CUTTING TRAIN SERVICE

Ottawa, Jan. 8-Urgent conditions of the war which necessitate the curtailent of railway passenger services that the freight congestion be relieved, are set forth in the formal judgment of the Railway Commission issued tonight by Sir Henry Drayton. The chief commissioner says: "In my view the board cannot well, at

the present moment, order the companies to remove any specific trains. The de-tails of the different passenger move-ments are much more familiar to the companies than they are to the board, and in the reductions that must be made the companies will have to see that every section of the country at least has the necessary passenger movement both in and out, although this may mean the carrying on of some trains not of them-selves remunerative, and the cancellation of trains which may be remunerative to

the companies. "The chief congestion is to be found at the frontier and on the section be-tween Hamilton and Toronto. Three companies are directly interested in the passenger movement here—the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific and Toronts, Hamilton & Buffalo Railway Companies. The territory is one requiring undoubt-edly as good passenger service. Probably edl ya good passenger service. Probably edi ya good passenger service. Probably cach and every or any will be able to show that every train operated in this district is operated at a profit. It is however absolutely necessary that at this most congested point the companies must lose their passenger revenue and the public be inconvenienced until the present emergence is next. There are present emergency is past. There are now forty trains operated daily in this territory, that is twenty into and twenty out of Toronto. In view of these cir-

out of loronto. In view of these cir-cumstances, a radical cut in this service must immediately go into effect. "This district must be supplied with coal and raw material, not only owing to its own necessities, but also owing to the fact that in it are situated a large number of multion factories now in number of munition factories now in danger of being closed.

"In my view, direction ought to be given immediately that out of these forty trains sixteen must be cancelled, the companies to select out of the total those trains which can be cancelled with the least possible public inconvenience. 

This tax is levied upon any railway whose gross receipts per mile exceed an amount named by the governor-in-council, and is a tax not upon earnings but per mileage of line. 




