There have always been doubts about the moon among astronomers. Her light is notoriously borrowed from that mass of incandescent vapours which we call the sun. It has no atmosphere. It cannot have inhabitants, unless organic life can subsist under conditions radically different from those on earth. The moon is an arid region, where there is no vegitation, where there is not how wooden fauces—"wood cocks—with care."
