*A cheap and excellent wine.*—To six gallons of new cider add two gallons of brandy, or that in proportion. Let the brandy be well mixed with the cider, and the cask be kept full by filling up, during the fermentation. At the end of six or eight weeks, you will have a liquor, which will not cost more than a quarter of a dollar by the gallon, possessing much the taste and sensible qualities of wine, and inferior hardly to none.

*Mustard.*—Mustard quickens the appetite, warms the stomach, assists in digesting hard meats, and dries up the superfluous moisture. It seldom agrees with weak stomachs.

*Pickling Pork.*—The following is the method formerly practised for baconing, or pickling pork, by the famous buccaniers of America. First, they cut the flesh into long pieces about an inch and a half thick; and after sprinkling it with salt, and suffering it to remain in that state for 24 hours, these slices were next dried in stoves till they acquired a bony hardness, and a deep brown colour. Pork treated in this manner, if packed in casks, may be preserved for upwards of a whole year; and when soaked in luke warm water, becomes plump, and has a rosy appearance. It likewise possesses a grateful flavor under the various forms of cookery, and is relished by the most delicate palate.



**Rice Jelly.**—This is one of the most nourishing preparations of rice, particularly for valetudinarians or convalescents. It is thus made: Boil a quarter of a pound of rice flour, with half a pound of loaf sugar, in a quart of water, till the whole becomes one uniform gelatinous mass; then strain off the jelly and let it stand to cool. A little of this salubrious food eaten at a time, will be found very beneficial to those of a weakly and infirm constitution.

**To cleanse the Teeth and to improve the breath.**—To four ounces of fresh prepared lime water add a drachm of Peruvian bark, and wash the teeth with this water in the morning before breakfast, and after supper. It will effectually destroy the tartar, and remove the offensive smell from those which have most decayed.

**Cure for Dysentery.**—A friend has communicated the following, as a cure for that terrible complaint, the Dysentery, which is so apt to prevail at the warm season of the year. He says he has repeatedly tried it, with the fullest success; "Take the yolk of three eggs, two ounces loaf sugar, one gill brandy, and one nutmeg, grated, the whole to be incorporated together.—For a grown person, a teaspoonful every two or three hours—a proportionably less quantity for children.

A lady who has found the following remedy for the prevention of bed bugs, wishes to make it public. After cleansing the bedstead thoroughly, rub it over with hog's lard. The lard should be rubbed on with a woollen cloth. Bugs will not infest such a bedstead for a whole season.

**To make Economical Wicks for Lamps.**—When using a lamp with a flat wick, if you will take a piece of clean stocking or other cotton rag, and shape and adapt it to the tub or receptacle for the wick, it will answer the purpose as well as the cotton wicks which are sold in the shops.

**Flies.**—We are told that the following recipe is as efficacious for the destruction of flies as solutions of arsenic, mercury and other poisons; and has the advantage of not endangering the lives and health of the human species if incautiously swallowed:—Dissolve two drachms of the extract of prussia in half a pint of boiling water, add a little sugar or syrup, pour the mixture on plates, and set them in places infested by these insects.

**Easy method of preserving animal food sweet for several days in the height of summer.**—Veal, mutton, beef, or venison, may be kept for nine or ten days perfectly sweet and good in the heat of summer, by lightly covering the same with bran, and hanging it in a high and windy room; therefore, a cupboard full of small holes, or a wire safe, so as the wind may have a passage through, is recommended to be placed in such a room, to keep away the flies.

**To sweeten meat, fish, &c. that is tainted.**—When meat, fish, &c. from intense heat, or long keeping, are likely to pass into a state of corruption, a simple and pure mode of keeping them sound and healthful is, by putting a few pieces of charcoal, each the size of an egg, into the pot or saucepan, wherein the fish or flesh are to be boiled. Among others, an experiment of this kind was tried upon a turbot, which appeared too far gone to be eatable; the cook, as advised, put three or four pieces of charcoal, each the size of an egg, under the strainer, in the fish kettle; after boiling the proper time, the turbot came to table perfectly sweet and firm.

