PERMIT RAILWAYS TO MAKE SURCHARGE

(Continued From Page 1.) The lines had been suffering for some time, and which was quite an objectionable situation.

Questioned as to whether the surcharges would fluctuate with the rate of exchange, Mr. Hayes stated they would be affected, and readjusted rates would be fixed twice a month by the railway commission.

A brief summary of the judgment, which was written by Hon. F. B. Carvell, chief commissioner, and concurred in by Commissioners Rutherford, McLean and Nantel, is as follows:

The order issued today providing for a system of surcharges on international passenger traffic between Canada and the United States is intended to place the Canadian roads in such a position that, after giving full credit for the amount which they will receive from the American roads on traffic to Canada...

On faces to American points immediately at the border, such as Detroit and Buffalo, no surcharge will be added, because in this case practically the whole journey will be in Canada.

From points a short distance from the border, such as Sherbrooke, Montreal, Chatham, and Vancouver, the surcharge will be 75 per cent. of the rate of exchange.

Toronto Rate. Then from points some distance farther away from the border, such as St. John, Ottawa, Toronto and Winnipeg, the surcharge will be 50 per cent. of the rate of exchange.

From all other points the surcharge will be 25 per cent. of the rate of exchange.

This arrangement will not in any way interfere with the right which any passenger now possesses, of purchasing his ticket to the American border in Canadian funds and from there making his own arrangements.

Commissioner A. C. Boyce does not agree with the judgment issued by Chief Commissioner Carvell and other members of the board. I am unable to reconcile the proposals of the railways with any jurisdiction possessed by this board, he says.

Conditions in respect of which relief is sought, onerous to the Canadian railways, are not in my opinion within the power of this board to ameliorate or remedy.

From points like Windsor and other places immediately on the border, the whole fare will be paid in American funds, or its equivalent, because the whole journey, practically speaking, will be in American territory.

On faces to American points immediately at the border, such as Detroit and Buffalo, no surcharge will be added, because in this case practically the whole journey will be in Canada.

From points a short distance from the border, such as Sherbrooke, Montreal, Chatham, and Vancouver, the surcharge will be 75 per cent. of the rate of exchange.

Toronto Rate. Then from points some distance farther away from the border, such as St. John, Ottawa, Toronto and Winnipeg, the surcharge will be 50 per cent. of the rate of exchange.

From all other points the surcharge will be 25 per cent. of the rate of exchange.

It is said that Senor Dato received a cipher communication from Paris several days ago informing him that the Spanish government intended to carry out a sensational crime in support of the suppression of the recent disorders in Barcelona and that they were only awaiting the moment.

When King Alfonso learned of the attack on the premier, he desired to go to the scene, but was persuaded not to do so.

BERLIN POPULACE IS UNDISTURBED

(Continued From Page 1.) The foreign minister already is being sharply attacked in a section of the nationalist press for failing to make a sterner protest against the accusation of war guilt. He is known, however, to have the solid backing of the cabinet.

Dr. Gustav Stresemann, leader of the People's party and chairman of the foreign relations committee, pronounced the present situation a "transitory stage," declaring it is bound to prove unprofitable to the entente "unless France's sole ambition centres in the gratification of political aspirations."

Predicts Another Conference. Dr. Stresemann predicted that another conference was bound to succeed the London talks.

Vorwarts charges that formally and legally the entente has begun a new war, thus admitting the terms of the peace treaty demand revision.

Official and financial circles in Berlin admit having only a hazy idea as to what is really the effect of the customs regulations along the Rhine, which the entente intends imposing.

The procedure, as such, is claimed to be a violation of article 270 of the peace treaty, which permits creation of a customs regime only if the economic interests of the populations of the occupied territories demand such a measure.

Suspicion is expressed in certain quarters that the entente is seeking to get a firmer grip on Germany's coal production, thus enabling it to control even the domestic distribution.

Commerce will succeed in devising other ways and means of evading Pohl's petty customs tyranny, at least as concerns commodities destined for transit thru the occupied areas, The Tagblatt says.

50 PER CENT. TOLL ON GERMAN GOODS

Austen Chamberlain Will Introduce Bill Providing for Collection. London, March 9.—J. Austen Chamberlain, the chancellor of the exchequer, is expected to introduce in the house of commons tomorrow draft of a bill calling for a 50 per cent. toll on the sale of German goods. The text of the bill is not yet available.

Broadly, it provides that the purchaser of German goods shall pay 50 per cent. of the purchase money to his own government, receiving in return a treasury receipt which he will hand to the German seller, who will be expected to collect the amount from the German government.

