REPORT OF THE GRAND CHANCELLOR.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Domain of Ontario:

BROTHERS,—The Grand Lodge session of 1898, in Woodstock, will be a was so marked that I must be pardoned for mentioning it; practically every officer was new, and I remember with what fear and trembling I assumed the office of Grand Chancellor.

My predecessors were able to feel quite comfortable when taking office for what they didn't know Bro. Geo. Mitchell did, and that was a lot. Over twenty years he filled the office of G. K. of R. and S.; was ripe with experience, and a perfect encyclopedia of information. The same might be said of Bro. D. J. Peace in a lesser degree for he had filled the office of G. M. of Ex. nearly as long and could put his thumb on every dollar of expenditure, therefore we all felt the Order had suffered a loss. Say what we will there settled upon us a heavy cloud that totally obscured every ray of light and promise, but thanks to new and young blood, these dark clouds have been dispersed, and as they rolled away we discovered they had a silver lining. With the brighter light and a clearer sky we saw Pythianism as a tree growing in the best of soil but sadly handicap; ed with a lot of deadwood. We decided to use radical measures,—the pruning kni'e was applied and the resu t is we come before you with smaller membership but, we trust, a hea thier one. The utter uselessness of carrying Lodges that make no returns is obvious and, it is with sincere regret the following list is cut off:

No doubt many of these will reorganize, and already I have opened up correspondence producing excellent prospects with St. Catharines, Berlin and Niagara Falls.

Before entering upon any details, allow me to congratulate the Order generally, and Grand Lodge in particular, in having such an excellent, painstaking officer as Bro, Walter Haynes, Grand Keeper of Records and Seal. His was no easy task, and I should fail in my duty as a Pythian if 1 did not pay him this deserved compliment. He has thoroughly mastered the details of his office, is prompt in answering all corresponden e, and always courteous and obliging.

At the very beginning of my official term, letters were forwarded me stating Rokeby Lodge, No. 9, was practically dead and needed decent burial. Here Thought I, is a chance for work so on July 28, I started for Wallaceburg and found no one, but with determination I started next day and succeeded in finding twenty good and true knights, who agreed to stand by the Charter provided I could make the way clear. To do this the Charter was surrehdered and debts cancelled, and in October when the weather was cooler I wended my way again to Wallaceburg, restored the Charter, and re-opened the Lodge. The boys were true to their promise, and Rokeby No. 9, is in a flourishing condition. I must thank Brothers Dunlop, Parker, and Hardiman for the valuable assistance rendered me.

It affords me pleasure to mention honorably the names of Morris Linz, F. J. Fitzgerald, Court Curtis and James G. Wilson as deputies; these Brothers have shown an activity very commendable and the Order is the better for their work and interest. An explanation is perhaps necessary re district No. 7. Bro. F. Smiley was appointed but he failed to qualify and I took the liberty of re-appointing Bro.

As soon as I had business well in hand I wrote Bro. Macleod G. M. of E. that our laws required a guarantee bond. Our good Brother lost no time, and after the usual questions had been answered I was furnished with a satisfactory bond for (\$500.00) five hundred dollars. I mention this as I find no record of its being done before.

During the first part of August I was placed in communication with Renwick Lodge, No. 47. Finding there was absolutely no prospect of re-opening this, all supplies, paraphernalia and cash on hand was handed over and honorably closed up.

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On the 21st of August I gave free vent to my Pythian enthusiasm and started for Indianopolis in company with S. Rep. R. H. McConnell. I spent a delightful week and was deeply impressed with the Uniform Rank Encampment. It was indeed a sight worth going so far to see, and more than repaid me for time and money expended. It gave me something to talk about when visiting subordinate Lodges; it enabled me to renew acquaintance with Sup. Chancellors Ritchie and Colgrove, whom I had been privileged to meet. Much more I could say but our representatives gave us their report which will suffice. I must add, however, that we should make every effort to give Ontario a good showing at the next Sup. Convention in Detroit in 1900, reference to which I shall make later on.

CORRESPONDENCE.

It has amazed me completely, the large amount of letter writing a Grand Chancellor is called upon to do. I have done my best and nothing necessary for the good of the Order has been delayed, but for a business man to undertake this in addition to his own, I can assure you it keeps him busy. Many questions asked could be answered by reference to Grand Lodge Statutes.

OFFICIAL CIRCULARS.

I thought it advisable to issue two Official Circulars during the year, both referring to recent legislation passed at the Supreme Lodge Convention at Indianapolis, and which became effective in August, and October, 1898. To secure the benefit of this it was necessary to take action at once, and I therefore issued my circulars giving all the information possible, allowing each subordinate lodge to act in its own interests. I trust in the matter of re-instatement there has been something accomplished.

OFFICIAL VISITS.

CALANTHE NO. 36.

My first visit made on the 8th of December, '98, was enough to discourage the most enthusiastic Pythian. It was to Calanthe Lodge No. 36, Brantford. My worthy deputy, Fred Ryerson, did all in his power to make it a success, but when we reached the Castle Hall there were nine brethern in their places. Two of these left before we got fairly started, which left us the perfect number,7 Naturally our meeting was of the informal kind, and at best was only conversational. To be candid I found Pythianism at zero. I did my very best to warm it up, and hope Calanthe Lodge will yet make a record for itself. We adjourned from the Castle Hall and enjoyed a supper which was certainly as jolly as seven could make it. I missed our genial P G. C. Elliot, and was sorry to hear that illness prevented him ioining us.

