at the meeting of the council, which was held in the same hall where Fa-ther Gapon, Maxim Gorky and other leaders denounced the emperor on the eve of Jan. 22 ("ited Sinday"), delegate after delegate from dimerent factories arose and reported that the workman, under the influence of the ultimatum issues by the employers aniouncing fac tories would be shut down indefinitely unless work was resumed on Monday, and with the pleading of their wives and of the conservative workmen ring-ing in their ears, were demanding that the strike should be ended. Strategic Mistake.

This precipitated a hotly contested debate between the moderates, who de-clared that the strike in the first instance was a strategical mistake and that it would be a grave error in tac-tics to attempt to force the men to remain in line, and the "last ditch" faction"

tion of those who wished to discontinue the strike. After a long discussion, a motion to call off the strike was rejected, and it was decided to call meetings of workmen in the factories to day to hay the citization form and y to hay the situation before them and
