Hydro-Electric Power on Dec. 15 Date for Inauguration of the Civic Supply is Tentatively Arranged— Celebration to Be Arranged.

The night of Dec. 15 will probably be memorable in the annals not only of the city, but of the whole province, for, unless present calculations miscarry, it will be the occasion of the celebration of the coming of hydro-electric power to Toronto.

At a meeting yesterday of the special civic committee to arrange for the cheap power celebration, the date was selected, subject to change if the chairman, Controller Church, after consulting with the hydro-electric commission, finds that power will not be then in readiness.

Arrangements will be made to illuminate either the armories or St. Lawrence Arena after the manner of the blaze of light at the Berlin festivities. The ceremonies will take place between 7 p.m. and a banquet, which will afterwards be given to the outside visitors.

The test of street lights on King, Charles and Jarvis streets may be made to-night, but the mayor is not anxious to mark the event with ceremony.

FRUIT AND FLOWER SHOW IS THE FINEST OF ALL Past Records All Beaten by Exhibition Which Was Formally Opened Last Night.

The seventh annual exhibition of the Ontario Horticultural Society was opened in the St. Lawrence arena last night by Hon. James Duff, minister of agriculture. The crowd was far larger than that of any of the previous exhibitions, and the exhibits are generally superior in both quality and quantity.

A profusion of fruits and flowers met the eye, taking up all the available room. A platform was occupied by people of note, especially in the line of horticulture. The show was opened by Mr. Duff, who made the opening speech. From an artistic standpoint, the beautiful flowers were by far the most attractive part of the exhibit.

TO CELEBRATE CENTENARY OF PEACE Hon. W. L. King and Others Address the New York Canadian Club—Dr. J. A. Macdonald's Address is Read by J. F. MacKay Lofty Sentiments.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—International peace, with incidental reference to tariff matters, was the topic of interest at the annual banquet at the New York Canadian Club. Among the guests was Hon. W. L. M. King, of Ottawa.

Dr. J. A. Macdonald of Toronto, it was announced, was unable, owing to illness, to attend, but his address on "Canada in the Anglo-Saxon Fraternity" was read by J. F. MacKay, president of the late Toronto Canadian Club.

Hon. Mackenzie King could see only one danger to the celebration of the centenary of the peace movement—namely, that some individual or society would try to usurp it all and create friction.

Hon. Adam Bell of Nova Scotia, showed some independence. Canada, he said, desired to be friendly with the republic, but did not intend to surrender any of her rights to assert her interest at any time. An Anglo-Saxon alliance would ensure the peace of the world.

