ONTARIO, NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA.—Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday.

Also, throughout the Dominion, any day appointed by proclamation for a general Fast or Thanksgiving Day.

ECLIPSES FOR THE YEAR 1887.

During the year there will be four Eclipses, two of the Sun and two of the Moon in the following order :

I. February 7-8. There will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon, invisible here. The first contact with the Penumbra occurs in Longitude $118^{\circ} 36' W.$, Latitude, $14^{\circ} 39' N.$ The middle occurs in Longitude $152^{\circ} 6' W.$, Latitude $14^{\circ} 20' N.$ ending in Longitude $174^{\circ} 22' E.$, and Latitude $14^{\circ} 0' N.$ The first contact with the shadow occurs at 52° from the northmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East.

The last contact at $27'$ towards the West.

II. February 22nd. There will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, invisible. We give some of the astronomical particulars. This Eclipse begins on the Earth generally February 22nd, 6h. 40m. 8, mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude $165^{\circ} 25' E.$ of Greenwich and Latitude $37^{\circ} 39' S.$ It ends on the Earth generally February 22nd, 12h. 25m. 4, in Longitude, $91^{\circ} 47' W.$ of Greenwich and Latitude $7^{\circ} 1' S.$

III. August 3rd. There will be a partial eclipse of the Moon, visible at Greenwich. The first contact with the Penumbra occurs August 3rd, 6h. 22m. 9, mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude $87^{\circ} 4' E.$ of Greenwich and Latitude $17^{\circ} 6' S.$ The middle of the Eclipse occurs at 8h. 48m. 9, in Longitude $49^{\circ} 8' E.$ of Greenwich and in Latitude $16^{\circ} 50' S.$ Last contact with the Penumbra occurs in Longitude $11^{\circ} 10' E.$, and in Latitude $16^{\circ} 35' S.$ The first contact with the shadow occurs at 180° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb toward the East.

IV. August 18th. There will be a total Eclipse of the Sun, only partly visible as a partial Eclipse at Greenwich. The following details will show the relations of this Eclipse to our Latitude. It begins on the Earth generally August 18th, 15h. 51m. 5, mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude $54^{\circ} 30' E.$ of Greenwich and in Latitude $37^{\circ} 27' N.$ Central Eclipse at noon Aug. 18th, 17h. 15m. 5, in Longitude $102^{\circ} 0' E.$ of Greenwich and in Latitude $53^{\circ} 47' N.$ This Eclipse ends on the Earth generally in Longitude $155^{\circ} 26' E.$ of Greenwich and in Latitude $9^{\circ} 57' N.$ At Greenwich the Sun will be partially Eclipsed, and continue about fifteen minutes.



CITY POSTAL DELIVERY.

The following are the arrangements in connection with Free Postal Delivery in the City of Montreal :

Letters and papers should be addressed to Street and Number at which to be delivered.

Notice of Change of Residence should be promptly notified to the Postmaster in writing, and renewed at the expiration of three months, they being acted upon only during that length of time.

There are five deliveries made daily in the central divisions of the city, at 8 a.m., 10 a.m., 11.30 a.m., 2 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. Four daily deliveries in the other divisions, at 9 a.m., noon, 2. p.m. and 3.30 p.m.

Hochelaga and Point St. Charles—Two deliveries daily, 9 a.m., and 1 p.m.

Every effort is made to secure the satisfactory working of these arrangements. If, however, irregularities occur, they should be at once reported to the Postmaster.

POST OFFICE.**POSTAGE RATES—LETTERS.**

Letters addressed from or to places in Canada and United States, 3 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

City, or drop letters for city delivery, 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

For Cote des Neiges, Cote St. Antoine, Cote St. Louis, Cote St. Paul, Mile End, Notre Dame de Grace, Point St. Charles, St. Cunegonde, (including Dorchester and Metcalf Avenues), St. Gabriel de M., St. Henri (Tannery West), St. Lambert and Longueuil, 1 cent per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

The above rates must in every case be prepaid by postage stamp. When posted wholly unpaid they cannot be forwarded, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office. Insufficiently paid letters for Canada, on which the first half ounce rate of postage is fully prepaid, are forwarded, charged with double the deficient postage.

Insufficiently paid letters for or from the United States, on which a single rate of postage or more has been paid, are charged with the deficient postage on delivery.

