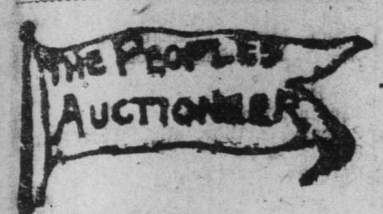

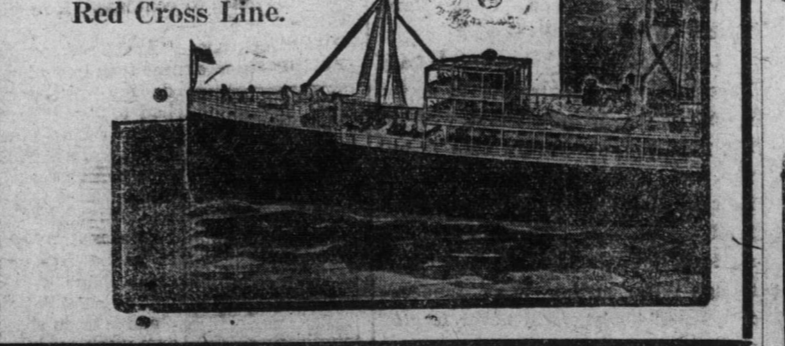

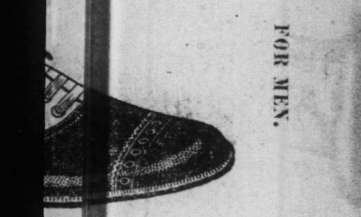

The Passing of Mr. Martin W. Furlong, K. C.

We chronicle with regret the demise of one of our professional men who occupied the foremost rank among our lawyers. Last night at 6 o'clock Mr. Martin Williams Furlong passed to his eternal rest. The deceased had been ailing for some months and he was recommended to take a trip abroad. Early in January he left for Montreal accompanied by his wife, and entered the Royal Victoria Hospital where he was operated on, but without success, as the complaint from which he suffered had gained such inroads that cure was found impossible and the end came last night.

Mr. Martin Williams Furlong was born at Olerin, Placentia Bay, March 25th, 1864, and was near the close of his 52nd year. He was educated at St. Bonaventure's College and was one of the brightest scholars of that institution. In 1881 he matriculated at the London University. From that until 1884 he taught in his Alma Mater and then began the study of law in the office of the late R. J. Kent, Q. C., father of Mr. J. M. Kent, K. C. He was admitted a Solicitor of the Supreme Court in 1889 and admitted to the Bar in 1890. In 1899 he became a member of the Law Society and in 1904 he was a Q. C. In 1899 he contested the District of Ferryland at the General Election, but was unsuccessful. In 1901 he was appointed Solicitor of the District of St. John's West with Messrs. E. P. Morris and J. C. Tessler and was successful. He was an exceedingly clever speaker and debater. He was one of the principals of the old Academia Club and a prominent figure in all the literary and debating undertakings of that institution and was considered to be the ablest speaker on the roll of members. In his profession at first he practised alone and then entered into partnership with the late Mr. Donald Browning, later he was a partner of Mr. James M. Kent, K. C., and at the time of his death was a member of the firm of Furlong, Conroy and Higgins. In 1907 he was appointed Solicitor for the Reid Newfoundland Company and four years later was made Director of that concern, replacing the late Mr. Geo. H. Massey until the time of his death. He was a brilliant lawyer and for the past twenty years was engaged in all the big law cases, arbitrations, etc. Mr. Furlong, with the late A. J. W. McNeilly was instrumental in establishing the old Atheneum where in the days of old wit and wisdom held sway. Mr. Furlong married a Miss McGrath, sister of Messrs. James McGrath, B. L., and Thomas, of the firm of McGrath Bros., Decorators. He was the son of the late Patrick Furlong, of Olerin. Besides a widow and four children he is survived by two sisters, May and Maggie Furlong, of this city, and two brothers, Edward, of New York and John, of Bay Bulls.

This morning's train took out quite a number of passengers. The Southern Shore train arrived in the city on time, and the local via Briggs Junction at noon. Last evening's No. 1 reached Bishop's Falls at 4.20 this morning.

FROZEN FISH SHIPMENTS.—Big shipments of fresh frozen cod and halibut reached the city from the West Coast during the past few days and our local market is well supplied.

RAILWAY WEATHER.—The weather along the railway to-day is very cold, wind N. W. and snowing west of Bishop's Falls. Temperature ranges from 4 to 10 above.

The Account.

There are now 10 districts disposed of on the account. The Burgeo returns finished last evening and resulted as follows: Yes . . . . . 598 No . . . . . 252 Of 10 rejected ballots 2 were counted, one "Yes" and the other "No." The Burin count commenced this morning. There are 1,472 ballots to be counted. It was found during the checking of this district last night that the Returning Officer had rejected 18. Two of these, however, were admitted, and favor prohibition. As the vote now stands there is a net loss for prohibition of 11 votes for ten districts.

"The Letter," a sketch presented by Mesdames Colville and H. Outerbridge, was very pleasing and enjoyed by all. The apron and candy sale was a great success and the proceeds will be devoted to church work. The Ladies' Association is to be complimented on the success of the event, and particular credit is due the President, Mrs. (Rev.) White and Mrs. Valentine.

Conductor Noseworthy Assaulted.

Just before the express got away last evening, a man named Murphy, belonging to Conception Harbor, assaulted Conductor Noseworthy at the Railway Station. The conductor was trying to prevent Murphy from boarding the train; he being under the influence of liquor. Mr. Noseworthy was badly cut about the face, and Dr. Fraser, who was called, had to put three stitches in the wounds received.

