## ANNUAL MEETING,

February 21st, 1889.

The Annual Meeting of the Grande Ligne Mission was held the 21st February, at 3 P.M., in the French Baptist Church, Montreal.

Rev. A. G. Upham, President, in the Chair.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and approved.

After discussion arising from the Minutes as to the position of the estate of the late Rev. Louis Roussy, now in the hands of the Executors, it was moved that a committee, consisting of Messrs. A. A. Ayer, C. S. J. Phillips and J. Richards be appointed to confer with the executors of the Roussy Estate, with the view of offering to pay off the indebtedness of the same in order that the property may be transferred to the Grande Ligne Mission, as it is the opinion of the Mission that the farms should be sold, and the proceeds thereof invested, in order that the Mission may derive the greatest possible revenue therefrom.

The President read letters from several brethren in Ontario, who had been invited to attend, expressing warm interest in the Mission and regretting unavoidable absence.

Mr. Geo. B. Muir read the Amended Act of Incorporation as passed by the Provincial Legislature in Quebec, July 12, 1888, which, upon motion, was unanimously accepted. (See Appendix for Act.)

The amendments to the Constitution proposed at the last Annual Meeting were then considered clause by clause, and the Constitution and By-Laws as printed in the Appendix were adopted.

The Annual Report was then read by the Secretary, Rev. T. Lafleur. It was moved, seconded and resolved, that it be made ready for publication by the Secretary, with the assistance of the President, and Messrs. Muir and Bentley.

The Report of the Treasurer, Mr. J. Richards, was then presented and adopted.

The Treasurer of the Building and Endowment Fund, Mr. J. McKergow, then stated that thus far \$18,500 have been subscribed to this object, which amount includes \$2,000 expected from the ladies of Ontario. The Brooklyn Ladies Association have also raised \$1,000 to be invested as a separate and special Scholarship Fund.

It was then resolved, in accordance with the provisions of the new Act of Incorporation and By-Laws, that the Mission elect fifteen Directors, and the following brethren were elected by ballot :—

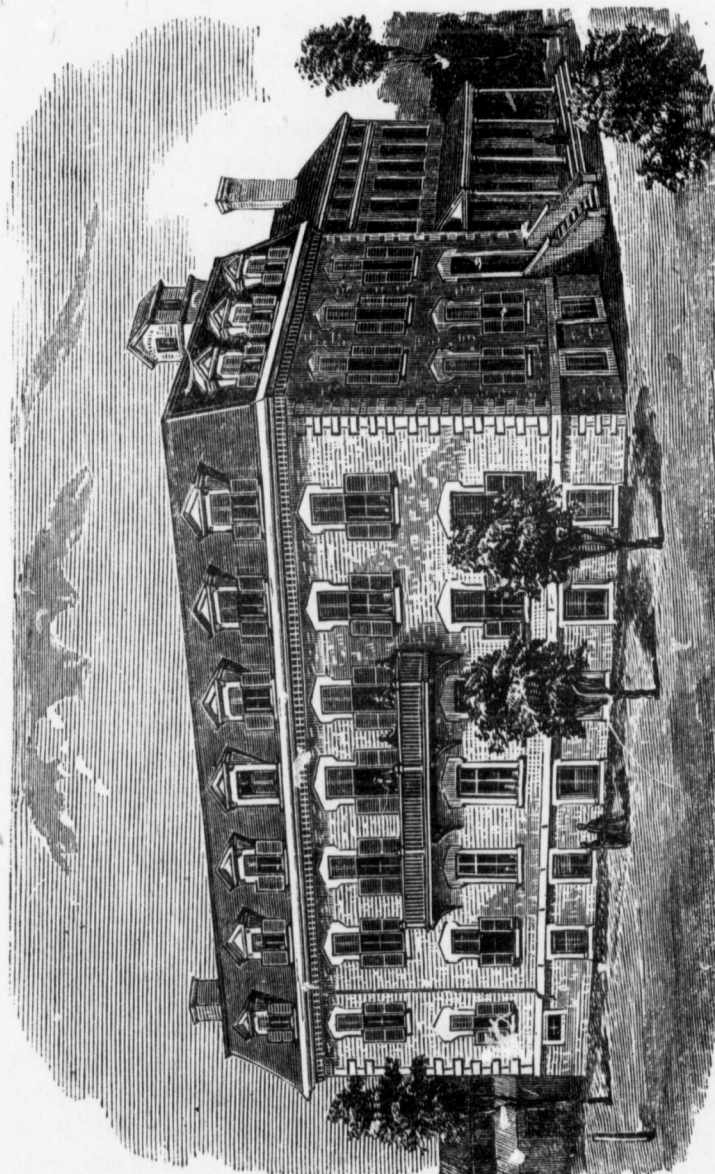

### STUDIES.

No fixed course of study is prescribed, but the following studies are pursued by the pupils arranged in four general classes.

*Class A.*—Bible, French, English, Ollendorf, cours de langue Anglaise, Arithmetic, Writing.

