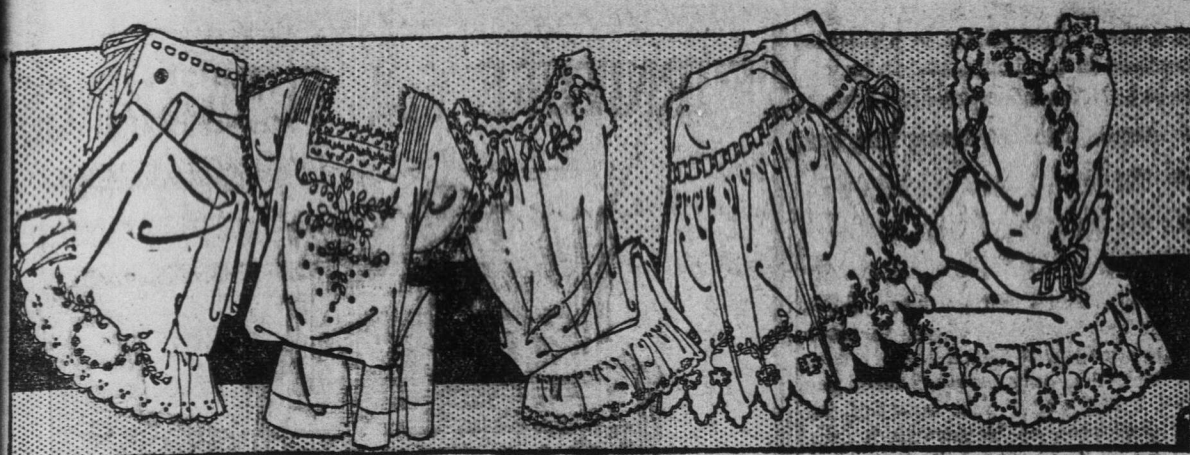

LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY.

 This is the birthday of Abraham Lincoln. He has had no use for it almost fifty years now, but he does what few men are able to do. He has bequeathed his birthday to the nation.

Lincoln's birthday is a holiday in the states that have agreed to forego the civil war and focus their attention on the somewhat inspiring nature. On this day men stop cheating each other and walking over the heads of those who can't get out of the way and nation at being let and politics, unbusiness and other interesting phenomena. It is generally agreed on Lincoln's birthday, by the speaker engaged in commemorating it, that if Lincoln were still alive he would adhere firmly to the political party to which the speaker belongs. Lincoln is one of the few American statesmen who became so great that they have been

borrowed by every known political party after their death, when they could not object.

On this day also the public schools close from their pursuit of the curriculum and educate the children about Lincoln. Nothing does the growing brain of a child more good than to plant a few ideas about Lincoln in it. If a boy learns enough about Lincoln at the age of ten he may possibly pause at the golden age of twenty, while worrying over the fact that his college allowance is only \$200 a month, and reflect on the fact that Lincoln extracted more wisdom from a pine knot and a borrowed book than most people have squeezed out of a public library.

It also does the politician a lot of good to stop once a year and reflect upon Lincoln. Lincoln was a politician and got himself elected president of the United States. But he didn't do it by trading off his immortal soul for delegates. He acquired a principle early in his career and stuck to it though at times the air was too full of his back to be breathed with pleasure. Lincoln became a great leader because he insisted on remaining in front where the shooting was good. But he didn't enjoy his job. He left the pleasure of his work to posterity. A great many statesmen are called upon to choose between their pleasure and posterity's and do so postively, not being on the ground at the time, has usually lost out.

It is strange, isn't it? said my nephew to me the other day, "that Mary is alive, and her brother is dead?" She, the perennial invalid, always hanging on to life by such a slender thread; he, big, vigorous, so brimful of life?

Strange? I could hardly agree with my nephew. True, Mary, the invalid, is still alive, and Jim, her great, husky brother is dead. He did not die suddenly, by accident, but after a lingering attack of pneumonia.

