AN ART MUSEUM IS WANTED

Toronto is Behind Other Cities of Its Size in This, Says Mr. Byron E. Walker.

ONTARIO SOCIETY STARTS IN

And a Committee Appointed to Consider the Possibilities of Carrying Out a Scheme.

The Ontario Society of Artists recently issued a pamphlet which should be read by all who are interested in the progress educationally of this fair city of ours. The pamphlet calls the attention of the public to the fact that we have no art museum in Toronto. While in other branches of education Toronto takes a leading position, says the announcement, and suitable buildings have been erected for their accommodation, as regards art it is far behind cities of its size and importance in the United States, Australia, New Zealand and Cape Colony.

It is a circumstance worthy of notice that this aggressive policy is adopted by the government at the very time when the Cataract Power Company of Hamilton is in a position to supply the current necessary to operate the Hoopfer Refining Company's nickel plant. It is stated that 3000 tons of nickel are produced annually by the Hoopfer Refining Company. Hon. J. M. Gibson, Attorney-General in the Ontario Government, is the head of the Cataract Power Company and a director of the Hoopfer Refining Company.

Access should be so free for all that every man, woman and child of the community should be able to see and enjoy the work of art. This, however, should be made compulsory for all who are admitted to the museum. The public are cordially invited to see and examine, to fully appreciate and to have struck it fast right. The Canadian Engineer states that the Hoopfer Refining Company's plant will be ready for business in the coming spring, and as soon as it is started work will begin on a nickel-steel plant which, with the necessary buildings, will cost about \$8,000,000.

Therefore, to found an art museum in Toronto, the Society of Artists believes that an association should be formed at the outset which would have the power and responsibility of raising a building and carrying it out, to receive requests and grants and apply them to the purpose for which they were intended. This art museum should be undertaken on the principle of gradual growth, that is, development of the building and what is to contain. The whole program should be provided in the building for the school of Art and Design, and the museum, and the maintenance could be provided by a citizen's loyalty membership fee, carrying with it privileges of lectures, lectures and exhibitions, etc., etc.

Mr. B. E. Walker, in his address, said that he wished to emphasize the fact that the Ontario Society of Artists was not attempting to found an art museum. He hoped to see an art museum founded and managed by the citizens of Toronto. In either Toronto compared very badly with other cities of the same size and importance in England and the United States. It was, however, his duty to compare Toronto with Montreal, Montreal being the older and larger city, but to compare Toronto with the outside of Europe there is no city in the world which has so many art galleries as Toronto. In these art galleries, the finest examples of the work of Sir Joshua Reynolds, Rembrandt, Van Dyck, and other great masters are to be seen.

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FLY THE FLAG.

The Australians are going to celebrate the 17th of March as a public holiday in honor of the part played by the Irish in the South African war. The Lord Mayor of London will hold the Irish flag on the Mansion House on the same day. Canada ought to take advantage of the same opportunity of showing her appreciation of the services rendered by the Irish soldiers in the preservation of the Empire. The example set by the Lord Mayor ought to be followed by the Mayor of Toronto, and especially by the Irish flag on the City Hall. On this occasion the flag will have no fractional significance. It will represent an idea exactly parallel to the idea embodied in the Dominion flag, viz. loyalty to the Empire. By all means let the Irish flag be in evidence all over Canada on Saturday, and the shamrock too.

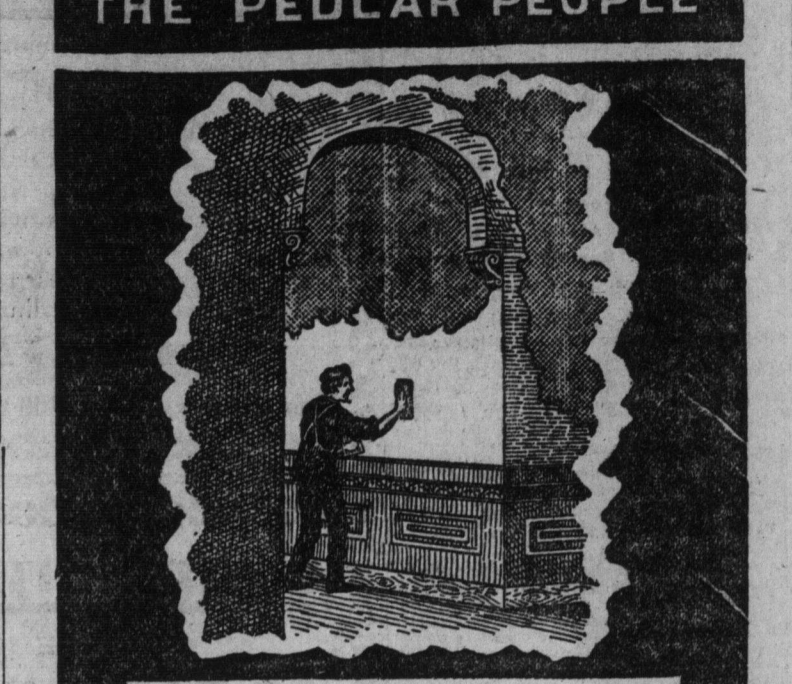
