A SIX-YEAR-OLD MURDERER.

Brother to Make it Realistic.

To-day he took his little brother to the cemetery, which wasnear his father's home, and after scooping out a grave in the sand by a small brook, he placed the little infant in a box, which he had previously carried there, nailed down had previously carried there, nailed down the top and buried it, going through the form of delivering a prayer and singing a hymn. 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

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
