TO BE A DISTINCT NOVELTY COMING AUTOMOBILE RACES

Final Arrangements Made for the Meet on August 6 at the Exhibition Grounds.

There is a distinct novelty in store for Toronto in the automobile races which are to be held in Exhibition Park on Aug. 6. A meeting of the Auto Club was held in the King Edward on Thursday evening, and final arrangements made for the meet, which the club intends to make an annual affair. Five races are on the card at present, but it is expected that a couple will be added. There will be an event for open cars costing less than \$500 (single cylinder Rambler, Northern, Eldridge and Mitchell), one for cars under \$200 (Stevens Duryea, Auto cars, double cylinder, Rambler, Ford, Columbus), one for cars costing \$300 and upwards (4-cylinder Peerless, 4-cylinder Packard, 4-cylinder Winton, 3-cylinder Thomas).

There may also be a fancy driving race and an open event for two-cylinder cars. In addition to these Barney Oldfield, the celebrated chauffeur, will make three trials at beating his own records on a half-mile track. His records last year—1 mile, 54.4; 1/2 mile, 4.4; 10 miles, 43.2-2.5; and 15 miles, 44.1—have never been touched by any auto racer. He will make three test heats, 1 mile, 3 miles and 5 miles on his Peerless racer, and is confident that he can lower his last year's figures. There are 100 members in the Toronto Automobile Club, and there have been enough entries up to the present time to make each event a feature. Taken in all, the club expects to give the best afternoon's sport ever seen in Toronto.

Russian Casualties 2000 Japanese Only a Thousand

General Oku Reports That General Kuropatkin Was on the Battlefield During the Recent Fight at Tatchekiao, But Was Not Wounded.

Washington, July 29.—The Japanese minister has received the following telegram from the foreign office at Tokyo, dated today: "General Oku reports further that according to the statements of Russian officers captured during the recent battle, Gen. Kuropatkin was present on the battlefield, and that General Sakaloff and Komarovitch were wounded. Also that the Russian casualties were about 2000. The Japanese casualties were about 1000, and Gen. Oku reports that investigations are being made regarding the number of prisoners taken and the quantity of munitions of war, etc., captured."

RUSSIA FEARS THE WEST. St. Petersburg, July 29.—Since the Russian retreat from Tatchekiao and the taking of Newchwang by the Japanese, the feeling here has grown suddenly more pessimistic. With the Japanese able to get around Gen. Kuropatkin's right from Newchwang, with their forces pressing in upon Hsiehcheng from the east, and a Japanese column threatening the Russian communications above Liaoyang, the withdrawal of the entire Russian army northward may be absolutely necessary.

RUSSIA FILES PROTEST. London, July 29.—Russia has filed a formal protest at the foreign office against the British shipments of contraband to Japan.

BRITAIN'S POSITION. London, July 29.—Premier Balfour, in a printed reply to the questions asked by Thomas Gibson Bowles (Conservative) in the house of commons July 27, asking for information regarding the actions of the Russian armored cruiser Dmitri Donkoff in the Mediterranean, confirmed the facts reported by Mr. Bowles, and added that the British government's view is that any ship using coal for purposes other than those for which it was obtained should not thereafter be accorded coaling facilities.

Mr. Bowles asked the government if it was aware that the Russian armored cruiser Dmitri Donkoff, after being allowed to take 500 tons of coal at Port Said, and after her captain had given his word of honor that he would proceed at once and by the direct route to Cadix, remained off Port Said and stopped and examined six vessels which were about to enter the canal, and a few days later repeated the stoppage off Alexandria. Mr. Bowles also wanted to know what steps the government would take to prevent such behavior.

KUROPATIN NOT WOUNDED. St. Petersburg, July 29.—The general staff denies the report circulated in European papers of the wounding of Gen. Kuropatkin at the battle of Tatchekiao. The general, it is added, is perfectly well.

NOT BEFORE 2 WEEKS. St. Petersburg, July 29.—It is announced that the Baltic sea squadron's departure for the east will not occur for at least two weeks.

MAY BE OFF YOKOHAMA. Tokyo, July 29.—(11 a.m.)—It is believed that the Russian armored cruiser Dmitri Donkoff will be off Yokohama to-day.

OF INTEREST TO FARMERS QUESTIONS IN THE HOUSE

Government Criticized for Not Giving Adequate Facilities for Shipping Perishable Products.

Ottawa, July 29.—(Staff Special.)—For failing to give adequate facilities for the shipment of the perishable products of Canada the government was vigorously criticized by E. D. Smith of Wentworth in the house to-day. Mr. Smith concluded his speech with a motion asking the house to condemn the government for not securing for the farmers of Canada "a safe and speedy transport for the perishable products of the farm and competitive low prices for freight."

Sir Richard Cartwright gently shifted the responsibility for the defects complained of to Hon. Sydney Fisher. Blames Sir Richard. Dr. Sproule showed that the contracts with the steamship companies in the matter of cold storage and ventilated chambers were loosely drawn. They did not impose hard and fast conditions on the steamship company. For this state of affairs, Dr. Sproule blamed the minister of trade and commerce. It was Sir Richard Cartwright who made the contracts.

**MARKETS LESS ACTIVE OVEREY STRONG**  
 Thursday's Rally at N.Y. Partially Lost—Bank Shares More Active in Locals.

World Office, Friday Evening, July 20.

There is nothing new to chronicle in the action of local stocks today, and the now apparently settled market was well content to the questions, with a reaction of two points and a recovery to the starting point. Dominion Coal showed much more firmness today, and bids here and at Boston were publication of the net earnings of C.P.R. for the month of June and for the fiscal year ending with the month brought forth as comment, as nothing new was divulged in the figures. As a speculative feature it is held, both here and on other markets, and at New York to-day only two other speculative stocks were insignificant. A gap in sales was made up for to-day by a number of transactions in the banks. Dominion was advanced Tuesday, but the balance was put then at steady prices. The local board will be closed till Friday, and this doubtless had a restricting influence in the speculative section.

Paris & Stoppard, 21 Melinda-st., report the closing at New York on Northern Securities bid 100, asked 101; Mackay common bid 25, asked 24; Mackay pref. bid 30, asked 29; Dominion Coal (Boston) bid 3/4, asked 3/4; Dominion Steel (Boston) bid 3/4, asked 3/4.

The corn crop shows a better than average yield, and is better than ever, while cotton is making good progress, with increasing reports of a good yield.
