**The Royal Commission.**  
At noon to-day the great case of "Sir John versus Sir John et al" will be formally opened at Ottawa. Nothing has thus far transpired in reference to the shape the proceedings will assume, and there is considerable public curiosity as to the probable doings and saying before the Commissioners.

If we may rely upon the correctness of the Ottawa Times, the celebrated "sealed packet" of Mr. Starnes is to be produced. It says:—

The documentary evidence on which so much stress was placed by Mr. Huntington that he expressed the fear that it, having passed out of the custody of the Parliamentary Committee by the dissolution of that body, might even at that time (about five o'clock on the afternoon of the 18th) be floating down towards the Gulf of St. Lawrence, will be forthcoming, while their case having been put before the public by the Opposition through the press, will furnish a sufficient ground upon which the Commissioners may proceed.

This is all very well; but who is to say whether the whole of the important papers in Mr. Starnes' possession are produced?

The Ottawa correspondent of the Globe has the following particulars:—

Judge Cowan arrived from the east by the morning train, and Judge Day and Polette came in the afternoon. The headquarters of the trio are at the Russell House. The Railway Committee room in the Parliament buildings has been fitted up to represent as nearly as possible a court of law. A long table is stretched across the head of the room, in the centre of which are desks for the three Commissioners, whilst at one end sit the two official reporters, and at the other end Mr. Salter Vankoughnet, Secretary of the Commission. A small desk and chair on the right, and a little in front of the Commissioners, are placed for the accommodation of the witness under examination. Immediately facing the Commissioners is a row of desks for the use of members of the press. To the rear of these are benches for the accommodation of the public. Adjoining the Committee room is a smaller apartment, to be used should the Commissioners desire to retire for consultation. The following gentlemen have been subpoenaed to appear to-morrow to give evidence:—Sir Francis Hincks, Messrs. Andrew, Allen, Starnes, Beaubien, and Dr. Bellefleur, the latter two being respectively Vice-President and Secretary of the Northern Colonization Railway Company. Sir Francis is described as much put about by things as they are, and consequently in very bad humor.

The correspondent of the Hamilton Times has it that a conspiracy is said to be hatching at Ottawa under the management of Sir John, aided by Hugh Allan, for the purpose of bringing a charge of some sort against Hon. Geo. Brown, in order to divert attention from their own case. The particulars may be expected to appear in the Government organs shortly.

A brief paragraph, telling of a mute yet terrible record of the destruction wrought by the late storm, comes from Halifax, N.S., in the following words:—

"About 50 bodies, supposed to be corpses of American fishermen, have been washed ashore on the north side of Prince Edward. Thirty-three more were picked up between the North Cape and Cascompec."

Some time ago, when the Mail was engaged in vilifying Hon. Mr. McKellar, his favourite cry was that he should resign his office till the charges against him should be investigated. A much more serious charge is now made against Sir John A. Macdonald and his colleagues, and proof is not wanting to substantiate the charge. Yet the Mail has never called on Sir John and his incriminated colleagues to resign. Perhaps it makes some difference with the Mail whose ox is gored. But why should not the same rule hold good in both cases?—Huron Signal.

A man named Roderick Legge has been committed to the Rockwood Lunatic Asylum, Kingston, having become insane in consequence of a blow on the head received from a windlass crank whilst digging a well. Hopes are entertained of his recovery.