The Situation

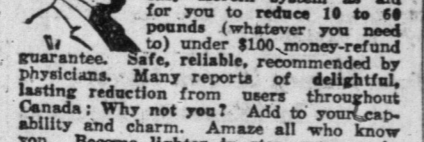

Sir James said that they could not delay public business to satisfy private interests and that the measure before the house had already been agreed upon by the three interested governments. Therefore, it would be well for the senate to proceed with the measure.

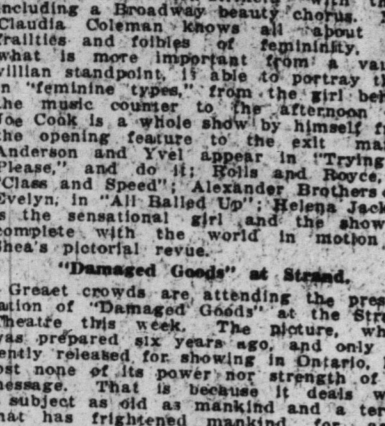

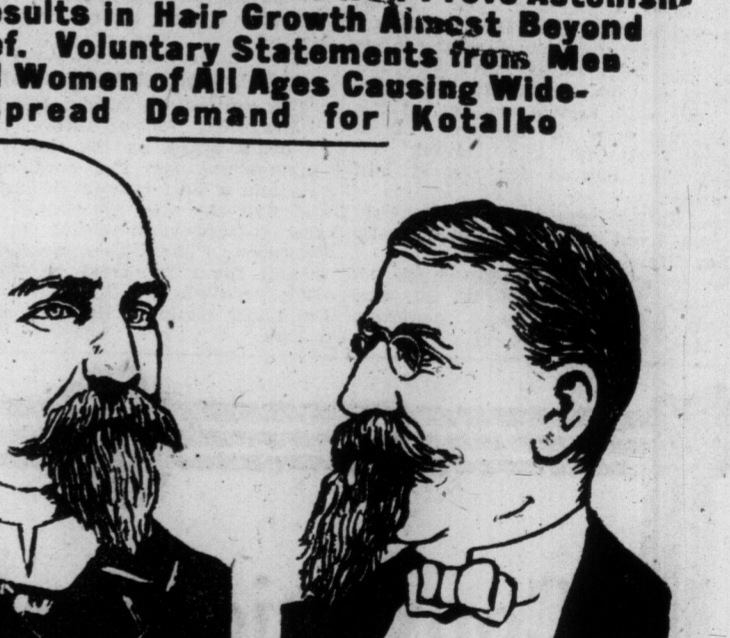

**SUGGEST SOFT COAL BURNED IN SCHOOLS**

Trustees Points to Large Saving Possible by New Arrangement.

**COMMITTEE CLASHES**

Member Reverts Insults in Efforts for High School Appointments.

Excitement over school coal and high school appointments almost shattered yesterday's meeting of the management committee of the board of education, but Mrs. Groves, the presiding trustee, succeeded in averting a disruption. The committee spoke previous records by sitting for over three hours' madam presiding, succeeding in restoring order and appealing to the trustees not to break the quorum until the order paper was cleared.

Rev. F. E. Powell and Senior Principal G. A. Smith had a lively time. Both attempted to hold the floor and speak simultaneously. The senior principal claimed that he had been assailed. The trustee counter-claimed that, as a representative of the people, he had a right to all the information available in high school matters.

Mrs. Groves decided that the trustee had the best right to the floor, and was in order. Rev. F. E. Powell said that last year he received nothing but insults in his efforts to have the appointments to the Toronto high school staff made from all the applicants, irrespective of domicile, whether residents of Toronto or not, so long as the best qualified applicant was appointed.

Rev. H. A. Berils, who strongly supported Rev. F. E. Powell's attitude, brought the contest to an end by securing the endorsement by the committee of an instruction to the high school principals to send a full list of the names of all applicants with qualifications, to the committee, the principals to report a first, second and third choice.

Coal Supply Trouble. Trustees Wemp, Berils and Miller reviewed the recent coal supply trouble. The company which replaced state with good coal wrote that it had always made good when attention was called to unsatisfactory deliveries. Trustee Wemp gave the committee a written statement showing how \$30,000 a year could be saved by using soft coal exclusively. The information will be considered in relation to the coal contracts, which are to be let in June.

The applications of a "reorganized" Latin Day School and Jewess were left over for a special meeting of the committee. A deputation was present from the "reorganized" church.

Exchange of Teachers. Prin. Hutton of University College headed a deputation to the committee which strongly endorsed the exchange for a school year of teachers from Canadian and English schools. Mrs. Ballantyne asked for the co-operation of the board of education in the more milk campaign. The committee reversed last year's policy by deciding to co-operate with the Y.M.C.A. in the use of swimming pools to teach pupils to swim, and a committee to arrange details was appointed.