Where the Storm Was Felt.

Yesterday afternoon the S. S. Meigle now discharging a cargo of coal for the R. N. Co. at Placentia, had to slip her moorings and run to Argentina for shelter. The coast around the Argentinian Capital is particularly bleak and very much exposed to the S. W. wind which blew with terrific force yesterday, and it was only a couple of weeks ago that the S. S. Coban breaking from her moorings went adrift inside the beach there.

Big Herring Cargo.

The s.s. Kito, which came from Green Bay via Bell Island, is now in port. Her cargo consists of 12,000 frozen herring in bulk and 200 barrels on deck. The vessel was several weeks collecting her cargo in Green Bay. On the passage us she met rough weather and had to put into Twillingate on account of a snow storm. After resuming she had to put into Bell Island to replenish the coal supply in her bunkers. She sails from here in a day or two likely for Boston.

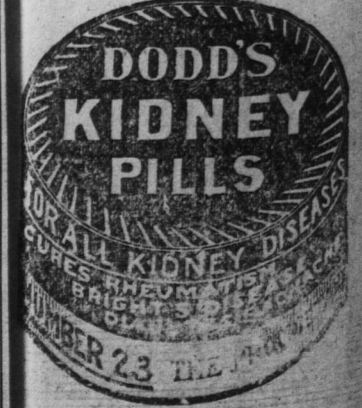

DEMAND REPHRASES. STOCKHOLM, To-Day. There is a great outcry and demand for rephrasing the ultimatum issued by the German Government having ordered the cancellation of all contracts with the Swedish customers for analine dyes, unless the customers are willing to pay four times more than the contract price of dyes and at the nominal value of the mark.

ALL ALIENS MUST REGISTER. LONDON, To-Day. The British Government has issued an order making compulsory for all aliens through the country to register with the police. Heretofore friendly aliens were required to register only in prohibited areas.

LUSITANIA CASE SETTLED. WASHINGTON, To-Day. The substance of the tentative communication from Germany, designed to settle the Lusitania case, is acceptable to the United States. High administration officials last night concluded that the German proposal, upon Germany to make concessions and agreements as set forth in the document achieved a recognition of the German position which it has contended in connection with submarine warfare.

TWO ZEPHS. LOST. AMSTERDAM, To-Day. The Echo Belge publishes a report that two Zeppelins have been lost near App-Halsen. The first collided with a tree while returning from the raid on Paris on January 20. The second was brought down by a French airman within a few miles of the same place.

EIGHTY ZEPPELINS. BERNE, Switzerland, To-Day. That eighty Zeppelins are now in the German service, appears from information developed in Friedrichshaven, where the Zeppelin Works are located. The latest type that is having a trial trip this week is L-95 which is taken here to mean that it is the ninety-fifth in series. According to the Standard, the Government will announce next week the details of a new scheme of defence organization which has been planned.

Kaiser Planned to Rule Europe. London, Feb. 1.—A curious article by Henry Wickham Steed, foreign editor of the Times, appears in the February number of the Nineteenth Century and After. It is entitled "The Pact of Knopisnit," and deals with events alleged to have transpired immediately preceding the war.

Plot to Blow Up 80th Battalion. Kingston, Feb. 1.—Word was received in Kingston yesterday of the arrest in Belleville of three men and two women, who, it is alleged, planned to wipe out the 80th Battalion by blowing up the Belleville gas works, which are adjacent to the barracks of the Battalion.

FOILED BY A WOMAN WHO CAUSED ARREST. For many days there had been rumors that German sympathizers intended to visit Belleville and commit depredations. About a week ago five strangers made their appearance in the city and immediately came under the surveillance of the military police. But it was a woman who caused the arrest. She, it is alleged, overheard the five discussing their plans in an adjoining room, and her ear caught the words, "It is a pretty big and dangerous job but we can pull it off all right!"

Col. Sherwood, of Ottawa, Chief of the Dominion Police, was summoned to Belleville and got in touch with the secret service of the United States, with the result that the identity of the suspects was soon established. It was ascertained that the party consisted of Abe Silver, alias Frank; Beanie Silver, alias Frank; William Cohen, alias Fort, and two women confederates.

The oldest member of the party is Abe Silver, who very recently terminated a ten years' sentence in the Joliet Penitentiary, and the others have long records. The gang is wanted in Chicago for robbery and other crimes.

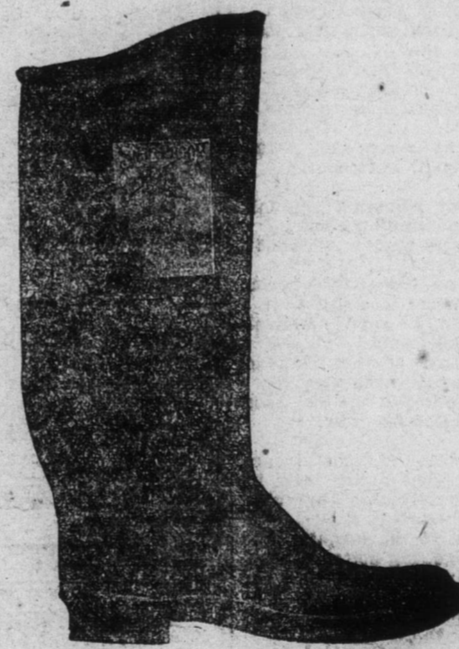