The prepaid postage on letters for the United Kingdom and Newfoundland is 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. Wholly unpaid letters for or from the United Kingdom and the other Postal Union countries, (except the United States), are charged double postage on delivery, and insufficiently prepaid letters double the deficiency.

No letter, &c., can be forwarded registered to any destination unless both the postage and registration fee have been fully prepaid.

POST CARDS.

Post Cards issued at one cent each cannot be transmitted to any place beyond Canada or the United States. Post Bands can be obtained at the rate of \$1.25 per 100.

Post Cards for correspondence between Canada and the Postal Union Countries, are sold at the Stamp Agencies at 2 cents each.

RE-DIRECTED LETTERS.

To any place in Canada, the United States and Postal Union Countries.

Re-directed letters to places within the Dominion or United States, will be forwarded without any additional charge if not taken from the office or if handed back at the moment of their delivery, but if taken from the office and subsequently re-posted they must be prepaid at least one rate, in default of which they will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

Letters originating in Canada re-directed to any of the Postal Union Countries, will be forwarded, even if taken out of the Office and subsequently re-posted.

MATTER WHICH CANNOT BE FORWARDED THROUGH THE POST.

Any Explosive Substance, glass, liquids, or other matter likely to entail risk or injury to the ordinary contents of the mail, will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, Ottawa.

Spectacles and eye-glasses, if securely put in cases not likely to allow the contents to escape if broken in course of conveyance, may be sent by Post within the Dominion on prepayment of parcel post rates.

Letters containing Gold or Silver Money, Jewels, or precious articles, or anything liable to Customs duties, cannot be forwarded by Post to any of the Postal Union Countries, except to the United States.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters intended to be Registered, when addressed to places in Canada or Newfoundland, must be prepaid by stamp, 2 cents each; to the United States 5 cents each, in addition to the postage rate.

All classes of matter may be registered to Postal Union Countries, and the sender may entitle himself to an acknowledgement of delivery from the party addressed by the payment of a fee of five cents in addition to the registration fee.

All letters for registration should be posted 15 minutes before the hour of closing ordinary mails, and 30 minutes before closing of English mails.

Registration Stamps only are admitted in prepayment of Registration Fees.

NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS

published regularly at intervals of not more than one calendar month, having a full title, the place, date of publication, and the number of the issue printed at the top of the first page, posted by the publishers in the Post Office at the place where they are printed, and addressed to regular subscribers or newsdealers, resident in Newfoundland, the United States, or Canada, except at the place of publication, are transmitted free of postage.

POST OFFICE.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS, ADDRESSED TO PLACES IN CANADA, NEWFOUNDLAND, AND UNITED STATES.

On all newspapers and periodicals other than those from the office of publication, including all newspapers and periodicals published less frequently than once a month, the postage rate is one cent per 4 ounces, which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than one ounce may be posted singly; if prepaid by postage stamp, one-half cent each.

Newspapers from Offices of Publication posted for City Delivery are not delivered by Letter Carrier unless prepaid 1 cent each by stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and re-posted by News Agents to regular subscribers, are not liable to any additional postage.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the end and sides, and not exceeding five lbs. in weight, may be posted at any Post Office in Canada for conveyance to any Post Office in the Dominion (with the exception noted below), at the following rates.

Not exceeding 4 ounces, 6 cents.

" 8 do 12 do.

For each additional 4 ounces or fraction thereof, 6 cents.

The size of the parcel must not exceed two feet in length, or one foot in breadth or thickness. The postage must be prepaid by stamp, and the parcel should be marked "by PARCEL Post." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Registration Stamp thereto, in addition to the postage.

PARCEL POST FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Parcels securely and substantially packed and closed for the United Kingdom, limited in weight to 3 lbs., and in size, to 2 feet in length by 1 foot in width or depth, will be received at the wickets of the Registration Office, under conditions explained there to the senders, for transmission in the weekly mails despatched by the Steamers of the Canadian Lines. Rate, 30c. per lb., or fraction of a pound.

MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER.

Books and pamphlets, printed circulars, prices current, hand-bills, book and newspaper manuscript, printers' proofs, maps and print, engravings, sheet music, photographs, insurance policies, militia and school returns, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, for Canada, Newfoundland and the United States, may be posted, prepaid by stamp, at 1 cent per 4 ounces, provided they be sent in covers open at the ends or side, and so put up as to admit of the contents being, if necessary, easily withdrawn for examination; if enclosed with written communications, or in sealed envelopes notched at the end or sides, letter rate of postage will be charged.

