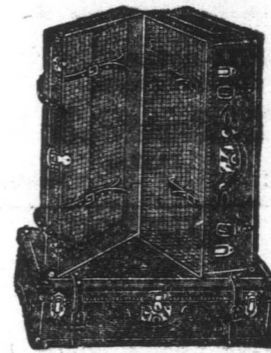

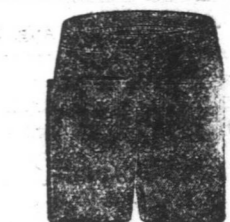

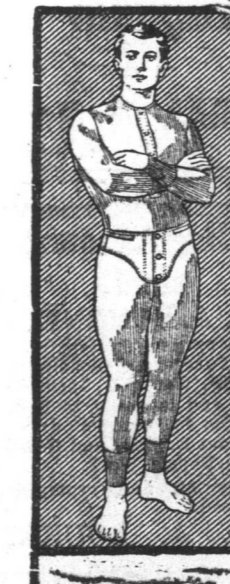

**NORTHCLIFFE DANGEROUSLY ILL**  
LONDON, Aug. 3.  
Prayers are being offered daily for the recovery of Lord Northcliffe in the Church at Barnet, at the request of his mother who lives there. The telegram yesterday when inviting the congregation prayers, said it was useless to disguise the fact that Northcliffe was dangerously ill.

**WAR DEBT PENALTIES.**  
PARIS, Aug. 3.  
Separation of the Rhineland from Germany, with her own parliament and government, and separate financial regime, supervised by the Allies, is part of the scheme of penalties presented to Premier Poincare as in the opinion of Parliament will be part of the war debt penalties.

**TIGHTENING THE SCREWS.**  
PARIS, Aug. 3.  
All German property in France sequestered by the government during the war, will be permanently taken over and proceeds from the sale deposited in the French Treasury as the penalty of Germany's refusal to continue the present scale of payment for private debts contracted with Frenchmen prior to the war, according to reliable reports.

**GOLD RUSH IN TRANSVAAL.**  
LONDON, Aug. 3.  
The reported discovery of a new gold field in the Transvaal, stretching from the border of Bechuanaland to Nyatroom, has created a sensation, and something like an old time rush is proceeding. Options have been taken up on many large groups of claims.

**WILSON'S MURDERERS.**  
LONDON, Aug. 4.  
Joseph O'Sullivan and Reginald Dunn, under sentence of death for the assassination of Field Marshal Wilson, will be hanged on August 10th, it is announced this evening.

**ALALON TELEPHONE CO. BONDS**  
MONTREAL, Aug. 4.  
An issue of \$115,000, 6 1/2 per cent. first mortgage, twenty year bonds, has been made by the Alalon Telephone Co. of St. John's, Newfoundland, and is being offered privately by the Royal Securities Corporation at 98 and interest to yield about 6.70 per cent.

**EARL BALFOUR'S NOTE.**  
LONDON, Aug. 4.  
To-day's debate in the House of Commons on Inter-Allied debts and German reparations, which it has been expected would bring out further interesting facts respecting the recent note of the Earl of Balfour on the subject, and regarding Great Britain's international obligations proved disappointing. It is supposed that Premier Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Herbert S. Asquith, one of the Liberal leaders, and other speakers made a studied effort to say nothing which would embarrass open and impartial discussion of the subject at next week's important conference in London between the Allied leaders. During the five hours of debate there was constant iteration of Great Britain's intention to repay her

resistance, largely caused through strain and overwork.

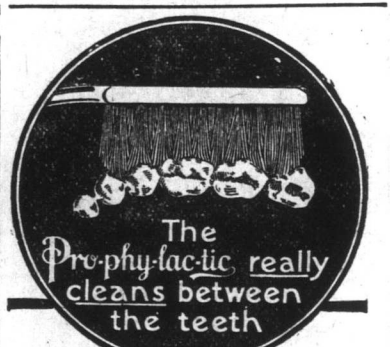
**APPEAL DISMISSED.**

### One Hundred Years Of Camera History.

A Frenchman named Nicéphore Niepce is regarded as an inventor of photography. He was the first man to obtain a permanent picture with the aid of a light. Born in 1765, at Chalons-sur-Saone (France), he joined the army, but ill-health and failing eyesight compelled him to resign his commission. He was appointed Administrator for the district of Nice, and held this post for several years before he returned to his birthplace, where, with his brother Charles, he began to make experiments in chemistry and mechanics. Gradually he turned his attention to the art of lithography, and eventually the idea of forming sun pictures occurred to him.

