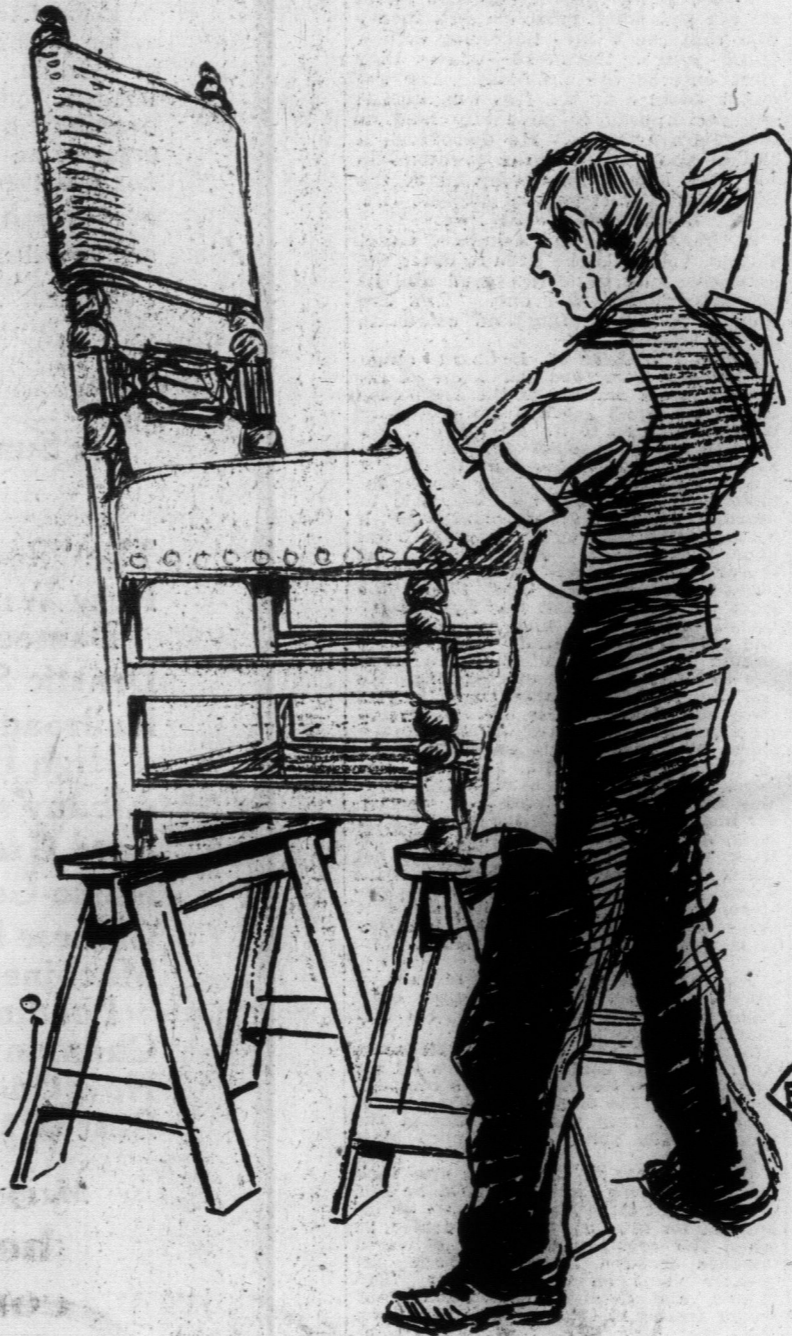

RECOUNT REFUSAL SURPRISES LEAGUE

Citizens' Liberty Advocates May Decide to Oppose Premier's Election.

T. L. Carruthers, general secretary of the Citizens' Liberty League, considers that Premier Drury is breaking faith in his refusal to allow a recount of referendum ballots which he is said to have promised. A meeting will be held to decide on what steps shall be taken to oppose Mr. Drury's election.

"I am certainly surprised to a certain extent at the decision of the government, thru the deputy attorney-general, that a recount cannot legally take place. It is clearly the case of Mr. Drury passing the buck to Mr. Raney, and he passed it on to Mr. Bayly."

