Feel your stock so well that hunger will be an incentive to sunbath. Keep grass cut back and it will continue to grow and put forth efforts to seed. The farmer who suffers from the heat caterpillar should blame himself most. If you have a bad bruise, thoroughly soak it in water as hot as you can bear it. Under favorable conditions, strawberries can be grown for three cents a quart. The heavier the growth the better the shade and the more utilization of the soil. Stock like clean grass. Note how they relish it after it is washed by a shower. If you want the second crop of grass to come on vigorously, do not mow too close. It is not the owner of the horse that wants to be alarmed; he wants to alarm the burglar. Be sure in going into the sheep business that you do not prepare the way to go out of it. The heavier the crop the more fertilizing material is used up and should be returned to the soil. Where one-half of a tree has been sprayed and the other not, the advantage of spraying is very marked. So long as cases are underrated and lumber is overrated as food, cheese will not be popularly appreciated. People think they must have medicine. The wise and humane doctor gives them that which is least harmful. Trying to save a horse from stumbling by use of the check-rein is like trying to lift one's self by the boot-strap. Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, is said to be practically a vegetarian. He prefers such foods as rice in the sunshine. THE POULTRY YARD. To Prevent Flying. If your fowls are not high enough, tack a string to each foot, and make the string higher by stretching a strand of wire over the top of the fence, fastening the wire to the strips. Such a fence may not be the best, but it will keep the fowls higher and more serviceable at but small cost. Keep Them Out. At this season of the year one should never let a strange fowl into the yard, for by so doing you may bring lice, cholera, rump and other ailments or drawbacks. Keep a strict quarantine against all new comers, as appearances may deceive you, and a single instance may cause you much annoyance and labor. Cholera Cure. In reply to an inquirer, we will state that there is no cure. The sick birds will not eat, but they will drink. The best results have been obtained when a teaspoonful of liquid carbolic acid has been added to a quart of water and no other water allowed to drink. The entire premises must be well disinfect-ed in order to eradicate the disease. A Ready Roast Cleaner. Fasten a sponge to a stick, as a handle, and have a pint of a mixture of equal parts kerosene and crude petroleum within handy reach. When you clean out the poultry house, wash the roosts, benches and lower sides, with the mixture. In fact, if you cannot conveniently clean out the house, wash the roosts at all events, and you will keep lice down. Set the potato and wash in a convenient place for use, or hang it up in the poultry house. Worms in Poultry. Not only do the intestinal tracts of the fowls, but worms have been found in the fowls, or the cause, is unknown but no doubt the cause of some of the diseases leads to the presence of worms. The remedy is spirits of turpentine, which may be administered three times a week by giving two or three drops on a bread crumb or by mixing a tablespoonful of the turpentine intimately with two quarts of corn meal, mixed into a stiff dough, and fed three times a week as much as the fowls will eat at a meal. Because the hens are allowed to roost outside on trees and other places, it does not protect them against lice. We recently inspected the roosts and woodpiles of a farmer who called on us because his hens were dying of cholera (as he supposed), but which we found to be due to lice, they being present on the roosts and on every other place where the hens had been accustomed to roost. Even an old wagon under a shed, which had been used as a roosting place by the hens, was overrun with lice, and it was more difficult to get rid of the vermin than if they had been confined to the poultry house. Lime A Valuable Aid. While it will injure the value of the manure, lime will be found the best and cheapest preventive of lice and disease. A barrel of slaked lime that is in a fine condition, kept conveniently near the poultry house or in one corner of it, will, if freely dusted over the floor, roosts, yards, nests, walls, etc., prevent lice, and as lime will destroy the germs of rot, and also absorb the dampness, it will render the fowls less liable to those ailments which prevent them from being profitable. Only a few minutes daily will be required in sprinkling the lime over the house, and the amount of work that it will save in fighting lice and curing disease, or preventing them, will be of greater benefit than whatever value the droppings may possess if no lime were used.