**TORONTO WOMAN DIES IN EIGHTY-SIXTH YEAR**

Mrs. Edward Galley, one of Toronto's well-known pioneer residents, died yesterday morning at her late residence, 22 Walmer road. Had she lived until tomorrow, she would have celebrated her 88th birthday.

Mrs. Galley and her husband celebrated the 4th anniversary of their wedding day on October 18, last year. She was well known as one of the oldest members of Berkeley Street Methodist Church, she having attended that church for almost half a century.

Mrs. Galley was born in Oshawa, but had lived in Toronto practically all her life. She is survived by her husband, two sons, Richard and W. E., and by two daughters, Mrs. J. Jackman and Mrs. W. L. Edmonds.

**SET STANDARD FOR MOVING PICTURES**

Censor Board's New Regulations Eliminate Undesirable Features in Films.

A statement has been issued by the Ontario board of censors of moving pictures setting forth the standard to which these must conform in the future. Amongst the more important provisions which the board decides that pictures showing a successful banking of the law will not be allowed; nor will misleading pictures dealing with the army, navy or other government departments or pictures which cast reflection on our nation or its traditions. There must be a respectful presentation of all British flags, while the display of foreign flags will be decided by the board. Pictures showing animals being unkindly treated, or being tortured or killed, will not be allowed; pictures dealing with firearms or the display of knives will be carefully considered and passed upon; shocking and unnecessary scenes of violence and struggle scenes will be cut out.

Constructive suggestions, which might be conducive to producing lawlessness or crime will not be permitted. In this category are included pictures depicting methods of saboteering, picketing, raising claims, croaking houses molesting persons, insulting police against authority, wrecking trains, tampering with railway apparatus and other tricks of defeating justice.

Criminal Must be Victim. "The results of crime should always be shown to be disastrous to the criminal and productive of catastrophe, clear and convincing, and the showing of bombs or explosives to be used for the malicious destruction of life or of property will be prohibited" decrees the board.

Scenes of insanity, if gruesome and harrowing, will be eliminated and in no case will scenes of violence, prolonged or instructive scenes of murder or showing of executions will not be allowed.

In regard to costumes the board says: "Each question of costumes or taste must be considered on the basis of taste." No burlesque of any religious organization or its work, funerals, insane asylums, or of hospitals will be permitted, and scenes of well known character of any race or people will be eliminated by the board.

Scenes from underworld. Scenes from the underworld will not be allowed unless these result in some good effect, while scenes depicting smoking and drinking of women will be passed upon by the board having regard to the country portrayed. The board further set out that "scenes will be judged and passed upon as covered by our general standards."

The board will insist that sex problems be treated with seriousness and respect, and that scenes of violence must not be treated improperly or suggestively in a dramatic or comedy theme.

Constructive suggestions of the use of means of illegitimately procuring drugs, narcotics, poisons, etc., will be eliminated. It may be necessary for dramatic purposes to suggest the use of these things, but in no case will they be shown in ways which might give an incentive to imitation.

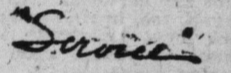

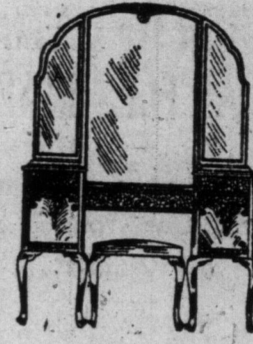

Excitement over school coal and high school appointments almost shattered yesterday's meeting of the management committee of the board of education, but Mrs. Groves, the presiding trustee, succeeded in averting a disruption. The committee broke previous records by sitting for over three hours. "madam president" presiding in a rooming order and appealing to the trustees not to break the quorum until the order paper was cleared.

Rev. F. E. Powell and Senior Principal G. A. Smith had a lively time. Both attempted to hold the floor and speak simultaneously. The senior principal claimed that he had been assailed. The trustee counter-claimed that, as a representative of the people, he had a right to all the information available in high school matters.

Mrs. Groves decided that the trustee had the best right to the floor, and was in order.

Rev. F. E. Powell said that last year he received nothing but insults in his efforts to have the appointments to the Toronto high school staff made from all the applicants, irrespective of domicile, whether residents of Toronto or not, so long as the best qualified applicant was appointed.

Rev. H. A. Berlitz, who strongly supported Rev. F. E. Powell's attitude, brought the content to an end by securing the endorsement by the committee of an instruction to the school principals to send a full list of the names of all applicants with qualifications, to the committee, the principals to report a first, second and third choice.

**Coal Supply Trouble.**

Trustees Wemp, Beris and Miller reviewed the receipt of coal supply trouble. The company which replaced staff with good coal wrote that it had made several good attempts to secure what was considered satisfactory deliveries.