### A Great Discovery.

There are certain resinous and bituminous substances which, when exposed to thin films the action of light and air become insoluble in oils. In his process of picture-making, Niepce coated a silver plate with a varnish consisting of a solution of bitumen of Judaea in oil of lavender.

When dry this was exposed for six or seven hours in a camera provided with a lens. The image was developed by immersing the plate in oil of lavender, which dissolved the portions of the bitumen unaffected by the light, leaving a picture in insoluble bitumen.

After experimenting with various materials, Niepce made his bitumen process known in 1829, but which was never used to any extent. Another Frenchman, named Daguerre, had also made experiments in photography, and in 1829 he entered into partnership with Niepce. When the latter died Daguerre continued the experiments. The outcome was the process known as the daguerreotype, which was popular for many years.

### When the Sun Explodes.

The sun's surface is not always as clear as it appears to the unaided eye. Seen through a telescope it presents usually a considerable number of dark spots. Sometimes these patches are so big that they can be seen by the naked eye when the sun's brilliance is dimmed by the passing of a light cloud. This happened recently, when a gigantic spot made its appearance.

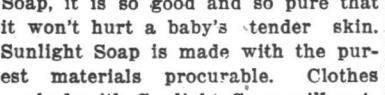
These spots are produced by explosions of extraordinary violence in the interior of the sun. Vast masses of gases are hurled outward, and as they go they expand and cool, forming dark patches amid the terrific heat of the rest of the sun's surface.

The coolest sunspot has a temperature of something like 30,000 degrees, enough not merely to melt the toughest steel, but to reduce it to gas! Sunspots come and go in waves. Every eleventh year they reach their maximum. Then they decrease in size and number for five and a half years, afterwards slowly increasing until the greatest point is reached again.

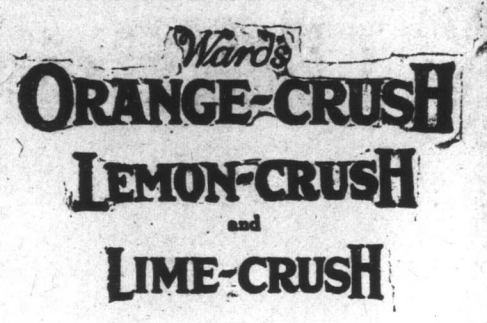

### Footwear.

Wearing shoes with high heels or narrow toes is responsible in many cases of fallen arches, corns, bunions, hammer toes, weak muscles and it is not infrequently an attributing factor in defective eyes and various nervous disturbances.

A great number of people have been killed or crippled for life thru falls due to high-heeled shoes. It should be the parent's aim to develop strong, youthful feet in their children. Put away the idea that any kind of shoes will do for the children. In childhood the feet are easily moulded and may become irreparably deformed through the parent's lack of knowledge and desire to have the child prettily shod. The public ought to demand common sense shoes which conform to the shape of the foot, and manufacturers should be obliged to supply them. One must also remember that greater standard with fewer styles means a less expensive product.

If your feet bother you try the following exercise prescribed for soldiers by the U.S. Government. Stand with toes together, heels as wide apart as possible and barefooted. Raise on the toes and lower slowly on the outside of the foot. Count and increase the exercise every day until you reach a hundred. Try this a few weeks and you will be surprised at the pleasure in walking.

**Care of Your Eyes.**

You should neither read facing the light; nor read in a strong sunlight, nor while riding in a car, nor while lying down.

In reading light should be good and fall upon the book over the left shoulder.

Hold your head up while reading and do not let your eyes get nearer than a foot from the page.

Avoid reading papers or books in which the print is small and not clear.

Keep your eyes clear by bathing them well each morning. Be careful not to dry them with a soiled towel or cloth.

