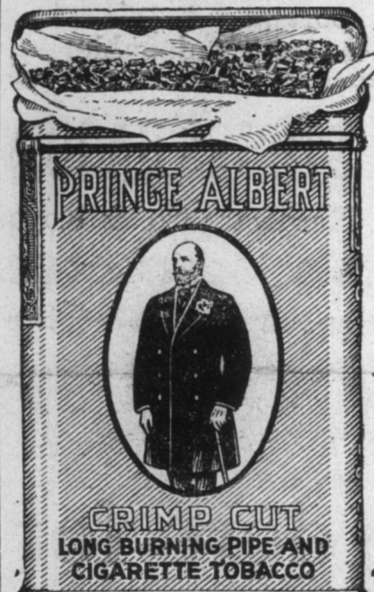

## Empire Day Sports! POSTPONEMENT!

## Prominent Citizen Assaulted

BY HOUSEBREAKERS WHO FORCED AN ENTRANCE TO HIS HOME—POLICE DO GOOD WORK.

Housebreaking as we read of it in our local papers, does not contain many thrills, but it had its full meaning in the scene which was enacted at the residence of Mr. Frank Steer, 21 Military Road, at 3.35 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when two thugs of the worst type ever seen in the city forced an entrance, and on being caught redhanded at the game, apparently with murderous intent, while in the act of making their escape, attacked Mr. Steer, and hitting him with a large bottle, inflicted a severe head wound which came nigh to being fatal.

#### THE ALARM.

About 2.45 p.m. Mrs. J. F. Lindburg, whose home is one door east of Mr. Steer's, saw two suspicious characters climb over the fence surrounding the latter's backyard, and fearing the unusual visitors were calling with no good intent, got in touch with Mr. Steer at his office over the phone and acquainted him of the facts. Mrs. Frank Lindburg, who lives one door west of Mr. Steer, also noticed the "thugs" but on their going around to the opposite side of the house thought they had left the place.

#### THE ASSAULT.

In the meantime the desperados had forced an entrance through a window at the rear of the house, by first breaking a small hole in a pane of glass, thus allowing them to unfasten the patent window catch. On reaching his home, Mr. Steer was startled by the examination of the two front rooms and was about to proceed up-stairs when he observed traces of mud from dirty boots on the lower steps. Being convinced of the fact that the men were in the house, he phoned the Central Fire Station for police assistance, at the same time keeping an eye on the stairs. Suddenly, like two wild cats, the housebreakers entered the room by the open door, but were intercepted on their way by Mr. Steer, who unfortunately received the full force of a well aimed blow from the man with the bottle, which landed about the left temple, cutting and bruising the flesh. For a few seconds Mr. Steer was knocked dizzy, and before he could regain his strength the villains had disappeared.

#### CAPTURED.

About three minutes after the assault had been committed, the "Telegrams" reporter reached the scene, arriving a few minutes in advance of Sergeant Detective Byrne who was accompanied by Constable O'Flaherty. With but a meagre description of the culprits, which however satisfied the officers, they started immediately on the trail and in less than twenty minutes landed their men at No. 27, Gower Street, where they were making for their rendezvous. On being searched at the lockup a small burglar's outfit of single iron tools, consisting of a brass chain, a codfish hook, a brand new sailor's jack knife with marine spike attached—a dangerous looking weapon, and several other useful articles were found on their persons.

#### CRIMINAL RECORD OF CULPRITS.

The two desperados are brothers and their names are Alexander Morgan, aged 18, and Walter Morgan, aged 18. Both have had criminal records and served several terms in jail, principally for theft. The elder is one of the worst characters in the city, and was dismissed from the Royal Naval Reserve for a misdemeanour on board H.M.S. Briton and a few days later figured in a fish stealing episode and got six months imprisonment. Nor has the younger brother an enviable reputation in police circles, but is capable of "lifting" anything he can lay hands on, from a needle to an anchor. This lad, it will be remembered, carried on a game of hide-and-seek from hall doors bottles of milk left by farmers. It is a coincidence that he was captured red-handed at this game by Constable O'Flaherty in the vicinity of the residence they broke into yesterday. When arrested at the time the culprit gained much notoriety for all the fictitious names he gave in turn to the authorities.