Trustee Wemp gave the committee a written statement showing how \$30,000 a year could be saved by using soft coal exclusively. The information will be considered in relation to the coal contracts, which are to be let in June.

# SET STANDARD FOR MOVING PICTURES

### Censor Board's New Regulations Eliminate Undesirable Features in Films.

A statement has been issued by the Ontario board of censors of moving pictures setting forth the standard to which these must conform in the future. Amongst the more important the board decides that pictures showing a successful killing of the law will not be allowed; nor will misleading pictures dealing with the army, navy or other government departments or pictures which cast reflection on our nation or its traditions. There must be a respectful presentation of all British flags, while the display of foreign flags will be decided by the board. Pictures showing animals being unkindly treated, or being tortured or killed, will not be allowed; pictures dealing with firearms or the display of knives will be carefully considered and passed upon; shocking and unnecessary scenes of violence and struggle scenes will be cut out.

"Constructive suggestions, which might be conducive to producing lawlessness or crime will not be permitted in this category are: pictures showing the use of explosives, the use of dynamite, the use of machinery, the use of tools, the use of firearms, the use of knives, the use of other weapons, the use of any apparatus or device which might be used in the commission of a crime.

"The results of crime should always be shown to be disastrous to the criminal and productive of a catastrophe, clear and convincing, and the showing of bombs or explosives to be used for the malicious destruction of life or property will be prohibited" decrees the board.

Scenes of insanity, if gruesome and threatening, will be eliminated and in no case will suicide be shown. Pictures of a vulgar or indecent nature will not be allowed. Each question of costumes or taste must be considered on the basis of morals.

No burlesque of any religious organization or its work, funerals, insane asylums, or of hospitals will be permitted, and ridicule of well known characteristic of any race or people will be eliminated by the board.

# CRIMINAL MUST BE VICTIM.

"The results of crime should always be shown to be disastrous to the criminal and productive of a catastrophe, clear and convincing, and the showing of bombs or explosives to be used for the malicious destruction of life or property will be prohibited" decrees the board.

Scenes of insanity, if gruesome and threatening, will be eliminated and in no case will suicide be shown. Pictures of a vulgar or indecent nature will not be allowed. Each question of costumes or taste must be considered on the basis of morals.

No burlesque of any religious organization or its work, funerals, insane asylums, or of hospitals will be permitted, and ridicule of well known characteristic of any race or people will be eliminated by the board.

# SCENES FROM UNDERWORLD.

Scenes from the underworld will not be allowed unless these result in some good effect, which scenes depicting smoking and drinking by women will be passed upon by the board having regard to the country portrayed.

The board sets out that "pictures which will be judged and passed upon as covered by our general standards."

"The board will insist that sex problems be seriously and soberly treated, and reserve, indelicacy to marriage ties must not be treated improperly on suggestively in a dramatic or comedy theme."

"Constructive suggestions of the use of means of illegitimately procuring drugs, narcotics, poisons, etc., will be eliminated. It may be necessary for dramatic purposes to suggest the use of these things, but in no case will they be shown in ways which might give an incentive to imitation."