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FRIENDSHIP LODGE NO. 16.

On January 30, '99, I visited Friendship Lodge No. 16, Windsor, and had a delightful time. The weather was extremely cold—way below zero—but Pythianism was hot and we had a warm time. I was met at the station by Grand Prelate W. A. Cates and District Deputy Morris Linz. Together we installed the officers and made a few remarks on the order generally. I don't know that I ever met a more enthusiastic lot of Pythians—fully alive to the needs of the order, determined to go ahead, and in view of the Supreme Lodge session in Detroit in 1900 they realize that all eyes will be upon them. It was with pleasure I heard of their work and expectations.

After-lodge work we sat down to a splendid banquet, some 60 being present. Among the invited guests were Grand Chancellor Fisk of Mich, and Lt.-Col. Hatt, the Uniform Brigade. These gentlemen gave us valuable information concerning 1900 conclare. Speech, story and song made time pass all too quickly, and I must frankly admit that our Windsor brethern know how to have a good time. Among other things Hearned was that Grand Lodge will be invited to hold its 1900 session in the Border City and will be asked tochange its date to coincide with Supreme Session in August. With such men as Wm. J. Tomlinson, W. A. Cates, Morris Ling and the newly installed officers I feel quite satisfied the order will 1912 good account of itself.

RATHBONE NO. 12.

February 14th was the date of my official visit to my own Lodge. Rathbone No. 12, and if I put on paper what is on my heart it would seem rank flattery.

I love to talk about Rathbone Lodge because I know the character of its membership, and I have held them up as a model Pythian brotherhood. An old proverb says: "Prophets are without honor in their own country," but here is an exception, for no one could be honored more than I in my own Lodge. On this occasion the evening was devoted to pleasure, but later on (March 14) I was favored with an exemplification of degree work by a team composed of all Past Chancellors, and taken as a whole is the best I have seen anywhere. The new officers for '99 are a a clever set of boys and will give a good record for their year of office.

WOODSTOCK NO. 45.

February 22nd I visited Woodstock Lodge No. 45; was met at the station by G. V. C. Bro. J. S. McKay and Bros. Bicknell and C. C. Forbes. It was a real pleasure to again visit Woodstock, to renew friendships formed during Grand Lodge Session, and find the Lodge in such a healthy condition. Quite a number of invited guests took part in the banquet which was a credit to the Order.

I again visited the Lodge, May toth, for the sole purpose of seeing their Rank work. Two Ranks, 1st and 3rd, were promised, but, unfortunately, at the last moment the Knights Rank was given up on account of the absence of candidate. However, the 1st Rank was well done, showing marked ability and dignified interpretation of the Ritual.

ROKEBY NO. 9.

March 1st was the date of my 3rd and last visit to Rokeby No. 9, of Wallaceburg. On the occasion 1 duly installed the officers, exemplified the secret work, and put the final touch to a work 1 was deeply concerned in. Three visits enabled me to form a thorough-estimate of the boys, and 1 cannot speak too highly of e.

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them. They began with a membership of 18 in October and had increased to 29. This was commendable and I take this opportunity of placing on record my congratulations and compliments.

HAMLET NO. 42.

March 8th I visited Hamlet No. 42 at Stratford; was met at station by Bro. Barnsdale. I found the Lodge in excellent condition, best of harmony prevailing and a great desire to increase in membership. We took up the Ritual work and got much benefit; we had a good family talk, and got at the true inwardness of Pythianism and felt my visit had been a success. After Jodge work was over we three ourselves on the tender mercies of Bro. Fred J. Carrie of the Queen's Hotel, and had an excellent luncheon, followed by songs, recitations and a good time generally.

TORONTO LODGES

On Friday, March 24th, I turned my steps to the Mecca of Pythianism Toronto and found the lodges of the city, Mystic No. 1, Queen City No. 18, Amicus No. 20, and Toronto No. 30, had combined their forces and prepared a grand banquet—certainly the best of the year. It lacked nothing and was a treat. I was accompanied by Sup. Rep. Bro. Fitzgerald of London and G. V. C. Bro. McKey of Woodstock, and when the party sat down it included all the distinguished Knights of the Queen City of the West and the resident G. L. officers. The style and dignity of the entertainment impressed me very favorably; the whole tenor of the speeches was a sort of Jubilate which seemed to me a reflection of the enthusiasm of the committee of management especially the chairman, P. C. James G. Wilson, who is the right man in the right place.

I must compliment the Brethren on their musical programme. It was an agreeable surprise and leads me to the thought we must try and improve the music in our lodge rooms—but more of this later. The only regret I felt was that I had no opportunity of seeing any Rank Work.

MARMION NO. 15.