*Class B.*—Bible, French, Geography, History of Canada, Arithmetic, English, Writing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

*Class C.*—Bible, French Grammar and Reading, English Grammar and Reading, History of Canada, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geography, Latin, Book-keeping (elective), Writing and Drawing, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

*Class D.*—Bible, French Grammar and Literature, English Grammar and Literature, English History, Algebra, Geometry, Latin, Greek, Compositions and Recitations in French and English.

The School opens early in October and closes by the first of May.

Preference is given to French pupils, especially those from Roman Catholic families. A very limited number of English pupils is received. When more extensive accommodations are provided, and the applications from French pupils can be overtaken, a liberal course of study may be provided for English students.

If our Mission enterprise has not made extraordinary progress during the past year, it is not for want of commotion in the field in which we labor, for both the Protestant and Catholic mind and community have been unusually agitated. We have had plenty of opportunity to fish in troubled waters. We profess to be fishers of men, obeying the command of the blessed Lord who has immortalized the little lake on the shores of which He chose His first disciples.

Not any more than they do we need aught save the inward calling of the Master to follow a work of evangelization and reformation. If we have His Spirit in abundance, we shall work spiritual miracles according to His gracious promise. John 14 : 12.

With but small means we have undertaken this great work in the face of immensely wealthy ecclesiastical corporations ; with small numbers we have dared to go in the midst of a vast multitude, more or less hostile to our enterprise ; because we have been obliged to show them that they are mostly deprived of the knowledge of the Gospel on which true Christianity must rest. Their religion is to a great extent traditional and superstitious, owing to the teaching and practice of their priests. We cannot possibly preach the Gospel without showing this.

Those who consider this work of little importance only show that they have not seriously examined this question ; that they do not realize the great problems laying at their door, and with which they must grapple some day. There is such a thing as ignoring the great issues in the world and society in which one lives.

That we are just now in troubled waters as to the relations between Protestants and Catholics, is evident enough even for obtuse minds. A religious society, which had its origin in the very principle of opposing the great Reformation, after having been abolished by the Pope, bereft of its properties by governments all over the world, finds here shelter under British rule, succeeds in being reinstated, incorporated, and soon expects to be indemnified (as it claims) for a large portion of the property once entrusted to it for educational purposes.

That in this country the degree of Bachelor of Arts of Protestant Universities, and particularly of McGill, should not be considered a sufficient certificate for the study of law, without passing an inferior examination before Catholic lawyers and priests, is one of the intolerable things we labor under as Protestants, and nothing but Roman Catholic influence is at the bottom of the unjust requirement that all law students must be acquainted with the theological system of Thomas Aquinas.

Is not this enough to induce us to pursue our labors with still more vigor, as we already know that Jesuitical influence is widely, and in some places deeply felt, whether acknowledged or not?

We have had cheering success in the past; the present is encouraging, and the future cannot be but the fruition of present honest and persevering labor.

We know from the best of sources that the Quebec Government has gone so far as to take pains to ascertain the number of French Protestant voters in this Province, and that *their number is not less than four thousand*. This, taking into account the generally large French Canadian families, must represent fifteen or sixteen thousand French Protestants in this country. There are certainly more than this in the New England States. Putting it at the lowest figures, more than thirty-five thousand French Canadians here and in the United States have become the followers of Christ through the Gospel instead of the followers of the Pope,—with the Syllabus. And all this is the result of the small beginning in a log house at Grande Ligne, but a house where there was a large soul radiating with light, love, wisdom and untiring devotion to Christ. Is that not enough to encourage us, to inspire us?

Our work during the past year has been, to say the least, encouraging. Our French Churches met in Association, at St. Pie, on the 29th of June, and enjoyed very delightful and profitable meetings. They were presided over by the Rev. T. Lafleur, who gave a discourse on the work of the Holy Spirit in humanity. The brethren in attendance seemed to be in deep sympathy with the subject, for after the letters from the different Churches and the letter to the Churches had been read, there was a breath of blessing reminding us of former days, and many of the brethren who spoke afterwards were certainly under the influence of the Spirit of God.

As to the result of the work in different stations, we have particularly good news to report from Roxton Pond, where the congregation and Sunday School increase, and where Bro. Brouillet administered the ordinance of baptism to eleven persons during the year, some of whom were recent converts from the Church of Rome. The Grande Ligne Church, for some time deprived of a resident pastor, extended a call to the Rev. M. B. Parent, of Ste. Marie de Monnoir. Brother Parent has accepted the call, and came to settle at Grande Ligne in the month of September. We have no doubt that his talent as a preacher, his well ordered industry, and his improved state of health, will make him a blessing in this important field, where every winter the congregation is doubled by the pupils of the Institute, and which forms a centre where a good many of our families may come to settle in their old age.

The Report of the Montreal Church will speak for itself in showing a good record of work and success.

At the Grande Ligne Institute there have been a few changes. Mr. and Mrs. Massé have together assumed the Principalship of the School. After a successful winter session in teaching together in the Institute, Mr. and Mrs. Dalpé left it last summer, especially on account of Mrs. Dalpé's delicate health. We very much regret the cause of their departure, and the loss of Mrs. Dalpé's efficient and affectionate teaching. They are not, however, lost, as an influence in our work, for Mr. Dalpé has kindly taken the superintendence of the Sunday School in the French Church in this city.