#### UP FOR TRIAL TO-DAY.

The prisoners were arraigned for trial to-day in the Magistrate's Court before Mr. Hutchings, K.C., J.P., but, at the request of Supt. Grimes, who is not yet prepared to proceed with the prosecution, were remanded for eight days. Meanwhile the police are conducting a searching investigation, having information in their possession that will probably reveal that the Morgan brothers participated in many other housebreaking and thieving escapades of late, notably the robbing of the offertory boxes at the C. E. Cathedral on Sunday last, as referred to by us yesterday. Mr. Frank Steer was called to give evidence to-day while the prisoners were at the bar for the purpose of identification. Witness presented a long jagged cut on the top of his head near the temple, as a result of being struck with the big black bottle. A couple of stitches were needed in the wound and he still feels the effects badly. He believes that but for the fact that he had his hand hat on at the time, there is little doubt that he would have suffered serious consequences. He regretted to the Court that he knew nothing of the occurrence, as detailed above, and identified the prisoners as the ones who had broken into his house and assaulted him, the eldest prisoner striking him with a bottle and the younger with a boot. To give an idea how violent the blow from the bottle was, it was broken in millions and the pieces were gathered up and shown to the Court to-day by Detective Byrne.

Teresa held out a helping hand and who without her motherly care and practical interest might never have reached the sanctuary and the Cloister. About 20 years ago Sr. M. Teresa was seized by an incurable malady and for the past 14 years she has been altogether incapacitated from work; notwithstanding all that medical skill could achieve, she continued an invalid. Her patience, resignation and confidence in God during her last illness were the edification of those who were privileged to witness her passing away. Let us trust that at length her soul has found rest in God's bright home. On to-morrow (Thursday) morning at 10 o'clock Solemn Requiem Mass will be celebrated for the repose of her soul in the Chapel of Our Lady of Good Counsel. **Your Boys and Girls.**

A young child who eats potatoes freely will frequently be found to crave large quantities of salt, and will often eat it surreptitiously, possibly much to the astonishment of the mother. This desire will disappear if the use of potatoes is reasonably limited. Potatoes should never predominate in nursery menus. Rice, macaroni, etc., should be used for variety.

The potato is a salt giving starch vegetable, to be eaten with lean meats or other nitrogenous foods. It is three quarters water, and prevents concentration in food. The remaining quarter is nearly all starch. Care often eat it surreptitiously. Care should be exercised in the selection of potatoes, those that are yellowish

white being preferred. The fact that it takes three and a half hours to digest boiled potatoes and two hours for those that are properly baked, will indicate at once which method is preferable for the nursery.

#### AIR SERVICE BETWEEN ROME AND TURIN.

Rome, To-day. An air postal service was inaugurated to-day between Turin and Rome. An airplane left Turin at 11.15 a.m. to-day with 400 pounds of letters, 200 pounds of newspapers and a message from the city of Turin to Premier Besseli, and arrived at Rome at 3.30 p.m.

#### SMUTS ON GERMANY'S AFRICAN AMBITIONS.

LONDON, To-day. A complimentary dinner was given to-night in honor of General Jan Christian Smuts, the famous Boer leader, at which Viscount Milner, the Earl of Selborne, Sir Leader Starr Jameson, former Premier of Cape Colony, and other prominent men were present. General Smuts in his speech alluded to Germany's desire to establish a great Central African Empire and the menace such a scheme would have to the whole world. "It was during my experiences in East Africa," said General Smuts, "that my eyes were opened to the serious danger of this plan. In that land there was a gigantic possibility in the huge population of one of the most valuable assets for the creation of the most powerful army the world has ever known. We do not know the value of a black army. If our statesmen had allowed such an army to be created it would have proven not only a serious menace to the future of South Africa but to the whole civilized world." General Smuts said he hoped this matter would be borne in mind when a peace settlement came to be made, and that the league of nations would absolutely forbid the military training of African natives.

