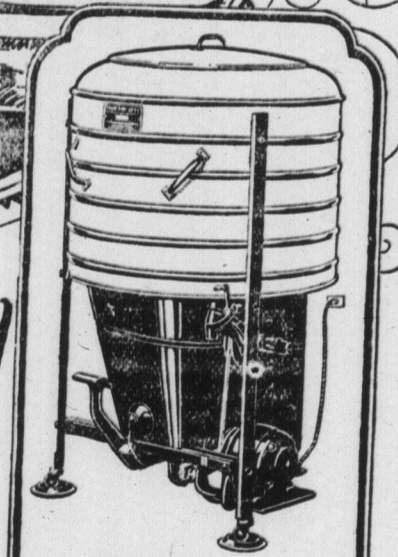

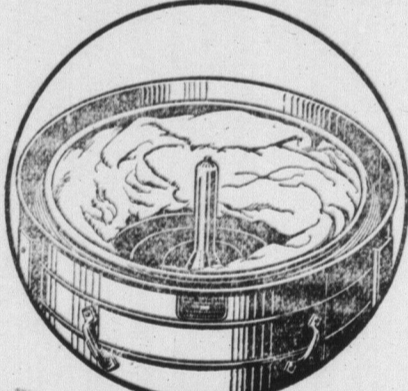

### EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN

Secretary of Religious Education, addressed the Sunday School at 11 a.m. setting forth the scope and importance of Sunday School work from the standpoint of its over 200,000 schools in the world, its 2 1/2 millions of teachers and officers, and its vast army of 21,000,000 scholars. But it was especially important from the standpoint of character building and its blessing and strength to the national life developing through the individual high and noble national character.

A Mass. meeting was held in the afternoon at 3 o'clock under the auspices of the Men's Brotherhood, addressed by Mr. Machum, in which he referred most eloquently and powerfully to the challenge of the Sunday School to the church to give it every encouragement and support in consideration of the fact that 85% of the membership of the church come from the Sunday School. The church should provide not only better equipment and better trained teachers for the regular Sunday sessions of the school, but should also arrange for mid-week activities such as C.G.I.T., Trail Rangers and Tuxis Groups, for teen age boys and girls, and in addition to this, Young Peoples' Societies, should be organized for the older young people of our churches. By these mid-week activities there would result higher and better companionship, additional spiritual instruction and better social advantages.

On Sunday evening Evangelist Hawkins again addressed a large audience of interested and attentive hearers basing his remarks on Matt. 27:42 "He Saved Others." After a sermon marked by tenderness, clearness and power, an appeal was made for decisions for Christ. Quite a number indicated their desire and purpose to enter the Christian life and were afterwards dealt with in the Enquiry Room.

A real revival is going on in Lawrencetown, much to the encouragement of all concerned, and this too, in the old time way, by the faithful and earnest declaration of the Gospel message—the old, old story—old, yet ever new.

Mr. Hawkins will continue the services until Wednesday evening, Feb. 14th, after which he will go to St. John, N.B., where he will begin a campaign on Feb. 18th, with the Victoria St. Baptist Church, Rev. George D. Hudson, pastor.

### REVENUE CONTINUES TO GROW

Nearly Ten Dollars Increase For Fiscal Year Ending January 31st.

Ottawa—Canada's revenue during the ten months of the fiscal year ended January 31st, totalled \$328,142,085, an increase of \$9,662,196 over the corresponding period of the previous finance year.

In the same period, ordinary expenditure declined \$6,241,022, the total ordinary expenditure in the ten months ending January 31st, last, being \$263,072,228.

In spite of decreased expenditure and increased revenue \$7,483,842 was added to the net debt of Canada last month. On December 31st, 1922, the net debt was \$2,412,496,151. On January 31st, 1923, it had grown to \$2,419,979,993. The increase, it is explained, is mainly due to railway advances.