Mr. Herbert Marceau, a graduate of McGill, has been called to help Mr. Massé in the teaching department, with Mr. Rainville as assistant teacher for the less advanced classes. Mrs. Miner teaches Instrumental Music and sewing. Miss S. Piché helps Mrs. Massé in household management, having assumed in part the work done by Miss Riendeau the previous winter. Miss Riendeau has lately accepted a call as teacher in the Ladies' School at Compton, in the Eastern Townships.

The School opened in October with a goodly number of pupils, and now numbers fifty-five boarders and sixteen day pupils. It is in a prosperous condition ; the details of which will appear in the Report of the Principal.

The work of collecting for current expenses has been chiefly done by Mr. Lebeau, Pastor at St. Pie. In the spring he visited the Lower Provinces and the State of Maine, in the autumn and winter the Province of Ontario, and met with commendable success. The Principal of the School, Mr. Massé, visited the New England States in the spring and beginning of summer. Partial collections have been made by Mr. Arthur Massé in the Ottawa Valley, and by Mr. Lafleur in New York, New Haven, Hartford, Uplands, Pa., and Montreal.

In addition to the collection for current expenses, some of the members of the Board and other friends of the Mission, have been actively engaged in the work of canvassing our Canadian Churches for the Building and Endowment Fund. They were generally received with favor, and a good beginning of this great work has been made. \$25,000 for buildings and \$100,000 for endowment is a large sum ; but it would be a comparatively easy task to raise it if but a few of our wealthy brethren could be made to see the importance of a work which in a few years is sure to assume an immense influence in the development and moulding of this growing country. We are no longer ignored as a French protestant factor in this growth, and a short time may bring us to prominence and influence for good, especially by our teaching institutions.

As usual, the Ladies' Brooklyn Association have been untiring in their efforts to sustain their beloved Mission, and have already raised \$1,000 as a special and separate Scholarship Fund.

#### REPORT OF GRANDE LIGNE AND FELLER INSTITUTES.

It has repeatedly been said that the destiny of a country lies in the hands of its youth. We believe this to be most true, and therefore we strive to properly instruct young men and women, and to put before them a lofty ideal.

What an honor it would be, could we prepare a detachment of that army, who will in the near future, we trust, lead the dark Province of Quebec to recognize Christ as "the only name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved."

We shall be accused of being visionary. What is a school like yours, they say, among so many immense Roman Catholic Seminaries, Convents and Colleges; we answer, it is the leaven that will eventually leaven the entire mass.

The work is already begun, for we see its effect, and the country too feels it. Education has received a strong impulse in this Province. Fifty years ago the Roman Catholic clergy were strongly opposed to the organization of common schools. To-day they are obliged to yield to the demands of their people, who are not willing to remain inferior to Protestants in point of education.

The morals of the Roman Catholics,—who have in any way come in contact with Protestantism,—have improved. How often have I heard Mr. Roussy say that on his arrival at Grande-Ligne, the place was a veritable Sodom! It is no longer so. The people seek to live uprightly. These two results added to those attendant upon direct missionary labour are such as to greatly encourage us.

School opened this year on the 16th of October.

Several of the old pupils came back, and appeared so glad to return that one would have said they were returning home after a few months absence.

Our list numbers twenty-seven girls and twenty-eight boys, besides sixteen day-scholars.

As a rule, the pupils are not quite as advanced as those of last year, several having left for McGill College, Normal School, or elsewhere. One, however, is preparing for the University, two for a theological course, one for Normal School diploma, and one is fitting herself to teach in an English School.

All are well disposed, though at times the younger ones display a superabundance of activity and vigor and an overwhelming lung power.

The course of study is the same as last year, but the staff is entirely different. Mrs. Massé has general charge of the household, and acts as assistant teacher.

Mrs. Miner, daughter of Chas. Raymond, Esq., of Guelph, teaches music and sewing. Miss Piché, a former pupil here and teacher of French for several years, has the surveillance of the girls and also teaches several classes. Mr. Marceau, graduate of McGill, holds the position of first teacher, and his work is much appreciated by us and by all the pupils.

Mr. Rainville, a medical student, and former assistant of Rev. Chas. Roux, is here as general surveillant of the boys and teacher of several classes both in English and French.

The teachers are all faithful, devoted, and energetic, and they work together in perfect harmony.

A work of grace has been going on for some time and still continues. Several of the pupils, even among those who appeared most indifferent, have been led to Christ. We had hardly hoped to reach them, when God was pleased to show His power and our little faith in winning them to Himself. One of the former pupils, visiting here this winter, could not help remarking on the great change among some of the boys, and said "What a change in those boys! How I wish I had come back!" We trust more will be converted before the term closes.