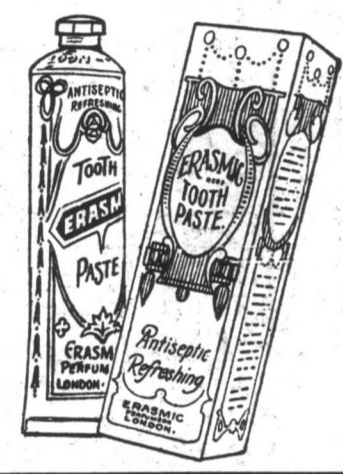

**A Children's Story Teller**

Hans Christian Andersen, the Danish storyteller and poet, was born at Odense, a seaport town on the island of Funen, Denmark. The son of a shoemaker, he had very little schooling, but in spite of that drawback he became one of the most gifted writers of fairy tales that the world has known. At the age of twenty-five he published his first volume of poems, including the widely translated "Dying Child." Three years later he received from the Danish King a pension, which enabled him to travel in Germany, England, Spain, and the East. A prolific writer, he produced an almost continuous series of poems, dramas, short stories, novels, and narrative descriptions of scenery and manners. Particularly interesting are his Chinese stories, and the way in which he describes the beauties of that vast empire. Indeed, though set forth in childish language, grown-ups cannot fail to be interested. He must have been a great lover of Nature as well as a God-fearing man, for even his fairy tales contain morale and hidden lessons, which the wisest person would do well to read, and inwardly digest. His "Tales for Children," "The Wild Swans," and "The Ice Maiden," are the daintiest productions in that class of literature; whilst his "Story of My Life," is as interesting as his fairy tales. It is, however, for his "wonderful" tales that he is best remembered and will be longest known. These include "The Tin Soldier," "The Ugly Duckling," and "The Little Match Girl." On his 70th birthday he was decorated by Christian IX, with the Grand Cross of the Dannebrog, and an album containing one of his stories in fifteen languages was presented to him by his admirers. He died at Copenhagen on August 4, 1875.

Ships Within Ships.

CARRYING VESSELS IN TROUBLES OF PIECES.

At the present time a well-known shipbuilding firm in the North of England is building a vessel which will be conveyed to Africa in portions. It will be re-assembled at its ultimate destination.

Every year ships are built in Great Britain for use on lakes and inland waters in all parts of the world. Usually these are built and bolted together in the shipyard before being taken to pieces and sent to distant parts in separate packages.

**Boilers Give Trouble.**  
A large mission steamer built some years ago for use on Lake Nyassa, in Africa, was erected in this country as if for launching. But no rivets were used; bolts and nuts held the steel framework together. The sides—port and starboard—were painted in different colours, and every bar, plate, and piece of steelwork bore a different number and letter.

Thus the builders in Africa could tell at a glance whether a plate belonged to one side or the other; the exact position it was intended to occupy was denoted by the reference number and letter.

In order to facilitate transport, this steamer was divided into over three thousand packages, each of which weighed from half a hundredweight to five hundredweight.

The greatest difficulty encountered in sending these ships abroad is with the bolters and masts. The bolters weigh many tons, and the masts are difficult to handle on account of their length.

**Work On Nfld. Picture Story Begun.**

WELL-KNOWN PLAYWRIGHT ON THE JOB.

He has worked with such stars as Alice Brady, Elsie Ferguson, Billie Burke, Mae Murray, John and Lionel Barrymore, Constance Bennett, Dorothy Dalton, Mary Miles Minter, and Nantogya. Just prior to his arrival in St. John's, Mr. Fort completed an adaptation of Ralph Connor's famous book, "Glenarry School Days," which is at present under production at Ottawa, Ontario, and under Ernest Shipman's supervision. **Paying for the Navy.**

AUSTRALIAN PLANS TO HELP BRITISH TAXPAYER.

Mr. W. M. Hughes, the Prime Minister of Australia, has announced tentative arrangements for an Imperial Conference to be held about the middle of next year to consider the effect of the Washington Treaty and the Dominions' contribution to Empire defence, especially with regard to the navy. Mr. Hughes added that there was no reason for the existing disparity between the contributions of Britain

and overseas dominions. "I agree it does not appear equitable," he said, "but Australia's contribution per head equals and perhaps exceeds that of the other Dominions combined. If the quota of each of the other Dominions were raised to the Australian level the British taxpayer would be considerably relieved.

All the Dominions at the last Imperial Conference recognised the soundness of the principle of Empire contribution to naval defence, but the matter was postponed pending the decisions of the Washington Conference."

Hero of Alexandria.

