LONDON, April 15,-(C.A.P.)-Replying to a letter from a Unionist M. P., Mr. Balfour says: "Wheat grown within the limits of the empire should be imported free. This policy will, I believe, commend itself to the judgment of the British community and will certainly be received with favor by the

Mr. Balfour's announcement is regarded as likely to have an effect on next elections. The free trade view, however, is not to tax colonial corn and not to affect the price of bread, as three-fifths of the corn is imported from foreign exporters, who would raise the price to pay the duty. Colonial and British farmers would do likewise to make extra profits, so the statement will not prevent the cry of the "little loaf."

"We have also retained the right to require all licensees to put firerangers on their limits, and if they neglect to do so we are to have the power to to do so we are to have the power to put on the necessary rangers and charge their wages and expenses against the limit, withholding the license until these charges are paid. We also retained the right to appoint what are called supervising rangers, whose duty it is to see that the work is efficiently done. These will be placed in charge of certain districts, into which, for the convenience of supervising, the licensed territory will be divided. These supervisors will be furnished with lists of rangers appointed by each licensee and the limits pointed by each licensee and the limits they are on, and by visiting them fre-quently they will be able to see that the firerangers are active in the per-formance of their duties.

NOT AS BAD AS REPORTED Byron Walker Straightens Out Battlefields Commission Rumor.

MONTREAL, April 15 .- (Special.) -When the bill was passed at Ottawa creating the Quebec Battlefield Commission, there was no parliamentary authority to expropriate. Something had to be done, however, as there was over \$600,000 in the Bank of Monttreal, to the credit of the commission, and the members wanted to go ahead with their work. Appeal after appeal was made to the government at Ottawa, yet, like other large bodies, they declined to move. Finally Sir George Garneau, Byron Walker and Col. Denison, threatened to resign en bloc. This had the desired effect, and the bill was rushed thru at Ottawa. When spoken to by The World last night, Byron E. 

Opinions Differ as to Whether I Should Be Allowed to Suck Dam.

Opinions may differ as to whether the dairy calf should be allowed to suck its dam at all; at any rate it should not be allowed to do so any longer than for a few days. An essential point to observe is that the calf gets the first milk, or colostrum, 33 this milk is not only highly nutritive, but it also possesses properties that serve to cleanse the bowels and start reared on skim milk if it is fed intelligently. For best results it is advisable to feed whole milk until the call 17.300 is from two to three weeks old, when 6,400 the skim milk can be submitted gradtually. It is important that ually. It is important that the milk be fed at as near blood heat as pos-

sible, as this is merely following na-ture's plan. The amount to be fed will vary somewhat with the size of the calf, but a fairly safe rule is about ten pounds (one gallon) of whole milk per day for a start, working up to about fifteen pounds within two weeks.
The amount of skim milk, unless in exceptional cases, should not exceed eighteen pounds per day until the calf is five or six weeks old, and it is seldom advisable to feed more than 24 or 25 pounds at any stage. It is a mis-taken idea that the lack of quality in skim milk can be made up by quan tity, and many good dairy calves are ruined by overfeeding with skim milk. For the first few weeks at least the calf should be fed three times a day. as there is less likelihood of digestive troubles under this system than when the milk is given less frequently and in larger quantities.

It is well to get the calf into the habit of taking limited quantities of grain as soon as possible; and one of the best things to start out on is oil meal. This can best be given by converting it into a jelly by adding boiling water and feeding it with the milk. A water and feeding it with the milk. A teaspoonful of oil meal is sufficient for a start, and the quantity can be gradually increased up to haif a pound a day.