The following are excluded from the reduced rate: Legal documents, stamps or forms of prepayment, whether obliterated or not, as well as all printed articles constituting the representative sign of monetary value.

Packages of miscellaneous matter are limited in size to 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in width or depth, and to the weight of 4 pounds for Newfoundland and Canada. There is no provision for the transmission of seeds and bulbs between Canada and the United States by mail, except when sent as samples, the limit of weight for each packet is 8 ounces, and the rate, 10 cents.

The limit of weight for book packages addressed to offices in the Dominion is 5 pounds, and Packets of miscellaneous or books cannot be registered unless prepaid at letter or parcel-post rate.

Post Bands with an impressed 1 cent stamp for this purpose, may be obtained at any Stamp Agency, at the rate of four for 5 cents.

The term "printed circulars" is extended to include circulars produced by the electric pen or other mechanical process, easy of recognition by the officers of the Post Office, as well as when printed by the ordinary processes of printing type or lithography.

PATTERN AND SAMPLE POST.

Canada.—Patterns and samples of merchandise, not exceeding 24 ounces in weight, when posted in Canada for places within Canada, must be prepaid by postage stamp at the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces weight, and put up in such manner as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Patterns or Samples, are not admissible as such.

United States.—Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, and packages of seeds and bulbs posted for places in the United States, will continue to be subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, prepaid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

USEFUL HINTS.

Register all valuable letters, and use sealing wax for letters containing money.

Transmit money by Money Orders.

Make complaints and enquiries in writing.

Preserve and request correspondents to preserve envelopes of mis-sent or delayed letters.

Send to the Post Master envelopes of letters about which you seek information or make complaint.

POST OFFICE.

Business men should be careful to authorize but a limited number of persons to receive their letters, and only those in whom they have full confidence.

Please return promptly to the Postmaster, or at the Enquiry Office, misdelivered letters or other mail matter.

A letter or Packet once posted becomes the property of the person to whom addressed, and must be forwarded to its destination. On no application, however urgent, can it be delivered back to the writer. Business men are requested not to ask for the return of letters posted by mistake or otherwise.

Letters addressed to initials or to fictitious names cannot be delivered, but will be returned to the writer through the Dead Letter Office, unless the address contains a designated place of delivery; thus, a letter addressed to A.B., Post Office, Montreal, would be returned to the writer, but a letter addressed A.B., care of John Jones, box No. 781, or No. 1,500 St. Catherine street, would be delivered at the address designated.

MONEY ORDER OFFICE.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by Money Order, if possible. If sent by letter, it should always be registered.

(A & B.) Limits of weight and size : 5 lbs. for the United Kingdom, and 4 lbs. for other countries, 18 inches in length and 12 inches in width or depth.

(C.) Limits of weight and size : 8 oz., 8 inches long, 4 inches wide and 2 inches deep. By exception, the limits to Belgium, France, Luxemburg, and Greece, are 12 inches long and 4 inches deep.

TWO HORSE VEHICLES—BY THE DRIVE.

Time Allowed, Fifteen Minutes.—For one or two persons, 50 cents ; for three or four persons, 65 cents.

Time Allowed, Thirty Minutes.—For one or two persons, 65 cents ; for three or four persons, 75 cents.

TWO HORSE VEHICLES.—BY THE HOUR.

For one or two persons, \$1.00 ; for three or persons, \$1.25.

Baggage.—For each trunk carried in any such vehicle, 10 cents.

No charge for travelling bags, valises, boxes or parcels, which passengers can carry by the hand.

When the drive exceeds half an hour, hour rate to be charged ; fractions of hours for any drive exceeding one hour shall be charged *pro rata* hour rates as above established for drives by the hour.

For drives between midnight and four o'clock in the morning, fifty per cent. shall be added to the tariff rates above established.

The tariff by time shall apply to all drives extending beyond the city limits, provided the engagement be made within said limits.

Children under five years of age, and sitting on their parent's or their guardian's lap, will be admitted free of charge, and shall not be held as being included in the word "persons" in the said tariff.

The word "drive," wherever it occurs in the tariff, shall be held to admit stoppages within the time fixed for said drive.

TARIFF OF CARTAGE.