**To remove the taste of turnips from milk or butter.**—The taste of the turnip is easily taken off milk and butter, by dissolving a little nitre in spring water, which being kept in a bottle, and put a small tea-spoon full into eight gallons of milk, when warm from the cow, entirely removes any taste or flavor of the turnip.

**Bottling Cider.**—When you draw off cider for bottling you may probably prevent the bursting of the bottles by setting them on the ground in the northerly part of your cellar and covering them with moss.—This moss you will be careful to keep wet with cold water, drenching it from a water pot every 8 or 10 days, during the warm season.

**Remedies.**—For the gout, toast and water; for bile, exercise; for corns, easy shoes; for rheumatism, new flannel and patience; for the tooth ache, pluck it out; and for love, matrimony.

**Cure for the Influenza.**—Drink very plentifully of barley water sweetened with brown sugar, and strongly impregnated with an acid ; and observe strict temperance in your diet.

**Sundry Hints.**—Finish the transportation of wood, timber, plaister, and other heavy articles, while there is good sledding ; and kill your pork, if you have not done it already. Look well to your barns, your wood pile, your store pigs and poultry. Visit your cattle yourself—trust not your boy, however faithful he may be. Fodder them twice in the morning, and twice at night, if you would have them thrive. If your fodder is poor, sprinkle it with brine, which will improve it much. Let your cows and ewes, forward with young, be fed with corn, potatoes, or turnips. Give your hens a little slackened lime, or pulverized brick, to form the shell, and you will have a plenty of eggs which will make your bacon palatable. Get out your flax—let not the music of the spinning wheel cease for the want of it. Cut scions for grafting, and put them in your cellar. If you have not learned the best method of grafting, read some of the best books for direction.

**To preserve Game in hot weather.**—Game or poultry may be preserved for a long time, by tying a string tight round the neck, so as to exclude the air, and by putting a piece of charcoal in the vent.

**Maple Sugar.**—This sugar, made with care, is superior to much that is imported. It should gratify our love of country, to spread our tables with the fruits of our own soil, which were raised by our industry, and for which we are dependent on none but our Maker. Improve therefore, the season for making sugar as soon as it arrives, and with as little expense of wood as possible.

**Cows.**—Keep no more cows than you can keep well. One cow well fed will give as much milk as two treated indifferently, and produce more butter. If a cow be wintered badly, she will rarely recover during the summer so as to become profitable to the owner. Cows should by all means be kept under a shelter in extreme weather; particularly those which give milk, or a failure in the quantity of milk will be experienced. Sweet potatoes, carrots, pumpkins, and ground oats, are unquestionably among the best articles of food for milch cattle. These cause the milk and butter to assume a fine flavor and a rich color, and at the same time the quantity and quality are greatly increased.

**Chopped Hay.**—Let every good farmer provide for himself a cutting machine. The saving of hay in a season of scarcity will be very great. It is said, that 15 pounds of cut hay are as good as 20 pounds in the common way.

**Preservation of the apple tree.**—Take nearly in these proportions: Of lime, three pounds—soap, one pound—cow dung, six—ashes, one—salt, one—brimstone, a quarter of a pound—mix them into a soft mortar. Rub this composition freely over your trees with a mop. Then the wood lice will die, the tree hold its apples, and the wood pecker will not touch it. The powerful effects of this composition will soon be visible. The month of April is the best time to try it. It will be well to scrape off the rough bark of the tree, before the composition is applied, taking care not to wound it.

**Cure for poisoned sheep and cattle.**—Raw eggs, given to sheep or cattle poisoned by eating laurel or ivy, will effect a speedy cure. The dose for a sheep is one egg; for a cow, four. When used for this purpose, the shell of the egg is broken, and the yolk with as much of the white as is practicable, is slipped down the animal's throat.