I reached home on Saturday, rested on Sunday, and started off on Monday the 27th to visit Marmion Lodge No. 15, Chatham. Imagine my surprise when I arrived in the city at 4.30 to find the Lodge in session waiting for me to instal the officers. With the aid of our distinguished P. G. C's, Bros. P. D. McKellar and W. E. Rispen, we did this admirably and so made it possible to devote the whole evening to pleasure. As I passed through Chatham on my way to Wallaceburg my visits enabled me to know my Marmion Brothers pretty well, and I therefore felt quite at home. The evening's enjoyment was greatly enhanced by the visit of a dozen or more of the Wallaceburg boys and a number of prominent citizens. The program was of the free-and-easy sort and therefore very enjoyable. The chair was taken by the newly-installed C. C. Bro. O. L. Lewis, who proved a host in himself. I must also mention Bro. Massey, the retiring C. C. pleased me to see the respect shown him by all members of his Lodge. pears to have been the mainstay during his year of office, and I am glad to add my tribute of praise. He accompanied me on one of my visits to Rokeby, and I found him a gentleman in every sense of the word. We exemplified the Secret Work and told the story of Damon and Pythias, with lantern slides, which pleased everybody. Marmion has a good staff for '99, and I hope to hear of renewed prosperity.

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LONDON LODGES.

My next visit was to London on April 13, '99, when Myrtle No. 2, Prospec No. 10, and Columbian No. 37, combined in giving me a grand reception. Being so near home I may say the fraternal feelings between London and St. Thomas is of the very best, therefore we were on good terms at once.

The first rank was exemplified in first-class style, and I must not forget the use of the lantern and its brilliant light of acytelene gas. The who'e outfit showed a degree of enterprise quite worthy the Forest City.

It is always a pleasure to renew acquaintance with such brothers as P. G. C's Fitzgerald and Ironside. The former is my Deputy and right hand man. Whatever Bro. Fitzgerald undertakes is done well. He presided at the supper and kept things moving in fine style. The hilarity was modified somewhat by the death of a Brother Knight.

HAMILTON.

April 24th I visited the Ambitious City-Hamilton-accompanied by G. V. C. McKay, G. K. R. & S. Haynes, G. M. E. Macleod, P. C. Domville, of St. Thomas, and C. C. Forbes, of Woodstock. Like Toronto and London the Lodges combined and made an imposing gathering-Red Cross No. 3 and Bismarck No. 31. These have both large memberships, and the busy hum of enthusiastic Knights was sweet music to our ears as we entered the Castle Hall. In view of all I saw and heard I consider it the most important Lodge rally in the domain. Bismarck brethren exemplified the First Ránk, and if we excuse the little flurry of excitement caused, no doubt, by the presence of so many Grand*Lodge officers, the work was well done. Red Cross No 3 undertook to show us how the Third Rank should be done, and it was a good object lesson for all. I have always heard No. 3 spoken of as the banner Lodge in Third Rank work and I took more than ordinary interest in it. Certainly I have never seen or heard a better senate, but outside of this Red Cross must look to its laurels, for St. Thomas and London press them very close on the general round-up. I was pleased to see the lantern slides used in both Ranks, which added attractions for the eye as well as car. Refreshments were served and the usual good time indulged in, as must always be the case when such Pythians as Jno Burns, D. J. Peace, A. R. Whyte, J. Chapman, H. Carscallen, M. P. P., R. C. Pettigrew, Burkholder, Ramsberger, Harry Morris and M. Meston are present. A pleasant feature during the evening was the presentation of a P. C's jewel to Bro. F. B. Bennett, the youngest Past Chancellor in Ontario.

A second visit to Woodstock on May 10th brought my visiting list to a close, except one to Niagara Falls, which I have refrained from mentioning until the

NIAGARA FALLS.

The story of Rainbow Lodge No. 49 is sad and deplorable and is the one blot upon our shield during the year. To make it clear I must begin at the beginning.

On October 19th, I received a telegram from Bro. Meston of Hamilton, who was then at the Falls. "Scrious difficulty in Lodge here, come first train, am waiting answer." As I had arranged to be in Wallaceburg next day, it was impossible so answered accordingly. On my return from the West we talked over the 'phone and arranged a time for my visit; but a telegram from D.D. Delcomyn asked me to postpone it a week as a meeting could not be arranged. In the meantime I did my best to find out the trouble and its cause. The following extract from a letter dated October 25, '98, signed by F. W. Griffith's, Barrister, will give an idea of the state of affairs.

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" NIAGARA FALLS DIFFICULTY.

* * * "Mr. Delcomyn, the local organizer, has made use of lodge funds to the amount of \$160. A few other members are short a few dollars, but this is the result of negligence in bookkeeping, not dishonesty. The total shortage is about \$220. Members are back in their dues \$123. Every cent of this will be willingly paid in if the members see any chance of the lodge surviving the Delcomyn raid. With all moneys collected in, the lodge would be on an excellent financial footing. Mr. Meston and I have agreed with Delcomyn to accept \$150 and release him. A note properly endorsed will be accepted and I think in a few days Delcomyn will succeed in doing this.

"Your presence in Niagara Falls will be of vast benefit at this particular time. A little encouragement and advice would put the members in real touch with the order and be of benefit to the new officers. The lodge affairs have not been carried on in a business like manner," etc., etc. * * * *

After some further correspondence I started for Niagara Falls and found arrangements made for a meeting in Griffiths' office. We waited an hour and three members showed up and it was evident to me that there was no interest taken. However, we had an informal meeting, when it developed that Lawyer Griffiths was appointed by the Lodge to bring about a settlement by law or otherwise. He did not hesitate to tell Delcomyn what he thought of him, even threatened arrest for embezzlement. Finding we could do nothing with so small a meeting we started out to call on some of the members, which seemed rather to increase the difficulties. However, before leaving the office Delcomyn admitted owing the order \$19.75, but since everybody thought differently he offered to give his note for the amount claimed, which we agreed to accept if satisfactorily endorsed. With this understanding we separated.

