LIBERALS BRUKE PLEDGE, ASSERT CONSERVATIVES

Deliberate Violation of Agreement Said to Have Been Responsible for Defeat of Proposal to Enlarge Senate—Was to Have Been Coupled With Redistribution Bill.

OTTAWA, June 12.—"A more deliberate and cynical breach of faith has seldom been witnessed in public life," was the way in which one of the cabinet ministers described tonight the action of the opposition in breaking the agreement which had been entered into between Premier Borden and Senator Loughheed with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Senator Bostock regarding the bill to increase western representation in the senate.

Two questions arose during the session of parliament just closed which the government sought to have disposed of by an agreement between the two political parties. The first of these related to redistribution and the second to an increase in the representation of the western provinces in the senate.

The opposition always insisted that the latter question should be coupled with that of redistribution. A unanimous agreement for redistribution was arrived at between the two parties with respect to all of the 234 constituencies except one, and the question as to that one was by agreement left

REDMOND DECLARES WAR UPON LEADERS OF NATIONALIST ARMY OFFER TO CO-OPERATE IS REFUSED

Majority of Provisional Committee of Volunteers Not Supporters of Irish Party, He Says—Unless Breach is Healed, New Organization Will Be Launched.

LONDON, June 12.—John Redmond, the Irish Nationalist leader, today declared war on the provisional committee of the Nationalist volunteers, a majority of whom, he asserts, are not supporters of the Irish party.

At a meeting of the Irish Nationalists discussed the matter in the house of commons this afternoon and subsequently Mr. Redmond issued a letter declaring that the action of the committee "amounts to a refusal to accept my offer of co-operation."

Pointing out that the committee originally was a self-constituted body, Mr. Redmond proceeds: "I am informed on good authority that a majority of them are not supporters of the Irish party, while the rank and file of the Irish volunteers at least 85 per cent. are supporters of the Irish party."

MISS DAVIS WINS HIGH HONOR AT GALT SHOW

Toronto Girl Carries Off Hundred Dollar Silver Cup for Woman's Hunter Class—Rode Gelding Marquis Which Took Five Other Prizes.

GALT, June 12.—Miss Della Davis of Toronto, on H. H. S. T. Hope's choice gelding Marquis, took the highest honors at the fourteenth annual Galt horse show today, winning J. A. McElroy's high silver cup as first prize for the woman's hunter class. Following the presentation of the award by Mr. McElroy, the horse-woman left the ring, bearing the trophy, amid a wave of applause. Marquis took five other prizes.

Spectacular jumping entries in the last event tonight were the feature of the second day of the show. Twenty exhibitors entered the event, and the judges, Raymond M. Dale of Toronto and W. A. McElroy of New York experienced difficulty in deciding the winners, two jumps being necessary. The Prince George cup of Toronto, as first prize, went to Frank Moss of Preston, Redding Stone being the winner. Gold medal of the Tudor-hope stable took second prize.

Competition throughout the day was keen in the harness pairs class more than an hour was necessary to decide the winners. Miss E. Van of Montreal took first prize with I Wonder and Eye Opener. Richard Palmer of Toronto took second with M. P. and Glittering Glory. Visiting horsemen declared the exhibits the most closely matched in years, while the judges said that the show was one of the best ever held in the Dominion.

An entry this afternoon which greatly pleased the spectators and called forth much favorable comment by horsemen and the judges was the four-in-hand. All drivers showed cleverly handled the reins, but the best driving was that of Miss Viau, who took first prize with I Wonder, Eye Opener, Earl Gray and the Duke of Connaught. A. J. Meager of Simcoe took second, and J. H. Murray of Toronto took third. J. W. Wood of Maid, Governor and Wild Rose, took third prize.

Miss Viau's coachman handed the entry on entering the ring, but after circling several times the lead horses performed badly, and in rearing were

SENATE BLOCKS WAY TO INCREASE IN UPPER HOUSE'S REPRESENTATION OBSTRUCTION DELAYS PROROGATION OVER THE JUMPS AT GALT

Senate's Insistence That Appointment of Additional Senators Be Deferred Until Dissolution of Present Parliament Causes Deadlock—Postoffice Bill Also Shelved But Redistribution Measure Carries—Duke of Connaught's Farewell Address.