**Seed, Grain.**—Let farmers be careful in preparing seed grain, for they will reap a great advantage in doing so. The most approved mode of preparing wheat, rye, oats or barley, is to soak it from 12 to 24 hours in a strong brine, having salt petre put in, and immediately before sowing, to mix with it enough lime, plaister, or wood ashes, to make it so dry that it may be sown evenly. A crop of flax may be greatly increased by mixing with the seed an equal quantity of fine salt, and sowing it.

**Fences.**—While repairing your fences, remember that a fence well made will stand a dozen times as long as that which is poorly made. While you drive your business before you, and do your work well, all will be easy; but suffer it to lag, or slight it, and soon it becomes a grievous burden.

**Potatoe.**—This vegetable is one of the greatest benefits bestowed on man. It furnishes food in a variety of dishes, a sweet sirrup, sugar, and vinegar, serves to fatten a great number of animals, and is the best preservative against scarcity. We therefore request our fellow farmers, to read over what has been heretofore said on the manner of raising potatoes, and pay particular attention to the culture of them.

**Indian Corn.**—A word by way of recalling the cultivation of this plant to the memory may not be amiss. To prevent squirrels from pulling it up, mix with it a little tar after it has been soaked in brine, after which put with it plaister, lime, or ashes. Judge Peters, of Pennsylvania, recommends the harrow instead of the plough in the culture of corn, and we believe in weeding, especially in a light and mellow soil, there can be no doubt of the correctness of this opinion. As a general rule, perhaps harrowing at weeding, and ploughing at half billing and billing will prove most advantageous modes of cultivation, provided the last hoeing is finished before the fibrous roots of the corn are spread so far as to be injured by the plough. After your corn is hoed the first time, place about each hill a handful of ashes or gypsum; or, some say, a mixture of both.

**Caterpillars.**—Destroy utterly every caterpillar—leave no nest undemolished on your fruit trees. This may be done by burning brimstone under their nests,— by sprinkling ashes or fine sand on them and the limbs where they are, when wet—or by putting a mop or wisp of tow on a pole and brushing their nests with brine.

**Cabbages.**—The seed should be sown about the 20th of April, that they may be transplanted the 20th of May. The ground should be well mellowed and manured. Hoe them in the morning while the dew is on, once every week until they begin to head. Do not pull them, till there is danger of their freezing fast in the ground—an early snow will do them no injury. When removed from the garden set them out again in a trench dug in the bottom of your cellar.

**Gure for Cancers.**—Take the root of the dock, boil it until soft, then use it by way of a poultice, taking care to renew the application two or three times in a day. This simple remedy has effected an entire cure.

**Hops.**—The bitter taste of the hop seems as unpalatable to our farmers, as salt to the Californians. But hop beer improves on acquaintance like the muskmelon. I wish to see every garden ornamented with a few hills of them. The hills should be 7 feet apart, having two roots of the last year's growth in a hill, and one half of the ground may be occupied for vegetables the first year. The second year place one, two, or three poles 14 feet long, to a hill, and carefully tie 2 aprons to a pole. When the vine has grown up, and its top is seen waving above the top of the pole, clip the end of it off. They require as faithful hoeing and manuring as corn. They are no friends to weeds.

**Good Coffee of Rye.**—Wash the rye clean; boil it till soft; but take care that the kernels do not burst. Then dry it, and burn it like coffee; grind it and it is fit for use. It may be infused and boiled in the usual way; but if coffee is required equal to Mocha, half of this powder added to an equal quantity of real coffee gives a beverage fit for the Grand Turk.

**Cutting of rye.**—This subject is of such importance that we cannot omit our endeavours to impress it on the minds of the community. Rye should be cut as soon as possible after the milk is out of the berry or kernel; then bind it in small sheaves and shock them thus; set 4 or 5 according to their size, together, then place on a cap sheaf. Let them stand till perfectly dry, and then secure them in a barrack or on a scaffold, not on a mow or hay. Rye cut and secured in this way is worth nearly double the price of that which is managed in the common way, and the straw is excellent fodder.

