

FRONTIER OF BOUNDARY

Interesting Statement Regarding Advancement of the Mines of That Part of B.C.

OF THAT BIG CARIBOU INGO

Franklin Camp on the North Fork—Quotations on and Sales of Stock

Greenwood, B.C., Oct. 24.—The total quantity of ore shipped from the Boundary district to Oct. 16 is about 43,000 tons, shipments to July 1 aggregated about 10,000 tons, and approximate monthly totals since have been: July 7000 tons, August 12,000 tons, September 14,000 tons. Shipments for October will, it is estimated, reach about 17,000 tons from the mines in the Boundary district, known as the Boundary group (including the Old Boundary, Victoria and Knob Hill) and the B.C. mine in Summit Camp. There will probably be some other small shipments from several properties upon which less development work has as yet been done.

New Camp in the Boundary. Grand Forks, B.C., Oct. 24, 1900.—The Boundary district, including the Boundary mine, north fork of the Kettle River, is being developed by the Boundary Development Co., which has an open cut on the ledge, 120 feet long, and from 15 to 25 feet in depth.

Col. W. C. Hayward of Grand Forks has returned from a tour of inspection of the Boundary mine, on the east fork of the north fork of the Kettle River. His party included Jack Curry, C.E., John W. Barrett, Oklahoma; Harry Donough and Henry Kelly of Carson, Cal.; Hayward understood the trip on behalf of Robert Anderson, managing director of the Boundary Development Co., which is desirous of securing copper-gold properties for English clients. Franklin Camp was discovered only a year and a half ago, but the location in that region already covered 100 miles along Grand Forks. Until recently the country was very difficult access, the trail extended over the mountains and great difficulty was experienced in taking in supplies. At present a road is being built to Franklin Camp. Forty or fifty men are employed on the construction work and the job will be completed within three weeks. An easy grade has been secured on the new route following the water grade thru the valley. Later on, when an adequate appropriation is voted by the Legislature, the trail can be easily converted into a wagon road.

Several miles have been explored, and the values will average higher than Boundary properties, the ledge varying in width from six to 60 feet, and the majority extending 50 feet into the ground. GOULD'S FRENCH BROTHER-IN-LAW

Western Sewerage System. City Engineer Rust, in his fortnightly report to the Committee on Works, gives further information respecting the sewerage system recommended for that portion of the city west of Broadview Avenue. He says the method proposed is what is known as the separate system—that is, the domestic sewage and a portion of the roof water only is admitted into the sewers and the storm water is taken care of as at present by open water courses, which run thru this district. Separate sewers are proposed to be more sanitary than combined sewers and are designed large enough to carry domestic sewage. They are always running nearly full, while in the combined system the dry weather flow is very small as compared with the capacity of the sewer.

Care at Railway Crossings. Manager Keating of the Street Railway Company has replied to Engineer Rust's letter calling attention to the question of more caution at railway crossings. He says the railway employees are in the habit of using all necessary caution, and he knows no instance where they have been negligent.

Says Rust is Mistaken. Mr. Rust's complaint regarding the car service in the western part of the city between 8:30 and 9 a.m. being inefficient is replied to by Mr. Keating, who says the Engineer has been misinformed.

REFUSED TO FOLLOW THE EDICT
Issued by the Dowager Empress to Kill Foreigners—Missionsary Out-look is Bright.

The Rev. George E. Hartwell of Schuen, West China, a missionary of the Canadian Methodist church, arrived in the city yesterday afternoon.

Officials Favored Them.
There was no outbreak in Schuen, as Mr. Hartwell says, and all the officials of the province were favorably inclined towards missionaries. When leaving they preceded him all the protection in their power, and he was able to leave the province without any further trouble.

LAWLESS GETS SIX MONTHS.

Dishonest Lawyer Sentenced—Harrison Sent Down for Five Years—
Mr. Justice MacMahon yesterday sentenced George Harrison, convicted of criminal assault, to five years in Kingston Penitentiary, and J. Percy Lawson, found guilty of the same crime, to six months in the Central Prison. His Lordship made some scathing remarks on the Harrison case. The jury had, for some reason which he was at a loss to understand, brought in a recommendation to mercy, otherwise he might have been more severe. The law provides for the "cat-in-hat" and life imprisonment in the case of this kind.

Referring to Lawson, the judge said that he was worse than an ordinary thief. As a solicitor, the community was entitled to the belief that he would hold his tongue in law. The breach of trust was the worst feature of the case. The witness, William Gorman, was tried on a charge of criminal assault, provoked by a 17-year-old girl named Adda McClellan. The alleged offence was committed at Woodlawn city, near Adda McClellan. The judge agreed, and Lawson was bound over to appear for trial at the January Assizes.

POLICE COURT RECORD.
For stealing a number of silver spoons marked "Clancy" from a Kingsstreet grocer, and 14 pool balls from the St. Clement's Club, 154 Wellington, an old man named Thomas Bennett was given seven months in the Central Prison by Magistrate Davidson yesterday.

Thomas Westcott pleaded guilty to stealing a gold ring from James Richardson, mate of the steamer Chipewake.
Charles Watson, better known as "Steeley" Wagon, who pleaded guilty to stealing rings and watches from the store of Dr. J. W. West Green-street, was committed to jail for six months.

Archibald Mitchell pleaded guilty to stealing \$17.55 collections made for the employees of the Toronto Police Department. He was given six months in the Central Prison by Magistrate Davidson yesterday.

Martin Lyons was fined \$2 and costs or 30 days for assaulting Bernard Henshaw of Hackney-street.
John Burgess and Charles Rawlinson were sent down for seven months.

Max James of York-street, who was remanded on Wednesday till the 6th, having been charged with non-support of Dinah, his wife, was arrested again yesterday on the complaint of the wife, that he had assaulted her. The second charge stands till the 6th. For being disorderly in the vicinity of St. Simon's Church, Arthur White, Wesley Will and Albert Francis were each fined \$2 without costs, or 10 days.

Non-Jury Assize Court.
Ten years ago the widow of B. H. Hughes died in a gully in the city of Toronto. The property was claimed by the city, and the city was ordered to determine the ownership. The city seeks to have the property, and the possession given the city immediately. The case goes on this morning.