I spent the night talking with Delcomyn, went through all his memorandums and tried in every possible way to see some solution. Next morning I visited the Lodge-room in company with Clark K. of R. and S. and Delcomyn. There I was shown the extravagances in furnishing. I examined the books and made every enquiry concerning the finances, and my conclusions were as follows:

The M. of F. held some money but he did not know how much. The M. of E. never kept a book but put his vouchers in his pocket book. He had recently been burnt out and many of his papers were lost and he could not say how he stood.

Delcomyn owed \$19.75 which he was willing to pay, but a majority of the members said the amount was \$160. He never kept any books and knew nothing of business; was depending on remittances from his people in England and Denmark for his living.

After looking over the whole matter, I could not put my finger on a single solitary transaction that was regular or in order. To make a long story as short as possible: Delcomyn could not get his note endorsed and I left feeling doubtful as to results. Finally, after lapse of some weeks and much correspondence, Delcomyn was arrested, Lodge effects seized, Grand Lodge threatened with law suits, to all of which I had to give some attention. The end came when I asked Bros. J. P. Macleod, G. M. of E. and Bro. Walter Haynes, G. K. of R. & S. to attend a sale, which they did and bought in our paraphernalia. Thus endeth one of the unpleasant episodes in our history.

CONSOLIDATION.

January 3, '99, I signed papers for the amalgamation of Prospect No. 10 and Mizpah No. 22, to be known as Prospect No. 10.

Following the custom of my predecessors I did not visit the distant Lodges in Algoma, and the far north, because of the great expense.

SUGGESTIONS.

Every Grand Chancellor has had some suggestions to offer, but I must say frankly I am without any that I consider of value.

CHARTER ON VIEW.

Along the line of present improvement I would advise every subordinate Lodge to have its Charter nicely framed and hung in the Lodge-room, for strange as it may appear. I have on more than one occasion, had to draw attention to absence of Charter or warrant; without them Lodge meetings are illegal.

I would also plead for better music at our meetings, especially the singing of chant in Page Rank. It is impressive when well done, and if four would agree to stand by the organ or piano they could accomplish much. There should be an effort made in all our Lodges to have better and more music.

LANTERN AND SLIDES.

I strongly advise the use of lantern and slides in Rank work, and I hope all will get them. This can be made a strong attraction in the Lodge-room, for in these days of kodaks and cameras, one or two active members can make slides that afford amusement and pleasure besides developing a taste for art and benefiting the Order. My motto would be, "Make meetings interesting and profitable"

I have advocated the Endowment Rank on every occasion, at all gatherings, and hope the record will show a large increase in the membership of this important branch of our Order.

Attention is drawn to the unveiling and dedication of the monument erected to the memory of Justus H. Rathbone, founder of the Order. This will take place at Utica, N. Y., Wednesday, July 25, '9), upon the occasion of the meeting of the Grand Lodge of New York. The monument has cost \$11,50c; the cemetry authorities have donated a lot one hundred feet square overlooking the beautiful Genesee Valley, and there the memorial stands. Arrangements for reduced railroad fares will be made, and a suitable programme has been arranged.

ORGANIZER.

In December last I negotiated with a gentleman named Hawthorne to enter the field as organizer, on the following terms:—He to have the authority of the G. L. for his work, without salary, his remuneration to come from each subordinate lodge for whom he worked. For example: Suppose he came to Rathbone Nc. 12. Our initiation fee for three Ranks is \$15. For every candidate he brought in we would pay him \$5, and where the fee was less, his share to be in proportion, or whatever amount was mutually agreed upon. I further stipulated that each Lodge should furnish him with a list of names that were considered des rable for membership, or that he should submit names to a committee appointed for the purpose. This would safeguard the Order and prevent misunderstandings. To this he agreed, and I was to consult my executive br-thers as opportunity offered. After doing so, early in January, I wrote him that I was prepared to carry out our proposition, but up to the present he has not answered my letter. However, this may serve as a basis of introduction, and lend a practical aspect to this question, "Shall we have an organizer?"

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THE ALTERNATIAE.

That the sum of \$20 (twenty dollars) be paid to any member or ex-member of our Order who may institute a Lodge in any place in Ontario, the charter list to contain at least twenty names; this amount to be paid out of the charter fee of sixty-five dollars, leaving the balance of forty-five dollars for the supplies and charter.

This is only a suggestion but perhaps worthy of your attention. As you are aware, we are badly handicapped as regards other fraternal societies in the matter of organization. There are several towns and cities in Ontario where Pythianism should exist, but for want of some Brother, who, perhaps very properly, cannot devote his time to starting a Lodge unless some remuneration is forthcoming we cannot plant our tri-colored banner.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion lef me draw your thoughts and inventive powers to the SUPREME LODGE SESSION IN DETROIT IN AUGUST 1900.