#### WAR REVIEW.

LONDON, To-day. Although on both the British and French fronts the period of virtual inaction continues, except for minor trench raids by the British and artillery duels of violence between the French and Germans, it is not expected that these conditions will long prevail. The offensive of the British on the Arras front cannot be deemed to have ended until Field Marshal Haig's men once more have thrown their strength against the 2,000 yards of the Hindenburg line still held by the Germans west of Bullecourt and straightened out their lines for the heavy blows that are to come against the Drocourt-Queant switch line on which the Germans place dependence to ward off the advances by their enemies eastward. The last reports had the British busily engaged consolidating the gains they had made along the Hindenburg line. With these completed the expectation is that another of the great battles which have marked the progress eastward of the British will soon be in full swing. Probably finding their counter attacks against the French in the region around Moronvillers, in which they were repulsed on Monday night with heavy casualties, was too costly, the Germans on Tuesday did not renew their efforts to regain the lost ground, instead they engaged with the French in violent artillery duels in the region of Vanelery, on California Plateau, and east of Chevreux, which lie between Soissons and Rheims, not forgetting again to throw numerous shells into the already devastated town of Rheims. According to Vienna, the Italians attempted to advance on the Isonzo, but were stopped by the Austrians.

#### BRINGS CREWS OF TORPEDOED SHIPS.

NEW YORK, To-day. A British steamer which arrived here to-day brought the members of the crews of several vessels sunk by submarines, including four from the British freight steamer Towargate, torpedoed on April 16 while bound for Galveston, Texas, to Liverpool. The loss of the Towargate had not previously been reported in this country.

#### PLAIN WORDS TO THE RUSSIANS.

PETROGRAD, To-day. Albert Thomas, French Minister of Munitions, addressing a delegation of the Workmen and Soldiers' Delegates in Moscow, said that thousands of French and British soldiers are perishing while awaiting Russia's cooperation in the war. On this co-operation, the Minister said, the soldiers had a right to count. Russia's inaction at the front was equivalent to a separate peace.

#### NEW RUSSIAN AMBASSADOR TO BRITAIN.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Petrograd says that as a result of the change in the Government, M. Iwasky has been appointed Ambassador to Britain in place of Sergius Sazanoff, the former Minister, who recently was named for the post. Several days ago, when M. Sazanoff was about to leave Petrograd for London, he was intercepted at the railroad station by an attaché of the Foreign Office and requested to postpone his departure.

#### PROTEST TO GERMANY AGAINST DETAINING AMERICANS.

WASHINGTON, To-day. A protest to Germany against the detention of American citizens was made by the State Department to-day through the Spanish Government. The department has received positive information that Americans are being held in Germany, and has asked for a full and definite statement of the Imperial Government's attitude concerning their departure. It is pointed out that this Government has always acted promptly on the application of

#### GETTING READY FOR THE CONVENTION.

LONDON, To-day. The main development in the preparations for the Irish Convention during the past 24 hours is the convening of the Standing Committee of the Unionist Council on Friday at Belfast to arrange for a summation of a full meeting of the Council for the purpose of considering the Government's convention proposal. The Standing Committee, which is the Council's Executive, consists of seventy members. The Council, which is framed on democratic lines, numbers more than five hundred members. It is inferable that the Committee does not intend hailing (?) matters, for it is stated in Parliamentary lobbies that it will demand information concerning the character and composition of the Convention before calling the Council together. The Irish Unionist Alliance meets in Dublin to-day under the Presidency of Viscount Middleton to decide the course to be adopted by the Unionists of the west and south toward the Convention. Dublin correspondents of some of the London newspapers say that, while the attitude of the Sinn Feiners is still doubtful, there is no ground for assuming that the extremist section's rejection of the convention will necessarily be endorsed by the whole party.

## War News.

**Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.**

**RUSSIAN COMMISSIONERS IN U.S.**  
NEW YORK, May 22. Four members of the Russian Commission to the United States have arrived safely in this country.

**ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE WAR MINISTER.**  
NEW YORK, May 22. The Jewish Daily Forward has received a cable from its correspondent at Petrograd to-day saying that an unsuccessful attempt was made this morning to assassinate War Minister Kerensky, who escaped. All the participants were arrested. Rumors say that the plot was arranged by supporters of the old regime.

**SWEDISH STEAMERS CAPTURED.**  
COPENHAGEN, May 22. Three Swedish steamers, the Lizzie, Goia and Kalla, which were assumed to have been captured by the Germans of Oerikoff Lighthouse, have been taken to a German port, according to advices received by the Politiken from Stockholm to-day.

**INCREASING WAR STRENGTH.**  
WASHINGTON, May 22. President Wilson to-day signed the bill increasing the enlisted war strength of the navy to 150,000 men and the marine corps to 30,000.

**KAVALA BOMBARDED.**  
SOFIA, May 22. To-day's war office statement, after reporting artillery actions at various sections of the Macedonian front, announces that 13 enemy warships bombarded Kavala, while 12 airplanes

dropped bombs on the town. Several houses in Kavala were destroyed, says the statement, but no military damage caused. One hostile airplane was shot down.

**RUSSIA CABLES NOTE TO AMERICA.**

WASHINGTON, May 22. Foreign Minister Tereschenko, Russia, cabled a note to the State Department to-day, giving assurance in behalf of the new Ministry, that Russian democracy was inspired with the spirit of solidarity with the United States, and like America is carrying on war to secure the freedom of nations and a lasting peace. By direction of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, says the communication, I hasten to say how highly the whole Russian Democracy is inspired with the sentiment of full solidarity with the great Republic, which, true to its traditions of liberty, espoused the cause of coalition for the defence of justice and right. Like the United States, Russia is not seeking conquest or any covetous end in the present struggle. I am glad to find these lofty principles which were so eloquently formulated in America are striking unanimous echo in free Russia, now mistress of her own destiny.

**FRENCH PARLIAMENT RE-OPENS.**  
PARIS, May 22. Parliament was re-opened to-day and the expected interpellations regarding the conduct of the war were presented to the Chambers. Addressing the Deputies in regard to the interpellations, Premier Ribot said: "I recognize that the representatives of the people desire some explanation. These may be given to the public, who like yourselves have a right to be informed. The secret session may be reserved for other subjects. Concerning interpellations on the last of these, it may be said there were some excessive hopes and some errors in execution, but the results obtained should neither be exaggerated nor belittled. Never have our soldiers proved more admirable. The

government thought some changes should be made and it had them made. It has re-organized the High Command so as to relieve it of everything not concerned with military operations. The Minister of War now works in co-operation with the Military Committee of the Chamber. I ask a postponement of the discussion on this point until the work of bringing about this co-operation has been concluded. In reference to the submarine warfare, I recognize that while the tonnage loss has diminished we must seek more energetic and decisive means in dealing with the submarines. We will consider that situation further, on Friday. As to the food supply we are ready to discuss it as soon as possible, believing that the country has not been sufficiently informed." Taking up the Russian situation, Ribot said "it was necessary to combat dangerous sophisms, which sought to treat the restoration of our lost provinces as being a question of annexation, and which also confused the question of indemnities for savagery in invaded provinces. This indemnity is a contribution for wrong done. It is a requirement which both law and equity demand. The same reparation should be required for all small nations which have been crushed, for Belgium, Serbia, Roumania and Montenegro. No conquests and no covetousness, that in substance is what the Russian Government declares for. France repulses it could not oppress any nationality, even that of its enemies. It will call to its aid to defend small nations not vengeance, but jus-

What France wishes is a durable peace, but we don't wish military dispositions to endure which can destroy this durable peace when it is once made. If the German people comprehend this it would make peace easier to attain. That is the view of Russia at the moment when the United States is making preparations to enter the war. Now let Russia make her offensive and we will be able to talk of peace not in an equivocal manner, but openly, and this peace if they don't ask it of us, we will impose it." Ribot prefaced his reference to Russia by asking for postponement of the debate, because of conversations which the French Government has been invited to have by the Russian Government. He created intense interest when reading the message received from the Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs, which said: "Russia will never forget the calm with which France entered the war on our side, and will always remember that at the moment of the present crisis in Russia's existence it was the splendid effort of the French people which attracted the enemy masses toward the West and thus permitted our Russian forces to gain time for reorganization."

