It is to be hoped that the public attention which to-day's expos-ure will direct to this abuse, and what will follow in subsequent articles, will induce Mr. Mowat to take the matter into his most serious consideration and give us something in the way of reform at the next session of the procial legislature.

The Making of a Nation. The celebration of the Washington centent al naturally enough throws our neighbors back upon reminiscences of what happened a hun-dred years ago. And among different views of that former time which we have come across there is one presented by The Chicago Tribun which we think particularly worthy of atten-tion. Taking for its subject "The Growth of the National Doctrine," our contemporary rises to correct what it believes to be a prevailing and popular error. It appears to be th ing and popular error. It appears to be the general belief that Washinzton and his associ-ates labored together in harmony, and almost as one man, not only in declaring the independ-ence of the old colonies, but afterwards in framing a federal constitution for them. But this is making a grand mistaka. In truth, it was only by dint of prolonged, unfinching effort that a National Government was got to-gether at last, in the face of heavy blows and much discoursement. Washington and those much discouragement. Washington and those who shared with him his comprehensive, far-sighted doctrine of *nationality* had to contest every step of the way with politicians of little and limited vision, whose horizon was bounded

by the Province – fellows who could not understand what a nation was wanted for at all. To each one of these pigmy politicisms, his own particular province, or commonwealth, or state, as it was afterwards called-was all that he cared The rights that appeared precious in his eyes were those of his own province merely ablishing a great nation, he did not think of that at first in fact it took years upon years to get even a conception of it into his his head at all. "The aspirants for offices, honors and power in the States flattered the local prejudices of the people, inflamed local pride and self-interest; declared that the es-tablishment of a nation would be the begining of despotism. It was only by slow de-reces that the Nationalists made progress." The last two sentences we quote straight from our Chicago contemporary, and they are descriptive of the kind of opposition which Washington had to encounter a hundred years ago. Yet they would answer fairly well to ribe, too, some of the opposition whic has to be met in our own time by those who would make Canada a nation. Yes, the true story of the Washington cen tennial has its valuable lesson for Canadians, as well as for our Republican neighbors. And the most important part of that lesson isthat Canada should try to be a nation. And in order that she may succeed in this, she must above all things have a National Policy. That is for us the lesson of the Washington Centennial.

The official statistics continue to show a de-

crease in immigration into the United States, the arrivals for nine months of the current fiscal year numbering 255,707, as compared with 293,231 during the same period of last year, and 260,951 during the nine months of the year previous. The decline extends to almost every nationality, Russia alone showing a considerable increase, while there have been 12,000 less arrivals from Great Britain, 900 less from Sweden and Norway, 8000 less from Italy and 4000 less from Germany.