**Ardent Spirits.**—Drink not a drop of them, even in the hurrying season of the year, unless advised to do so by your physician. The experience of many proves, that men feel stronger, can perform more labour, and endure the heat better without this sparkling poison than with it. Instead of it drink beer, milk, cider, water gruel, sweetened water. If you let ardent spirits alone, you will be more likely to enjoy health—your children will probably be sober, strong, and healthy without it.

**Cure for Wens.**—A planter in Raleigh, (N. C.) afflicted some years with a wen on his neck which grew to a considerable size, was cured by washing it two or three times in a day with salt water—water, in which salt had been dissolved. To his great relief, the wen gradually decreased, and finally disappeared.

**Cider.**—Apples which fall early should be gathered and made into cider for immediate use and for vinegar. Suffer the full apples to hang on the trees till ripe, then gather them; and keep them housed until they are mellow. They should be sorted before they are ground, and all dirt and rotten apples removed. Let the mill, press, and vats, barrels, &c. be clean and sweet. The juice should stand in the pomace 12 hours at least, which will give the cider a higher colour and render it richer. As soon as the cider is worked let it be racked, and put in clean casks or bottles.

**Beer.**—To refine and clarify it, put into a barrel of beer a piece of burnt chalk of the size of a hen's egg, and it will be brisk to the last.

**Cutting of Bushes.**—We see, with regret, pastures in many parts of our land overspread with a noxious growth of shrubbery and weeds, which destroy much of the feed. That all vegetables may be subdued by repeatedly cutting them, is a position which does not rest on mere theory; more than 20 years' experience has removed every doubt from my mind. The whole success of this business depends on cutting them at the proper season. If we would destroy the plant, and prevent its future growth, we must cut it when the root is most exhausted. This is just before the fruit ripens. Therefore weeds, brakes, thistles and bushes, should be cut at different seasons according to the maturing of the plants.

**Beef.**—Six quarts of good coarse salt is enough for a barrel of beef killed late in the fall, provided you mix with it three fourths of a pound of salt petre, and three pints or two quarts of molasses. In the spring, take up the beet and boil the brine—then put on as much salt as you please—it will not harden. It is surprising that so many throw on a whole bushel of salt in the fall, for the sake of making beef as hard as a lap stone, when with so little expense it may be kept as tender as fresh steak.

**T**HE Falls are level (or still water) about three hours and an half on the Flood, and about two hours and an half on the ebb, which makes it passable four times in 24 hours, about 10 or 15 minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the river St. John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

**S**AMBRO Island and Light House is in latitude 44 deg. 30 min. N. and longitude 63 deg. 32 min. W.

From the westward, bring the light to bear N. E. ; if it bears more easterly stretch to the southward till it bears N. E. and as much more northerly as you please, there being no shoal or ledge to the southward; then keep it open on your larboard bow; give it more than a mile and a half birth, as much more as you please.

Note—The western ledges lie from the light S. W. distant two miles, the other W. S. W. about one league; the eastern ledges lie in a range nearly, some above water; the outermost one mile and a half from the light, bearing from it E. N. E.

When the light bears north, distant about 2 miles, run N. E. 4 miles, then north will carry you to Chebucto Head, at a proper distance clear of all danger.

When a breast of Chebucto Head, run N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. for the south point of George's Island.

When within half a mile of George's Island, you may enter the harbour west of it in 12 fathoms, or east of it in 15.

In passing between Sandwich point and Meagher's beach, run nearest the point, to shun a shoal which runs off S. W. from the beach.

There is also a shoal lying one mile south of Sandwich point.

Coming from the eastward, run for the light, and you cannot fail seeing Chebucto Head as you open Halifax harbour; the light being 4 miles distant from the Head to the S. W.