"Mr. Bayly bases his refusal on the grounds that a recount, if desired, must be applied for within four days after the returning officer has added up the votes."

"Our first application for a recount was made to Mr. Lucas, the late attorney-general, on October 25, three days after the vote was taken."

"The late government were so convinced of the justice of our contentions that they passed an order-in-council dated October 31 granting a recount. The advisers of the Drury government have ignored this order-in-council."

"My executive had decided not to oppose Mr. Drury in his election in order to give him fair play, and a chance to make good. This raw deal which has been handed to us will probably cause a change in this respect. A meeting of our committee will be held today to decide what further steps will be taken in reply to Mr. Raney's ultimatum," said Mr. Carruthers.

PARK SCHOOL OLD BOYS DINE.

Last night the annual dinner of the Old Boys' Association of Park school was held, a feature of the gathering being a memorial tablet to the boys who fell in the war made from the old bell that used to call them to school. Two hundred and fifty miniature tablets, also made from the bell, will form part of the presentation which will be made to Principal R. Richardson.

LESS ROOMS, MORE SCHOOLS.

Late changes in the building plans of the board of education will lessen the number of merely extra rooms and increase the number of entirely new schools, nine of which are now scheduled.

ADAMS GUM EMPLOYEES' SOCIAL CLUB ACTIVE

An elaborate program of entertainment for the employees of the Canadian Chewing Gum Co., Limited, is being scheduled by the A-Chicle-A-Club, a social organization made up of the factory and office staff of the manufacturers of "Adams Chiclets."

The social season of 1920 was given a good start last evening when two large vans carried the members for a sleigh ride. Those who were unable to pile into the vans remained in the club rooms, beguiling their time with sundry games of euchre and 500.

To give the members who braved the cold ride a chance to thaw out, a dance was put on after their return to the club rooms, and refreshments were served.

Among other social features planned by the A-Chicle-A Club are a Valentine Leap Year party on February 14 and an "Irish" party on March 17. These were decided upon at a recent meeting of the club, at which the following officers were elected: Mr. T. J. McElroy, president; Mrs. M. M. Heuler, vice-president; Miss A. Newlands, treasurer; Mr. W. Bateman, secretary; Mr. W. Smart, chairman-entertainment committee.

NO PERSONAL DAMAGE.

James W. A. and Elizabeth Cronk-wright were allowed \$71.75 for damages to their automobile and no damages for personal injury by Mr. Justice Logie yesterday in their suit against the Toronto street railway to recover \$10,000 alleged damages to their car and persons when the automobile was struck by a street car at Bloor and Bathurst streets. The jury returned a sealed verdict overnight. They found negligence on the part of the conductor of the car and on the part of the plaintiff, who might have avoided the accident by exercising more caution.

SPECULATION SAFER THAN INVESTMENT

More Money Lost by Latter, Col. Deacon Tells Electrical Club.

Col. F. H. Deacon gave a valuable address to the Electrical Club yesterday on the features of various types of stocks and bonds. He spoke of his experience in the last 22 years. As long ago as that bonds were almost unknown and mortgages and bank shares were the favorite forms of investment. Today bonds offered excellent opportunities.

There were five features that had to be recognized in an investment: its safety, its yield, its convertibility, its appreciation, and its stability. Government and municipal bonds ranked first for safety, but there was a proper time to buy them. Toronto bonds bought at par a few years ago were now selling at 77 1/2. Harbor bonds, now selling at \$1, he ventured to prophesy, would be at par long before their maturity.

He discussed railway and industrial bonds, recommending railway equipment bonds. Of industrials, he said these should be considered, their management, their permanency, their sources of raw material, their market in regard to competition, and their record.

More money was lost, he said, thru legitimate investment than by speculation. As a rule industrial shares can be bought five years later at a lower rate than when first promoted. New industries were not for poor men to invest in.

He advised present purchase on long date or very short date, two or three years, or 15 or 20 years and upwards, at 5 1/2 or 6 per cent. It was more difficult to get people to sell when prices were high than to buy when prices were low. Inside information was generally poor, as insiders were too close to the business to get a proper perspective. If the New York stock market was bad business might be expected to be depressed six months later, and if it was good a time of depression business might be expected to pick up within six months.