I have mentioned to the subordinate Lodges that this would come before Grand Lodge for consideration. How shall we turn this opportunity to our advantage? I have thought of advocating a grand rally for Ontario in the city of Windsor, and in a body join our American brethren in the Uniform Rank paraffic. Then comes the question of uniform. We were nuch pleased in Indianopolis to see a white linen or duck suit generally adopted, with such variations as hats, canes and umbrellas would allow. If we could devise something in expensive, yet similar, with our National flag to the front, it would serve as a mark of distunction. For instance, suppose we say white coat and pants and a vest made out of a Union Jack? But here is where I ask for your inventive genius to come in. Think it over.

Of course every effort must be made to get low rates or excursions on the railways, and if we can induce our brethern to see this Supreme Conclave and Encampment I have no fear for our future growth. Enthusiasm is catching and our Grand Domain will glow with new life and vigor if we can only turn this opportunity to our account.

This new departure of having our Grand Lodge Reports distributed before the session will I hope be appreciated, and I trust the Supreme Ruler of the universe will permit us all to meet in our 29th session with Friendship for all, with Charity for the weak and erring, doing honor to our Order.

I must again refer to the kindness and courtesy of my Grand Lodge Brethren and to the royal receptions given me by the subordinate Lodges.

I am deeply grateful for the high honor conferred on me and in return can say I have done my best.

REPORT OF THE GRAND KEEPER OF RECORDS AND SEAL.

OFFICE OF THE GRAND KEEPER OF RECORDS AND SEAL, GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO, KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS,

TORONTO, JUNE 1st, 1899.

To the Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias, Domain of Ontario:

Brethren,—I herewith present the twenty-seventh annual report of the affairs of this Grand Lodge, and the first submitted to you, as incumbent of this office, which you so graciously bestowed upon me at our last Convention, and take this opportunity of thanking the members of this august body for the honor bestowed and the trust reposed in me.

STATE OF THE ORDER.

What I state in this report, regarding the present membership, will not astonish very many of our brethren, as I confidently believe the majority already are aware of the dormant condition of the Order as it existed prior to my installation of office. The reports of the last three or four years suggest prosperity, but no increase had been really accomplished. Lodge, that had paid no Capitation Tax into Grand Lodge for some years, were still included in our numerical strength, and so long as Grand Lodge had only to pay an amount to the Supreme Lodge according to Supreme Representation, we could well afford to carry these delinquent Lodges, but recent changes in the Supreme Constitution imposed immediate action.

At the Supreme Convention in 1898 it was enacted, that the revenue of the Supreme Lodge should not as formerly be principally derived from the sale of supplies, but that a Capitation Tax be levied upon all Grand Domains, amounting to 8c. per capita, per annum, for each member in good standing on the 31st day of December next preceding. This being the case, it was necessary to take such steps as would bring these Lodges again in good standing, or call in their Charters. Every inducement was offered to them, but there being no possible chance of resuscitation, they were closed up, and paraphernalia, books, etc., ordered to be sent in to this office. Some of the Lodges have already done so, and as soon as portions of the paraphernalia can be disposed of, to make room for the balance, the rest will be attended to.

It will, however, be our great effort to start these Lodges again, and from present appearances the chances are encouraging, but it will have to be with new members.

The following Lodges have paid no Capitation Taxes to Grand Lodge since

The Grand Executive, however, fully appreciates the kindness of the London Lodges for the courteous manner in which they have asked us to visit them.

EXECUTIVE REPORTS.

It has been my effort to have the Executive Reports in the hands of the subordinate Lodges, prior to meeting of Grand Lodge, so that the representatives may know something of the suggestions or questions embraced therein, and thus be in a position to fully discuss and act upon same, when the proper time arrives.

This has been accomplished, thanks to the help of the Grand Chancellor and Grand Master of Exchequer, and I hope this small effort will be appreciated.

FINANCES.

It is also a matter for congratulation that the amount of funds on hand, in Grand Lodge at the present time, is larger than it has been for some years. The effort to increase the sale of supplies, etc., and the closing of the debit accounts of subordinate Lodges have heen chiefly the measure of success

NEW PRICE LIST OF SUPPLIES

A new price list of supplies has been recently issued, and the attention of some of the subordinate Lodges is drawn to the Grand Lodge Statutes, Chap. 4, Section 30, which prohibits the purchase of such supplies, embodied in the price list, from any source other than the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal. Please do not forget this.

THE PYTHIAN PRESS.

Thanks are extended to the editors of the different Pythian publications for kindly forwarding same to this office. After being carefully perused, they have been distributed around, and trust that from the seed sown some harvest may have been garnered.

ENDOWMENT RANK.

The Endowment Rank, in the hands of Past Chancellor Robertson, has made remarkable progress since our last Convention. Several Sections have been formed and the benefit of same brought more fully to the notice of our Lodges. It has now got "a-going," and so long as Bro. Robertson interests himself in this, the premier branch of our Order, it is bound to go ahead.

Brother Robertson, who is now the accredited agent for the Endowment Rank in Ontario, has been asked to address a few words to the members, in our reports, and I have great pleasure in inserting them, knowing it to be for the good and welfare of the order.

FINALE.

Every Lodge now on our Roster is a good and lively one. The membership is increasing, more interest is being taken in the beautiful ritualistic work, and I have sufficient faith in our grand Order (now that the dead limbs have been cut away, no longer hampering the trunk) that new life wil be infused into this prolific tree, that bears the golden fruit of Friendship, Charity and Benevolence.