**GERMAN TRENCHES RAIDED.**  
LONDON, May 22. Our troops successfully raided the enemy's trenches east of Vermoules at noon to-day, says the war office statement to-night. On the rest of the front there is nothing of special interest to report. One German airplane was brought down in air fight yesterday, and another hostile machine was driven down damaged. One of ours is missing.

**SURVIVORS REACH LAND.**  
LONDON, May 22. Thirteen survivors from the Norwegian steamer Madura have reached land. Their vessel was shelled and sunk by a German submarine. Two men were killed by shell fire and seven were wounded. The survivors report that the submarine gave no

warning, and fired on the men as they were lowering the boats. Twenty-three survivors, including the captain's wife, from the Russian ship Lynton, 2,351 tons gross, have also reached land. They say their ship was sunk by a German submarine without warning and that they were shelled while getting into the boats.

**FOOD RIOTS IN LISBON.**  
MADRID, May 22. Advice from what is considered a reliable source in Lisbon state that ten persons were killed and fifty wounded during the recent food riots there. Groceries and bakeries were sacked by the rioters, but the movement did not develop revolutionary tendencies.

**TO FORCE DOWN COAL PRICES.**  
WASHINGTON, May 22. Measures to force down anthracite coal prices will be taken by the Federal Trade Commission, it was announced to-day, if producers and dealers do not adhere to their recent promise to cease extortionate practices.

**FOOD CONTROLLER FOR CANADA.**  
OTTAWA, May 22. The appointment of a food controller for Canada is urged by the heads of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress. It is considered certain that the matter will come before the Cabinet Thursday. The Canadian controller would co-operate with the official named by the United States Government for the same purpose. All sorts of rumors, as to Sir Wilfred Laurier's stand on the conscription issue are in circulation, even talk of his resignation of the Liberal leadership, but it is conceded it is purely speculation, though it is not expected Sir Wilfred will support the Borden measure as it shapes up at present.

**AUSTRIA WILL OFFER RUSSIA PEACE CONDITIONS.**  
AMSTERDAM, May 22. It is the Austrian Emperor's idea to offer very generous peace condi-

tions to Russia according to the German correspondent of the Tid. These will include the integral re-establishment of Poland, a free passage through the Dardanelles and a loan to Russia. These proposals were discussed at a recent meeting between Count Czernin, the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, and Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the Imperial German Chancellor at headquarters.

**INCREASE IN RECRUITING.**  
MONTREAL, May 22. There has been considerable increase in recruiting in number four military district, since conscription was broached to Parliament by Premier Borden. Latest reports of recruiting furnished by Major-General Wilson, showed forty men taken on the largest number in one day for many months. At all local recruiting headquarters there is unvented activity.

**RUMOR DENIED.**  
OTTAWA, May 22. "Persistent rumors from Montreal that Sir Wilfred Laurier is about to resign the Liberal leadership owing to the conscription issue, are emphatically denied to-day by a former liberal cabinet minister. It is pure invention without a vestige of truth behind it, he declared.

**BRAZIL AND THE WAR.**  
RIO JANEIRO, May 22. Brazil may declare war on Germany to-day, so newspapers and officials say.

**PROTEST FROM MEXICO.**  
AMSTERDAM, May 22. A Berlin despatch says that the Mexican Minister to Germany is reported to have handed a note to the German Government protesting against the submarine campaign. The report followed a prolonged conference between the Mexican Minister and Foreign Secretary Zimmerman on Monday.

**GERMAN LOSSES.**  
PARIS, May 22. Some idea of the extent of the German losses in the recent Anglo-German offensive in France may be obtained, according to a semi-official note, from the fact that while on the Verdun front from February, 1916, to February, 1917, one year, Germany put into action 56 third one-half divisions, she put into action 80 divisions on the Anglo-French front this year from April 9 to May 11.