Just a word about two of the pupils whose mothers are Roman Catholics. One, a very intelligent and trustworthy young girl, who had attended Protestant meetings but a few times previous to her coming here, has made remarkable progress. She reads and studies her Bible with great interest, and takes an active part in the prayer meetings. The other, owing to outside influence as we believe, cried continually for the first few days, saying she was so very lonely she could not possibly remain. Seeing her tears had no effect, she feigned illness, believing she would surely be allowed to go. We remained inflexible, however, and the girl is now one of the happiest of the family. She is very careful in her work, ready to please and we trust before the spring she may give her heart to God.

We are sorry not to be able to record a greater number of Roman Catholics in our school. The reason for this is known, however.

I am told that the priest from this place has written to those of neighboring parishes, urging them to watch lest some of their flock be induced to come here. It is even reported that the illness of a Roman Catholic boy, who was here last winter, was attributed to his coming here. "You might have expected that" the priest said, "for sending your son amongst the *Swiss*," as they call us.

Two Roman Catholic boys had applied for admission this Fall and been accepted, when they wrote of their disappointment in not being able to come. They were not courageous enough to go contrary to the advice of their religious leaders.

The carefully prepared and practical sermons of our pastor, Rev. M. B. Parent, are much enjoyed and appreciated by our pupils, as well as his course of religious instruction, given regularly twice a week. This good seed, watered from above, can but spring up and produce a rich harvest to the glory of God.

Prayer meetings among the pupils are exceptionally interesting and blessed. Our monthly temperance meetings are very instructive, and we hope profitable also.

In closing I must refer to Miss Alexandrine Morissette who was forced to leave us by her Roman Catholic parents. As her story may be told at length elsewhere, I need not enter into details.

She was especially loved by her teachers and school-mates because of her happy and gentle disposition, exemplary conduct, and true christian character. Her departure left many aching hearts in our school, and eyes still fill with tears when her name is mentioned. Alas! it is then true that we are living in a country where a young person of nineteen years of age may not choose her own religion, and the God whom she will serve. Unless she be full twenty-one years of age, it would seem that she has no right to listen to the voice of conscience and follow its promptings. She must think, will, and believe as her father does. A sad state of affairs! However, it takes more than this to discourage us, for we remember the words of the Master: "they shall deliver you up to the Councils."

#### MONTREAL STATION.

It is with sincere gratitude to God that we report progress in our missionary work in this city. It has pleased Him to bestow His blessing upon our efforts and to cheer our hearts with tokens of His mercy and approbation.

During the year, thirteen have been added to our Church, five by letter and eight by baptism. Among these last is an aged woman recently converted from Romanism who has had to suffer considerable persecution on the part of her own children, who, however, are now disposed to hear the truth themselves. Some of them have recently and occasionally attended our meetings. Through Mrs. Scott's Bible work a few other Roman Catholics have been drawn to our services. Two women, one of them the mother of a large family, have attended with deep interest and much concern for the salvation of their souls. We are becoming more and more confirmed in the opinion that the French Roman Catholics have a deep-seated desire to know the truth, and that were they left free to inquire after it as they would fain do, before many years a general breaking away from the old Romish moorings would take place. The following facts, and others that could be cited, show the truth of our assertion.

Last summer, the little band of workers connected with our Church went to hold a meeting in the eastern part of this city. To our great delight and astonishment, about eighty Roman Catholics were present and listened to the preaching of the Gospel most attentively. Not a move was made, not a word spoken that was not in perfect harmony with the sacredness of the occasion. After the service such expressions as these were heard:—"Thank you sir, for your good instructions, we would be glad to hear you again,"—"Nothing could be better than that discourse, &c., &c." By a written request, a week later, we went to hold another meeting in the same place. We were told before-hand, that the priest had heard of our first gathering, and had instigated the breaking up of any future meetings. When we arrived, we found about a hundred and fifty people in, and around the house. Amidst considerable excitement the service was begun. When about to speak the missionary asked for quietness. He was answered by a volley of insults. When he tried to pacify the man from whom they came, the man leaped on him, while another kicked over the table upon which stood the only lamp in the room, and there was utter darkness, in which the missionary had to struggle with his assailant to extricate himself the best way he could. A good deal of noise and confusion followed, and amidst the jeers and taunts of about a dozen of characters such as those mentioned, the missionary and his friends were obliged to wend their way homeward. The great majority present would have been glad to hear, but their fear of being reported to the priest closed their mouths and kept most of them outside of the house.

Another instance in support of our assertion is the following:

A young, intelligent woman had bought from our lady missionary a Bible. After reading it some time this woman said to the missionary that the book could not be good, for, said she, it does not accord with the teachings of our Church. With two members of our church, she went to show her book to a Jesuit father. They had a conversation with him lasting over two hours. As they were about to leave, the priest holding the woman's Bible in his hand, asked her how much she had paid for it.—"Fifty cents," was the reply. "Here is your money," he said, giving her the amount named, "I'll keep this book," he added. The woman blushed and kept silence. Filled with holy indignation, one of



our sisters present looked the priest in the face and most earnestly said : " Sir, if you take this book away from this woman, knowing, as you do, that it is God's Word and the source of spiritual light, I shall hold you responsible for your action, on the last day, before the tribunal of Christ." He kept the book nevertheless, and told the woman to come alone some other day to see him. She has not been seen since, she studiously avoids the Bible woman.