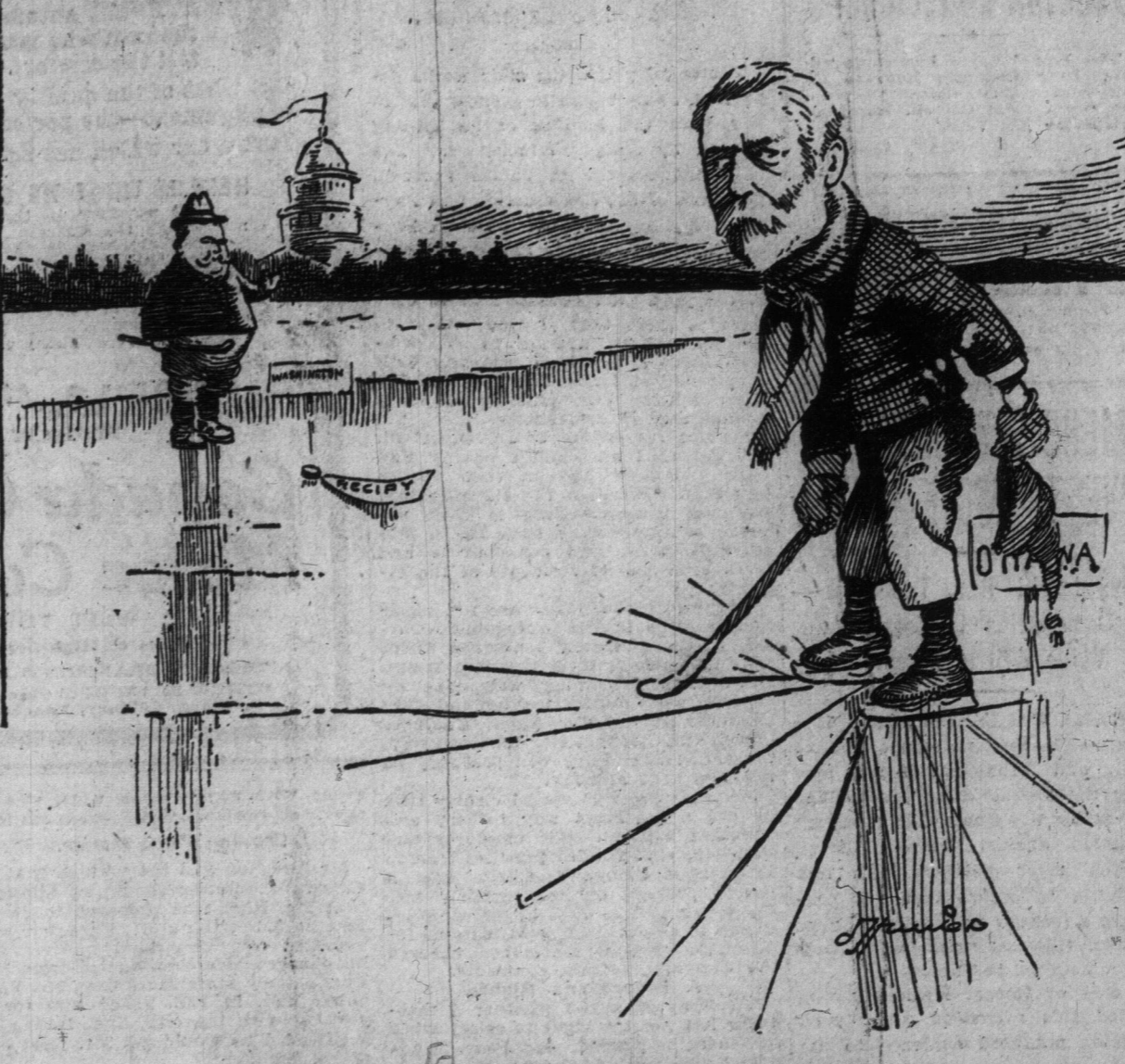
It was not acts of parliament or the artful dickerings of diplomats that made possible the Anglo-Saxon franchise. Considerations of trade or party politics will not hold it together.

Canada's Future. "And Canada proposes to stand by and to maintain the world-wide empire of British dominions. As Canadians, we say to all Anglo-imperialists that we are proud of our British ancestry, but also with foreign nations, we will govern our own country, frame our own laws, administer justice over our own fiscal policy, and determine for ourselves our trade relations not only with foreign nations, but also with Great Britain herself.

ON VERY THIN ICE.

ELEVATORS TO BE BUILT BY THE AGRICULTURISTS Government Assistance in Form of Mortgages, Repayable in 20 Annual Instalments.

REGINA, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The report of the elevator commission, appointed Feb. 25, by the Saskatchewan Government, has been handed to Premier Scott. It is a bulky document, and the commissioners, Prof. Robert Magill of Dalhousie University, N.S.; George Langley, M.L.A., and F. W. Green, Moose Jaw, secretary of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers' Association, are unanimous in their findings.

Public interest largely centres upon the commissioner's findings in the matter of ownership and operation of initial elevators, and on this point the commission favors none of the schemes outlined before them in their entirety, but have evolved a solution, embodying what appears to them to be the best features of several of them.

HOUSE OF LORDS TO CONSIDER VETO BILL

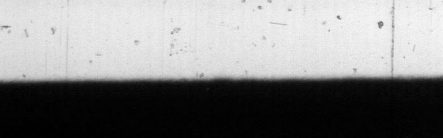
Asquith to Accede to Lord Lansdowne's Request — Premier to Issue Statement on Friday—Austen Chamberlain Outlines Unionist Policy.