I have known Mary for years, and I had known Jim almost as long. As a child, Mary was sickly. Jim came into this life with all the bounties nature can bestow, when she chooses to be generous. He never really had a day's sickness up to his last. Yet he is dead. Mary, beginning life almost still-born, was so sickly that her mother had little hope of saving her. She had been sick for weeks at a time, since. Yet she lives.

Strange? Not at all. Mary never had more than a little store of the precious fluid, life. She has been taught, ever since childhood, to husband it, to use it but sparingly. Jim, brimming over with that same fluid, used it prodigally. He did not drink, it is true, but he overate, underslept and overworked. He did not have any bad habits, except the worst of all, he never took any care of himself.

Mary treated herself as if she were

a very delicate piece of mechanism—a watch, you might say. Jim treated himself as if he were a steam roller. Mary noticed every little grinding noise in the machinery and sprang to its repair. Jim never noticed any.

It always strikes us as strange that the sickly outlive the healthy, so-called. Yet is it? The human machine is a very complicated, very wonderful bit of machinery, which we who are healthy take no bother to study. We know better than to treat our automobiles, our sewing machines or our baby carriages that way.

Jim had his automobile overhauled regularly. It was always in the best of condition. He never had himself overhauled. He had had been eating the wrong things for a year, and too much of them. He had persistently neglected his lungs, his heart, his liver and his kidneys. He got his exercise running his automobile. The first real test to which his own personal machine was put discovered flaws in it here, there and everywhere. Now he is dead—Mary lives.

Somebody has said: "Health is a crown on the head of the healthy; no one sees it but the sick." It is equally true that only the sick really value health.

The greatest tribute that can be awarded to any mechanical invention of man is that it is almost "human." The human machine is the standard by which we measure all others, and by which all others fall short. Why not try to give it at least that intelligent understanding that you would give a new automobile or a watch?

Household Notes

The left-overs of the toilet soap, if saved, will make an excellent shampoo solution. Melt them until a soft soap consistency, then add some water and rub on the head; it will be found much easier to clean the scalp.

When logs of wood have been placed on an open fire and are partly burned, when the family is about to retire, stand the logs on end and put water over them. They will not endanger the house nor burn to waste.

All white leathers, excepting kid are best cleaned with soap and water. Use a stiff nail brush and plenty of soap and water. After the shoe is scrubbed, rinse off the soap and put the shoes on a stretcher and dry in the sun.

A mustard plaster is a good old remedy, serving as well as an emetic, it should not be kept in the same place all the time. It acts just as well if placed just a short distance from the spot affected as it does directly over it.

Tan shoes should not be polished if they become soiled, moisten a soft cloth and rub it across a piece of pure white soap. With this wash off the dirt, allowing the soap to remain in the leather, and polish with the palm of the hand.

If the skin beneath the fingernails is very rough, before retiring dip the tips of your fingers into cold cream, allow the skin to take up as much of the cream as possible, then dip the fingers into talcum powder and wear loosely fitting gloves.

Before using a new tin-lined saucepan, fill it with water, adding a lump of soda and some potato peelings, then put it on the stove and let it boil for a few hours. When this is finished, wash it with soap and water. After this there is no danger of poisoning.

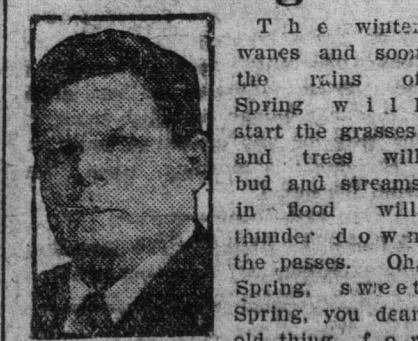
To ventilate a child's room without creating a draught, place a strip of board made to fit the window beneath the lower sash. Raise the lower sash, insert the board, making a space between the lower and upper sashes through which fresh air may enter the room without a draught.

Two layers of buttered stale bread put into a shallow baking dish and covered with grated cheese and a little of three well-beaten eggs, 2 cups of milk, one teaspoonful of salt, and one teaspoonful of flour, and baked in an oven for twenty minutes, will be found an excellent dish.