Among a goodly number of items of interest, of which we should like to speak more at length did space permit us, are the following :—

A member of our church, and greatly esteemed and beloved, has, since his own conversion to the truth, been praying for his intelligent, amiable, but still Roman Catholic wife. Anxious to reclaim her husband from what she supposed to be fatal error, she asked him to come with her to see the priest and have a free talk with him. They went. Our brother maintained his position so well that his wife expressed her dissatisfaction with the priest's arguments and general bearing. She took her husband to another priest, and to a third, but with the same result. She finally gave up in despair, and has since manifested a disposition to enquire into the truth. She has attended several of our meetings, and we are in hopes the light of truth and grace will soon shine in her heart.

An English woman, who, on her marriage with a French Roman Catholic, had embraced her husband's faith, has lately come in contact with members of our church, and, through their influence, has been led to attend some of our services. Her husband is somewhat disposed to hear the truth, and she has expressed a longing after the faith which, in a moment of weakness, she abandoned. We pray for her conversion to Christ, from whom she may never wander away.

A French woman in this case, who married an English Protestant, has also attended our meetings. She receives with much cordiality the visits of the missionary, and seems to be seriously enquiring after the truth. We have her also on our hearts as a subject of our sincere prayers.

Among a goodly number of other Roman Catholics, who have occasionally attended our meetings, may be mentioned two young men who give fair hopes of coming to know the truth as it is in Jesus.

An intelligent and well read man, with tendencies to skepticism, has lately greatly delighted us by his assiduity in his attendance upon our services and his deep interest in the teachings of the Gospel, both from the pulpit and in the Sunday School. He also is a special object of prayers.

Among the young in our Sunday School there are some who are seeking Christ. Two, we have reason to believe, have already found Him, and may be expected soon to confess their faith by baptism.

The average attendance upon our services has been fifty-four in the morning, forty-four in the evening.

Our Sunday School, under the superintendence of our esteemed brother, Mr. W. Dalpé, B.A., has held its own; but we are contemplating its reorganization at an early day, so as to increase its interest, numbers and efficiency. By providing the Côte St. Louis Baptist Mission with an excellent teacher for one of their French classes, we have lost one upon whose services we were counting in our own School.

A Temperance Society has been organized in connection with our Church, and has held already two interesting meetings, at which quite a number have signed the pledge. It is our desire to do something to further the temperance reform by enlisting the young, and by winning those who may be tampering with the poisonous cup.

Our Treasurer's Report, at the Annual Meeting of the Church, showed the receipts for the year to be \$400. In addition to this, \$15 have been raised by Mrs. Therrien's S. S. Class for the Bible work in Montreal.

## GRANDE LIGNE.

It was only in September last that I was invited to take charge of this Church. It had been without a pastor for about a year. Although in that condition, it was well cared for, so far as the preaching was concerned ; for our missionaries in turn regularly supplied the pulpit. However, in cases of that kind, it is evident there can never be the same *esprit de corps*, the same zeal, as when, through the influence of one man, there is unity of effort, of thought, and of aim.

When to prepare a report, I came to look back over this brief period of time spent here, I find no reason to complain or be discouraged.

So long as the old apostolic term of warfare is the faithful image of the life of individual Christians and of local Churches, we need not be discouraged with our present state, but rather to take courage, work and hope. If there are still enemies without (and they are not lacking), there is comparative peace and harmony within. Old divisions seem to be gradually vanishing, and we pray that nothing may occur to revive them. Our services are well attended, even though the roads are not in good condition, or the weather favorable. We have often noticed with pleasure a team coming regularly each Sunday a distance of twelve miles in the muddy roads of autumn.

Interest is shown, not only by service attendance, but by activity and zeal for the prosperity of the church in every respect. The Ladies' Aid Society here deserves special mention, for the ladies have done all in their power to help us out of our financial difficulties.

Our Sunday School also has not been without interest during the fine season. Now it is greatly reduced, as it generally is in the winter, and it has, therefore, been thought best to have our classes unite with those at the Mission.

If the pulpit here has been well supplied, we cannot say as much of the out-stations connected with this field. They have been without a missionary for a year or more. I have been able to visit them only once since I came here. It is very desirable to have an Evangelist to go to them at least once a month.

The yearly subscriptions show an increase on last year; they amount to \$200; Sunday collections, \$45; realized by the Ladies' Aid Society up to date, \$5.

#### STE. MARIE DE MONNOIR CHURCH.

This year we have to report a few changes in the midst of us. Among these changes, and certainly not the least, was the departure of the pastor, Rev. M. B. Parent, who left Marieville, after spending five years preaching the Gospel of Christ in this locality, to accept a call to the pastorate of the Grande Ligne Church.

