ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

ITEMS PASSED IN COMMITTEE ON SUPPLY.

Explanation of Increases—A Heavy Days Work by the Railway Committee—Private Bills.

The principal work of the house yesterday was in committee of supply where the discussion is very irregular. The most interesting passages were in reference to the appropriation trying to remedy their former error in reducing the salary of a party friend, in which Mr. Crooks spoke with his usual diffusiveness, and Mr. Bell stirred up some feeling by his anti-parliamentary Roman Catholicism, for which he was severely criticized by Mr. Harcourt. Mr. Mowat introduced a bill relating to the inspection of steam boilers.

The chairman said that he had not been shown that there was any desire on the part of the railway companies or the public for a grand central station. The further consideration of the bill was postponed until to-day in order to allow plans to be produced.

ST. CATERINES AND NIAGARA CENTRAL. A bill granting an extension to the St. Catharines and Niagara railway was next taken up. The measure gives the company power to extend their branch line from Hamilton to Toronto and to the village of Victoria, in Wentworth county, or to some other point on Niagara river, also to extend the line through the western part of the counties of Hamilton, Brant, Oxford, Middlesex, Kent, and Essex, to Windsor or some other point on the Detroit river.

PRIVATE BILLS. The committee on private bills met yesterday morning at 10:30 o'clock. Mr. Fraser presiding. There was a large attendance owing to the bill for the incorporation of the Orange grand lodges having been taken up. The Orange bill was then taken up. Mr. Merrick said that this bill having been before the house on a previous occasion it was unnecessary to say anything regarding it.

WORK IN COMMITTEE. THE RAILWAY COMMITTEE. The first measure considered by the railway committee yesterday morning was the Gait Junction railway company. The bill gave power to construct a railway from Gait to Paris or Bradford, or to some point between the two last named places, and to connect with all railways through cross or alpine. The clause relating to the route was amended so as to define the location more precisely. The capital was fixed at \$200,000 instead of \$100,000 as proposed in the bill. A provision authorizing municipal entities interested to exempt the road from taxation was amended by providing that such exemption should be available to any municipality within twenty years of the date of the bill.

DISREPUTABLE DIVES.

Heavy Fines and Imprisonment by the Police Magistrate Yesterday.

Yesterday was a red letter day in the police court, and some of the girls and madams who were up were pretty severely dealt with.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS. The public accounts committee met yesterday morning with Mr. Ferris in the chair. The examination of Mr. Cashman of the crown lands department was resumed by Mr. Meredith. Accounts were produced, including a number from T. & W. Murray, Pembroke, and Murray and Tully, Coblenz, for implements and supplies furnished to the Pembroke and Mattawa, Pembroke and Alice, and other colonization roads. The witness was examined on the latter part of his evidence, which is to be further continued to-day.

RIGHTS OF INNKEEPERS. The committee to which was referred the bill conferring on innkeepers and livery keepers the right to sell any animal brought to their premises in their business in their own right, met yesterday afternoon. Mr. Meredith pointed out that the innkeeper has already the common law right to a lien on an animal owned by his guest, but not unless the owner was his guest. The statute at present confers the right to retain an animal for food, etc., furnished to the animal. It was thought that the bill was too broad, and an amendment was introduced to allow of Mr. McMahon further considering it.