When furs become dingy and sodden looking, hang them out in the air, then take a whisk broom, dip it in grain alcohol and brush vigorously the wrong way of the fur. Use plenty of alcohol and brush until every inch is covered. Then let hang until thoroughly dry, pounding them occasionally with the flat side of the broom. When well-dried, brush with a stiff brush the right way.

REPORT

Of Executive Committee of Citizens' Committee.

(Concluded). Street Repairing and Cleaning. To relay the principal streets with macadam or any system of paving, would involve a large outlay.

Water Supply and Fire Protection. The forward movement in regard to water supply, which was begun in 1904, has been steadily continued, and for domestic purposes it may be said that the larger portion of the city is adequately supplied.

The amount of property at risk, uncovered by insurance, is estimated at eleven million dollars. It would cost citizens \$110,000 to pay insurance on this amount, and if protection can be obtained at anything less than that sum, it is obviously desirable to procure it.

The data which have been furnished by the City Engineer on this important matter are so largely composed of figures, that it is impossible to do more than state broad facts.

At every fire lately it has been noticed that the water supply is insufficient, and to obtain even the amount that has been available, other portions of the city have been left entirely unprotected.

The valuable business premises on the harbor front require special protection, and the Fire Underwriters and the Board of Trade have urged with all the force at their command that a fire boat for the harbor should be procured.

The waste of water in St. John's is enormous. 160 gallons per head per day is sent into the city. Elsewhere 90 gallons is considered an excessive supply.

The City Engineer estimates that it will cost \$150,000 to make the water supply of the city perfect, from the point of view of fire protection.

Inspector General Sullivan, in a valuable report, points out that there is almost an entire lack of fire protection regulations in the city, nor is there any inspection of buildings from this point of view.

It will be said, it is all very well to make plans in this extravagant manner, but where is the money to come from? It will be argued that such a programme would mean greatly increased taxation.

The Committee however feel that while careful study is required before a definite statement can be made as to the power of the city to meet such commitments as are herein suggested, there is no reason to suppose that they are beyond our means, provided an improved organization could be substituted for the present inefficient system.

The following particulars have been obtained from the Municipal Council. The total appraisal for the city is \$97,655, of which the South Side of Water Street furnishes \$28,530.

The accounts show the Association to be in good financial condition (having on hand and invested \$4588. During its thirty-three years in operation there have been paid one hundred and sixty-one calls, nearly fifty thousand dollars, to widows and orphans of deceased brethren.

That our present system of municipal government is faulty is proved by the present condition of the city. We have been afraid to trust the electorate and their representatives, and have hedged the municipal government about with many restrictions.

The directors desire to express their thanks to those brethren who have assisted in securing so many new members the past year, and to urge that all new members to unite themselves with this truly Masonic benefit, and to suggest to those that are members to continue helping forward the good work by assisting the directors in obtaining new members, so that the present year may be as successful as the last.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Feb. 11.

Sir Edward Carson, in the Commons, said that never before, in a speech from the Throne, had a statement of such gravity been made in reference to the domestic relations of our fellow citizens in Ireland. The words put in the King's mouth were a condemnation of the Home Rule Bill, and a confession that it had utterly failed to furnish a solution of the Irish question. It was small wonder in view of this confession, that the Government spurned the idea of leaving the decision to the voice of the people. He declared that if Ulster was to be drawn within the grip of a Dublin Parliament, he would, regardless of all consequences, stand with the people of Ulster in the policy of resistance. Redmond, he said, never tried to win Ulster, he wanted only her taxes. He declined to pledge himself as to what he would do as a result of a general election. After such an election the whole question would have to be considered in the light of the country's mandate. John Redmond followed with a warm repudiation of Carson's charge that he wanted Ulster's taxes. Redmond declared the plea for the amicable settlement of the Home Rule question found a ready response on the part of Irish Nationalists, but said the proposals must be consistent with the main principles of the Bill. He accepted the new situation arising from Asquith's promise to initiate a suggestion for settlement, although he thought the Government had gone further than necessary. He, however, would do nothing to make the situation more difficult or dangerous. Candidly, Redmond continued, the Irish Nationalists did not share in the tragic view as to the possibilities of civil war. He thought the Commons should resent such threats as an affront. The exclusion of the province of Ulster, he declared, could be no solution to the Irish question. Redmond concluded by saying he was deeply anxious to remove all fears and would meet proposals of the very broadest kind, in the most friendly spirit, in the earnest hope that the aspirations in the Royal Speech be realized, and a peaceful settlement reached of the great problem on which the well being of Ireland and the unity and strength of the Empire depended.