He was much loved here, and it was not without much sorrow that the people saw him leaving. For a time it was feared that this loss would be felt in the church, as he was replaced by a young man who came here to begin his work in the ministry, but there is reason to thank our Heavenly Father for what He has already done through him.

Our meetings have been very well attended, although the weather has been far from favorable, as we had a constant rain during the fall, and very severe snow storms since winter has set in, so that people who drove five and eight miles, over bad roads, to meet with their Christian brethren on Sunday morning, proved the love they had for their Saviour.

Our young people have manifested a greater interest for the affairs of the church than they had for a long time before. May

it please the Lord to bless us more and more to do His will in all things, and to increase our love for Him, and for His Church, of which we are members!

During the last year, our congregation saw the need of making a few repairs in the interior of our chapel, to make it more inviting, as well as more comfortable, for those who come to worship. They went to work to collect the money required among themselves, and carried out their plan in a most successful manner. Now the dark, grey walls have given place to pure white, and our pews and floor are neatly painted.

We have especially to thank one of our sisters, Madame Ledoux, of Ste. Marie, who with untiring efforts, wrote to all her old pupils, who had spent six months or more with her, studying the French language, to ask them for a subscription of one dollar each to buy an organ for our little church, and we are happy to report that her efforts were crowned with success.

With the money received she bought a very nice organ, which she presented to the church, and having some money left over (for the Lord always gives more than we ask of Him), she was enabled to buy some good curtains for our windows, that were almost curtainless, and also four chairs for our platform.

Since the 2nd of September, when I preached my first sermon, I have tried to preach the Gospel of God every Sunday to an attentive congregation. I have also visited the families as often as I could, considering that I was called away from my field to spend four weeks collecting on behalf of the Mission. During this time I visited the churches in the valley of the Ottawa, and as far west as Toronto. The trip proved to be very profitable to me, as I made the acquaintance of many dear friends of the Mission, and it was not unprofitable to the cause.

ST. PIE.

In the absence of Pastor Lebeau, our young brother evangelist, Jacques Césan, who has occupied that field two or three months, gives a few facts, together with his own impressions, concerning it.

The general impression, already expressed in a former Report, is that the frequent and long absences of the pastor and his devoted wife are detrimental to the continued success of the work. The field is an interesting one, and such as to insure a good measure of success, from the fact that Roman Catholics are singularly liberal, and somewhat freely attend Protestant meetings.

On quite a number of occasions, when the state of the roads, or the great distance from the place of worship makes it a duty for the missionary to go to private houses to hold meetings, the Roman Catholic neighbors frequently drop in and join in family worship. On a recent occasion, at such a meeting, a Roman Catholic present, seeming particularly sad and unhappy, the missionary went to him and said: "My friend, you appear to be laboring under some anguish,—do not fear to open your heart, and to commend yourself to the sympathizing Saviour, who has said: 'Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest.'" Hearing these words, the man broke out in sobs, and said: "I know He is good; I know it, but I am not."

At another place, visiting in a house where I found two women quite sick, I read and prayed with them. There happened to be a young Roman Catholic from another parish, who invited me to visit him at his home, as he wanted to know more of the Gospel.

At one of the meetings thus held on Sunday evening in private houses, there were sixteen persons, two of them Roman Catholics. I spoke to them of the work of Christ, and His sufferings for us, the just for the unjust. They both were moved to tears, knelt down, and evidently under the power of the Spirit, implored the pardon and blessing of God.

I have had, especially with brother Gendreau, the colporteur, several occasions to speak to Roman Catholics, who sometimes, contrary to our hopes, kindly invited us to their homes and to their meals.

I think that, on the whole, the field is one where a good deal of good and new work can be done.

## ROXTON POND.

If the harvest was always in proportion to the seed put in the ground, the husbandman's revenue would be greater than it generally is. In like manner, if conversions of sinners were in proportion to Gospel preaching, every Gospel preacher would rejoice in seeing many souls pass from darkness to light, and from the power of Satan to God. In many places, alas! the results seem to be in inverse ratio of the labor bestowed and the sacrifices made.

For many years the Gospel has been preached enough in Roxton Pond to convert everybody; and, nevertheless, only a small number have received the truth savingly. We have at this time to say with the prophet: "Who hath received our report?"

During the past year, the field of Roxton has not been much extended over Roman Catholic ground. Still something has been gained, and in the meantime our congregation and church have increased and have received good. Some have joined the church by letter, and others by baptism.

During the summer, we have had several baptismal occasions, witnessed by at least two hundred Roman Catholics. The number of those who thus publicly professed their faith in the Saviour was eleven. I have no doubt that these occasions have been the means of enlightenment and serious impressions upon Roman Catholics.

I must state that of the eleven persons that were baptized, five were over fifty years of age, some of them having recently left the Church of Rome. One of the latter was heard to say a fortnight after his baptism: "How different have been those days since my baptism from those of years past."

Our prayer meetings have generally been well attended, and have become more interesting. A large number of those who come take part, even the sisters who used to think it impossible for them to do so publicly; children also venture to mention a favorite hymn to be sung.