*On the Cultivation of the Annual Sunflower.*—Sir, allow me to recommend, through the medium of your useful miscellany, the cultivation of the annual sunflower, as possessing the advantages of furnishing an abundance of fodder for cattle, in their leaves. When, also, they are in bloom, the bees fly to them to gather sweets. The seed is valuable for feeding sheep, pigs, &c. It produces a striking effect on poultry, in occasioning them to lay more eggs than usual; the dry stalks burn well, and the ashes afford a considerable quantity of alkali.—*English Magazine.*

*Mode of marking Sheep without injury to the wool.*—An English writer gives the following:—Mark on either side of the nose of the sheep, the initials of the owner's name, and on the opposite side any number by which he may choose to designate the particular sheep, by means of a small iron letter or figure about an inch long; which being dipped in common oil colours, mixed with turpentine to dry them more readily, is placed on the part described, and will continue until the next shearing season. The process is easy, and will give the animal no pain; the marks cannot be readily obliterated, which is not the case with tattooing or cauterizing.

*Chapped or sore lips.*—May be healed by the frequent application of honey water, and protecting them as much as possible from the influence of cold air.

*Obstinate Ulcers.*—May sometime, be cured with sugar dissolved in a strong decoction of walnut leaves.

**Sore Throat.**—Let the throat be steamed with hot water, in which hops are infused, and apply the hops after having been scalded for some time externally to the diseased part of the throat.

**Cure for Corns.**—A gentleman who may be relied on, informs us he has found the juice obtained by bruising green bean leaves, a certain and effectual cure for corns. It should be applied to the corn at night, for four or five nights successively. It is equally efficacious when applied to warts.

**Codfish.**—Dun, or dried codfish, ought not to be boiled to make it tender; it operates as on an egg, an oyster or a clam, the more you boil it the harder it grows. Let it simmer on or near the fire, in a kettle, two or three hours, according as the fish is hard, and then change the water; and, before dishing, put this up to near boiling heat, but not higher. This management does not draw out, but revives the glutinous, and enlivens the nutritious substance in them, and leaves the fish tender and nutritious.

**Sore backs in horses.**—Whitelead, moistened with milk or sweet oil, has been recommended as the most effective application in the above complaint.

**Feather Beds.**—The want of feathers is altogether artificial, arising from a disregard of the physical and moral well being of infants and children; and he who has the good fortune never to have been accustomed to a feather bed, will never in health need or desire one, nor in sickness, except in cases of great morbid irritation, or excessive sensibility, or some disease in which the pressure of a firm or elastic substance might occasion pain. But when a rational regard to the preservation of health shall pervade the community, feathers will no more be used without necessity, or medical advice, than ardent spirits will be swallowed without the same necessity or advice. The physician has frequent occasion to see persons who are heated, sweated, and enfeebled by sleeping on feathers, as if from a fit of sickness, enervated, dispirited, relaxed and miserable.

**Economical and safe way of making Soap.**—To 12 gallons of ley, strength just sufficient to bear an egg, add 16 lbs of melted grease, which by being placed in the hot sun, and occasionally stirred, will in a few days produce a soap of the best quality.

*Exemplary instance of Justice in the King of Prussia.*

One John Michael Arnold, a miller, had bought the lease of a mill, belonging to the estate of Count Schmettau of Pommerzig, situated in the New Marche of Brandenburg, near the city of Custrin, and known in that province under the name of the Pommerziger Krieb's Mill. This mill, at the time when Mr. Arnold bought the lease of it, was plentifully supplied with water, by a rivulet which empties itself into the river Warta. During six years, Mr. Arnold had made various improvements in the said mill, and, by means of his labour and industry, had been enabled to pay his rent regularly, and to acquire a sufficiency for the maintenance of his family. At the end of that period, about four years ago, the proprietor of the said mill resolved to enlarge a fish pond contiguous to his seat, and caused a canal to be cut from the said rivulet, at a small distance above the mill, to supply his fish pond with water. By these means the current of the stream was lessened, and the quantity of water so much diminished, that the mill could no longer do the usual work.

