



The amount of property at risk, uncovered by insurance, is estimate at eleven million dollars. It would cost citizens \$110,000 to pay insurance on this amount, and if protect ion can be obtained at anything less than that sum, it is obviously desirable to procure it. The data which have been furnish

ed by the City Engineer on this important matter are so largely composed of figures, that it is impossible to do more than state broad facts. At every fire lately it has been noticed that the water supply is in sufficient, and to obtain even the amount that has been available, other portions of the city have been leit entirely unprotected.

The valuable business premises of the harbor front require special protection, and the Fire Underwriters and the Board of Trade have urged with all the force at their command that a fire boat for the harlor should be procured. But owing to the divid ed responsibility of the Government and the City in regard to the Fire De partment, it has been impossible to persuade either body to move in the matter.




