

SERBIAN OFFICIAL.

The Serbian official issued to-day says: A violent artillery duel was started by the Serbs yesterday, and Serbian infantry at many points ex-pelled the Bulgars from the advanced positions occupied by them. The Bulgars' counter attacks in the course of the night were completely repulsed. Serbian attacks carried out during the night were successful.

RUSSIAN DESTROYER REPORTED

BERLIN, Sept. 13.

A Russian destroyer has been sunk in the Gulf of Riga, by a German aeroplane squadron, says a report to the German Admiralty to-day. German naval planes also have attacked Russian sea forces in the Black Sea off Constants.

NO PRISONERS TAKEN.

LONDON, Sept. 13. The Bulgarian troops which took the Danube fortress of Silistria, in Roumania, the capture of which was announced by the German war office on Sunday, apparently did not take as prisoners any considerable number of Roumanians. The official Bulgarian statement of September 11th received here to-day, says the Roumanians retired on both sides of the Danube pursued by our cavalry. Although this translation of the Bulgarian statement is taken literally to indicate that the Bulgarians forced the passage of the Danube, it is improbable the Bulgarian war office meant to convey this meaning. 



WAR SUMMARY. LONDON, To-day. The French troops north of Peronne are holding the salient they have driven into the German line eastward of the Bethune-Peronne road near Bouchavesnes. They hold intact the town of Bouchavesnes and other points along the line captured in the offensive which they started on Tuesday. In addition the powerfully organized German trench system south of Le Priez farm near the road running west from Rancourt to Combles has been captured, placing Com bles into further jeopardy. The fight-ing in the region of Bouchavesnes has been of a sanguinary character. Find-ing the French had cut their line of munication from Peronne north the Germans threw violent attacks against Labbee Wood and Hill 76 south of Bouchavesnes, succeeding in recapturing both places. The French returned viciously to the attack, and after a hard fight, some of it hand-to-hand, finally drove out the Germans and kept the ground they had won. In two days fighting more than 2,500 mans were taken prisoners and a large number of guns and machine guns captured. On that part of the Somme front held by the British the situation remained unchanged. South of the Somme heavy artillery duels, between the French and Germans between the French and Germans continue in the region of Vermandovillers and Chaulnes. The repulse of a German attack near Fleury in the Verdun sector is reported by Paris. All the Macedonian heavy fighting continues, but no important charge in the positions has been reported. 


