TWO ARE DROWNED

Fredericton Gets Word of Double Fatality

THIRD WAS SAVED

Charles Graham and Llewellyn Kinney Lose Lives in North Lake by Upsetting of Canoe—Everett Farrell Reaches Shore

(Special to Times)

Fredericton, N. B., July 17.—News has been received here of a double drowning accident which occurred near Forest City, parish of North Lake on Thursday last. Three young men, Charles Graham, aged twenty-seven; Llewellyn Kinney, aged eighteen and Everett Farrell, were canoeing on North Lake when the craft upset, Farrell was the only one to reach the shore. He was a fair swimmer and managed to get hold of the canoe. His companions went down with scarcely a struggle. Search was immediately begun for the bodies but they were not found until Saturday afternoon. They were located in each other's arms. The sad affair has cast a deep gloom over the community.

SAYS THE ITALIANS ARE POISONING WELLS

Turks Report Capture of a Spy Who Has Confessed

London, July 17.—The Turkish embassy here states on the authority of the Turkish commander at Tripoli that an Italian spy captured at Zora, with a bottle of poison in his pocket, has confessed that he was despatched to Tripoli with instructions to poison the wells. He had already poisoned one. He said that two other spies had been sent to poison wells at Beana.

CONDUCTORS ARRESTED

Three Grand Trunk Men Charged With Stealing

Toronto, July 17.—Conductors Williams and Lorne Palmer of Toronto, and William Wylie of London, who have been operating Grand Trunk trains out of Toronto, are under arrest charged with stealing money from the company. Wylie is an old employee of the company and, although there are three charges against him, he strenuously denies his guilt. He was arrested at Hamilton while on duty. All three men are on remand.

COLORADO ONCE HOME OF PIGMY RACE

Colorado Springs, Colo., July 17.—Evidence that Colorado was inhabited by a race of human pigmies, not easily distinguished from apes, have been discovered in the fossil fields of Florissant by Professor Farnsworth of the British Museum and Professor Yalish of the Imperial University of Tokio.

SAY REBEL LEADER HAS HALF MILLION

Washington, July 17.—Copies of a proclamation by some of General Orozco's men, charging that the rebel leader has \$500,000 in El Paso banks, and is preparing to go into the United States to enjoy it, have been received by the state department. Depredations by 3,000 rebels concentrated near Guadalupe, have been reported.

NOTED MATHEMATICIAN DEAD

Paris, July 17.—Julius Henri Poincaré, better known as Henri Poincaré, an illustrious mathematician, and cousin of the French premier, died suddenly today from the bursting of an aneurism. A fortnight ago he underwent a serious operation, which was apparently most successful, and the doctors in attendance saw no complications.

German Scare Seems Now To Have Caught The Premier

SPEAKS AT BANQUET

Sees Critical Time For Empire in The Next Ten or Twenty Years, But Does Not Say What Canada Will Do To Help The Motherland

(Canadian Press)

London, July 17.—Amid prolonged and renewed applause, Premier Borden declared in the Harcourt room of the house of parliament at Westminster last night that in time of peril he believed every dominion, including Canada, would give a response not less loyal or less earnest than that of the motherland herself. "One realizes, however," said Mr. Borden, "that when the day of peril comes, the day for effective preparation may have passed. I conceive that those who accept a share in and responsibility for the defence and security of this vast empire may no longer be considered as wards by the self-constituted guardians."

CHURCHILL TO TELL OF NAVY EXTENSION PLANS

First Lord to Make Important Pronouncement On Monday

He Will Speak For a United Imperial Fleet—Estimates to Provide For More Men, Rush on Ships Now Building and Special Programme for Mediterranean

PAPER ON INFANT FEEDING

BY DR. McVEY OF ST. JOHN
Matter of Practical Interest and Value Presented at Meeting of Medical Society in Moncton
The subject of infant nutrition is one of much importance, when we take into consideration the fact that an infant normally doubles its weight in the space of six months and triples it in twelve months. It shows the wonderful activity of tissue building that is taking place to supply the necessary constructive material for such very rapid growth and development during this important period of life.

Infant Mortality
The very great mortality of infancy is largely due to the fact that the child is fed in a way that is not adapted to his needs. The most important part of the diet, which is the starch, does not fully develop until the end of the twelfth month, for this reason no food of starchy nature should be given an infant during the early months of life. The required carbohydrate elements must be supplied in the form of sugar, and in order to supply the large amount of protein necessary for an infant, a considerable amount of hydrocarbon is necessary. If the food is deficient in these elements, the infant is apt to show rickets, deformities, and other ailments.