From any place to any other in the First Division, or from any place (exclusive of the Harbour wharves) to any other place in the city, and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed three-quarters of a mile.

Articles not herein enumerated (of a convenient bulk), not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cts.; Ashes, Pot or Pearl, two barrels, 15 cts.; Beef, Pork or Fish, five barrels or three tierces, 15 cts.; Coals or Coke, half a chaldron or half a ton, 15 cts.; Crockery, one crate or one hogshead, 15 cts.; Flour or Fruit, seven barrels, 15 cts.; Grain, not over 1,500 lbs. weight, 15 cents; Lumber, Sawn, from yard to boat, 500 feet, board measure, 15 cts.; Salt or Rice, six bags or six barrels, 15 cts.; Firewood, dry, from boat yard, half a cord, three feet long, 15 cts.; Firewood, green or from rafts, half cord, three feet long, 20 cts.; Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cts.; Lumber, green or hard, from rafts, 500 feet, board measure, 20 cts.; Molasses, Sugar, or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead or load, 20 cts.; Pig Iron, Lead, Copper, or Tin, one ton, 25 cts.; Bar Iron or Steel, one ton, 30 cts.

From any of the Harbour Wharves to any place into the Second or third Division, within half a mile distance of the boundary line of the First Division, and *vice versa*, or from any place (exclusive of the Wharves) to any other in the city, and *vice versa*, provided the distance does not exceed $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles, the rates shall be 10 cents extra.

For every additional half mile, ten cents.

From any place in the Western Section of the Third Division, and *vice versa*, for one load: To the Stores and Wharves below Wellington Bridge, north side to Lachine Canal, 20 cts.; the Stores and Wharves below Wellington Bridge, south side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts.; the Basins above Wellington Bridge, north side of Lachine Canal, 25 cts.; the Basins above Wellington Bridge, south side Lachine Canal, and the Stores, Stations, Factories, etc., at Point St. Charles, 35 cts.; the Stores, Factories, etc., at and above St. Gabriel Locks, north of Lachine Canal, 30 cts.; Bonaventure Railway Station, 20 cts.; Bonaventure Railway Station, from the lower Wharves of the Harbour, 25 cts.

From any place in the Eastern Section of the First Division, and vice versa, for one load, 5 cents additional.

For any excess over the quantity or weight fixed for a load, additional *pro rata* rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter by the employer beyond the time usually required for loading, the carter shall be paid extra for such delay, at the rate of five cents for each quarter of an hour. If a carter is called, and there be no load for him, or if he be unable to load the goods or articles for want of assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily travelled.

Divisions of the City.—The First Division comprises the East, Centre and West Wards (including the south-west side of McGill Street and the north-west side of Craig Street, and shall be subdivided into two sections (Eastern and Western), the line of demarcation between them being the centre of St. Lambert and St. Jean Baptiste Street.

The Second Division comprises the St. Ann, St. Antoine and St. Lawrence Wards (exclusive of McGill and Craig Streets).

The Third Division comprises the St. Louis Ward (exclusive of Craig Street), the St. James and St. Mary's Wards.

MONTREAL WATER WORKS.

Extract from By-Laws Nos. 65, 66, 82, enacted 20th April, 1873.

Sec. 5. It is expressly forbidden to any occupant of a house or building or any part thereof, supplied with water from the said water works, to furnish water to others, or to use it otherwise than for his own use, or to increase the supply agreed for, or to waste it, or to practice any fraud upon the said Corporation with regard to the water so supplied.

Sec. 6. All persons taking the water shall keep the distribution pipe within their premises in good repair and protected from frost at their own expense; and they shall be held liable to the Corporation for all damages that may result from their failure to do so.

Sec. 7. No person shall fraudulently connect any pipe with the water pipes of the Corporation, or with any pipe, cistern or apparatus connected therewith, or to or into which the water from the said water works shall flow or proceed; or shall fraudulently use or otherwise misappropriate the water supplied by the city, or knowingly permit the same to be fraudulently used or misappropriated.

Sec. 8. If any person supplied with water by the Corporation do, or permit to be done, anything in contravention of this by-law, or fail to do anything prescribed by this by-law, the superintendent or his deputy, may cut off the water supply, and cease to supply such person with water so long as the cause or complaint remains, or is not remedied.