Our Sunday School continues to be interesting, and to draw adults as well as children. It is divided into three classes. The

adult class, under the care of Mr. O. Therrien ; the children, from nine to fifteen, are in the pastor's class, and the younger ones are taught by Mrs. Racicot.

We have also a Temperance Society, composed of some sixty members. Temperance meetings are held twice a month, and are always well attended.

On those occasions we have recitations, lectures, speeches and singing, all in the interest of the Society. Our young people enjoy those meetings very much, and it is especially in view of benefiting them that we have organized this Society.

During the year, the congregation has contributed \$133 to the Mission ; \$21 to Baptist Foreign Missions, and \$38 for church expenses.

I cannot but regret to add that the congregation, if so disposed, could easily double that amount.

#### SOUTH ELY.

### ST. JOHNS.

Our venerable missionary stationed here, the Rev. T. Riendeau, who, with enfeebled health, has continued to do what he can to make the Gospel known around him, writes that the cause in St. Johns has not been as encouraging this year as last year, though he had better hopes at the first. Last year they could rejoice in few conversions, in seeing several persons baptized and join the little flock ; while this year some of these converts were removed by death, and others had gone west as far as Dakota. He is, however, happy to learn that in this far-off region they faithfully bear the testimony to the truth they have received ; so that we send witnesses for the Gospel even there.

Our friend thinks that the cause of the Gospel has sustained a severe trial in St. Johns, in the fact that the Morissette case was pleaded and lost here ; however, it may prove more favorable than we now see, as the case is not ended.

Brother Riendeau has felt much encouraged by the kindness and help of English Protestant friends in St. Johns, and wishes to acknowledge here his indebtedness to them.

It shows that the missionaries and their immediate friends have been hard at work ; that accomplishing the usual amount of labor round them, they have attempted great things for God in this priest-ridden Province, and that they are determined to continue and increase the good work. We all know now by long historical record that the great missionary work is chiefly accomplished by great souls filled with the Spirit of the Master, whose ministry was pre-eminently a missionary ministry, and who taught us to "pray the Lord of the harvest that He will send forth laborers into His harvest." Only those laborers whom He sends will properly do His work.

We know not when our individual work will be done ; it may be so very soon ; but we know that if it is at all well done, there will be an eternal blessedness and reward in the simple welcome of the Master. And we also know that if we honestly employ our talents, whatever their nature, it will be for the help, the comfort, and the larger success of those that will follow us here on earth in the Master's work.

### REPORT OF BIBLE WOMAN'S WORK.

The "Montreal Grande Ligne Ladies' Association" assumed last year as their special work the support of Mrs. Scott, who, under Rev. A. Therrien's direction, had been for some months engaged in city mission work among the French Catholics, reading aloud the Word of God, and, when practicable, disposing of copies of the Bible.

The Bible Society supply this devoted sister with books, and the amount for which she sells them supplements the salary which she receives from our Association. An appeal sent to the "Canadian Baptist" brought a few generous responses from friends at a distance, but the principal amount is given by Montreal ladies, who subscribe monthly, and manifest much interest in this excellent work.

At our Annual Meeting, held last November, Mrs. Therrien read the report of Mrs. Scott's first year's work. The following extract is from that very interesting account:—

"The fact should be known and more generally recognized that real, solid Bible and evangelistic work is being carried on in this great city of Montreal, overshadowed by the thickening and blighting cloud of conventual influence, and priestly oppression, as never was done before. In view of what has been already accomplished, and with the prospects which brighten the future, we may well 'thank God and take courage.'"

The following are some of the incidents recorded in Mrs. Scott's Monthly Reports:—

"A man to whom I offered the Bible for sale, after taking the volume three times in his hands and eagerly examining it, said: 'I cannot buy this book, our priests do not like us to read it.' I said to him: 'Sir, the Bible is called the Holy Book even by your priests, and since it is a holy book, why should they object to your reading it?' He turned to his wife and said: 'To be sure that is so; I don't see why our priests should object to our reading this book, since it is a holy book, and I am going to buy it.'"

"I offered my books to a woman; at first she would not even look at them, and said it was perfectly useless to ask her to buy one. I asked for the privilege of reading a chapter, which she granted. In the meantime a neighbor came in and listened. When I got through reading, they both expressed their admiration for the contents of the book, and searched for money to buy each of them a copy, which they did."

"A woman to whom I had sold a Bible, went to confession, and showed it to the priest. He told her she must not read it or keep it, without saying why. When I revisited her (this time in company with a friend), she told us all about her interview with the priest, and, on her proposal, the three of us went to see him, and to ask what fault he found with the book. He refused to talk with us. We went to another, with the same and even worse results.

"A third whom we called upon said candidly that the book was good, but as it was without notes, the Church could not approve of Catholics reading it. He advised the woman to get an English or Latin version. 'What would be the use,' we said, 'as this friend knows not a word of either of these languages; she could not derive any benefit from it.' 'Neither could she from this one,' he said, 'the Church alone can understand the Bible.' We reminded him of the words of Jesus, who said: 'I thank Thee, O Father, Lord of Heaven and Earth, that Thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and hast revealed them unto babes.' We had a long, and, we think, profitable conversation with him."