The miller had foreseen the event, and from the beginning had remonstrated against the cutting of the canal. But his remonstrances, as well as his solicitations for cancelling the lease, proving in vain, he was at last forced to seek redress in a court of judicature at Custrin, to whose cognizance the affair belonged: but his lord being a man of fortune and consequence in that province, soon found means to frustrate his endeavours. He continued to enlarge his fish pond, so that the miller, instead of finding redress, found his water daily decreasing to such a degree, that at last he could only work during two or three weeks in spring, and about as many in the latter part of the year.

Under these circumstances, the miller could no longer procure his livelihood, and pay his rent, and consequently became indebted to his lord for a considerable sum. The latter, in order to obtain his rent, entered a suit against him in the same court of law at Custrin, which had before refused relief to the miller, and soon obtained a sentence against the miller's effects: which sentence being approved of and ratified in the High

Court of Appeals at Berlin, was into execution. The miller's utensils, goods, and chattles, were seized, and sold, in order to pay arrears of rent, and the expences of most iniquitous lawsuit; and thus poor Arnold and his family were reduced to want and wretchedness.

A glaring injustice of that kind could not pass unnoticed by so friends to humanity, who well knew the benevolent and equitable intentions of their sovereign. They advised and assisted the miller to lay a case before the king. His Majesty, struck with the simplicity of the narrative, and the injustice that apparently been committed, resolved to inquire minutely into this affair, and if the miller's assertions were founded in truth, to punish, in an exemplary manner, the authors and movers of such an unjust sentence.

The king accordingly made inquiries, and the informations he received corroborated the miller's narrative. His majesty afterwards ordered the Register of his High Court of Appeals also all the memorials and pleadings of the said lawsuit, to be laid before him, which he revised himself, assisted by an eminent lawyer; and nothing might be wanting, his majesty sent a person of confidence to Custrin, with orders to survey the mill, the rivulet, and the new canal; also to inquire into the miller's character, his former situation in the true cause of his failure, and other circumstances attending the affair. And after being fully convinced, as well from the report of said commissioner, as also from papers laid before him, that the sentence against the said miller was an act of the most singular justice and oppression, his majesty immediately dictated and signed resolutions thereupon.

On the next day the king, his high chancellor, baron F. also Messrs. Christ, Eman. Henry Lewis Graun, and J. Ransleben, the three counsellors in law, who, together with the chancellor, had signed the said sentence, into his presence, and on their arrival his majesty put the following questions to them:

Question II.

Can a like sentence be pronounced  
upon a miller for non payment of  
rent for a mill, after the water, which  
used to turn his mill, is wilfully taken  
from him by the proprietor of the  
mill?

They all answered in the negative.

“Then (said the king) you have,  
yourselves acknowledged the injus-  
tice you have committed.—Here is  
the case:—A nobleman, in order to  
enlarge his fish pond, has caused a  
canal to be cut, to receive more wa-  
ter from a rivulet which used to turn  
a mill. By these means the miller  
lost his water, and could not work his  
mill about a fortnight in spring, and  
about as many days in autumn;—  
notwithstanding, it is expected that  
he shall pay his rent as before, when  
his mill was plentifully supplied with  
water; but as that was out of his  
power, from the impossibility of pur-  
suing his trade, the court of justice at  
Custrin decreed, that the miller's ef-  
fects, goods, and chattles, should be  
sold, to pay the arrears of rent; which  
sentence being sent to the High Court  
of Appeals here, is confirmed and  
signed by you, and has since been  
executed.”