Sec. 9. No person shall wrongfully cause or suffer any pipe, valve, cock, cistern, bath, soil-pan, water closet, or other apparatus or receptacle to be out of repair, or to be so used or contrived that the water supplied to him is, or likely to be wasted, misused, or unduly consumed.

Sec. 10. No alteration shall be made in any of the pipes or fixtures inserted by the city, except by its agents or officers.

Sec. 11. No person supplied with water from the said water works by meter, shall be allowed to connect, or cause to be connected, any pipe or other fixture between the Corporation's service pipe and the meter.

Sec. 12. No person, unless duly authorized by the water committee, shall open any hydrant in the said city, or lift or remove the cover off, or draw water from the same.

Sec. 13. No person shall turn on or turn off the water in any manner, or interfere with any of the water pipes or valves belonging to the city, without the license of the water committee, or of the said superintendent.

Sec. 14. No person shall pass the railing enclosing the reservoir of the said city, or shall defile or deposit any filth or offensive matter in the said reservoirs, or on the bank or ground adjacent thereto, belonging to the said city, or shall allow any dog or other animal to jump into the said reservoir, or upon the said bank or ground, or shall pass or remain upon the said bank or ground after ten o'clock in the evening; or shall do or cause anything to be done tending to defile or corrupt, to disturb or agitate the waters of the said reservoir.

Sec. 15. No person shall draw or use water from the River St. Lawrence, or elsewhere, for the purpose of selling the same, to any part of the city.

Sec. 16. No person shall draw or use water from the water works in the said city for private fountains, or for hand hose for watering purposes, or for building or manufacturing purposes, unless such person shall have previously obtained from the superintendent of the said works a written permission to that effect, and paid the respective rates charged in the subjoined tariff for the supply of water in such cases; and in no case shall said hose be used for sprinkling or watering the streets between 9 o'clock in the forenoon and 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 17. No person shall use a hand hose of a larger size or nozzle than one fourth of an inch orifice, or use any hand hose for the purpose of washing horses, coaches, omnibuses, or other vehicles.

Sec. 18. No meter shall be used for determining the quantity of water supplied by the said works, unless the same shall have been previously submitted to and approved by the said superintendent.

Sec. 19. The several rates enumerated and specified in the tariff contained in the subjoined schedule, shall be, and the same are hereby imposed for water to be supplied from the water works of the said city.

Sec. 20. The said rates shall be due and payable to the city treasurer, in advance, on the 15th day of August, every year, by the occupant or lessee, or occupants or lessees, of all buildings, part of buildings, or tenements in the said city, supplied with water from the said works, as well by those who shall consent as by those who shall refuse to receive the water pipe to supply the said water or to use the same.

Sec. 21. All charges for specific supplies, or for fractional parts of the year, shall be payable in advance and before the water is let on.

Sec. 22. In buildings occupied as offices, where there are water closets in the building, each tenant of an office, or suite of offices, will be charged, in addition to the tariff rate, a water closet tax.

Sec. 23. A discount of 5 per cent. shall be allowed to all water tenants who shall pay the said rates on or before the fifteenth day of August in each year.

Sec. 24. In all cases of non-payment of the rates imposed by the present by-law, for thirty days after the same are due, the said Council, or any duly authorized officer charged with the management of said works, may cut off the supply of water from any building upon which the said rates shall be due, or from any one in default to pay the said rates, which shall not prevent the said rates from running as before, and the water shall not be let on for the use of any such defaulter except upon payment of all arrears due.

Sec. 25. Any person offending against any of the provisions of this by-law, or of the said tariff, shall for each and every such infraction, be liable to a fine not exceeding twenty dollars and costs of prosecution, and in default of immediate payment of the said fine and costs, to an imprisonment in the common gaol for a period not to exceed two months, the said imprisonment to cease upon payment of the said fine and costs.

STORES, SHOPS, OFFICES, &c.

For each house, part of a house or tenement, occupied as a store, shop, office, warehouse, manufactory, or other place of business: per annum.

1. When assessed at an amount not exceeding \$50 per annum.....\$ 4.00
2. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$50 but not over \$75.....\$ 5.00
3. When assessed at an amount exceeding \$75, but not over \$100.....\$ 6.00

And so on, continuing according to the same scale, that is to say, adding for every additional sum of \$25 or any part thereof... \$ 1.00

Stores, shops, offices, and other places of business, when attached to a dwelling occupied by the same party, to be charged at dwelling-house rates on the full rental of the whole tenements, when such rental does not exceed \$100 per annum.