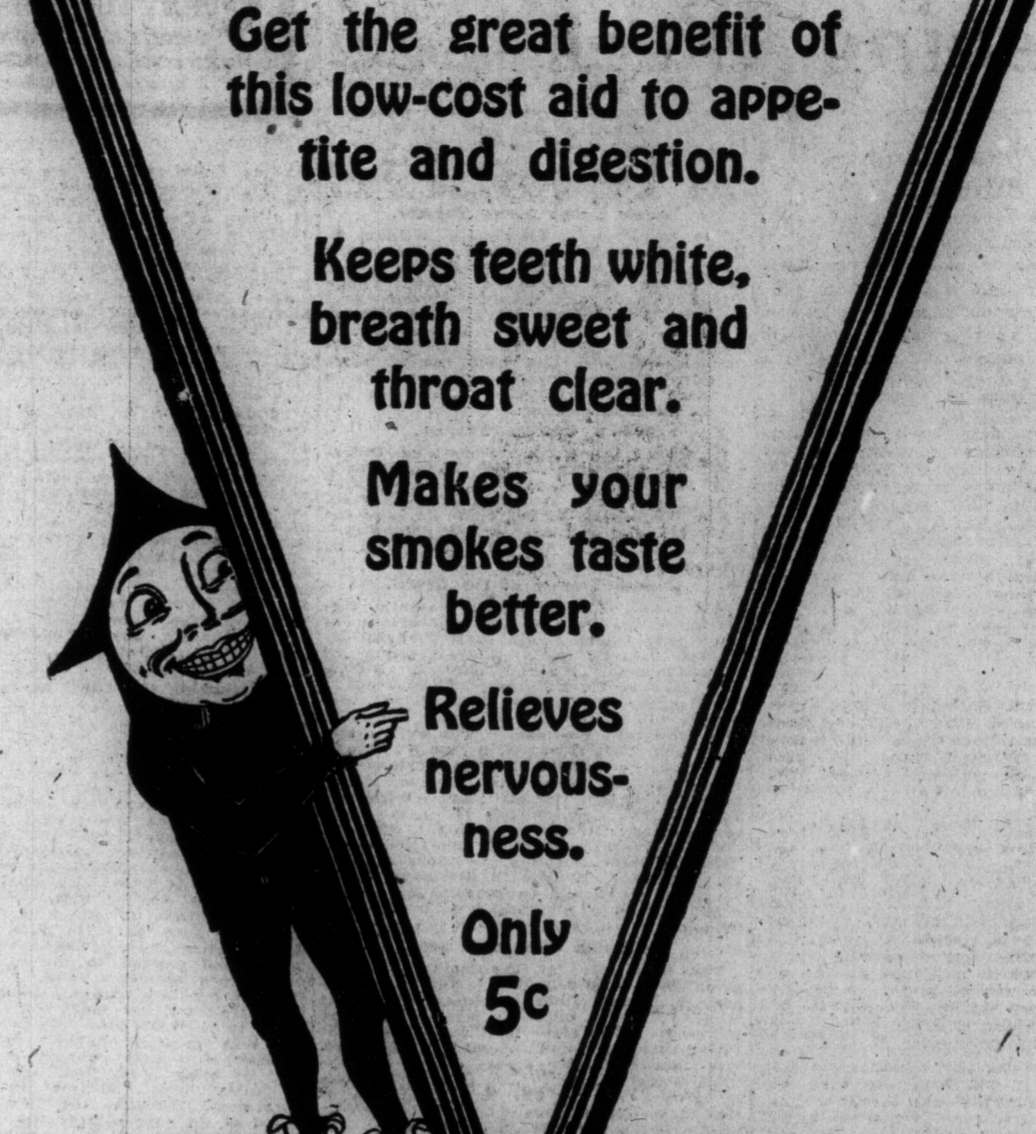

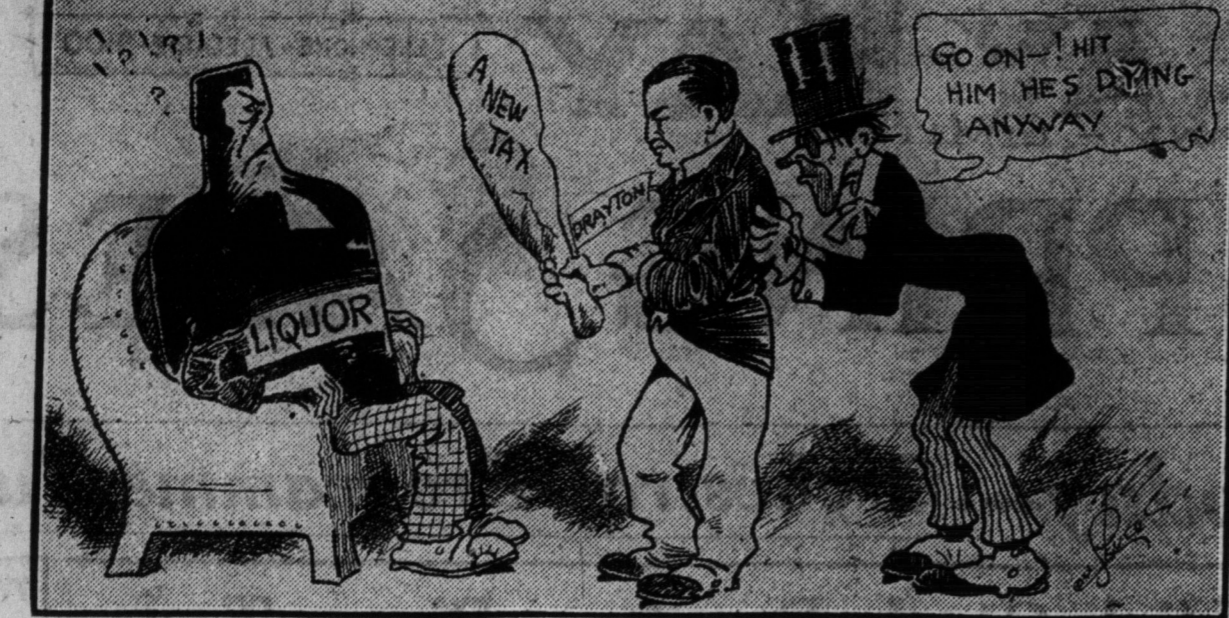

The present revolution proves the wisdom of our decision. The anti-Bolshevik movement will help with propaganda, supplies of food and similar aid, but no military force will ever be attempted again. "Our present desire is to rush food to the area temporarily freed from the Bolsheviki. We do not ask the United States to participate in the situation in any way politically, but by confining itself strictly to humanitarian aid it can do much indirectly to bring about freedom in Russia."

