LONDON, Jan. 6.—If neither the Geneva protocol or the Austen Cham berlain's alternative scheme are approved, the disarmament conference of the limitations imposed by the dominions on their foreign policy ranks of the world will begin the formation of these great national combinations which have so long been a feature of the diplomacy of Europe, and beginning again that armament rivalry which was a feature before the great war.



### CHURCHILL PLANS DEBT CONFERENCE

PARIS, Jan. 6—Plans for an inter-allied debt conference at Brussels next month, to which the United States probably would be invited to send a delegate are declared to have been formulated by Winston Churchill, British Chancellor of the Exchequer, who is due to arrive here this evening at the head of the British delegation to the conference of allied finance ministers which opens tomorrow.





# ABOUT NEW ICE AGE

Scientist Says There Is no Evidence of Another Glacier Period.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 - Persons slarmed by reports of a slight cooling off the scores prepared for today's sessions of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. Dr. A. P. Coleman, of the Royal Ontario Museum at Toronto, and Prof. W. F. Humphreys, of the United States Weather Bureau. agreed there had been no evident advance toward conditions believed to be the cause of previous ice ages. Glacial periods of the past can best be accounted for, Professor Humphreys