LONDON, Nov. 15.—A general election before Christmas is a practical certainty, but the steps whereby this will be brought about are still unknown. The King is evidently taking an active part in the crisis, and his majesty's influence may have an important bearing on the situation.

It is understood to-night that the government will accede to Lord Lansdowne's demand to have the veto bill submitted to the house of lords, on condition that no dilatory tactics are employed for the mere purpose of gaining time. As it cannot be supposed that the lords would accept the bill, this move is not likely to have much effect on the general situation.

Premier Asquith's official statement will not be presented to parliament until Friday, in deference to Mr. Balfour, who has an important meeting at Nottingham on Thursday.

When the house of lords assembled this afternoon, Lord Lansdowne, the leader of the opposition, played a card which may possibly be the prelude to a highly interesting development in the political game now under full sail. He would to-morrow, he said, move "That this house invites its majesty's government to submit to its consideration the terms of the parliament bill. This is the official designation of the veto bill, which is the centre of all the trouble."

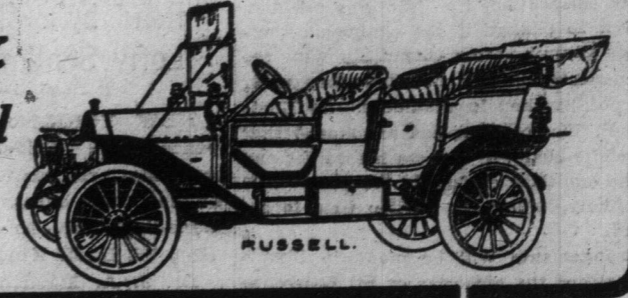

MONTREAL, Nov. 15.—An important shipment of thoroughbred horses reached Montreal yesterday by the Canadian Pacific steamer Lake Erie, inclusive of brood mares, fillies and colts. There are nine in the lot, and they were brought out from England by Mr. E. Turner-Mead of Dorington Stud Farm, near Shrewsbury. They are now at the C.P.R. Stock Yards, Mount Royal and Berthelme avenues, and are to be disposed of at private sale, and say that are not taken up by Mr. Turner-Mead will take with him to his farm near Vancouver, B.C.

Perhaps the most interesting animal in the lot is one of the late King Edward's breeding. This is a brown yearling filly by Orville, one of Lord Beresford's stallions, and was foaled in January last. She is a full sister to Gold Paste, a big winner of two-year-old events this year, and a prominent candidate for the 1911 Derby and other classics.

The two yearling colts are of high-class breeding. One is a brown that was foaled on April 18. He is by Fair Star, who was by Rightaway, out of Miss Common, by Common, winner of the 2000 Guineas, the Derby and St. Leger. This colt goes back to Thorman, who in his day was a great performer. The other colt is by Grimrose by Galopin. This colt is a brother to Taitell, Sturt and Glenleigh, winners this year, and was foaled on June 5.

Two of the mares in the shipment are in foal, and if they should remain in this province their offspring would be eligible for the Quebec King's Plate. They are both about twelve years of age, and are thus considered to be in their prime for breeding purposes. Mome d'Amour is a bay mare, and is by Sorcerer, and goes back to Melbourne. She is in foal to Andover, and is due to foal in May. She is the dam of Lord of the Level and War Lord, good performers in the past season of the English courses. ### LOCAL OPTION FIGHTS THROUGHOUT THE PROVINCE

Number of Important Places Which Will Vote on Bylaws in January Next.

One of the busiest places in the city these days is the office of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance. The workers are preparing for their local option campaign. The secretary of the alliance states that on Monday, Jan. 2, 1911, between 80 and 90 municipalities will vote upon the question of local prohibition.

A feature of the campaign is the fairness of the attempts to repeal local option. Last year there were 111 municipalities in which repeal contests were possible, but in only 12 was the matter brought to a vote, and only two bylaws were repealed. This year there are 137 municipalities in which repeal contests might be brought on, but repealing bylaws will be submitted in only about six. These are: Ancaster Township, Colborne Village, Hewick Township, Beverley Township, Goulburn Township and McKellar Township.

