspondents who have returned from headquarters, say no further war operations in Macedonia are expected.



Keep to the Right

Mrs. Tucker and a friend from Herby Content started out to do some shopping yesterday, and as they went down Water Street Mrs. Tucker said "I was very annoying, for it took me four times to avoid a head-on collision, as everybody walked just how they liked, some on the left, more on the right, while others butted their way in a zig-zag fashion." Powerful men carrying trunks "heeled it for Colliers" and in their eagerness to be on time actually ran foul of delicate women, knocking them senseless, while others with anything from a sample of fish to a barrel of berries took up the sidewalk and drove pedestrians of the meeker type outside in the middle of the street. Mrs. Tucker says this time to introduce some method for pedestrians on Water Street, and if all would keep to the right "it would be much easier for all concerned and would prevent head-on collisions, which one of these days may prove disastrous. In the days gone by 'was a common sight to see a hand cart being pushed along the sidewalk containing a feather bed or an iron bedstead, but of late years these hindrances to the pedestrians have been consigned to the middle of the street, but yet there is room for further improvement and she would suggest that pedestrians keep to the right, for she believes once we get into the knack of doing so, we will soon discover that it will be far more agreeable to all concerned and people will rejoice in the fact that they can do their business without being put in a fair way of being conducted to the Hospital because of a head-on collision that knocked the wind out of them. Horses and carts have a rule of the road that compels them to keep to the left and if this wasn't so, accidents would happen every hour in the day, and now Mrs. Tucker says we should have a rule for pedestrians, or all the weaker ones will have to wait Water Street or run the risk of being returned to the bosom of their families, cripples for life. Keep to the right in the rush and see that we'll all will work. You'll get there just the same and get there much easier. TIM SHANNAHAN.


Fast Street Car Driving.