Hero, who was either a Greek or an Egyptian who wrote in Greek, lived in Alexandria about 200 years ago. He was a scientist and an inventor. He invented a water-clock, an organ run by water-power, a catapult worked by compressed air and his books contain descriptions of levers, wedges, screws, pulleys, a steam engine, a self-trimming lamp, a theodolite and an acolyte. The last named was a hollow ball containing on its surface a number of tubes whose ends were bent in one direction. When steam was generated in the ball it forced the latter to rotate as it was forced out of the bent tubes.

**Labrador Report.**

THE MEGLE BRINGS GOOD FISHERY NEWS.  
 S.S. Megle, Capt. Burgess arrived at port last evening, after a 12 days port trip to Hopedale, Labrador. The American tourists made the passage and were delighted with the scenery on the coast. Capt. Burgess gives fair reports of the fishery and the voyage on the whole will be a good one. At Grady, North of Batten there is only a sign of fish, but the reports from the North are very bright. At Grady, North of Black Island there is a good variety of fish. The crew are doing exceptionally well at Grady. Horse Harbor and Emily Harbor. Fish were plentiful when the Megle was coming South. Big hauls being taken daily. The schooners are fishing at Iron Point and doing well. At Whiston's Harbor and Hare Tickle, there are no vessels fishing, but the local fishery is doing well. The fleet doing the Northern Labrador fishery reported to Capt. Burgess that the fishing was to be had at Farmington and many schooners there would have big trips. Ice prevented schooners getting far North, there being a heavy fog. At Cartwright there is Lordship Bishop White and Mr. Canon Bayly of Bonavista who have been on a visitation along the coast.  
 Capt. Sam Bob Winsor and his shipwrecked crew who lost their vessel in the Straits came south by the Megle and were landed at their homes. Since the vessel was lost the men secured some 200 quintals of cod fish which was purchased by E. C. Grant. Capt. Fradsham of Bay Roberts, whose auxiliary schooner was lost at Winsor's Harbor, also came south by the ship. His crew of five are still fishing and are doing well.

**Austrian Doctors Studying Rickets.**

CURES BY SUNLIGHT AND COD LIVER OIL SUGGEST NEW THEORY.  
 London, July 4.—The study of rickets has been carried a stage further by the work of a group of investigators amount in the beams of children. They found, according to the Lancet, that children receiving fresh milk from stall-fed cows to which milk sugar had been added developed rickets during the winter and spring. They did not develop it in summer.

On the other hand, when cod liver oil was added to the diet and more milk and less sugar given rickets did not develop at any time. The disease, moreover, could be cured by cod liver oil and by exposure to sunlight or to the radiation of the mercury vapor quartz lamp.

The latter point is of very great interest for it suggests that the well-known curative effect of sunlight may depend on the ultra-violet rays it contains, which are present in large amount in the beams of the lamp. In cities these ultra-violet rays are filtered out by the smoke in the atmosphere and so the city dweller is deprived of this aid to health. Deeply interesting, too, is the fact that the action of cod liver oil on the bone lesions of rickets. Cod liver oil is stated to contain vitamin A, and hence the suggestion is now made that this mysterious body may be produced in the animal body by a process of "photo synthesis," under the influence of sun radiation—"an idea which is quite new to animal physiology." Experiments on animals to confirm or elucidate this idea are now in progress.

## Irish Funds for Lucrative Practice

The Irish establishments in the eighteenth century were out of all proportion to the wealth and to the needs of the people, and they formed a great yield of lucrative patronage—paid for from the Irish revenues—at the full disposal of the English ministers, and almost wholly beyond the cognizance of the British Parliament. The habit of quartering on Ireland persons who could not be safely or largely provided for in England was inveterate. The Duke of St. Alban's—the illegitimate son of Charles II.—enjoyed an Irish pension of £800 a year; Catherine Sedley, the mistress of James II. had one of £5,000 a year. William III. bestowed confiscated lands exceeding an English county in extent on his Dutch favorites, Portland and Albemarle, and considerable estates on his former mistress, Elizabeth Villiers. The Duchess of Kendal and the Countess of Darlington, the two mistresses of George I. had pensions of the united value of £5,000 per annum. Lady Walsington—the daughter of the Duchess of Kendal—had an Irish pension of £1,500, and Lady Howe, the daughter of Lady Darlington, one of £900, while Madame de Walmsden, one of the mistresses of George II. had an Irish pension of £800. Some of the pensions stood under other names. Thus we had the Duke of Devonshire, when Lord Lieutenant—on August 6, 1788—transmitting to the Lord Treasurer a warrant granting an annuity of £2,000 for thirty-one years to the Earl of Chesham and Lord Walpole for the sole use of Sophie Marianne de Walmsden, the Queen Dowager of Prussia—sister of George II.