**MERCHANT SUBMARINE.**  
PHILADELPHIA, May 22. The Philadelphia Ledger published a story to-day to the effect that America has found the perfect answer to the German submarine terror. It is said to be a merchant submarine, standard sized at about 7,500 or 8,000 tons deadweight, of such speed that it can even when submerged easily elude any surface pursuit, and non-sinkable. The craft, an invention of Simon Lake, according to the Ledger, is capable of submerging within a half minute and has been so standardized and simplified that the first one may be turned out in four months and others after that at a rate of one every three or four weeks.

**STRIKE IN MUNITION FACTORIES.**  
STOCKHOLM, May 22. According to information received here from Hungary, a strike has been continuously in progress in all Budapest munition factories since May 1st.

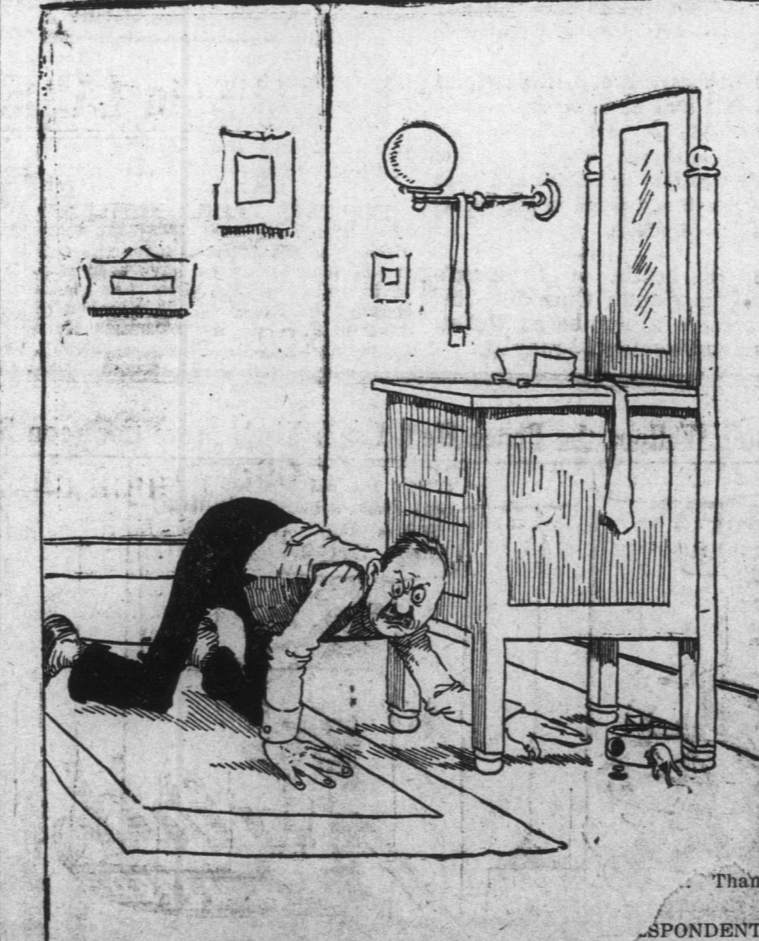

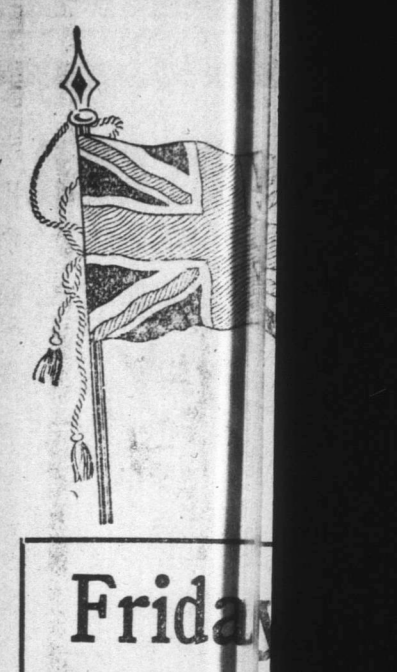

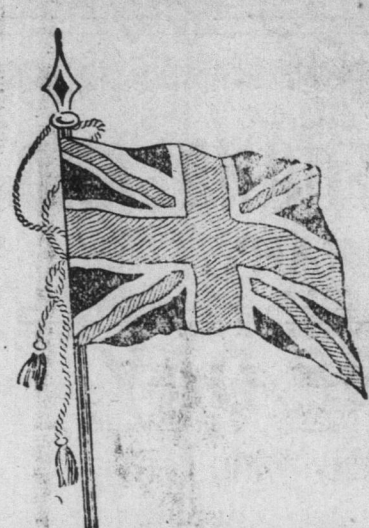

### 'Ship', Ships and Ships'

On Thursday the Premier said: "The road to victory, the absolute assurance of victory, is to be found in the one word—ships." And the second word is 'ships,' and the third word 'ships.' On Saturday the War Office issued a drastic 'bombing out' order for munition workers. "All skilled and other essential men engaged on shipbuilding, ship repair, and machine engineering will for the present be protected from recruitment." We have taken the liberty of italicizing that phrase "for the present," because here is a plain intimation of an intention in the future, perhaps even the near future, to take out of shipbuilding and put into the army men admittedly essential to the industry which supplies the country with the ships without which there can be no victory. Let there be no misunderstanding. We are to-day building far too few merchant ships for our vital needs—not a tithe, probably, of what we require. We should be building far more. There is no prospect, even if it were wise and foreseeing to rely upon such a prospect, of other countries making good the deficiency in ships without our straining our resources in construction to the utmost. Nor is there any reasonable hope that the necessity for building to the top of our