Rather it seems moulded out of the stuff of which the mountains themselves were made, long ago when the world was plastic and empty of all save possibilities. There never was so sinuous a thing as the great wall built by men. I think so sinuous and so aspiring.

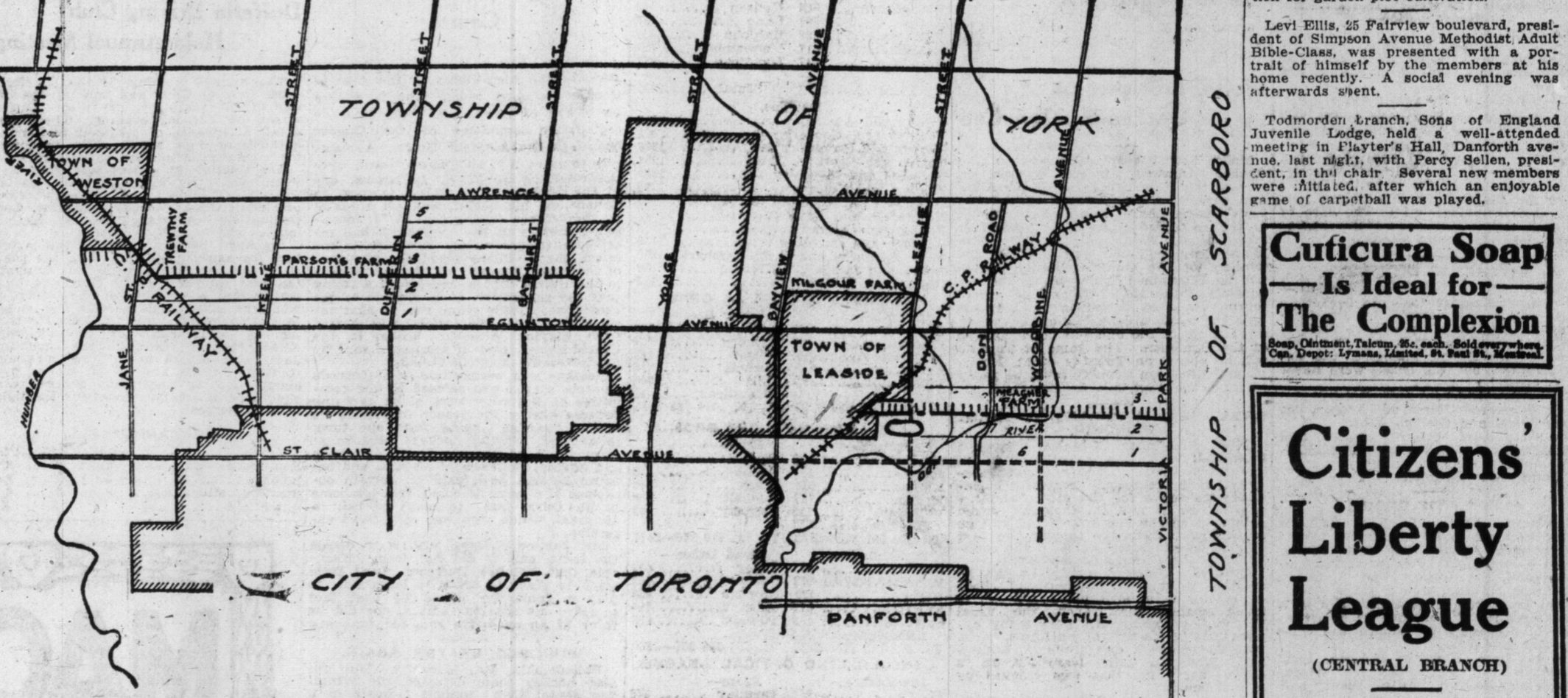

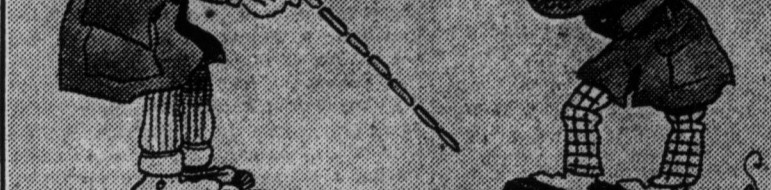

followed by the British government. Debate on the resolution was adjourned by Dr. Michael Steele (South Perth), and the house adjourned at six o'clock.