HAS YOUR LODGE A SECTION?

Brethren—How to extend the Order in Ontario has been discussed year after year by our Grand Lodge representatives, and, with the exception of bringing in nicely worded reports, nothing is done, and the Order remains at a standstill. Other Orders are planting Lodges in nearly every little hamlet in Ontario, and the Knights of Pythias, with the finest ritualistic ceremonies in the world, and the best fraternal insurance in existence, is almost forced to take a back seat among other fraternal organizations in this Province, in the way of membership.

My object in writing this special article is to show to the members of the Order, through our Grand Lodge representatives, how we can build up the Order in our Domain—both in the way of new Lodges, which means new members and increased interest all around, and at the same time retaining our present members,—by a more active policy in regard to the Endowment Rank, both on the part of our Grand Lodge and Subordinate Lodge Officers. Unless we make known the fact that we insure our members at actual cost of insurance,—divided for convenience into fixed monthly payments, determined by the applicant's age at time of obtaining membership—we can never hope to place the Order in the position it should occupy in this Province. The Lodges without sections are practically cutting their own throats and are neglecting the means of providing an extra inducement to many a desirable candidate, who wants to provide for his family and those dependent upon him, and is forced to forfeit the social advantages of the Knights of Pythias and join a purely insurance order, because the Lodges throughout the Order are not doing their duty.

Fraternal insurance has come to stay, notwithstanding what is being said by interested parties to the contrary, and any Order that is paying nearly \$300,000 quarterly in death claims, and has paid in the past the vast sum of \$13,320,776, as the Knights of Pythias have done, need not be ashamed of its record.

Lodges without sections should take the matter up at once and I will be pleased to supply any brother at any time with full information as to rates, &c., our strong financial positions, or any other particulars that may be desired.

I am pleased to report substantial progress for Rathbone No. 12. 1 visited this lodge in my official capacity Jan. 31st, and installed the officers-elect for the current term. An excellent staff of officers were elected for this term, judging them by the splendid manner in which they perform the ritualistic work from time to time. Until recently they have conferred a rank almost every meeting night. The financial affairs of this Lodge are in a very prosperous conditionhaving about \$1,100.00 invested in Atlas Loan Co. bonds, bearing interest at the rate of 4 and 41/2 per cent. per annum. This is very gratifying, and the amount is steadily increasing.

The paraphernalia is kept in a large separate room, fitted up specially for that purpose. A man is paid to look after it and keep it in good order. This is something that some Lodges throughout the Grand Domain could, with much benefit, adopt. The paraphernalia is kept clean add free from dust, and after three or four years use looks almost as good as new.

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Rathbone now has A membership of 75 lin good standing. Considering the total membership, some of whom have left the city, an average attendance of 18 shows that the Lodge is very much alive, and that the members are taking an active interest in the work.

On Feb. 14th, a "Hard Times" Smoking Concert was held in the Lodge Room, with a light lunch, after, cards. It proved to be a great success. There were in this district five lodges, Mystic No. 1, Queen City No. 18, Amicus No. 20, Toronto No. 30 and Syracuse No. 39, and with the exception of the latter, which has been dead for 3 or 4 years, the present term has been a most successful one, not so much perhaps in the matter of new members as in the increased interest taken in the conventions generally, and the very marked increase in the amount of lodge visiting done by the members. This branch of lodge work is one which we have striven to have the members make more use of during the year, and the result is easily apparent at any of the lodge conventions, and it is also noticeable that the lodges whose members do the most visiting are in return most visited.

Probably the most important advance made in this district during the year was the institution of several sections of the Endowment Rank as a result of the speech of Supreme Chancellor, Colgrove at Woodstock last year. One in Amicus lodge (No. 4159) and one in Toronto lodge (No. 4173) as well as the strengthening of the existing section, No. 54. For this work the thanks are due to Bro. W. J. Robertson, the able organizer of the rank for Ontario, who has been untiring in his efforts to explain and introduce the insurance advantages of our order, and also to Bro. W. F. Daniel of Toronto Lodge, who rendered valuable assistance in organizing section No. 4173.

Early in the fall of '98 a meeting of the Past Chancellors of the city was called and it was decided to form a Past Chancellors' Association, which was done forthwith, and Bro. Frank Edmand of Mystic Lodge was elected Secretary. Through his efforts nearly every P. C. in the city is now a member, and while more interest might have been taken in the meetings, yet there were many valuable suggestions brought up and discussed, especially in regard to the rank work, and the work of the lodges much improved thereby. The formation of a permanent amplified team is mooted, and it is expected that it will take definite shape in the near future.

The reception of the Grand Chancellor on March 24th was a very pleasant event, and did much to enthuse the members. About 150 of the members sat down to a banquet, and this was followed by toasts and speeches interspersed with songs and selections. The speech of P. G. C. Fitzgerald, and G. K. of R. & S. Haynes also replied to various toasts, and a very pleasant evening was spent.

On June 12th, about fifty members of the city lodges paid a visit to Red Cross and Bismark Lodges, Hamilton, and had a most enjoyable time. The Hamilton brethren exemplified the amplified third rank in a very able manner, alterwards entertaining us with refreshments and a concert. Grand Chan, Murch and L.C. Elliott of Brantford and G. K of R. and S. Haynes were present and made addresses. The Hamilton brethren have promised to return the visit early in the fall, and these visits will no doubt boom Pythianism in both districts.

