SENATOR PLATT IS NEXT
TO LIFE INSURANCE PROBE

Is Wanted to Tell About Collection of Campaign Contributions From Some of the Big Companies.

FRUITFUL WEEK OF THE INQUIRY

Senator Chancery M. Dewey Unable to Identify Vouchers for Legal Services—Gage E. Tarbell's Righteous Opposition.

New York, Nov. 17.—With the end of the morning session, the Armstrong investigation committee finished a week that has not been equalled since the inquiry began.

Early in the week, James H. Hyde was examined, and he made charges against E. H. Harriman and former Governor Odell, who successively appeared and denied Mr. Hyde's statements. Mr. Hyde, on being to all, reaffirmed his former testimony. Then United States Senator Chancery M. Dewey was heard and he was expected that before the day was over Senator Platt would be called. He was expected to testify as to the collection of contributions to political campaign funds by the insurance companies. Mr. Odell was called yesterday that Senator Platt collected all such moneys up to last week. It is now expected that the senator will be heard early next week, possibly on Tuesday, when the sessions will be resumed.

Frank E. Jordan, son of the former controller of the Board of Health, and a member of the Ontario Life Insurance Society, who at a previous session testified that he did not know who his father was, or whether either his father or mother was living, was called again today and said that he had been in contact with his mother, who was in Canada, since he first testified, but that she did not mention his father.

Samuel N. McCurdy, assistant registrar of the Equitable, said that he had charges of that company's vouchers for legal services. Regarding the action of the insurance company, Mr. Platt said that he had demanded an examination into the company's methods. He asserted that thousands of dollars were spent by the Equitable in this manner. He justified the expenditure on the ground that it would have cost the city about \$40,000 had no defence been made.

Dejeu on the Stand.

Senator Dewey was called to testify regarding a number of vouchers for legal services, but he declared that he had no knowledge of them himself.

One voucher of John A. Nichols for legal services was accompanied by a letter to Senator Dewey, referring to "our friend who is offering such poor evidence." "Your cantankerous friend by the river," the letter said.

The senator said he knew Nichols had been retained at different times by the Equitable, but he did not remember a connection Mr. Nichols, he said, was once quarantine commissioner and active in politics.

Gage E. Tarbell, second vice-president of the Equitable, society, was called before noon and had his testimony started in his testimony when Senator Platt was called to the stand. He was asked to identify the vouchers for legal services which were presented by Mr. Dewey. Mr. Tarbell said that he had no right to identify them and that he would like to see the vouchers and their contents before he could do so.

Opposed Yellow Dog Fund.

He was opposed to money being spent for legislative purposes, and he said that if any money was to be spent it should be spent in a way that would be of benefit to the people.

WHICH IS THE GENTLEMAN?

It seems to us that the farmer wins out on both counts.

TARIFF COMMISSION TIRED
ARTISTS SEEK PROTECTION
To Raise Canada's Standard of Art—Tribute to Canadian Girls—Piano Makers Want Anti-dumping Clause Enforced—Matters Kept Commissioners at Work Till Midnight.

Looking rather tired, perhaps a little reproachful, the tariff commissioners left the Board of Trade Council Chamber at ten minutes past twelve this morning. They had been hard at it putting aside very short intervals for eating—from 10 o'clock in the forenoon yesterday. Speakers were long-winded. The morning session was not remarkably thrilling. The question of the importation of cheap organs and pianos from the United States was yet another contentious item in the indictment against Uncle Sam, against whom speakers asked for redress in the form of stiff enforcement of the anti-dumping clause. Other parties sought a uniform tariff on spices, to close the doors against the importations of the tons of adulterated spices. Commissioner Broderick insisted that the inland-revenue department contemplated the prosecution of Canadian manufacturers who thus touched up their spices. The most interesting item of the afternoon was the application concerning the tariff on all knitted goods, and the Canadian who is better off than her sister the other side of the ocean.

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FARMERS: NOW OR NEVER!