Russell Sage said he should buy our straw hats in winter. Marshall Field said he was satisfied if he was right 51 per cent. of the time.

WORK OF O. A. C.

The Western Ontario O. A. C. alumni have requested the Hon. Manning Donnelly to transfer the whole of the teaching and investigation now carried on by the department of agriculture to the Guelph Agricultural College. Col. W. J. Brown of London, who headed the deputation, said that a good deal of educational work that should have been handled from the beginning by the college had grown up in the department of agriculture. It is the desire to have this transferred now to the college. The Hon. Mr. Donnelly expressed appreciation of the suggestions made.

MARINE NEWS

The White Star-Dominion Line steamer Dominion leaves Liverpool on Jan. 31, and is expected to make her eastbound trip sailing from Portland, Feb. 17.

The SS. Canada of the same line has been delayed, and is not expected to leave Liverpool before Feb. 18, which will make her next eastbound sailing from Portland, March 2.

Mays Did Not Like the Way Ed. Barrow Ran the Red Sox

New York, Jan. 23.—The appellate division of the supreme court reserved decision today on an appeal of Ban Johnson, president of the American League, and of the St. Louis and Cleveland Americans, from an injunction issued by Supreme Court Justice Wagner, which restrains them from interfering with Carl W. Mays continuing as a Yankee pitcher, pending the final outcome of a suit brought against them by the New York Club. In arguing the latest phase of the disputed case, involving Mays, who, while playing with the Boston Americans, walked off the field in Chicago, was suspended by Mr. Johnson, and later was reinstated by the league directors, counsel for the appellants belittled the claim that Mays had not violated his Boston contract willingly before his sale to the Yankees. It is claimed in Mays' behalf that he was hit with a ball, and also was "suffering from private worries," one being a fire which destroyed his wedding presents and baseball trophies. Appellants' counsel contended that affidavits in the case did not state Mays had been hit by a ball, and that his house had been burned in the spring, while the Chicago incident occurred in July. Counsel then quoted Mays as saying: "I am convinced that it will be impossible for me to preserve my confidence in myself as a ball player and stay with the Red Sox as the team is now handled."