"Another woman said: 'Ah, madame, you have sold a book like mine to a young man, and he has read it so much that he has become almost crazy. He is better now, but he has turned *Protestant*. We do not see him at the Catholic Church any more.' 'Do you still read yours?' I enquired. 'Yes,' she answered, 'I do; I showed it to the priest, and he told me it was not good, but I am not of the same opinion, and shall read it all the same.'"

There are several persons whom Mrs. Scott visits frequently, who are earnestly seeking the truth. Some of them have attended

our services at the French Baptist Church. One fine-looking woman in particular, who is the mother of eleven children, is anxious that her husband and children should come to understand the truth.

Our sister's work for the year is represented by the following statistics :—

It takes more than a rapid survey of these figures to form an exact idea of the work they represent ; would it not be well for us to ponder them in our minds and treasure them in our hearts ?

Can we suppose that no fruit shall be gathered from this seed sowing ? Whether in time or eternity shall we not rejoice in an abundant harvest of precious souls ?

May our dear sister, Mrs. Scott, realize in her experience the precious promise : " He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

## APPENDIX.

## QUEBEC.

2nd Session, 6th Legislature, 51 Victoria, 1888.

*An Act to amend the Act 18 Victoria, Chapter 72, respecting the Evangelical Society of "La Grande Ligne."*

WHEREAS The Evangelical Society of "La Grande Ligne," incorporated by an act of the late Province of Canada (18 Victoria, chapter 72) have, by their petition, prayed that their Act of incorporation be amended so as to change their corporate name, increase the number of directors, and extend their power as to the acquiring and holding of real estate and other property, and whereas it is expedient to grant the prayer of the said petition; Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature of Quebec, enacts as follows:

1. The name of the said Corporation is hereby changed to "The Grande Ligne Mission"—under which name the said corporation shall be subject to all the liabilities and entitled to all the rights, powers and privileges of the said Evangelical Society, save in so far as the same are changed by the present Act; and, notwithstanding anything in their act of incorporation contained, shall have power to acquire, purchase, take, receive, hold, enjoy and possess without license in Mortmain (Lettres d'Amortissement) all descriptions of moveable and immovable property, of whatsoever kind and nature, by any and every description of title, whether by purchase, gift, devise, will, lease or otherwise, and whether such title is made in favour of, or acquired by, the said corporation under its former name, or before or after the passing of this Act, and such property to let, lease, exchange, sell and hypothecate;—provided always that the real estate held by the corporation shall not, at any time, exceed the annual value of ten thousand dollars, beyond the requirements of the said corporation for its actual use and occupation.

2. Sections three and four of the said Act are hereby repealed and replaced by the following:

"3. The affairs of the said corporation shall be managed by a board of not less than nine nor more than fifteen directors, who shall all be members of regular Baptist churches, of whom five shall constitute a quorum, and whose term of office and manner of election shall be regulated by the by-laws of the Corporation."

"4. The Directors shall, from time to time, elect from their members a President, a Secretary and a Treasurer; and in case of the death or resignation of any Director, the remainder shall have the power of filling the vacancy thus caused, from amongst their number until the next election of Directors under the by-laws."

3. This Act shall come into force on the day of its sanction.

APPENDIX  
CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS

*Adopted at the Annual Meeting, February, 1889.*

NAME.—I. This Society shall be called The Grande Ligne Mission.

OBJECT.—II. The Society shall have for its object the promotion of Christian Education and the propagation of the Gospel.

MEMBERS.—III. All persons employed by this Society as Pastors, Evangelists, Colporteurs, or Teachers, or in any missionary labor whatever, shall be members of the Society; also those who pay the annual sum of one dollar or more. The payment at once of thirty dollars, made by a person, or in behalf of any person, will constitute a life membership.

DIRÉCTORS.—IV. The business of the Society shall be transacted by a Board of Directors, composed of not less than nine or more than fifteen members, all of whom shall be members in good standing of Regular Baptist Churches, who shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting by a majority of the members present, and who shall hold office for the term of one year, or until their successors in office shall have been elected. Five members of this Board shall constitute a quorum, competent for the transaction of business at a regularly called meeting. As soon as possible after their election, the Directors shall choose from their number a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer, whom they shall have the right to depose when they shall judge proper. In case of the death or resignation of any Director, the remaining Directors shall have power to fill the vacancy thus caused for the balance of the year in which such vacancy occurs.

ANNUAL MEETING.—V. The Society shall meet annually for the election of Directors, the reception of Annual Reports, and the transaction of other necessary business, at such time and place as the Board of Directors shall appoint.

AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.—VI. All Auxiliary Societies or Churches which shall aid the Society will have the right to be represented by a delegate in the Annual Meeting.

ALTERATIONS.—VII. No alterations of this Constitution shall be made without the consent of two-thirds of the Members of the Society present at an Annual Meeting, nor unless the proposed changes have been submitted in writing at a previous Annual Meeting.