Not only are the temperance people busy with the campaign places that will vote in January next, but already organization is being effected for the inauguration of campaigns in places that will not vote till January, 1912. This is being done by means of county conventions. Already half a dozen such conventions have been held, with the result that there is now a list of about 50 municipalities that are entering into a fight which will culminate a year from now.

This year contests are on in both the extreme eastern and western parts of the province. The Town of Amherstburg, in Essex County, and the Town of Lancaster, in Glangarry County, will both vote. Every municipality in the County of Glangarry is into the fight, including the Town of Alexandria, the Villages of Lancaster and Maxville, and the Townships of Kenyon, Lochiel and Lancaster. Just over the border the Village of Vankleek Hill, in Prescott County, and the Township of Roxboro, in Stormont County, are also voting. Other important eastern points in which the battle will be fought are the Towns of Arnprior, Perth, Smith's Falls, Napanee, Gananoque, and the Villages of Merrickville, Newburg and Newcastle.

In the northern part of the province, if the campaigns now on are successful, it will mean the entire cleaning up of large areas. Among the places voting are the Towns of Barrie, Bracebridge, Huntsville, Burk's Falls, Beaverton and Sutton. There will not be much doing in the northwestern part of the province, the only fights being in the Villages of Port Elgin and Palaley and the Township of Albemarle.

The City of Guelph is the centre of a hot fight. One of the largest and best organizations in the province is that of the citizens' committee in Guelph, and the campaign is being systematically carried on along practical lines. Just near Guelph, voting will take place in Guelph and Puslinch Townships, Erin Village and Drayton Village. Dufferin County has only three honours. These are all in the Village of Grand Valley, which place is looked upon by both parties as a strategic point, and will be the scene of a hard fought battle.

In Western Ontario the most interesting group of contests is that of the Township of Aldboro, with the Villages of Rodney, West Lorne, Wardsville and the Town of Bothwell. In these places are successful, it will mean a big white spot in the map of Elgin County. The hottest place in the province, however, is the County of Welland. Here a county convention was held last spring, at which it was decided to bring on a fight in every municipality in the county, as far as possible, with the result that ten municipalities will vote in January, including the Towns of Welland, Thorold, Port Colborne and Bridgeburg, with the Townships of Thorold, Crowland, Humblestone, Stamford, Willoughby and Bertie.

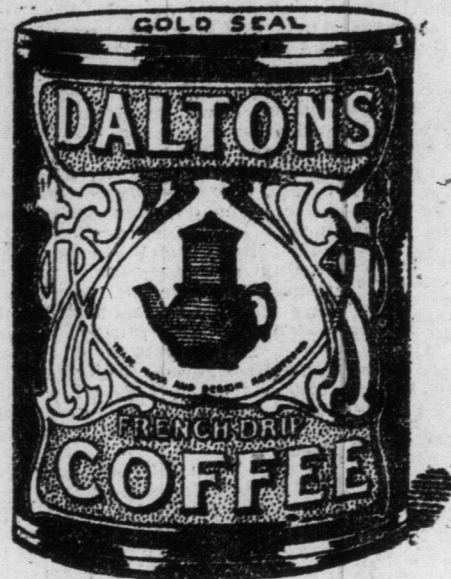

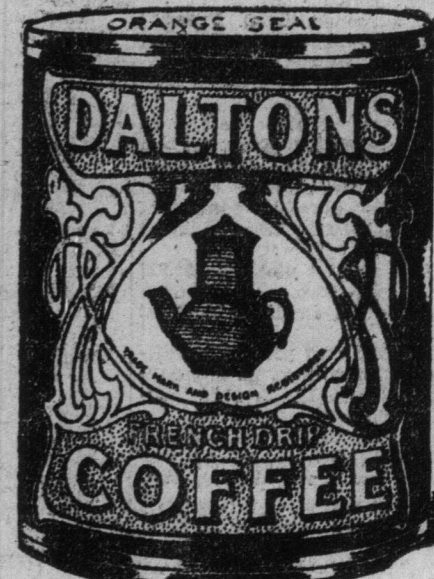

### PRESBYTERY DISCUSSES CHURCH UNION BASIS

Debate Will Resume December 6—Feeling That Modifications Will Be Required.