Daily Hints For the Cook

COCONUT CUSTARD PIE.
One pint of milk, three tablespoons fine cracker crumbs, one egg, one small cup shredded coconut, sugar to taste. Bake like a custard pie with one crust.

TEA CAKES.
Sift with one quart of flour seven teaspoons of baking powder and rub into it a large tablespoonful of butter, add a little milk, mix quickly into a soft dough with sweet milk. Half fill rings or tins (about five inches across is a nice size) and bake quickly in a hot oven. Let the cakes cool slightly, cut them through the middle, butter well and divide into four pieces. A nice luncheon dish and one often served in England for breakfast.

Cream three-quarters cup of butter, add 1 1/2 cups of sugar and beat smooth together in the best beaten yolks of three level teaspoons of baking powder and add to the first mixture alternately with one half cup of milk. Add last one teaspoon of lemon flavoring and then fold in the

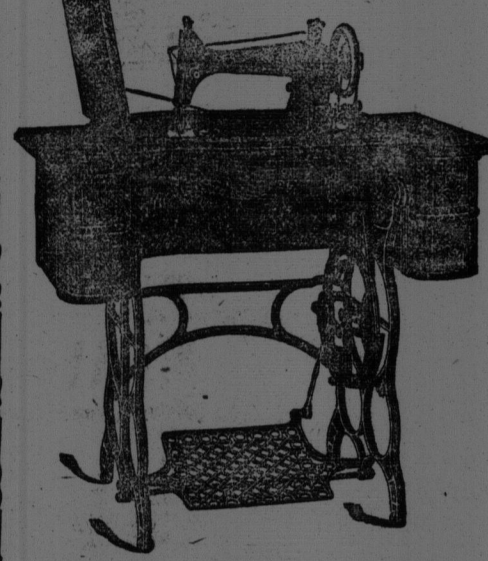

WHERE WILL CANADA GET IMMIGRANTS?

There Are Signs of Slowing Up in Britain And On Continent

A PROBLEM STATED

Scotland Wants to Keep Her Farmers; Ireland Will Not Allow Advertising for New Settlers and the Continental Countries Are Closing the Gates

(Times Special Correspondence.)
London, July 6--A statement by the Hon. George E. Foster that fifty years hence the population of Canada would be close on fifty millions brings up a question which has for some time exercised the minds of emigration experts here.

Where will Canada obtain the quarter of a million or so settlers annually that she requires from Great Britain in the future? Successive years of emigration have so denuded the source of supply that it is impossible to continue exporting in such large numbers the class of settlers the dominion welcomes. Up to the present, efforts have been directed to obtaining emigrants from the agricultural population, and, to a degree, townsmen have been discouraged. In the opinion of many, either the avenues of supply must be widened or emigration from this country will be restricted.

Scotland and Ireland
Then the British government is awakening to the fact that the big drafts from the farming population form a greater menace than even the export of bullion. Powerful representations have been made by the Scotch landlords, who find it increasingly difficult to obtain skilled labor to till their acres, and the government is pledged to some system of reform. In many parts of the country agricultural wages have risen by fifty per cent, yet the departures are not less frequent.

In Ireland emigration is positively discouraged by the authorities. An official acting for one of the provincial governments recently told me that permission to distribute Canadian literature to the pupils in the Irish schools could not be obtained, and that government maps setting forth the advantages of "160 acres" were removed from the walls of the school buildings.

The future attitude of the British parliament must be considered in arriving at a correct opinion in this matter. Public attention has been drawn to agricultural depopulation by the publication of a white paper which shows that Great Britain's farming population, which is just over a million, has been steadily decreasing, while the industrial population is increasing.

Canada's climate rules out the people of Southern Europe; Northern Europe is left. Here you meet the opposition of the sev-

eral governments. Conscription requires the young men to give their best days to the army or navy. Germany has so controlled the movements of her people that emigration has practically ceased. In Norway, Sweden and Denmark, where the inhabitants are so suitable for Canada, active measures to encourage emigration are rigidly forbidden. Where then is Canada to obtain her population of fifty millions which some prophets aver will spread over the dominion in the next half a century.

Australia
Teeming millions and surplus population are out of date terms when applied to Great Britain. Australian competition is something to be taken into account. A Scottish booking agent the other day said that for every inquiry he received for Canada two came for Australia. The big considerations Australia offers to settlers supply the explanation.

It is said, however, that settlers are not fully satisfied with conditions in Australia, and we see much of Australians in London who are on the way to Canada, attracted by the wide-spread publicity given to the advantages of the rich prairie. I heard the other day that it is within the range of possibility that Canada may establish an emigration bureau in Australia itself, but it is charging the imagination to suppose that a country like Australia, which spends vast sums of money to encourage people to come to its unpopulated areas, will permit an active campaign among its people for the purpose of luring them to other dominions.