Here the king ordered the sentence  
with their respective signatures, to be  
laid before them, and afterwards  
commanded his private secretary to  
read the resolutions which his Majes-  
ty had dictated to him, and signed  
before, and which are as follow :

“The sentence decreed against the  
miller Arnold, of the Pomortzger  
Kerbs Mill, in the new Marche of  
Brandenburg, being an act of the  
most singular injustice; and entirely  
opposite to the paternal intentions of  
his majesty, whose desire it is that  
impartial justice be speedily adminis-  
tered to all his subjects, whether rich  
or poor, without any regard to their  
rank or persons; his majesty, in order  
to prevent similar iniquities for the  
future, is resolved to punish, in an ex-  
emplary manner, the authors of that  
unjust sentence, and to establish an  
example for the future conduct of

judges and magistrates in his domi-  
nions. For they all are to consider,  
that the meanest peasant, nay, even  
the beggar, is a man, as well as the  
king, and consequently equally en-  
titled to impartial justice; especially  
as in the presence of justice all are  
equal, whether it be a prince who  
bring a complaint against a peasant,  
or a peasant who prefers one against  
a prince; in similar cases justice  
should act uniformly, without any re-  
spect to rank or person.—This  
ought to be an universal rule for the  
conduct of judges; and if the courts  
of law in his majesty's dominions  
should ever deviate from this princi-  
ple of equity, they may depend upon  
being severely punished. For an un-  
just magistrate, or a court of law,  
guilty of wrong, and subservient to  
oppression, are more dangerous than  
a band of robbers, against whom any  
man may be on his guard; but bad  
men entrusted with authority, who  
under the cloak of justice practise  
their iniquities, are not so easily guar-  
ded against; they are the worst of  
villains, and deserve double punish-  
ment.

“The king, at the same time, here-  
by signifies to all his courts of law,  
that he has appointed a new high  
chancellor, and that his majesty will  
be very exact for the future in the  
examination of his, and of their pro-  
ceedings. They are, moreover, here-  
by strictly commanded :

I. To bring all law suits to the  
speediest conclusion.

“II. Carefully to avoid that the  
sacred name of justice may never be  
profaned by acts of oppression and  
injustice; and

“III. To act with the most abso-  
lute impartiality towards every one,  
whether prince or peasant, without  
the least regard to situations in life.

“And in case his majesty should  
find their proceedings in any ways  
contrary to the above orders, they  
may depend upon a rigorous punish-  
ment; the president, as well as the  
respective judges and counsellors, who  
shall be found guilty of, or accessory  
to, any sentence directly opposite to  
the fundamental principles of justice.  
Whereof all the courts of law in all  
his majesty's dominions are to take  
notice.

 diate order to Custis, for the presi-

 under the direction of Baron de Zed-  
 litz, minister of state, to proceed  
 against them all according to law.

His majesty, in consideration of  
 the said injustice, has prevented the  
 miller Arnold with the sum of fifteen  
 hundred rix dollars. He also ordered,  
 that a sum equal to that produced by  
 the sale of the miller's effects, be  
 stopped and paid to him from the sal-  
 aries due to the respective judges,  
 &c. who had any share in that unjust  
 sentence; and has, moreover, con-  
 demned the proprietor of the mill to  
 reimburse to the miller all the rent  
 he had received, from the time when  
 he first opened the canal.

Maria de Macos, daughter of a master carpenter, had for  
 many years been afflicted with weeping eyes, which dischar-  
 ged an acrimonious fluid, that brought on an almost total  
 loss of sight. Alteratives were prescribed to no purpose,  
 nor could a course of mercury procure the smallest allevia-  
 tion. At length he made a strong decoction of chamomile  
 boiled in sweet cow's milk; with this, the patient bathed  
 her eyes several times a day, as warm as it could be suffer-  
 ed without uneasiness, and in about five weeks her eye  
 were perfectly cured.

**A good Bread.**—A mixture of two parts flour and one  
 potatoe, makes an agreeable bread, which cannot be distin-  
 guished from wheaten bread. It is said that 300 tons of  
 potatoes are consumed in London for this purpose every  
 week.