SCHOOLS, CHURCHES, HOSPITALS, &c.

Every building used as a college, academy, seminary of learning or school, all churches, poor or alms houses, nunneries, houses of industry, and generally all religious or charitable institutions, hospitals and reformatories, shall be charged at shop rates, to be based and determined upon the interest at four per cent., of the actual value of the property in such case, the said value as set forth and established in and by the assessment roll last made and revised. Provided that all such institutions, with the exception of churches, may, if they see fit, use water by meter, and pay therefor, at the same rate as distilleries, breweries and other establishments hereinafter mentioned.

Charitable institutions, wholly supported by means of public subscriptions, shall be charged at the rate of one and one-half cents per hundred gallons.

HOTELS AND TAVERNS.

By-Law concerning the Qualification of Persons in charge of Steam Engines and Boilers.

Passed 8th July, 1885 ; taking effect January 1st, 1886.

Sec. 1. No person shall take charge of the working and handling of a stationery, semi-portable or portable steam engine or boiler, either as engineer or fireman, who is not twenty-one years of age or over, and has not obtained a license, as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for the owner of any such steam engine or boiler to employ for the working and handling thereof, under steam pressure, any person who is not licensed as herein-after provided.

Sec. 3. Any person claiming to be qualified to take charge of the working or handling of a stationary, semi-portable or portable steam engine or boiler, as engineer or fireman, shall apply to the Inspector of Boilers, who shall examine the applicant, and the proofs he produces in support of his claim; and if, upon full consideration, the Inspector is satisfied that his character, habits of life, knowledge and experience of the duties he has to perform, are such as to authorize the belief that he is a suitable and safe person to be entrusted with the powers and duties of such a position, the Inspector shall give him a license to that effect, signed by him, and in which he shall assign the appropriate class to which the candidate is entitled as hereinafter specified; provided, it shall not be competent for the Inspector to refuse any such license for bad character and habits of life, before his decision shall have been previously reported to and confirmed by the Fire Committee.

Sec. 4. For the purpose of this By-Law, there shall be four classes of persons entitled to take charge of a steam engine or boiler :

- (a.) The first-class shall be engineers qualified to take charge of any steam engine or boiler.
- (b.) The second-class shall be engineers qualified to take charge of any steam engine or boiler not exceeding twenty nominal horse-power, calculated as per annexed schedule.
- (c.) The third-class shall be engineers qualified to take charge of any steam engine or steam boiler not exceeding ten nominal horse power.
- (d.) The fourth-class shall be firemen qualified to take charge of any boiler used for heating, boiling or drying purposes; they may, however, take charge of a steam boiler used for motive power, when under the immediate supervision of an engineer of the first, second, or third-class.

Sec. 5. The licenses, issued as aforesaid, shall expire on the first day of May next after the date thereof, and shall be renewed every year.

Sec. 6. The Inspector shall be entitled to demand and receive annually from each applicant as aforesaid, the following fees, viz.:

1. For first-class engineers.....	\$ 2.00
2. For second-class engineers.....	1.00
3. For third-class engineers.....	.50
4. For fireman25

The Inspector shall also be entitled to demand and receive from each applicant an entrance fee of 50 cents, to be returned to the applicant if he be successful in his examination.

Sec. 7. Any license granted as aforesaid may be revoked by the Inspector upon proof of negligence, unskillfulness, or drunkenness.

Sec. 8. In his examination of persons claiming to be qualified as aforesaid, the Inspector shall be guided, as far as possible, by the rules laid down in the annexed schedule.

Sec. 9. Any engineer or fireman who may feel aggrieved by any act or order of said Inspector, may, within one month thereafter, appeal from his decision to the Fire Committee, who may confirm, modify or disallow such decision.

Sec. 10. The Inspector shall make regular weekly payments to the City Treasurer of all monies received by him for and on behalf of the city under the provisions of this By-Law.

Sec. 11. He shall, at the end of every year, report to the Fire Committee, giving full particulars of the work performed, and the amounts received by him as such Inspector.

Sec. 12. The Fire Committee shall have full power to regulate the time when, and the manner in which the examinations shall be held in accordance with the provisions of this By-Law, and may, at their discretion, appoint assistant examiners to act conjointly with the Inspector.

Sec. 13. The term "Inspector," wherever it occurs in this By-Law, shall mean the inspector of Boilers appointed by the said council.