OTTAWA, June 12.—Parliament was prorogued late this afternoon, but the senate put up a spectacular situation before this formality was over. In the first place the senate again amended the postoffice bill, and in the second place amended the address which the government proposed to send to the imperial parliament asking for change in the clauses of the British North America Act, which affect representation in the senate, in order that the governor-general might appoint more representatives from the western provinces to the upper chamber. The government refused to accept the amendment, and so the measures were dropped.

The redistribution bill was passed by the senate without amendment. Flurry at Capital.

The situation which the senate created caused an immense amount of interest. Prorogation had been announced for 8 o'clock, but the senators, wielding the big stick over the commons, this became impossible, and the Duke of Connaught was informed by telephone that the second chamber was not ready for his attendance.

Militiamen who had been ordered out to take part in the prorogation ceremony paraded the streets, and soon the whole city was alive to the fact that the senate was the power behind the throne. Finally the governor-general was informed that the senate had promised to get thru by 4.30.

Pelletier Was Arrested. A day or two ago the senate amended the postoffice bill, which gave the governor-general the power to impose taxes on mail matter other than letters. This power was strongly objected to by a portion of the newspapers because the country, and on their objections the senate made its amendment giving parliament alone the power to impose taxes. It is said that Mr. Pelletier has received six hundred telegrams from newspapers objecting to his assumption of this power. When the bill came back to the commons Mr. Pelletier refused to accept it, and it was sent back again to the senate with the amending clause struck out. It came before the senate again today, and the upper chamber relinquished the amendment. When it was returned once more to the commons, Mr. Pelletier for the second time refused to accept it.

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TO SIGN PACTS TO KEEP PEACE

Arrangements to Be Made Between Great Britain, France and United States.

CANADIAN PRESS DESPATCH. WASHINGTON, June 12.—Secretary Bryan for the United States and Ambassador Spring Rice for Great Britain and Jusserand for France, will soon sign on the same day peace treaties, modeled after those already signed by Secretary Bryan, with sixteen nations. The signing of these treaties awaits only the approval of the British by the British self-governing colonies, to which it has been submitted. The Anglo-American and the Franco-American treaties will in a general way follow a similar pact already signed by Secretary Bryan, with the Netherlands. They provide that all questions arising between the United States and the respective European powers, which cannot be settled by diplomacy, shall be submitted for investigation for a period of at least one year to an international committee of five members. During the investigation hostilities would not be entered into, but the findings of the committee would not be binding.

There have been many complaints recently from residents in the neighborhood of Glendonwynne road about the odors arising from the piles of garbage in the ravine on either side of the road which the city is using to fill in and connect the Hammonds Collegiate to Bloor street. It is claimed that garbage and refuse of every kind has been dumped there, and the emanations from the heap have become a nuisance to the entire neighborhood.

Quebec avenue and Fincrest road have been in complete stagnation for several days, and it is believed that the objectionable odor will be covered with earth in the near future. The sidewalk on the north side of the road is a nuisance in a residential district, and the citizens in that part of ward seven feel justly indignant and claim that earth should be used through for filling in purposes, an odor from decaying garbage will arise thru an extremely thick layer of earth in warm summer weather.

The work on the sewer system is now being rushed towards completion in the northern district, and the extensive damage caused by recent rainstorms at Bloor and Woodville streets and Annet street is being repaired as rapidly as possible. CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 12.—Toronto is picking up more than one invaluable lesson in park construction as the result of the board of trade tour thus far. Incidentally a few ideas which have long been advanced by city council members the Toronto tourists say, have been quashed by the evidence of American experts who have made their cities blossom like the rose in great suburban stretches of recreation grounds for the liking thousands of their inhabitants.

Cleveland to date can speak with most authority on park and boulevard equipment, and this afternoon in a complimentary banquet given to the Toronto visitors by the board of commerce, people of the city in possession of 40 miles of boulevard and 2,000 acres of parks does not alone regard credit on the pioneers. Time and again it was said that it was the broad vision and progressiveness of the citizens of today that made it possible and desirable for Cleveland to have the great slogan of Cleveland's municipalities was "buy, buy, buy." If a 200-acre stretch was meditated they bought 300 acres and sold the residue at a profit. Of late, too, there has been no lack of legislation to back up the energy of the commissioners. The latest being a law which absolutely rules out anything in the nature of a sign-board in the park vicinity.

Political Home for Chamber.

