P., the British Labor leader, in addressing the students of Toronto University yesterday afternoon. At the conclusion of his address, when questions were invited, Mr. Hardle was asked if he believed single tax would mean a fairer distribution of realty

wealth. "I am not in favor of the adoption of single tax," said he. "but I suppose taxation of land values is a good thing

The distinguished speaker's remarks The distinguished speaker's remarks had been directed toward the labor movement and a defence of Socialism, which he described as the only solution of the social unrest existing now in all the great industrial countries. He appealed to the students, at the commencement of their careers, to throw in their influence to gain the ideal for which the great working masses were struggling. 

Canada Has 1.100,000 Communicants, According to the Figures of Secretary Caskey of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, Which Show the Methodists Leading.

The Lutheran Church is fifth among the Protestant bodies of Canada. There are about 500,000 baptized Lutherans in Canada; about 100,000 are community

are about 500,000 baptized Lutherans in Canada; about 100,000 are communicants of the church, and 100,000 are confirmed but not in Lutheran churches, some of them worshipping with other communicons. More than half of the entire half million are young people.

The gospel is preached in at least twelve different languages in the Lutheran churches in Canada, but the young people are learning the English language, and ministers are being secured who can preach in English as wall as in some other tongue.

There is a theological seminary at Waterloo, Ont., which began about a year ago, and one is being organized in Saskatchewan. A Lutheran home is planned for Montreal to care for the immigrants, there being three Lutheran churches in that city—one German, one Danish, and one English. There are about 5000 Scandinavians in Montreal, and 1000 Finns in Toronto, according to a local paper, and all are Lutheran.

Upon the request of the police com-missioners the board of control yes-terday decided that the censor of plays should not be chosen from the police department, but that the ap-pointment should be made from the board itself. As Mayor Geary ex-plained, the duties involved in the poplained, the duties involved in the position of censor were such as to require a man who was independent of the force altogether.

Under the present system, said his worship, the censor must visit the theatres, judge the performances, and if he deems them improper, prosecute the managers. This system, he said, was unfair to both the officer undertaking the duties and the theatres. If an independent critic were engaged he would determine whether there was anything illicit in the performances, and the police could act upon his recommendation and prosecute.

The mayor gave an example of the police commissioner's contention from the play of Julius Caesar, which was in Toronto last week. A woman who played the part of a page wore tights. Under the present method of censoring the officer would first have to decide the point as to whether the scant costume was objectionable. If he decided that it was he would prosecute in his capacity as a constable. The board, however, deferred any action in the matter pending further recommendation from the police commissioners.
