The Minister of Militia's My-thical Letter.

The Tory papers have been pub-lishing with great glee a letter purporting to be written by Mr. Ross Minister of Militia, to a postmaster nstructing him in positive terms to vote for the Government candidate. Yesterday we made some comments on that letter, and said that if Mr. Ross wrote it, he had done wrong. But it now appears that he never wrote such a letter. In the House on Thursday he referred to the subject, and stated in the most positive terms that "he never sent a tele graphic message, never wrote a letter and never used his influence in con nection with the electors in any way atever." His reason for not deny ing the statement sooner was that he wished to see the alleged letter in order to make that denial the more positive and complete. He had Burlesque and Comedy Troupe sked Mr. McDonald, of Cape Breton, 25 Artists! for it, but without result. That gentleman had given it to Sir John facdonald, who, assuming it to be genuine, had handed it to the Tory papers. It then fell into Dr. Tupper's nds, and he being in Montreal the letter could not be produced.

Now, why don't those gentlement the accused Mr. Ross, bring the leter to light, so that he may be eithe honourably acquitted of the charge or justly condemned? He has denied having written it in the most positive manner. He states that he does not even know the person to whom it was alleged to have been sent. The first provides that all the judges may try pending election petitions, the judges of Ontario having been of opinion hitherto that only the three judges constituting the Election Court could hear the trials. The second provides that the clause in the new Act granting an appeal from the decision of a single judge to the full Court shall be retrospective.

The unfortunate man, ignorant of the fatal trap, entered the house of the woman, and both being surprised were secured by the watchers, who speedily severed their heads from their bodies and carried the former to the district magistrate. There will be a trial, but the whole piece of legislation is a mockery. The guilt or innocence of the murdered will be decided by test. Both heads will be put into a large tub of water, and set in motion by vigorous stirring. If the heads meet face to face, behold a clear proof of guilt! If not, then all the worse for the avenger. Such is the power of custom—custom more cruel than law—for it demands the death if both. It is said that if a man had but killed the intruder he would be liable to punishment for murder. But having effected a double murder, he escapes with a mere formal whipping and receives a reward of \$20,000 cash. More Leakage.

By slow degrees, but very surely, the irregularities of the late Government are coming to light. Under their administration even Judges were induced to act illegally and take money from the Treasury to which they had no right. The most recent instance is that of Judge Bosse, of the Province of Quebec, who, a 1868, drew three hundred dollars; in 1869, the sum of three hundred and forty-two dollars; the same amount in 1870, and three hundred and twelve dollars in 1871, to which he had no claim or title whatever. He obtained those various sums nominally for travelling expenses, but as he was not by law entitled, to travelling expenses, he was simply, with the connivance of the Government, obtaining money illegally. Now that the matter has been fully exposed, it is proposed to institute proceedings against him for the sums so obtained, and force him to make restitution. It is high true, not only that these leakages should be stopped, but that the process of disgorgement should actively commence.—Hamilton Times.

Chor PROSPECTS IN THE STATES.—In the Chicago Times of last Saturday we find 160 special telegrams, dated May 15th, in reference to the crop prospects, from the mest important points in States of Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Indiana, Minnesota and Michigan. The prospects, indexing from these reports covering the

from the mest important points in States of Illinois, Iowa, Wisconsin, Indiana, Minnesota and Michigan. The prospects, judging from these reports covering the great grain-producing region of the north-west, is most encouraging for a large yield of all the cereals. In the winter wheat-growing regions theorop is generally looking well; a few counties in Michigan report wheat badly winter-killed; in other counties it is looking unusually promising. Corn in the States named is about half planted, and it is expected the usual breadth will be devoted to this great staple. In the more western States there has been plenty of rain, and the season is everywhere unusually backward, which has delayed corn planting.

Woot Prospects.—A Sarnia merchant received, the other day, a communication from an extensive wool broker, giving it as his opinion that "wool will rule low this season, so as to ship under low tariff, and will be bought at 28 to 30, and not over 81 cents. Four large concerns, that used Canadian wools, have failed; consequence of the financial panic on the other side. They used over one-third of all the combing wool grown in Canada. They will not be in the market this season." The above opinion will inform our farmers upon an important point, which they will be considering in a few days. It is that of a dealer who considers it his duty to keep himself well posted on wool matters. Opinions differ, however, on the subject, for another dealer says:—"The prospects are good. The stock on hand is light, and in Boston the price is about three cents per 1b. more than at this time last year. Present ruling prices 60 to 622 cents, American currency."

The first stone of the new Bay-ist Church, on the corner of Jarvis and Gerrard Stracts, Toronto, was turned on Monday by Dr. Castle, pastor, in the presence of a large gathering. The building will cost about \$60,000, and will have the latest improvements in ventilation, &c., the seats being constructed in semicircular shape on a rising floor.