The chamber of commerce building in Cleveland is a magnificent structure in marble and fresco work, and reflecting the importance vested in the institution. In the whole building two entire floors were maintained for the chamber work, and all facilities are provided.

Mayor Hocken and President Gundy replied to addresses at the banquet by Acting Mayor Stockwell, Lieut.-Governor of Ohio, Greenlund and Vice-President Little of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce.

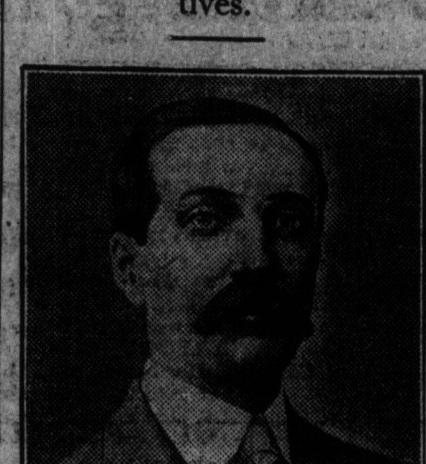

He regrets that the committee should have repudiated his suggestion.

"It is of the most vital importance to the national cause," the Irish leader says, "that this matter should be settled in an amicable spirit, and unless the committee can see a way to reconsider its decision and adopt the proposal that I have made, I must appeal to all supporters of the Irish party in the volunteers to at once organize county committees quite independent of the Dublin provisional committee and to maintain an important movement until it is possible to elect a governing body which shall have the full confidence of the country."

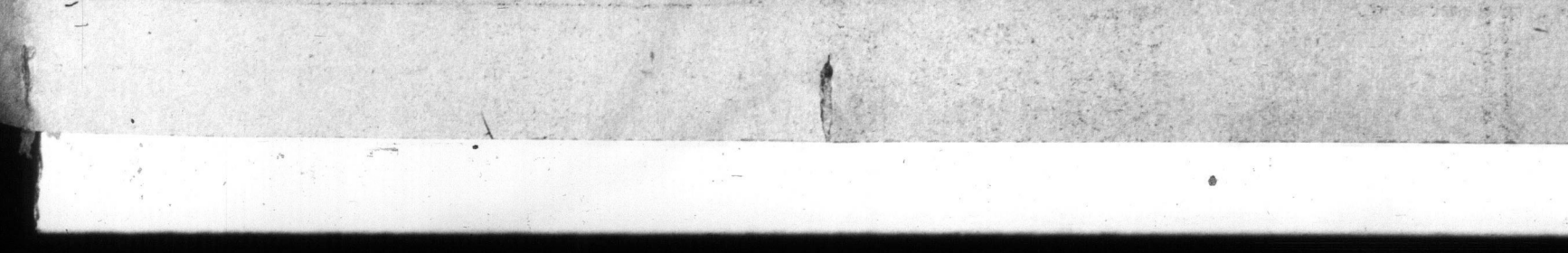

ANOTHER RUDE JOLT.

The Borden Government have received another emphatic reminder that they do not control the legislation of parliament, but that the senate does. The Conservatives have a large majority in the house of commons and were expressly returned to power in 1911 by the votes of the people to displace the Liberals who had controlled legislation for fifteen years "heretofore." But the Liberals are still in the majority in the senate and they claim and are exercising equal rights and powers with the popular chamber, and have defeated three measures of the government this session and others in the two previous sessions, including the naval aid bill. The government, therefore, the enjoying the support of the majority of the electors, are having their most important measures thrown out by the senate! In other words, a party and leaders, who have lost the popular support, are still masters of the legislation of the country—are able to block the popular will as expressed in the general election.

We do not question the rights or claims of the senate so much as we wish to state the fact, and to further say that Mr. Maclean, the member for South York, has repeatedly called the attention of the commons and the country to this condition of affairs; and that condition has come to be intolerable.

It had become intolerable in the mother country, where an irresponsible house of lords had blocked the progressive legislation of the house of commons, and the Parliament Act, which did away with this condition, was only passed after a bitter struggle and after the personal intervention of the King. Our senate is equally irresponsible; its members hold office for life like the peers (who are also hereditary) and are appointed without the people having any say therein. What has become intolerable in Great Britain cannot be less so here. And the Borden Government should have seen this at the first clash of arms two years ago and made the issue then. But apparently they simply invited more of the same; treatment; and they have been getting it in plenty. Even their supporters will be inclined to ask if they are lacking in political insight, or in courage to take up a challenge thrown at them; or do they admit the superior legislative judgment of the senate; or perhaps they doubt the mandate they received from the people?

