A Bunch of Exact Facts.

The following paragraph appeared in the Advocate or Thursday last:

"Who in Newfoundland is ignorant of the fact that by the "infamous Morine Railway contract all the forest areas that will "now be developed, thanks to the efforts of the present Govern-"ment, were taken from the people and given away for a song."

The exact fact is, that every acre of land in the Colony deeded to R. G. Reid, and by him transferred to the Reid Nfld. Co., Ltd., was granted to him under the Whiteway-Bond Railway contracts of 1889 and 1893. Not a single acre of forest land owned or controlled by the Reids was obtained under what is above referred to as "the Morine Railway contract," or, in other words, by the Railway contract of 1898.

Another exact fact is this, that all the forest areas connected with the Humber scheme, transferred by Sir William Armstrong to the Nfld. Power and Pulp Co., Ltd., were obtained from the Reid Nfld. Co., and if those areas had not been assembled together under the Reid Co., they would probably have been frittered away amongst hundreds, so that no large scheme of development could have been enterprised.

The plan for Humber development was originated by the Reid Nfld. Co., as the Wilson Deal, in 1916, when it was strenuously opposed by Coaker and his followers, but put on the Statute Book by the Morris Government of that year. In its new form, it is due to the enterprise of the Reid Nfld. Co., and its agents, in putting the matter before investors in London. After strenuous resistance by the Squires Government, it was consented to, and is now adopted as though it sprang from the brain of Squires himself, when, as a matter of fact, he is only using it as a political kite.

The Advocate goes on to say that "had it not been for Tory "opposition, construction work on the Humber plant would have "been in full swing long ago." But the real truth is that construction work on that plant might be in full swing to-day if Squires had caleld the House together, instead of dissolving it; and if the whole of next summer goes by without any real work being done on the Humber plant, it will be because Squires preferred to play politics instead of looking out for the employment of the people.

What is the Price?