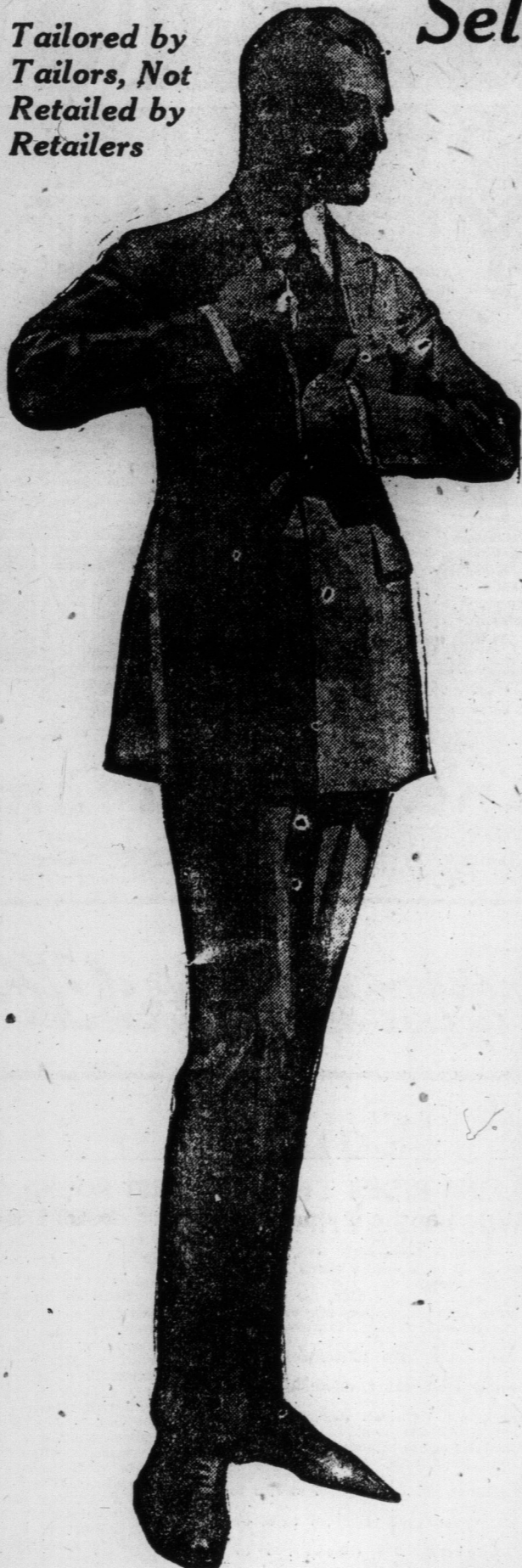

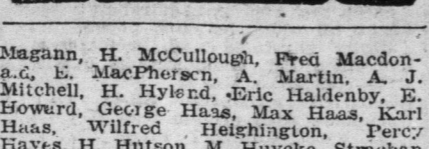

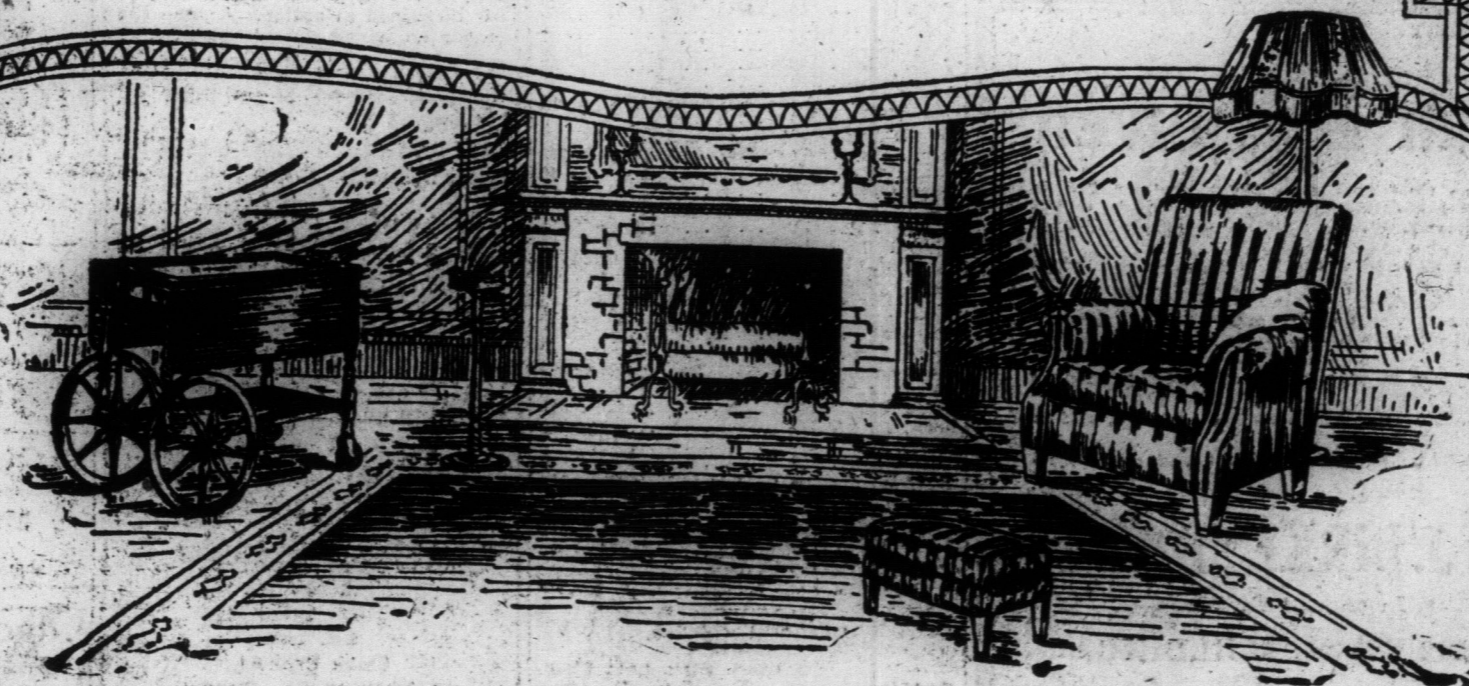