LONDON, Feb. 11.

It is now admitted in official circles in London that Sir Lionel Carden will not return to Mexico as British Minister, after he comes to London to report to the Foreign Office. Reports from Mexico City concerning Sir Lionel's interests in Mexican lands, which he shares with Lord Cowdray, have re-awakened keen interest in diplomatic circles here, and Lord Cowdray's frank admission of the truth of these reports has provided a fresh sensation. It is now known that the States hinted to the British Foreign Office that in the present tense situation in Mexico, it might be advisable for the Great Powers to have as diplomatic representatives there only those who have no private financial interests to guard.

LONDON, Feb. 12.

Home Rule was again the subject of interest in the Commons yesterday. Carson, Lloyd George, Sir John Simon, J. E. Redmond and Bonar Law were the speakers. At the conclusion of the debate the amendment to the reply, proposed by Walter Long, Unionist, that it would be disastrous for the House to proceed further with Government for Ireland Bill, until the measure had been submitted to the judgment of the country, was defeated by a vote of 333 to 255. The announcement was received with cheers from the Opposition, and cries of "resign."

LONDON, Feb. 11.

The King's Speech, in a grand passage, expressed the earnest desire of His Majesty to attain a settlement of the Home Rule problem by consent. This desire was fervently echoed by the Premier in the Commons, and by Viscount Morley in the Lords. Little hope of such exists. Inclusion of Ulster forms the Government policy whilst exclusion is demanded by Austin Chamberlain. Walter Long in the Commons, and Baron Middleton in the Lords, moved amendments calling for submission of the Home Rule question to the electorate.

LONDON, Feb. 11.

The following cabinet changes will, it is said, take place during the next few months, as the result of Viscount Gladstone's resignation as Governor General of South Africa: John Burns, President of the Board of Trade, to replace Gladstone's successor, Mr. Sydney Buxton; Herbert Samuel, President of the Local Government Board; C. E. Hobhouse, Postmaster General; C. F. G. Masterman, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.

Hans Schmidt, the murderer of Anna Amalier, has been sentenced to die in the electric chair in the week beginning March 23rd.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.

An earthquake lasting from 15 to 30 seconds, was felt in the New England States yesterday.

SOUTHAMPTON, Feb. 11.

Officers and passengers of the Olympic, which arrived to-day, say they had encountered the worst weather in their experience crossing from New York. One huge sea beat in 8 port holes and injured the purser and ten passengers, though not seriously.

PARIS, Feb. 11.

The Secretary of State for the Colonies has formally notified the Commons that Viscount Gladstone will cease to be Governor General of South Africa, in June. The appointment of Buxton, as Governor General, was officially announced to-day, which means several changes in the Cabinet.

PLYMOUTH, Feb. 11.

Storm-tossed passengers on the Olympic reached here to-day and had to go on to Southampton, as the fierceness of the gale prevented their landing, or that of the mails. This is the first time for many years that such a thing has happened here to a liner from America.

LONDON, Feb. 11.

The results of Marconi's wireless telephone experiments are sufficiently encouraging, says the Times, to warrant the belief that commercial installation will be available immediately. The first will be on board ships, and Marconi hopes they may be working within the next month or two.

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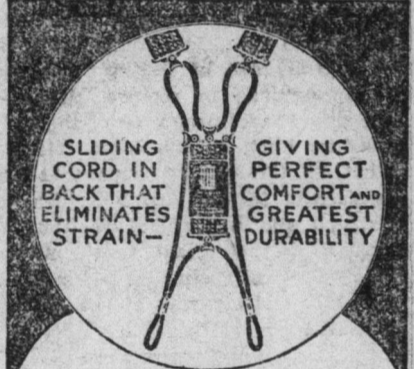
