WHOLESALE KILLING IN SAN DIEGO

Ex-Fireman Shoots Three Former Comrades

KILLS WIFE AND CHILD

Sent in False Alarm and Opened Fire on Men as They Answered the Call—Police Hunting for Murderer

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 1.—Bert S. Durham, a former fireman, after shooting and killing one city fireman, mortally wounding a second and seriously wounding a third, near a fire box from which he had sent a false alarm, in an effort to revenge himself on his former comrades, early today shot his wife and child and then fled.

30 COTTON MILLS CLOSE FOR WEEK

PROMINENT FIGURES IN THE BIG FINANCIAL SCANDAL IN FRANCE

Paris Aug. 1.—The first stage of the investigation into the financial operations of Henri Rochette, in the course of which the reputations of high French officials have been demolished, has ended with the condemnation of the promoter to two years' imprisonment and a fine of 8000 francs for infringement of the laws governing stock companies.

The men associated with Rochette in his speculative speculations were also found guilty of infringing the same laws and received varying sentences. Lecauchoux being sentenced to serve four months in prison and to pay a fine of 8000 francs, Crèvecoeur and DeMayer to pay fines of \$1,000 each and Capelle a fine of \$400.

Even more sensational than the verdict against Rochette is the finding of the court that Messrs. Pichereau, the man who brought the direct charge against the promoter, was not actuated by sincere or spontaneous motives. The court rules that, although Mons. Pichereau set in motion the machinery of the law against Rochette, the latter's conviction was due to reasons altogether foreign to the complaint. Mons. Pichereau is ordered to pay the costs of the trial.

VAUDEVILLE ARTISTS AND LICENSES

They Object to Being Classed With Dogs and Peddlers

THE ROOF GARDEN

Madison Square Waning in Popularity since the Thaw Tragedy—Suffragettes and Politics—Earle and His New Affinity

New York, N. Y., Aug. 1.—Classing them with dogs and peddlers, who must have a license to be at large in the streets of New York, the vaudeville artists of the city feel they have been grievously humiliated by the new law which requires that they be tagged and enrolled according to their profession.

With the advent of the season rapidly approaching the office of the Commissioner of Licenses is crowded daily with song and dance artists, prima donnas, acrobats, jugglers, tragedians, comedians and hangers of high and low estate.

"I don't care so long as they don't vaccinate me," chirped a venerable lady singer, who was one of the original applicants in the production of "The Black Crook" extravaganza forty-five years ago. "You know I have a horror of vaccination."

Some one suggested that it had been better to dispense with vaccination for the women artists, but that their teeth would have to be examined to determine whether such as Earle used to wear in the days when he discarded his pretty little French wife for the woman he claimed as his affinity. To add to their discomforts they innocently confided to the real Earle their aversion to him, intimating that they considered him an undesirable acquisition to any tea party. Imagine their confusion when the artist revealed his identity. You could see the cheeks of the young women flush and then turn when as they walked away in his presence. The recent refusal of the supreme court to annul the marriage of Earle and his affinity, who was Miss Keppner, on the ground that his divorce from his first wife was not regular, has greatly tangled up the affairs of the artist, who is reported to have aspirations toward a third nuptial alliance. The name of the lady he now conceives to have been designed for him is not disclosed. In view of the artist's rapturous affirmation that Miss Keppner was his heaven prescribed affinity it would be interesting to learn how he explains his mistake to soul mate No. 3.

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THE ROOF GARDEN
While the rest of the roof gardens about the city vibrate nightly with the jingle and rhythm of merry music, the Madison Square roof, upon which Harry Thaw shot and killed Stanford White three years ago, is a desolate and gloomy place. Ever since the tragedy this roof, once regarded as among the most delightful retreats of the city on a hot summer evening, seems to have lost caste with the old clientele it commanded, discouraging the interest of the masses of people who formerly went to much expense and trouble providing musical spectacles for it. The roof, which was the scene of the tragedy, was so fresh in the public memory, the roof did considerable business. It could not be said, however, that it was the show that the crowd went to see but the scenario of one of the most sensational tragedies in the history of the city. As one of the principal points of interest about Madison Square it still commands the interest of patrons of the "rubber neck" seeing New York auto-sharing in this interest with the Cafe Martin, in which they have conceived the idea of killing his famed rival for the affection of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, his wife.

Beyond this, as a show place the roof, because of its associations, has become a light upon the city that apparently will not go down. Although in one of the most attractive parts of the city, no theatrical manager would touch it. The fact that this portion of the Madison Square Garden property has ceased to be rentable is a blow to the city, as it is a factor in determining the directors to sell the big building, which includes in addition to the roof, a theatre, concert hall, office tower and the biggest seating amphitheatre and arena in the city.

SPANISH PRETENDER
ISSUES CALL TO ARMS

Madrid, Aug. 1.—A call to arms has been issued at San Sebastian by the Carlist pretender to the throne, Don Jaime of Bourbon. The manifesto congratulates the Spanish people on their loyalty to the King, and calls for a united front against Alfonso and Premier Canalejas.

"I will lead the battle," are the concluding words of the document.

Its issue has caused tremendous excitement here. The Republican leaders have met in conference and it is believed an uprising against all Royalty will follow the first move of the Carlists.

Ed Liberal, a leading paper, is authority for the statement that Premier Canalejas "will initiate a series of measures that will surprise the Vatican."

Premier Canalejas today conferred with King Alfonso. It was reported semi-officially that the King gave Senator Canalejas a promise of his continued support.

The King's attitude has split the Carlists into factions, but it is admitted that it has done much to check the spread of radicalism in the last few weeks. The Carlists in the Cortes today held a meeting at which a plan of action was discussed.

Ed Liberal, discussing the threatened break, says: "The Holy See has no reason to feel offended. It is a heading deliberately toward a rupture which will precipitate the opening of a rapid and energetic anti-Carlist campaign."