Sec. 14. Every person offending against any of the provisions of this By-Law, shall be liable to a fine with costs or an imprisonment, or to a fine, and in default of immediate payment of said fine and costs, to an imprisonment, the amount of said fine and the term of said imprisonment to be fixed by the Recorder's Court, at its discretion, but such fine shall not exceed forty dollars, and the imprisonment shall not be for a longer period than two calendar months, the said imprisonment, however, to cease at any time before the expiration of the term fixed by the Recorder's Court, upon the payment of said fine and costs; and the said offender shall be liable to the same penalties for each and every day that such violation or contravention shall last, which shall be held to be a distinct and separate offence for each and every day as aforesaid.

Sec. 15. This By-Law shall come into force on the first day of January, 1886.

DISTILLERIES, BREWERIES, ETC.

Distilleries, Breweries, Dye Houses, Railway, Printing or Photographic Establishments, and all manufacturing establishment, Colleges, Seminaries, Nunneries and Hospitals may be supplied by meter and charged as follows:

When the quantity used averages 1,000 gallons per day or less, at the rate of 30 cents per 1,000 gallons; when the quantity used averages from 1,000 to 2,000 gallons per day, at the rate of 20 cents per 1,000 gallons.

METERS.

The meters shall be furnished by the city and placed within the premises of the consumer, whose duty it shall be to see that the same are protected from frost or injury, the whole under the direction of the Water Department. Such meters shall at all times be acceptable to the Corporation Meter Inspector.

An annual rent shall be paid by the consumers for the cost and care of such meters, as follows:

The rent to be paid semi-annually, that is to say: One-half on the first day of May, and the other half on the first of November in each year.

If the meter gets out of order and fails to register, the consumer will be charged at the average daily consumption previously registered by such meter, and for the purpose of average the year shall be deemed to be 300 days.

Persons desiring to supply their own meter may do so with the previous sanction and written permit of the Superintendent of the Water Works.

When water is required for purposes not specified in the foregoing tariff, the rate shall be fixed by the Water Committee.

The Water Committee shall have power to ascertain by meter the quantity of water used in any of the above cases and charge accordingly.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

The three Military Districts into which the Province of Quebec is divided are sub-divided into seventy Regimental Divisions, comprised within eight Brigade Divisions.

The boundaries of such Regimental Divisions are identical with the Electoral Divisions into which the Province of Quebec is divided, with the following exceptions, viz : Montreal Centre forms two Regimental Divisions, known as First and Second Montreal Centre ; the First Division comprising the East Ward, and the Second Division comprising the Centre and West Wards.

Chateauguay forms two Regimental Divisions, known as First and Second Chateauguay. The First Division comprises the Parishes of St. Philomene, Chateauguay, St. Martin, St. Urbain, and the Second Division comprises the portion of the County not included in the First Division.

The Counties of Richmond, Wolf, Drummond, Arthabaska, Chicoutimi and Saguenay, each form a Regimental Division.

The Brigade Divisions are numbered from West to East, from One to Eight, and embrace the following Regimental Divisions for each respectively.

Ashes.—E. J. Major, inspector, College street.

Chap. 45. 37 Vic., 1874.—The inspector shall charge the sum of 10 cents for every hundred pounds of pot or pearl ashes inspected by him; 25 cents for each new head furnished; 18 cents for repairs and cooperage on each barrel—said cooperage to include nails and end hoops of barrel; 25 cents for putting in a barrel, partly filled, the additional quantity thereof necessary to fill the same, whenever duly required to do so; 25 cents per barrel in all cases where lime, raw ashes, damaged ashes or other trash have been packed or mixed with pot or pearl ashes, for extracting or separating the same.

Flour.—L. A. Boyer, inspector, 88 Common street. Fees, 2 cts. per barrel for inspecting and branding, (exclusive of cooperage), "when any less quantity than 100 barrels of flour are offered for inspection, the inspector shall be entitled to receive the full fees that would accrue to him on 100 barrels. When the inspector deems it necessary to verify the weight of flour given to him for inspection, and if said lot of flour is short weight, he is then entitled to an extra 2c. per barrel, and sees that said short weight barrels are filled up before being branded."