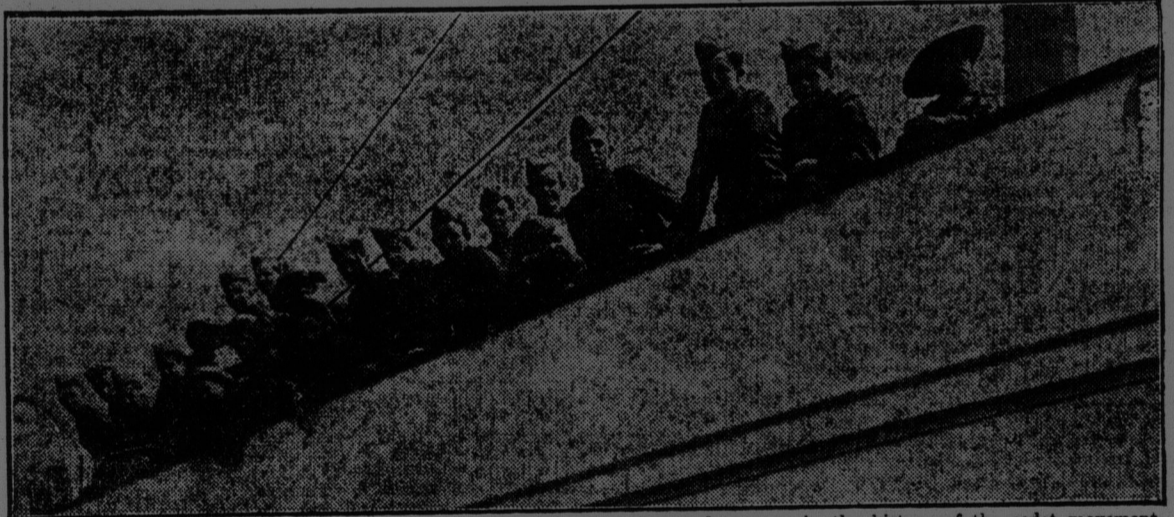

Ladies and Gentlemen:
The women's aid committee closes the present year with a membership of twenty-nine on the visiting committee and nineteen regular or assisting members. During the past year two members have resigned--Mrs. George West Jones and Mrs. George F. Smith. Miss Miller whose name was accepted at the last annual meeting, has been added in place of Mrs. G. West Jones. The second vacancy is not yet filled. From the visiting committee we are sorry to record the loss by death of Mrs. R. J. Ritchie.

Since last December a better plan for the general arrangements in regard to the clergy and music for Sunday services, has been provided, which distributes the services more definitely than formerly among the different communions of the city, and Mrs. E. O. Zikin has been made convenor of that committee to assist the member in charge for the month. Most excellent services have thus been available, and your committee desire again to acknowledge the comfort and great benefit of these services to the home. As far as possible they are always well attended and thoroughly appreciated by the patients and staff, and frequently outside friends, and once again your committee feel deeply indebted and grateful for this assistance on the part of the city choir or musical friends of the city.

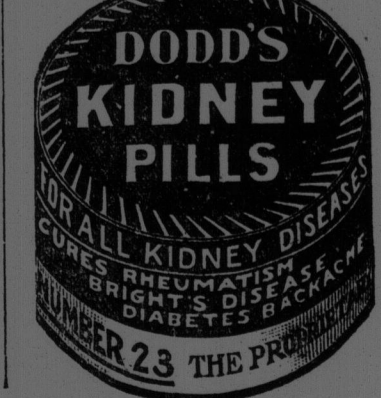
The entertainments that have been provided during the year on behalf of the home have been up to the usual standard as follows:
An afternoon tea, the 31st of August, 1911, held on the grounds, when the public were invited to be present and assist in the general entertainment--music, reading, etc.
A Thanksgiving tea and sale of home cooking, held in St. John's (Stone) church, Oct. 24 when a liberal contribution was reserved for the benefit of the home.

A Christmas treat, when four good-sized trees were gallily and generously trimmed and placed in public and private sections, giving the whole house an atmosphere of good cheer and plenty.
A house tea, given by the members in charge for the month, i. e., Mrs. Jas. P. Robertson and Mrs. H. A. Powell, on Feb. 28.

An Easter treat in March, consisting of individual potted plants for each patient, fruit, eggs, ice cream and cake, and one-half pound candy boxes with Easter decorations and Easter post cards.
A house tea again in June, with Miss Millett as convenor.