NEW INSURANCE SCHEME FOR MACHINE WORKERS. Through Canada and the United States the members of the International Association of Machinists, more than 400,000 strong, are taking a vote upon the proposal to insure every member desirous of being insured at the rate of 50 cents a month for every \$500.

Several members opposed maintenance of the embargo on the ground that it placed undesired stigma on Canadian cattle, which had been given a clean bill of health.

Urges Strong Protest. I. B. Pedlow (South Renfrew) moved an amendment, declaring "that the government of Canada should make a strong protest against the reason assigned by the government of Great Britain that Canadian cattle are diseased as an excuse for placing an embargo on live cattle going into the United Kingdom."

Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, regretted that the matter had been taken up in the way it had, by certain men from Canada. He believed they were seriously endangering the chances of getting the embargo removed.

The prime minister further reminded the house that there had been protests by every Canadian government since the embargo was put into effect. Mr. Pedlow's amendment gave the impression such had not been the case. Canada rested her case on a promise given to Sir Robert Borden in 1917 that the embargo would be removed at the end of the war.

The prime minister thought it was not proper for the house to launch a propaganda campaign against a policy followed by the British government.

The debate on the resolution was adjourned by Dr. Michael Steele (South Perth), and the house adjourned at six o'clock.

EMBARGO ON CATTLE APPLE OF DISCORD (Continued From Page 1). Lapointe, Rodolphe Lemieux, and Jacques Bureau, lashed themselves into a high state of indignation over the "slander" and "libel" against Canadian cattle by the British Government.

Mr. Pedlow, liberal member for South Renfrew, whose knowledge of cattle has been gathered in a dry-goods store, proposed as an amendment to Mr. Smith's resolution, calling on the Government to protest against the further continuance of the embargo upon the live ground that Piro-Pneumonia existed in Canada.

Trying for Thirty Years. To this Premier Meighen daily responded that Mr. Pedlow was asking the Government to do the very thing which the Government of Canada had been doing night and day for thirty years. That eminent cattle raiser, Edmond Bristol, of Centre Toronto, said that the Canadian cattle embargo was now a live issue in British Politics and that the Ottawa Government should keep out of it. Frank H. Keeper, the diplomatic cow puncher from York, suggested that the house adjourn for a day or two to cool off and then agree upon the terms of a resolution.

He was followed by Doctor Michael Steele from the South Perth ranch, who had not proceeded far before the house, under the Wednesday rule, adjourned at six o'clock leaving the cattle embargo very much up in the air.

The general sense of the house seemed to be that Great Britain had a perfect right to protect her own cattle raisers by a high tariff or some other embargo, but that she had no right to maintain the embargo upon the ground that disease existed among the Canadian cattle. Most of the members were probably in the position of "Nobby" White, a Liberal M.P. from Alberta who said he had never imported or exported cattle, but took it for granted that the lifting of the embargo would be a good thing or so many cattle raisers in Canada would not be clamoring for it.

A Blessing in Disguise. Mr. Smith, mover of the original motion, was emphatic in saying that the embargo was a blessing in disguise and that its removal would be injurious to this country. He said that years ago as member of the house he had protested against the stigma placed upon Canadian cattle by the embargo and had moved a resolution requesting the British government to send experts to Canada to examine and report upon the health of our cattle. None the less he thought it was altogether undesirable for Canadian farmers to ship store cattle for finishing to another country. Let the cattle be finished in Canada, slaughtered in the shape of dead meat. It need not be frozen meat, because the government could establish a great abattoir at Halifax. In short, he wanted the "national policy" applied to the cattle and meat business.

Donald Sutherland supported Mr. Smith's argument, but Hon. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, saw a great difficulty in our western ranches fattening and finishing stockers in this country under the handicap of severe climatic conditions.

Favors No Change. Ottawa, March 9.—(Canadian Press).—The British embargo on Canadian cattle and the translation of French speeches in the house of commons into English were the two items which held attention in the house today. The latter question was raised on a resolution moved by Joseph Archambault (Chambly-Vercheres), which proposed that speeches delivered in the French language should be translated and published in a special sheet of Hansard every Monday. The motion was adopted.

The cattle embargo question provided an interesting discussion. W. Smith (South Ontario) fathered the resolution, which favored no change from

### RADIAL COMMISSION RESTS TWO MORE WEEKS

#### Lawyers Deny That Any Time Has Been Really Wasted— Counsel for Pro-Radial Municipalities Desired Adjourning to Prepare His Case—Anxious to Avoid Calling "Experts," Who May Not Know Anything of Situation

According to the lawyers in the case, the Sutherland Radial Commission has been the busiest, most energetic commission ever seen in this province, has literally worked the lawyers almost to death to keep pace with its "busy" term of office, and any criticism to the contrary is wholly unjustified and unwarranted.