We believe that what the order in Ontario needs more than anything else, unless it be an organizer, is a semi-monthly or monthly paper to keep the members in touch with each other. All the other orders find it advantageous to have them, and we can think of nothing from which we would get such good results.

MYSTIC LODGE No. 1

Is not only No. 1 in name, but it has also been No. 1 in the amount of progress it has made during the term. The thanks for this state of affairs is largely due to the indefatigable efforts of C. C. Frank Edmand, who has done splendid work during the term, not only in his own lodge, but in the other lodges as well. He has made it a point to impress upon the members the necessity of bringing in new members, and has wisely set the example by bringing in propositions himself, with the result that since the first of January they have had a proposition at nearly every convention, and the rank work has been performed without the use of the ritual and in a manner that does credit to their staff of officers.

They wisely selected Bro. Edmand for a second term as Chancellor Commander, and one of his first acts was to get up an open installation which was held on Jan. 10th, and an entertainment was given in the lodge room that included almost everything from a phonograph to a brass band. Financially the lodge is in good condition, thanks to having an energetic M. of F. and an able K. of R. and S.

I have visited this lodge ten times during my term.

AMICUS No. 20

Is now the baby lodge of the district, and is composed almost entirely of young members, though several of the older ones are on its roster, including Dr. J. S. King, P. G. C. This lodge has been very lively during the year so far as interesting conventions have been concerned, the married brothers taking turns in providing refreshments for each evoning, the lodge being closed early so that an hour or so could be devoted to entertainment. They have an energetic and capable staff of officers, and the ritualistic work is generally well performed by the Past Chancellors of the lodge, though not by the elected officers as it should be. This Lodge instructed us to see if some steps could not be taken to have a Pythian paper, the same if possible to be under control of Grand Lodge and be sent free to every member, believing that it will have a tendency to keep our members in touch with each other.

Suggested by Bro. DuBois that for the good of the order an organizer would do well in Ontario.

That a visit from Grand Officers to Algoma Lodges, would be welcomed by all lodges in that locality.

DOMAIN OF OHIO, KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.

ADA, OHIO, February 1, 1899.

My Dear Sir and Brother, -I address you at this time concerning a matter to which I have given much thought and would be pleased to have your opinion concerning the project.

I believe, primarily, that one cause for non-payment of dues is the absolute ignorance on the part of a great majority of our membership, of the beauties of our ritual. This, coupled with the excessive dues, is in my mind, the direct cause of our enormous loss of membership each year. I believe if we would have enthusiasm extant in our order we should have intelligence. We should have men thoroughly versed in the lessons we seek to teach. I believe, further, that there is not more than ten per cent. of the members who have been initiated into our order who can intelligently repeat a single page of the ritual, and so long as the memberbership are compelled to hunt up some officer to get a key to the lodge room or the combination to the safe wherein the rituals are kept, and to do their studying in a cheerless lodge room before they can become thoroughly instructed, the present condition will remain to comfront us. I would overcome this in the following

I would have the Supreme Lodge, at its next session, take such action as would create a committee whose duty it would be to promulgate a pocket key or cipher ritual, so arranged that none but members who had received the lessons and who had given the ritual some study in the lodge room, could interpret.

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These ciphers could be sold to the membership who would be willing to pay almost any price for them. It would permit them to do their studying at home and in their offices, and would create, as I believe, a new interest and an enthusiasm such as our order has never known.

The promulgation of these rituals by the Supreme Lodge, and being handled as a Supreme or Grand Lodge supply, could be made a source of revenue; and direct taxation upon the membership could be done away with, for a time at least,

I have carefully gone into the cost of publication of a book such as would be required, and find that after the plates are made they could be published at less than 25c. per copy. They could be sold at a price almost equivalent to the price charged for the ritual we are now using in the lodge rooms, and would be hailed with delight by the working members of the order.

I address you concerning this question only after the most mature thought and deliberation. At the various district meetings which I have attended during my administration as Grand Chancellor, the applause with which this suggestion has been received has been such as to convince me that the interest of Pythianism demands some such action on the part of the Supreme Lodge.

I place the matter before you and would be glad to hear from you. If you know of any objection to such a project I would be glad to be enlightened; if you favor the proposition I would be glad to know that it met with your approval, as I would value your opinion in the matter most highly. To all Grand Lodges, Greeting:

At the last Convention of this Grand Lodge the following Resolutions were unanimously adopted;

WHEREAS By a special Act of Congress the U. S. Government has given to the Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias a 99 year lease on nearly five acres of ground on the government Reservation in Hot Springs, Arkansas, immediately adjoining the U. S. Army and Navy Hospital, for the purpose of erecting and maintaining a National Pythian Sanitarium and

WHEREAS The Supreme Lodge at its recent convention held in the city of Indianapolis by an almost unanimous vote, accepted this donation from the Government for such purpose and referred all matters pertaining thereto to the Grand Lodge of Knights of Pythias of Arkansas with full power to act,

BE IT RESOLVED By the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias of the Domain of the District of Columbia That for the purpose of assisting in building and maintaining said National Pythian Sanitarium, a per capita tax of one dollur (\$1.00) be, and is hereby levied on each member of the order in this Grand Domain, who is in good standing, in his subordinate lodge. Said per capita tax shall be paid at the rate of 20 cents per year, 10 cents with each semi-annual report for a period of five years, provided, however, that the payment of said per capita tax, shall not begin until the Grand Lodges of the Domains representing two hundred and fifty thousand members, shall have adopted the resolution levying a per capita tax of one dollar for said purpose.

