588ATCHFULNESS is a most important duty. Success in any department of business depends much upon it.
The merrhant must be careful to watch the market; the mechanic must watch and keep pace with every improvement in his line of work; The physician must watch his patient; the farmer must watch for the sowing and the reaping times. He must watch the growing crop in all its stages; he must watch against every agency that may tend to blught his crops, and thus render his labor fruitless. Watch is written upon the tools of every day-laborer. Watch is engraven upon the lawyer's brief. Watch is stamped by the Divine hand upon the high commission of the minister of the gospel. The policeman must watch while on duty; the railway switchman must watch the points; the engineer must watch the signals; the plot on deck must watch; the sentry on his beat must watch ; yea everywhere, in all the walks of life we meet the word WATCH. "Watch ye, therefore; for ye know not when the master of the house cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cock-crowing, or in the morning Lest coming suddenly he find you sleeping. And what I say unto you I say unto all, Watç." Mark 13: 35. If watchfulness is of such consequence as connected with interests already mentioned, what colossal proportions it assumes when applied to the eternal interests of the immortal soul! Is it not of infinite moment to you, my fel-low-man, my brother traveller to the judgment-seat, that you should watch with intense concern the welfare of your never-dying soul. Watch against every thing that is calculated to contaminate the soul through the medium of the eye. Watch against every unholy sound that would suggest evil through the ear. Watch the tongue, that "no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth," Eph. 4:29. Watch against every inducement to the hands
to grasp forbidden fruit, or the feet to tread in the paths of sin. Watch, closely watch the citadel itself, which is the heart. Watch well every appetite, bringing them all under subjection, so that no avenue of ingress to the soul be left unguarded. My friend, should you not "watch and pray, lest you enter into temptation," especially since your adversary, the devil, walketh about as a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour.