These house teas are an innovation, which promises to take the place of frequent public events of a similar kind. Being easy to manage, and more appropriate for the benefit of the patients and staff, they are simply an addition of a few delicacies to the usual supper of the home, when the members in charge for the month solicit a few of the committee at a time and plan to attend themselves, providing something of a short musical or literary programme as well. 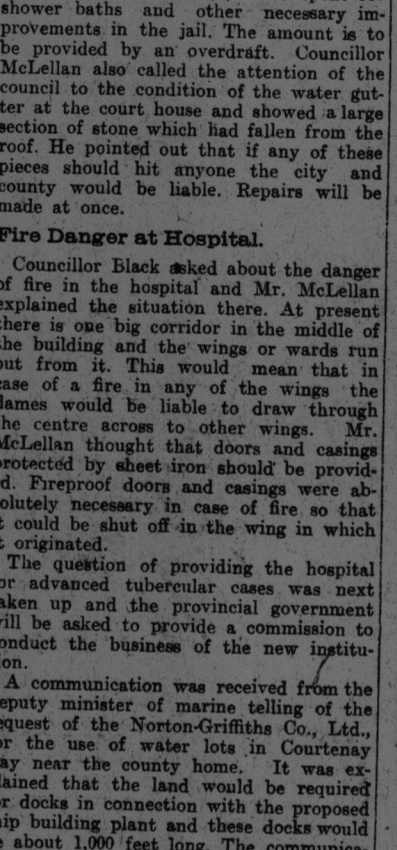
RECORD SEASON FOR SHIPPING

At the start of the sixth round Johnson was a somewhat bedraggled champion. His stamina had been affected by the constant pegging of Flynn's gloves against his stomach, and it was noticed he no longer maintained a grin which he wore in the preceding rounds.

St. John Schooner Likely Total Loss—The Fannie, Damaged, Towed to Islesford

J. Willard Smith received word this morning that the schooner Fannie, Captain Morrell, had gone ashore in a dense fog on Little Duck Island, near Islesford, Maine, last night and is a total loss. The schooner was bound from Boston to Shiluee and had no cargo on board.

Besides the captain there was a crew of six men. All were saved. No further particulars were received. The Ravola comes into port here often and Captain Morrell is well known here.

DECEMBER CASE IS IN COURT TODAY

Walter Winslow Charged With an Attack Upon Timothy O'Brien in St. Patrick Street

An interesting case came up for hearing in the police court this morning when Walter Winslow, aged twenty-eight years, was called upon to answer to a charge of assaulting Timothy O'Brien and attempting to rob him in a yard off St. Patrick street on December 9 last. The prisoner did not plead, but was remanded to jail.

The complainant said that on that day, between five and six o'clock, he was returning to his home in St. Patrick street from his work and when he reached his yard the prisoner ran after him and asked him where he was going. The complainant said he answered that he was going into the house, and that Winslow then struck him and knocked him down and tried to get his money. He said that when he was down the prisoner also kicked him in the face. O'Brien's brother came to the rescue and the prisoner ran away. The witness had over \$9 in his possession when attacked.

A warrant for Winslow's arrest was served out on December 11 but the police were unable to serve it until last night when Policeman George Henry took Winslow into custody. The case was adjourned until Friday morning at ten o'clock, when other witnesses will be called.

One other prisoner charged with drunkenness, was remanded.

William Short, arrested several days ago on the charge of assaulting two men on the exhibition grounds, was further remanded until Friday morning.

The case against the E. A. Pugsley Co. reported for hiring out cars with a dealer's tag attached, was continued this morning. Acting Sergeant Ross told of seeing the car in question in Charlotte street, with several passengers in it. The chauffeur had told him that his name was Thomas and that the car was owned by the Pugsley garage. Chauffeur Thomas was in court yesterday and denied being in the car on the night in question. The young man who was driving the car, and who said his name was Thomas, was the court before ten o'clock, but left. The case was further adjourned until Friday morning at twelve o'clock, when the chauffeur will be called.

DEATH OF JOSEPH R. MCCLURE IN ST. STEPHEN

Was Mason and Member of the Orange Order—Former Town Marshal

St. Stephen, N. B., July 17.—(Special)—Joseph R. McClure, who has been suffering from stomach trouble for some months entered the Chisnam Hospital yesterday and was operated upon by Doctor King of Portland, Maine, but in his weak condition he did not rally and died this morning about one o'clock.

Mr. McClure was fifty-four years of age and leaves his wife and one brother, Thomas McClure, town marshal. He was for several years town marshal and also served at the council board for four terms as councillor for Kings ward. He had in recent years conducted a grocery store and meat market in Water street near the bridge.

He was a member of Sussex Lodge, F. and A. M. and of the Encampment, also a member of St. Stephen Orange Lodge. The funeral, which will be Masonic, will take place tomorrow afternoon at two thirty from his late residence in King street.