All this interesting information was brought out at the close of the session yesterday afternoon when Robert McKay, K.C., pro-radial municipalities' counsel, asked for a two weeks' adjournment in order to have time to prepare his case before proceeding any further.

The commissioners were visibly shocked at the thought of another long adjournment, but when the attention to the fact that they had already been severely criticized in the press for the way matters had been delayed and the inquiry prolonged, they were unable to resist.

"I cannot understand why, with so much ahead of us an adjournment of two weeks should be made," said Justice Sutherland, "a week should be enough."

#### One Week Not Enough.

"I can only say that an adjournment of only one week would be quite impossible as far as I am concerned," said Mr. McKay. "I am not going to bring alleged experts from Chicago, New York and other parts of the United States only to find out when they get here that they don't know anything. I am going to find out whether witnesses I bring here know anything about the matter instead of bringing witnesses here to waste the time of the commission. Since September this inquiry has been sitting 105 days, including days that were not legitimate working days. It has taken two-thirds of my time, and has not given me any time in which to prepare a case and obtain witnesses."

"There has been much adverse criticism in all the newspapers about the way the commission is supposed to be delaying matters, and as the rural member of the commission, I have to bear the brunt of it all," said Commissioner Amos. "The people in the country do not get to know the reasons of these delays, and do not understand why matters are prolonged."

"I will say that never in my experience have I been so hard driven as by this commission," said Mr. McKay. "If do not regret it as a reflection on the commission, but say it merely to show what a fast pace has been set."

"I have also been hard driven," said Mr. Helmuth. "And might say that the commission has sat with much regularity and that any delay experienced has been much against the members' wishes; and yet if you read any of the newspapers you will read that the commissioners are practically doubling their time away and trying to lengthen things out."

### EX-CROWN COUNSEL MUST GIVE DETAILS

#### How Was \$50,000 Spent During the Timber Investigation?

#### R. T. Harding on Stand

Denies He Discussed Case in Any Way With the Commissioners.

Former Crown Counsel Harding was again examined before the public accounts committee yesterday as to an item of \$50,000 paid to him in connection with the timber investigation. Despite a long examination, however, but very little information was elicited and an adjournment was taken to give him an opportunity of preparing a detailed statement of his expenditures.

To the attorney-general, Mr. Harding said that never at any time did the government know the source of the information on which the timber inquiry was started, and never had he told the attorney-general that he was acting for J. H. Callahan of Port Arthur.

#### Callahan Retained Him.

To R. L. Brackin, witness said Callahan retained him to collect all information he could in reference to the irregularities of the Shevlin-Clark Co. at Port Frances. He was then to go to the attorney-general and see if he could get a commission issued.

Mr. Harding produced a letter, dated May 7, 1920, from the provincial treasurer, saying the government would include a sum of \$10,000 in the further supplementary estimates covering expenses in connection with the timber inquiry. Mr. Harding said he took this letter to the Home Bank and, on the strength of it, received \$10,000, which he placed in a trust account.

#### When Some of it Went.

Witness submitted a statement of moneys he had paid out, including \$4,240 to J. M. McEvoy, one of the counsel at the probe, and \$2,104 to T. L. Jones, an accountant. Then an item of \$2,000, he admitted, went to Justice Riddell on account of fees.

"You knew at the time of the new building at Ottawa?" asked Hon. G. H. Ferguson.

"I knew from the newspapers," Mr. Harding replied.

"Hon. Mr. Ferguson was interested in an item of \$108 for the Employment Defective Agency, and asked: 'That was not for the gentleman who gumshoed around after me last summer, was it?'"

Mr. Harding: "Did you have some?"

"Upon my word of honor I do not know," Mr. Harding said. "I had three conversations of mine," said Mr. Harding.

#### Left Trail Behind.

Mr. Harding explained that the item covered expenses of a man selected by Supt. Rogers of the provincial police, and sent to Port Arthur and Sudbury.

A statement submitted by Mr. Harding showed that Peter White, K.C., received \$2,500 on Nov. 4. The only amount which Mr. Harding said he had received was \$2,000 in August last. This was all he got out of the item of \$50,000 shown in public accounts.

#### Never Discussed Case.

"Now, Mr. Harding, I want you to be frank," said Mr. Ferguson. "As Justice Riddell says, I want you to do yourself justice. Now, what I want to know is: Did you ever discuss the evidence that was to be brought before them?"
