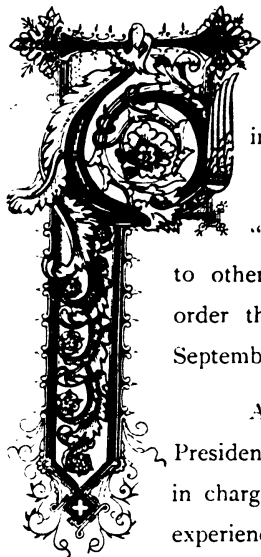

THE COLLEGE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS,
(the latter comprising about 40 acres) are situated
in the suburbs of the City of London.

The buildings are those heretofore known as the
"Hellmuth Ladies' College." They have been transferred
to other authorities, and organization is now being effected in
order that active, earnest work may be commenced early in
September, 1884.

A large and efficient staff of instructors, including a
President, a Lady Principal, Professors and Tutors, will be placed
in charge of the various departments. Several well-known and
experienced gentlemen and ladies have already been appointed
as Professors and Officers of the College; and as soon as the necessary arrange-
ments shall have been completed a full list of the Professorial and Teaching
Staff will be laid before the public.

The great aim and object of the management of the College is to provide
full and thorough instruction for Young Women, in all the branches of learning
taught in the best Universities. While the authorities have made provision for
furnishing elementary and secondary instruction to those who may require such
to enable them to pass the Entrance Examinations to the University Depart-
ments, as well as provision for instruction in Music, the Fine Arts and Domestic
Economy, their chief object is to furnish a sound training in true Academic or
University subjects. The standard for the **ENTRANCE** or **MATRI-
CULATION EXAMINATION** is quite equal to that of Toronto
University; and the work taken up in the respective years of the
entire course after Matriculation is similar to that of the four
years' course in the University of Toronto. It will thus be seen that
the education sought to be imparted in this institution is of a much higher

and more advanced character than anything that has hitherto been offered to the women of Canada. Therefore, it is hoped that the ladies, who may desire to pursue studies of a class higher than that supplied by the Public and High Schools, will show their appreciation of the effort now being made for their benefit, and extend to the London Ladies' College the support and encouragement needed by such a college in the commencement of its career.