strength will be mitigated at any time during the war. The policy, therefore, which the War Office announced as within the scope of its plans is a policy of striking at our vital spot—our sea communications. Now is it a policy for the future. In the past the War Office has drained men from the shipyards into the army who should never have been taken. What guarantee is there now that in taking the men whom it does not call skilled it will not disorganize shipbuilding, and what guarantee is there that it will not disorganize the industries which are ancillary to shipbuilding and which provide the shipyards with their raw material? Every day the necessity for a reasoned adjustment of the manpower claims of essential industries and the army grows more clamant; and every day brings forth a new War Office decree to prove that nothing is being done towards such an adjustment, but that the army is determined to swallow up all the men it can lay hands on, even though the country perish. Is it not time that someone laid hands on the War Office—Manchester Guardian.

#### THE SOLDIER'S FAREWELL.

The soldier for the battle leaves, and to his girl he says, "My pet, I've donned my valance and my greaves, my pauldrons, helm and scabbard. My country calls, and I must go, to fight for her, on land or sea, and every time I bag a foe, I'll think Miranda Jane of thee. We'd planned our wedding for this spring, the month of June should see us; but there will be no wreath or ring, until this righteous scrap is done. We'll join our hands when I come back, from scenes of turmoil and of gore; I love you nine ways from the Jack, but dear I love my country more. You could not honor me, dear maid, if in your secret heart you knew that I was shrinking and afraid, when banners waved and bugles blew. I hear of young men wedding girls that they may dodge the battle line; those brides, alas, are casting pearls before the cheapest kind of swine. Unless I have my girl's respect I do not ask her for love; and so I go forth to collect a lot of German scalps, my dove. My tassets, cuirasses, shield are on, my gorget's fastened in its place; and so one kiss, and then I'm gone, to make some Prussians run-a-race."

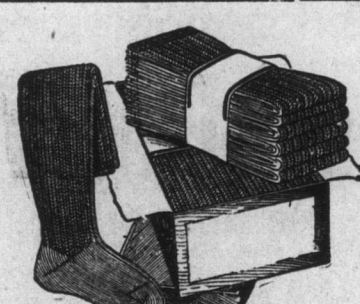