The way to make the Liberal leaders and government do better is for the Liberal rank and file to call them down and kick hard when they go wrong.

A mighty movement has been started over there to cure this state of things, and the way they propose to do it is to form farmers' leagues to elect farmers as their representatives. There's a lesson in this for the farmers of North York. The World has not been preaching this to-day or yesterday, but in every issue of the issue for years there has been something in favor of the farmers' league. The farmers of Ontario know that the World has done for them in the fight for better live stock prices on the Toronto market.

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ONE MAN LOSSES HIS LEGS
BROTHERS BADLY INJURED

Serious Results of Two Accidents in Toronto Last Night—Charles McBride Wilt Die.

Two serious accidents occurred in Toronto last night. Three men run over by a C.R.R. engine, Charles McBride is in the Western Hospital with both legs cut off. He is likely to die. Owing to their ragged legs struck by a street car, William Melroy and his brother Samuel Melroy, are both in the Emergency Hospital with severe injuries.

While attempting to climb on the footboard of a moving engine in the C.P.R. yard at the foot of John Street, Charles McBride, a brakeman, slipped and fell off. The engine was not moving very fast, but before he could recover himself the wheels passed over his legs and both were cut off. He was carried to the Western Hospital where he was placed in a room, and is expected to die.

The other accident occurred when a street car struck a man and his brother, who were crossing the tracks. The man was severely injured, and his brother was also injured.

WORKMEN BREAKING LOOSE
ANXIOUS TO END THE STRIKE

Plebiscite to Be Taken in Factories of St. Petersburg Will Probably Result in Resuming Operations on Monday.

"And what do these corporations—donate?" he was asked.

"Some of them will," he said. "Some will not." "The association would proceed to select a candidate on his views as to the question of 'Bismillon,'" he says. "If he showed a disposition to carry out their views, the association would show \$2000 or \$3000 at him to run his election with."

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BURIED UNDER DEBRIS.

C.R.R. Trainmen Have Miraculous Escape in Wreck.

Fort William, Nov. 17.—(Special)—The wreck on the Canadian Northern at Mattawa was one of the worst of that road this year, and it was miraculous that the trainmen escaped with their lives. The wheels on the pilot of the locomotive had jumped the track, but before Engineer Allan of Winnipeg had time to stop the train the wheels struck something and threw the locomotive over a 15-foot embankment. Five cars of coal followed. The men could not jump, and they were buried under the debris. Fortunately there was no fire, and all of them were rescued.

HARRYETT IS DISMISSED.

Bancroft Magistrate is No Use to the Government Now.

Samuel Harryett, police magistrate at Bancroft, who figured prominently in the battle-box cases at Belleville, has been dismissed from office as a result of his own evidence at the trial, and will be succeeded by G. L. Jarman.

COLONIES SHOULD SHARE.

In Organization of Army and Navy for Common Defense.

Canadian Associated Press Cable.

London, Nov. 17.—Major-General Sir Bruce Meade Hamilton, speaking at an Abner meeting, said that for the navy and army really to be serviceable in time of war some system of organizing the forces was necessary in which the colonies would share. British sea power really brought the colonies into close proximity. The colonies were beginning to realize the necessity of some common grounds for organization.

FRANCE IN LIBERIA.

Negotiations Refer to Delimitation of Boundary.

Paris, Nov. 17.—The foreign office to-day gave out a denial of the report that Germany had protested to France and Great Britain against her negotiations with Liberia, by which a portion of Liberia territory was to be hypothecated to secure a loan.