That night Helen went to examine it. She was curious. Suddenly she heard a noise within, and on the spur of the moment she spoke.

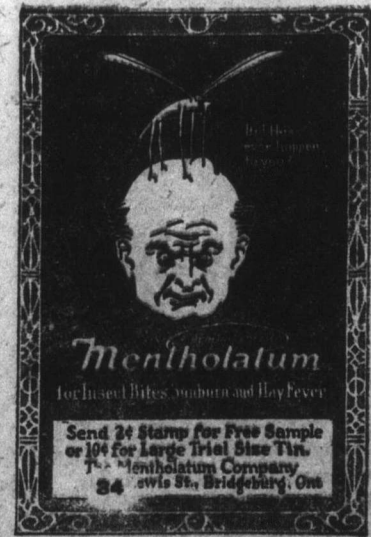
An answer came—in the voice of one of her old sweethearts. The hollow of the body of the horse was filled with Greek soldiers!

## C. P. Liner Empress of Australia.

The latest addition to the Pacific  
 service of the Canadian Pacific Steam-  
 ships is the "Empress of Australia,"  
 a vessel similar in many respects to  
 the "Empress of Canada," recently  
 completed by the Fairfield Shipbuilding  
 Company, and they are the largest and  
 the finest of the company's fleet.

The Empress of Australia was origi-  
 nally named the Tirpitz by her Ger-  
 man owners, for she is one of the ves-  
 sels taken over from the German mar-  
 chant fleet at the end of hostilities.  
 She was intended for the South Amer-  
 ican service of the Hamburg-Ameri-  
 can Line, and was launched in 1913  
 by the Vulcan Works at Stettin. Al-  
 though launched before the war, the  
 delays incident to that catastrophe  
 prevented her completion until 1921,  
 when she was handed over to the  
 British through the Reparation Com-  
 mission. Since being acquired by the  
 Canadian Pacific Steamships, she has  
 been altered and overhauled, and fit-  
 ted with oil-burning furnaces. The  
 alterations have been in the nature of  
 interior changes, including the pro-  
 vision of accommodation for Asiatic  
 steamer passengers. The lifeboat has  
 been brought up to date and Wehn  
 launching gear fitted.

**PRINCIPAL DIMENSIONS.**  
 Length between perpendiculars 558  
 feet; breadth 75 feet; depth to upper  
 deck 46 feet 2 1/2 inches; gross tonnage  
 21,500. She has accommodation for 400  
 first class, 165 second class, and 360  
 third class, and 670 Asiatic steamer  
 passengers, and carries a crew of 520.

She is of the shelter deck type, with  
 a continuous bridge deck extending  
 the full length of the ship. Above the  
 bridge deck are upper and lower pro-  
 menade decks running about half the  
 length of the vessel, and the boat deck  
 is above the upper promenade deck.  
 Below she has two complete 'tween  
 decks, while at the forward end she  
 has a lower orlop, and at the after  
 end a lower deck only.

The Empress of Australia is fitted  
 with every safety appliance necessary  
 to guard against unforeseen accidents.  
 She has a cellular double bottom run-  
 ning almost the complete length of  
 the ship, and it is subdivided into wat-  
 ertight compartments in a very com-  
 plete manner. The watertight doors  
 are all arranged for hydraulic as well  
 as hand manipulation. Wireless of  
 course plays an important part in the  
 ship's routine, direction finding in-  
 struments for ascertaining the ship's  
 position by wireless are included, and  
 there is an emergency plant as well  
 as the main set. The vessel has a  
 gyrostatic compass, and a submarine  
 signalling outfit.

**THE PROPELLING MACHINERY.**  
 The propelling machinery consists  
 of high speed turbines driving twin  
 propellers through Pottinger's hydro-  
 lic transformers. The main turbines  
 are of the Parsons' type with two tur-  
 bine impulse wheels and the total power  
 developed is 18,000 at the shaft, giving  
 a speed of seventeen knots under nor-  
 mal draught conditions.