Beef and Pork.—J. Doheny, Government Inspector, 125 Grand Trunk street. "For such inspection and branding, the inspector shall be entitled to receive, of and from the person submitting the same for inspection, for each and every barrel and half-barrel, tierce or half-tierce of beef or pork so inspected, salted, packed, pickled and branded, 25 cts. for each barrel, 15 cts. for each half-barrel, 35 cts. for each tierce, and 15 cts. for each half-tierce, exclusive of cooperage and repairs—the charge for which cooperage and repairs shall not exceed 15 cents per barrel, tierce or half-tierce; in consideration of which charges all barrels or half-barrels, tierces or half-tierces shall be delivered in good shipping order."

Fish. —, corner St. Sacrament and St. Nicholas streets. "Every inspector or deputy inspector who shall inspect or brand or mark any cask or package of pickled fish, or in bulk, in accordance with the provisions of this Act, shall be entitled to fees at the following rates, which shall be paid by the original owner or the person who employed him in the first instance:—for each tierce of salmon, salmon trout, or sea trout, 15 cents; each half-tierce, 10 cents, each barrel, 15 cents; each half-barrel, 10 cents. For each barrel of mackerel, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 5 cents. For each barrel of herring, 5 cents; each half-barrel, 4 cents. For each barrel of shad, 10 cents; each half-barrel 3 cents. For each barrel of whitefish, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of pickled codfish, hake, haddock or catfish, 5 cents; each half-barrel, 3 cents. For each barrel of dry-salted codfish, hake, haddock, catfish, ling or pollock, 5 cents; for each

half-barrel 3 cents. For each barrel bass, 10 cents; each half-barrel, 7 cents. For each barrel of cod-tongues, cod-sounds, halibut or eels, 10 cents; for each half-barrel, 7 cents. The foregoing rates shall be reckoned exclusive of salt, pickle, cooperage, storage, and labor employed in washing, rinsing, cleaning, nailing, screwing, or repacking any fish. For inspecting empty packages, 1 cent."

Leather and Hides.—T. Hawkins, inspector. "Every inspector shall be entitled, for the inspection of such hides, to a fee of 5 cts. for each hide in lots under 100 in number, and 4 cents for each hide in lots over 100 in number. The inspector may inspect and measure all kinds of leather which are sold by superficial measure or by weight, and shall be entitled to charge 2 cts. for each side or piece of such leather inspected and measured by him. The Act requires the inspector to provide a store or warehouse in a convenient situation for the purpose of inspection." Hides Inspection Store, No. 177 Duke street.

FISH AND GAME LAWS.

CLOSE SEASONS FOR FISH.

Province of Ontario.

IT IS FORBIDDEN TO CATCH

Net or seine fishing without license is prohibited. Nets must be raised from Saturday night until Monday morning. Nets can not be set, or Seines used, so as to bar channels or bays.

This applies to Indians as well as white men.

Fishing by means of Nets is prohibited in the following Rivers, with limits extending one-half mile on each side of the mouth of each, these rivers being set apart for the natural and artificial propagation of fish:—North River, County of Argenteuil; Salmon River, County of Huntingdon; Magog and Massawippi Rivers, Counties of Stanstead and Sherbrooke.

No person shall, during such prohibited time, fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell, or have in possession, any of the kinds of fish mentioned above.

Any person guilty of violating these regulations is liable to fine and costs, or in default of payment, is subject to imprisonment.

Other birds, (except Eagles, Falcons, Hawks, Wild Pigeons, King Fishers, Crows, Ravens, Waxwings, Shrikes, Jays, Magpies, Sparrows and Starlings) 1st Mar. to 1st Sept.

Penalty \$2 to \$5. Snaring, trapping, &c., forbidden; penalty \$2 to \$5. Any person may destroy Nets, Traps, Snares, Cages, &c.

After the first ten days of the close season, Railway, Steamboat Companies and others are forbidden to carry any Moose, Cariboo, Deer or any part of same; penalty \$30 to \$50.

Disturbing or taking the eggs of Wild Duck, Teal, Wild Goose or Swan is forbidden; penalty \$10 to \$25.

No person not domiciled in the Province of Quebec or Ontario is allowed to hunt at any time in the Province of Quebec, without having obtained a license from the Commissioner of Crown Lands.

The export of Deer, Wild Turkeys and Quail in carcass or parts thereof from the Dominion at any time is prohibited; penalty \$100 and forfeiture. Customs Officers may seize same on reasonable cause for suspicion of intention to export. (See Customs Act 1883.)