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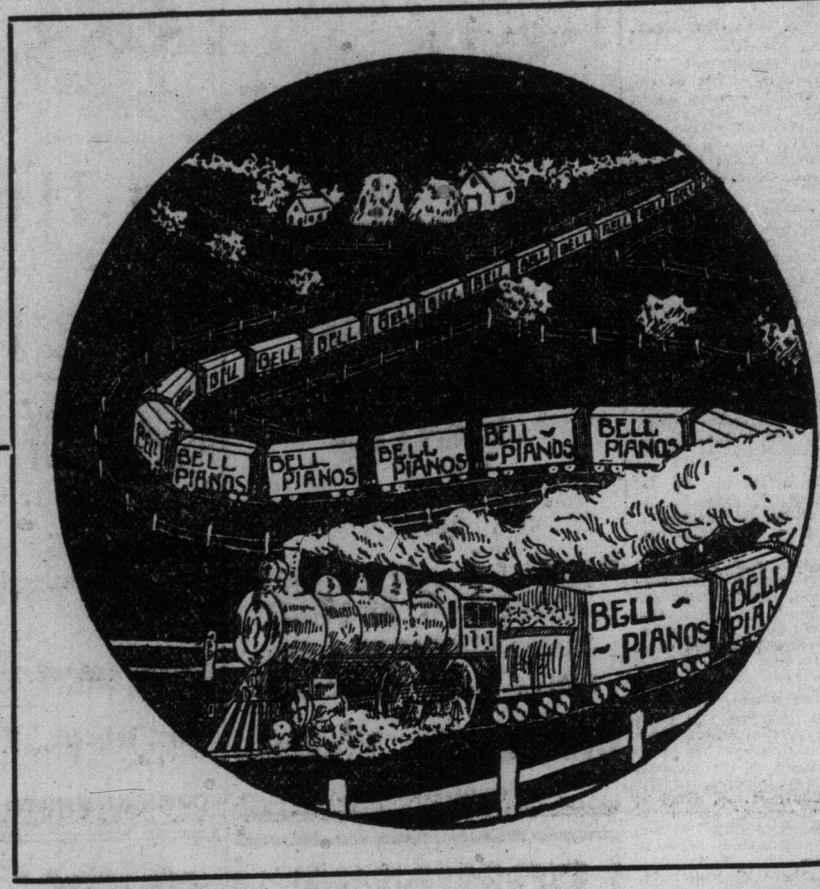

HAD MAGISTRATE THE RIGHT TO IGNORE HABEAS CORPUS?

Counsel for A. R. Walton Argues at Osgoode Hall That Court Proceedings Are Illegal.

That Police Magistrate Denison and Detective Mackie should be "attached" for ignoring the habeas corpus proceedings in the case of A. R. Walton was the motion made by J. R. Mackenzie at Osgoode Hall yesterday.

Walton, by counsel, affirmed that when in court he declared his counsel was not present the magistrate asked: "Are there not counsel present? Why should we not proceed with the case? Why concern you with the habeas corpus proceedings?"

The affidavit also states that the prisoner had been wrongfully brought across the border; that there were charges against him in his court that he must answer. Accordingly he was remanded till Nov. 21.

Mr. Mackenzie argued that the prisoner being in custody of the high court should not be detained by the magistrate.

Chief Justice Meredith said that all he had to do was to determine whether, on the contrary, Walton was entitled to discharge. As to the allegation that Walton was not openly extrajudicially released, the justice said:

"If you steal a man, the courts have nothing to do with the matter. It is a matter for the government to deal with. All I have to do is to find out whether he is rightfully where he is. The best place for you to go," he added, "is to Washington to see the president."

In giving judgment that the prisoner be remanded in custody, Sir Wilfrid Jordan pointed out that, if the prisoner was released he would be re-arrested immediately.

Mr. Mackenzie will take the matter to the court of appeal on Monday, as he says habeas corpus proceedings expressly provide against re-arrest on the same charge, under a penalty of \$500.

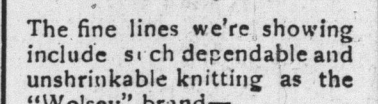

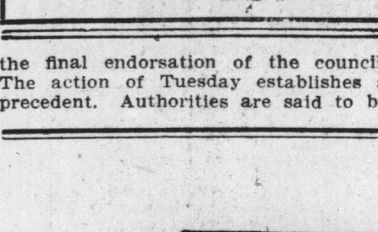