The turbines run at 800 revolutions  
 per minute, the propeller speed being  
 reduced through the transformers to  
 150 r.p.m. The ordinary thrust blocks  
 were originally fitted, but these have  
 been replaced with the Mitchell thrust  
 block with independent forced lubri-  
 cation. For reversing purposes a re-  
 versing engine is fitted at the end of  
 the turbine, which shuts off the steam  
 to the turbine, operates the pumps for  
 the transformer circuits, and opens  
 the steam when the turbine is run-  
 ning in the reversed direction.

For the ship's lighting and auxiliary  
 purposes, four turbo generators are  
 fitted, each of 115 kilo watts capacity  
 running at 2,200 r.m.p. The boilers  
 which were built in Germany at the  
 Vulcan Works, are a water tube type,  
 similar to the Yarrow, and working  
 250 lbs. per square inch. There are  
 fourteen of them, in two boiler rooms,  
 each boiler having three furnaces.  
 Howden's forced draft is used.

The passenger accommodation is very  
 sumptuously fitted up, with elevators  
 running between main and promen-  
 ade decks, smoke rooms, ladies' room,  
 writing room, and the usual lounges  
 among the public rooms. The first  
 class dining room can accommodate 270  
 passengers at one sitting. The vessel  
 will be a decided acquisition to the  
 travelling public between the British  
 Columbia coast and the Far East—  
 Canadian Shipping.

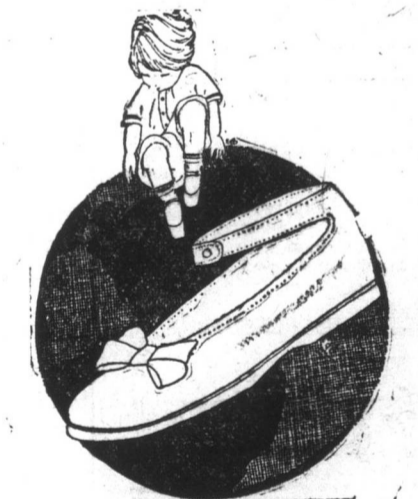

**Municipal Council**

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cooke presided. Council members present were: Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, and Dowden were present.

Minutes of previous meetings being read, the following matters were discussed:

The past week the Government was asked to guarantee the loan of \$50,000 for local improvements. Deputy Colonial Secretary informed the Board communication would be placed before the Executive at the earliest opportunity.

Communications were read from the Minister of Public Works and the Officer of Health, the former relating to shed erected during work on the Marine Parade, the latter in regard to unsanitary conditions at St. George's Field. The Board instructed the Engineer to have the shed removed and the unsanitary conditions remedied.

Communications made by Walter Gosse relating to the Plymouth Road were referred to the Engineer for attention.

Application of J. R. Flides for privilege of "small homes" Act for installation of water and sewerage system was granted. Council has no objection to this purpose.

Communication was read from the Collishaw asking that the Act extend to the St. John's Marine Society now being incorporated under the benefits of Section 88 of the new City Charter. The Society was prepared to immediately proceed with the erection of 35 houses if the Council would grant its Bonds to the extent of \$10,000. The Council, while recognizing the growing demand for a better class of workmen's houses than obtainable to-day in the congested town, is unable to accede to the request.

Communication of the R. C. Corporation regarding sewer conditions at the Palace, was referred to the Engineer for report.

Resolution given at last meeting regarding "Siren Horns" was taken up and resolutions were passed to prohibit the use of these as motor vehicles of every description except such as are operated by the St. John's Fire Department. It was given that at the next meeting resolutions would be passed to set apart certain streets of the city as stands for Licensed Drivers and also with reference to the parking of motor cars.

The City Engineer reported that bridge over Mundy Pond Brook, Archarth Road, which collapsed last week was being repaired and that traffic over this road had resumed in a few days.

Reports of Health Officer, City Engineer and other Departmental heads were tabled. Accounts presented were ordered paid after which meeting adjourned.

The orderly duties are done well and sometimes cheerfully for at least 5 minutes after inspection, camp is as smart as a top.

The Scoutmaster, Mr. Brown, is expected shortly and in his absence Mr. Louis Calver and Rev. Holden, M.A. are in charge. The camp is held in a field kindly lent to Mr. French.
