## CHRISTMAS SERVICES.

Though Christmas Eve was mild and threatening, Christmas Day dawned fine and clear, with everything covered by a dainty powdering of snow. The services were well attended, and both the number of communicants and the offertory were larger than usual. The decorations were Gothic in character, and special designs were carried out in scarlet immortelles. All the flowers on the altar were red geraniums, and very brilliant they looked against the new white dossal. The music was specially attractive and received most appreciative notices in the secular press. The soloists were Miss Wyatt, Miss Saunders and Mr. Burton.

## Parish Notes.

New Year's Eve was a very bitter night, but notwithstanding, many were present at the midnight service, and, listening to Mr. Hare's stimulating address, made anew those good resolutions which are the essence of true perseverance.

Special preachers during the month have been the Revs. Prof. Duckworth and C. B. Kenrick.

St. George's Literary and Musical Society held three more meetings before it closed for the Christmas vacation. Canon Macnab's lecture on "English Cathedrals" was much appreciated, and on the following Tuesdays Mr. Hare spoke on "Church Work in East London"; and St. Simon's Debating Club decided that a University education was not the best preparation for the career of a business man. Unfortunately the audience for this debate consisted almost entirely of women, who could not be expected to have many ideas on this practical subject. (EDITOR not responsible.)

It also welcomes a new subscriber, Mrs. Giles, who will give the customary 25 cents a month. The Guild is at present busy in making new surplices for the clergy and choir, and this extra money is devoted to buying a piece of linen for the purpose.

There have been several changes in the Sunday School since Advent began, and its working efficiency has been much strengthened by the Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Gosling, whose duty in finding new teachers, and keeping an eye on absent scholars, is not a light one. Mr. Hare has also been fortunate in securing Mrs. Francis to take charge of the Infant Class; hers is a most important work, and one that needs special gifts. At the library Mr. Harry Smith still presides, and altogether the Sunday School is becoming one of the best worked organizations in the Parish.

On the Sunday after Christmas the children of the Sunday School sang their Christmas carols in the Church. We noted with pleasure the presence of several of the mothers of the children, and to those who regret they did not hear them then, we would say, there will be still another chance, viz., at the Christmas Festival, to be held on Tuesday, Jan. 14th.

The poor were well remembered this year by members of the congregation, and the Rector gladly acknowledges several baskets of Christ-

mas cheer, several turkeys, three tons of coal and \$50 in cash.

We are glad to be able to state that Miss Lowe is well again and able once more to hold her Sunday afternoon Bible Class, which will re-open at 3.30 p.m. on Jan. 12th.

The Sanctuary Guild desire to thank Mr. Winsor for so kindly sending two men to assist in putting up the Christmas decorations.

The first meeting in the New Year of the Literary and Musical Society will be held on Tuesday evening, Jan. 21st, when a scene from "Pickwick" will be given by some members of the Society.

#### WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

During the last three months St. George's W. A. has been working for bales of clothing and gifts suitable for Christmas. In November a bale was sent to the Gordon schools, Qu'Appelle diocese, containing complete suits for four boys, and many very acceptable articles of clothing. In December a bale was sent to Emsdale, and another to Apsley, Algoma. Letters having been received from the clergy of these places for contributions to the Christmas trees, over seventy gifts were sent to each parish. Our thanks are due to the friends who kindly assisted the working members to gladden the young hearts of many children.

There are other ways of extending a helping hand to this branch, which has pledged to meet in April amounting to \$134, namely, to the

#### KING'S DAUGHTERS.

This new parish society is now nearly three months old, and promises to have a strong and vigorous life. About fourteen members are enrolled, and meet every Tuesday morning when

they work for the poor of the parish and do any work specially desired by the Rector. In this way some have become district visitors, and already unbaptized babies have been brought in and a general interest awakened in the Church among those who dwell in remote districts of the parish. This is a most useful work, and open to all those who "cannot teach," or "sing," or "embroider fine linen."

### THE SANCTUARY GUILD.

This is not a new society, but a new name for the Chancel Guild, which was inaugurated at the annual meeting on November 22nd. At this meeting the Rector presided and made suggestions, which were later adopted, as to the widening of the sphere of the Guild's work. Henceforth all the interior of the church will be under its supervision, and practical evidence of the result is already seen. The officers for the coming year were all elected by acclamation, and are:—

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT.

During the last year the Chancel Guild held twenty-nine meetings, the first taking place on Oct. 23rd, the last on April 26th, with a membership of nineteen.

On Feb. 12th, in accordance with the President's wish, it was decided to change the day of meeting from Tuesday to Friday.

The work of the Chancel Guild was most actively carried on during the whole of last winter. The beautiful white dossal which was begun in the winter of '99, was finished in time for use on Easter Day, owing to the special efforts of the embroiderers, who worked an extra morning each week during the season of Lent.

The Guild had also the pleasure and privilege of making a set of altar linen for the small mission church at Carroll, a tiny settlement in the Northwest Territories.

The set of linen consisted of a surplice for the rector of the parish, a fair linen, a protector, a corporal, a pall, a chalice veil and a linen burse.

Mrs. Elmes Henderson, a member of our con-

gregation for many years, kindly collected the necessary money for the materials.

Before the work was sent to its destination, the President entertained the members of the Guild and a few interested friends at afternoon tea when the altar linen was exhibited.

At the meeting last Friday the President read to the Guild the grateful and appreciative acknowledgment of the gift.

We must add here that all the embroidery and white linen work done by the members has been greatly helped forward by the kindness of the Sisters of St. John the Divine.

Besides the church embroidery the Guild has the care of the surplices and cassocks belonging to the clergy and choristers, and also the mending of the church music.

During the past year we have undertaken to address and distribute the PARISH MAGAZINE.

One of the most important of our duties is the weekly arrangement of the altar flowers and also the care of the Sanctuary, an office which is performed by all the members in rotation.

All the decorations for Church festivals are undertaken by the Guild and paid for out of their own funds.
