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Cable News

The French and Americans are fast

driving the Germans out of their posi-

tions in Southern Picardy and in the ector between the Vesle and the Aisne rivers. So rapid has been the progress for the Allies, the French in icardy and the Americans and French from Soissons east towards theims, that the retirement of the enemy has the appearance at present of the beginning almost of a rout. Meanwhile Field Marshal Haig in the north from Peronne to Ypres is almost as busily engaged with his troops in carrying out successful nanoeuvres, which are only in slightly less degree of rapidity, forcing the Germans everywhere to give round. Haig's men again have made he Germans taste bitter defeat on nunerous sectors, and the end of the n sight. In the last fighting in the region extending from the old Noyon ector to Soissons, the French have reclaimed thirty villages from the lermans, have crossed the Somme anal at several points and are stand ing only a short distance from the ortant junction of Ham, with its eads leading to St. Quentin and Laere. On the south they have made arther crossings of the Ailette River nd are fast skirting the great woodregion which acts as a barrier to ect attack on Laon, the Chemin des ies and the western Aisne defence of the enemy. Seemingly at the present rate of progress this barrier will shortly have been overcome and insons obliterated. Already the french south of Fresnes on the fringe of the high forest of Courcy, have penetrated the old Hindenburg line. All behind the lines northeast of Noyon, reat conflagrations are to be seen, rticularly around Jussy and La ere, which apparently is an indicaion that it is the intention of the Gernans to fall back as fast as they can the old German lines running utheastward from St. Quentin. A matter of vast importance to Britain and her allies is the apparent decision of the Mexican Government to nationalize the oil deposits of that country. "It must be remembered," says the Acadian Recorder, "that hundreds of millions of British and American dollars are invested in Mexican oil, particularly in the Tampico district, hence this act of nationalization is nothing more nor less than an act of confiscation, and both the British and United States Governments have protested in no uncertain terms. If Mexico enforced this decree it is a direct blow at Britain, and as such will have to be met in a drastic manner, which would be highly regrettable. In a terrible world crisis like the present the deprivation of this source of oil supplies to our Navy would be such a serious thing that it could not be regarded with complacency. 



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