For over two years now the senate has disputed the claim that the majority in the popular chamber has the right to lead and direct the legislation of the country and the government throughout it all has sat still. They sat still when Mr. Maclean and Mr. Sharp presented views on the subject in highly vigorous terms on Thursday.

THE NORTHEAST ELECTION.

Mr. Moss, nominated in the Liberal interest in the northeast riding of the city, has been accused of being a representative of the radial railways. To this he replies that his law partner is solicitor for the York Radial Company and that he himself at one time was a firm member. He had therefore arranged, if elected, at once to withdraw, and form a connection of his own, independent of the railways. Mr. Moss has always been a public ownership man, and is prepared to carry out the principle of public ownership of public utilities wherever possible. Mr. Moss' record is one much more in accord with public sentiment in this respect than that of his opponent. It is a point on which all Toronto candidates should have perfectly good credentials. No government, of whatever complexion, can expect any support which is not prepared to carry out the application of public ownership principles, as the Whitney government has done.

TEMPERANCE IN ONTARIO.

A map has been issued for campaign purposes showing Ontario after 23 years of Liberal government, in which the "wet" districts are shaded black. In the map the province looks exceedingly shady. A second map shows

Ontario after nine years of Conservative rule. The shadiness has disappeared almost and diminished to about the same area that the white patches formerly covered, indicating the "dry" spots. The latter map is quite sunshiny in appearance. No stronger temperance argument has appeared.

There will be various readings, however, of the causes behind the change, and the principles advocated by the political parties. The evident growth of temperance sentiment, its effective activity, and the desirability of having its support, will in the minds of many, be the urgent appeal made for it of course. What Sir James has carried on so well, it may be argued, should be allowed to complete. Others think that where his intention is so clear he should have more extensively responded to it. Mr. Rowell, whatever his motive, is intent on cleaning up what has been so well begun. It is a point against him that his party so long postponed action.

PANAMA CANAL TOLLS.

By a substantial majority, larger than was at one time anticipated, the United States Senate has passed the bill repealing the clause in the Panama Canal Act exempting coastwise shipping from payment of tolls. This is another remarkable personal achievement for President Wilson and its extent is scarcely weakened by the insertion of the Norris-Simmons amendment, declaring that the passage of the repeal act shall not be construed or held as a waiver of any right the United States previously possessed to exercise discrimination in favor of its vessels, or supreme sovereignty over the Panama Canal. President Wilson will probably accept the bill with this amendment, especially as the senate rejected another amendment which asserted instead of reserving the rights of the United States to discriminate.

Yesterday Was Heaviest Day in Months in Important Downtown Properties—One Freehold Transfer on Main Thoroughfare.

Yesterday was the biggest day of months in transactions on Yonge street, several large long term leases were negotiated, amounting to approximately \$800,000, while one freehold transfer, No. 408, totaled \$20,000. The most important property involved is the store at 191 Yonge street, north of Market street.

The Walker Shoe Company of Montreal has secured a ten-year lease on 283 and 291 Yonge street from Charles Tugman for \$10,000 a year. It is the intention of the lessee to use the 20 feet of the thirty odd feet frontage and sub-let the balance.

The Yonge street freehold transfer, involving No. 408, was sold by the J. F. Hartz Company, Limited, to the William Long Piano Company for \$20,000. There is a frontage of 32 feet and a depth of 100 feet.

It is understood that Jesse Appleth is in turn purchased the lease held by the Foster Optical Company on 85 Yonge street, which includes 50 per cent. of the amount involved in the transaction could be obtained, it is under-

stood that the lease has fifteen years to run, and was secured from the O'Keefe Brewing Company, the owners of the land.

Another lower Yonge street leasehold deal was 144 Yonge street, where the present tenants, the Kent Company, Limited, have secured a renewal from the trustees of the estate of the late Senator Cox for twenty-one years for \$25,000, or at \$12,000 a year, exclusive of taxes.

LONDON, June 12.—A determined attempt was made by militant suffragettes this morning to burn the ancient church of St. Margaret at Chipstead, about 14 miles to the southeast of London. Three distinct fires set by five lighters, composed of squares of felt saturated with oil, were set by the "armed squad."