A special meeting of the Toronto Presbytery was held yesterday to consider the proposed basis of church union, which has been prepared after five years of earnest conference. It was accepted by a substantial majority by the last general assembly, and is now set down for the consideration of presbytery. The Presbytery of Toronto, recognizing the importance of the question, appointed a special meeting for the consideration of the matter. A large number of the members of the presbytery were present and a most interesting discussion resulted. A committee of six members had been appointed by the presbytery to present the various phases of a basis of union.

Rev. D. Nell spoke in general introduction of the question, tracing the first story of the movement, which has resulted in the presentation of a basis of union. He deprecated any haste in bringing about a union, at the same time expressing his preference for it, because of the great need of united effort in aggressive missionary work and because of the new stimulus and life that will result from the introduction of new elements from other churches.

found to contain a happy blending of the best in all the churches.

"This statement," said he, "is as Calvinistic as any sound theism must be and as Arminian as any statement of truth dealing with human freedom must be. It is not a system of theology; it is rather a confession of faith. Churches and Christian people that can unite on such a confession of faith may surely be one."

In regard to the statements of polity, some divergence of opinion was expressed. Rev. A. L. Geggie pointed out certain elements in the statements that tended, in his opinion, too much toward autocratic government instead of a democratic government, such as has marked the church in the past.

In presenting the statement of the articles dealing with the training and settlement of the minister, Rev. A. H. McCallum expressed substantial satisfaction with the statement relating to the training of the minister. With respect to the settlement of the minister, he felt that the method proposed would only accentuate the spirit of unrest now deplored, rather than mitigate it.

John A. Paterson, K.C., dealt with the legal provision it is proposed to enter to safeguard the interests of the

several churches and the progress of the mother church.

The afternoon was devoted to a general discussion of the question. All shades of opinion were expressed as to the basis of union, but on the general question of church union there seemed to be substantial agreement.

After considerable discussion, it was found that the time at the disposal of the presbytery would not allow a decision to be reached, and it was agreed to adjourn the debate until Tuesday, Dec. 6, when the discussion will be resumed at 2 p.m. A strong committee with Principal Gandler as convener, was appointed to receive all motions and suggestions concerning a basis of union and present them at the next meeting.

The general feeling throughout the meeting was along the line suggested by Rev. Mr. Geggie concerning the autocratic polity of the basis, and as there are many modifications, it is doubtful if it will be accepted.

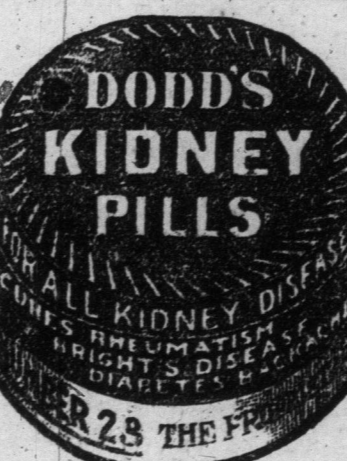
### GRAHAM DENIES RUMOR.

Mr. Carmack was shot to death on Nov. 9, 1908. Col. Duncan Cooper, his son Robin and John Sharp were arrested, charged with the crime. Sharp was acquitted, but the two Coopers were convicted and sentenced to 20 years each. Duncan Cooper was pardoned, and the state supreme court granted the younger man a re-trial.

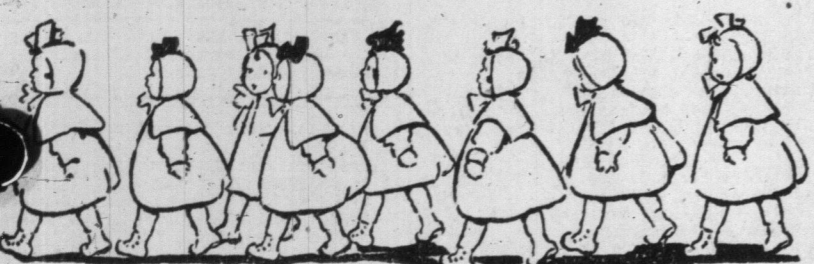