The rector, the Rev. William H. Stone, and the villagers were soon on the scene and were able to extinguish the flames before much damage had been done to the church, which dates from the 12th century.

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SAFEGUARDING OIL INVESTORS

ANOTHER STRIKE WOULD PROVE ALBERTA FIELDS

Oil Men From All Parts Crowd Calgary Hotels and Rooming Houses—All Are Waiting for a Second Proof of Paying Oil.

From Our Special Correspondent. CALGARY, June 8.—Today Calgary anxiously awaits the second oil strike, proving the Alberta oil field, and with Calgary well oil men from every state in the Union and from every section of Canada.

Another strike and Calgary will be for the time being the Mecca of American oil men and capital from the outside will roll into the Alberta field in millions.

The phenomenal run of Thursday has reinforced the belief that there are vast quantities of oil in subterranean Alberta, and that either the McDougall-Segur, Monarch, Mowbray-Berkley or Black Diamond drills will strike the precious fluid in a very short time.

At the present time of writing the black oily substance noticeable in the water at the McDougall-Segur well being brought to the surface in large quantities. Although prospects look brighter at every few feet of drilling the men in charge do not expect to reach any large body of oil until a depth of from 2,500 to 3,000 feet has been reached.

A black oily substance is being skimmed from the contents of the boiler at the Black Diamond well, which is now down about 1,825 feet. The Dakota sands were reached about 1,880 feet below the surface.

Wet gas is blowing out strong at the Monarch well, and it is accompanied by particles of black oil. This is the chief item of an interesting announcement made by Geologist Dunn.

The Monarch well is about 35 miles west of Olds, Alta., consists of some 66,000 acres, which was filled upon after two years' search by the general manager, B. W. Dunn, B.Sc., M.E., the same geologist who reported on the Tampico oil-fields in Mexico.

In Dakota Sands. According to O. G. Devenish, managing director of United Petroleum, all oil were discovered in the water when it was taken up from the company's well recently. Wet gas of a distinctly petroleum nature is issuing from the well.

BANKING TROUBLES
CAUSED SELLING

Sidney Long and Co. Failed
to Pass Clearing
House.

CHICAGO, June 12.—Banking house
difficulties and the suspension of a
grain firm were responsible today for
a selling flurry on the board of trade.

Closing prices, however, showed a
comparatively steady feeling with net
losses as follows: Wheat 3-8 to 3/4c,

corn 1/4 to 1/8c and oats 1-4 to 3/8c.

The outcome in provisions varied
from 7/8 loss to an advance of 2 1/2c.

When the market opened today
figures that were 1 to 1 1/8c under the
last level of the session. The market
had started with an advance due to

the smaller state banks either because
of rain damage in the harvest region
southwest of here, but the upward
trend of quotations proved to be
short lived.

Failed to Pass.
Posting of notice that Sidney Long
& Co. had failed to pass the clearing
house, was quickly followed by the
selling out of more than a million
bushels of July wheat either because

of the suspension of the firm or as a
result to take advantage of the dis-
turbed conditions that naturally en-
sued.

The almost simultaneous shut down
of the Lorimer bank and of a number
of smaller state banks brought on a
lively additional selling, a good share
of which was generally believed to

be of a purely speculative character
and of which the banks were not
traders who thought they saw a
chance to snatch a profit.

In the grain trade, the suspension
of Sidney Long & Co. was directly
connected with the Lorimer bank dif-
ficulties, vice-president Munday of the
bank being said to have been finan-
cially interested in the affairs of the sus-
pended firm. It was also asserted that
the Lorimer bank contained many
small boards of trade accounts.

Corn Weakness.
The corn weakness was partly due
to the Sidney Long & Co. failure, and
in districts which had been threaten-
ed by drought had been threaten-
ed from the outset. Prices were recover-
ing, when the financial mishaps led
the way to a decided break.

Oats tumbled with other cereals, in-
fluenced by corn and the ending of the
provision market, but in the end quotat-
ions averaged somewhat lower than
last night.

WATCHING CANADIAN
AGENCY SECURITIES

LONDON, June 12.—Movements in

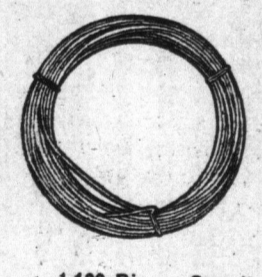