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It is hereby made the duty of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal to transmit to all of the Grand Lodges of the Supreme Domain a copy of this resolution and he shall upon receiving notice through the Journal of the proceedings of other Grand Lodges or by other means that the Grand Lodges of the Domains representing two hundred and fifty thousand members have passed similar resolutions notify the subordinate lodges of this Grand Domain that the levy has gone into force and effect and require each lodge to remit with its next succeeding semi-annual report the amount of-said levy.

Upon receipt of said per capita tax, he shall immediately transmit the same to the Grand Master of Exchequer as other taxes and dues are transmitted, and said G. M. of Ex. shall keep said funds in a separate account. Said funds may, in the discretion of the Grand Lodge Trustees be loaned or invested in such manner as they shall deem best.

It shall be the duty of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal upon the adjournment of this convention to transmit to the Supreme Keeper of Records and Seal, a copy of this resolution,

Upon the passage of such legislation, by the Supreme Lodge as may be necessary to establish a Pythian Sanitarium at Hot Springs, Arkansas, the Grand Lodge Trustees shall pay to the officer or officers of the Supreme Lodge designated to receive the same, all funds that may have accumulated by reason of the adoption of this resolution, together with the increment thereof to be used and appropriated under the direction and control of the Supreme Lodge for the purpose of erecting and maintaining the said Pythian Sanitarium.

Provided, however, that the in erest accruing from the amount derived from this levy, may in the discretion of the Grand Lodge Trustees be appropriated for the payment of prefiminary expenses incurred in establishing said Pythian Sani-

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED That the Supreme Representatives of this Grand Domain be instructed to vote for such legislation as may be necessary to establish the Pythian Sanitarium at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

It is with great pleasure that I transmit the above resolutions to you and ask you to give them the attention that their merits deserve and when you look at the great benefit to our sick brothers the establishment of the Sanitarium would be I feel confident that you will pass this or similar resolutions.

GRAND LODGE KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS, GRAND DOMAIN OF MISSOURI. ST. Louis, Mo., March 24th, 1899.

To all Grand Lodges, Greeting:

At the last convention of this Grand Lodge, the Committee on State of the Order recommended the adoption of the recommendations of Supreme Representatives as follows:

"We recommend that a memorial be prepared and sent to all the Grand Lodges requesting them to instruct their Representatives to co-operate at the next session of the Supreme Lodge, in passing legislation reducing: 1st, The amount paid to Supreme representatives in Mileage and per Diem, or, at least, in securing a reduction in the amount of mileage paid, to the end that the Supreme Representatives shall be compensated only for their actual and necessary expenses in attending the sessions of the Supreme Lodge. 2nd, Believing that the office of Supreme Chancellor should be an office of houor, and not of profit, we recommend that legislation be enacted reducing his salary to two thousand dollars per year. 3rd, Believing that the duties of the Supreme Keeper of Records and Seal are not more oncrous or arduous than those of the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal of this and other large Domains, we recommend that legislation be enacted reducing his salary to the amount of two thousand dollars per year. 4th, Believing that there are many men engaged in the management of financial institutions and in caring for trust funds, who would gladly handle the moneys of the Supreme Lodge as Master of Exchequer, giving good and sufficient bond for the faithful performance of duty, without any salary attached to the office, we recommend that the salary of the Supreme Master of Exchequer be reduced to one hundred dollars per year. 5th, We recommend that special attention be called to the proposed amendment to the Constitution, repealing the amending clause of the present Constitution and enacting a reasonable method as to amendments."

The report was adopted, and you are fraternally requested to unite with this Grand Domain in passing such legislation as is above proposed.

Your Committee on Judiciary begs to submit that it has had referred to it during the recess of Grand Lodge the following matters:

From Bismark Lodge No. 31-An ammendment to sections 16 and 17 of their by laws, From Amicus Lodge No. 20-Ammendments to sections 4, 8, 11, 14, 17 and

18, and the striking out of section 16 of their by-laws.

From Mystic Lodge No. 1-A code of by-laws. From Algoma Lodge No. 11-A code of by-laws.

From Marmion Lodge No. 15-A code of by-laws.

From Toronto Lodge No. 30-An ammendment to section 2 of article 3 of their by-laws.

Your Committee examined foregoing and acted on them as follows.

Bismark Lodge No. 31--The ammendment was approved as suggested. Amicus Lodge No. 20-Ammendments were approved of as submitted.

Mystic Lodge No. 1-By-laws approved as submitted.

Algoma Lodge No. 11-These by-laws were approved as submitted, with one exception, viz.: Your Committee struck out a clause which provided for the reinstatement of suspended members of the lodge on payment of \$3.00. The Committee took this action as the clause was contra to section 293, Supreme Statutes, and section 306 of the Grand Statutes, said sections setting forth that suspended members can only be reinstated on payment of a sum which shall be not less than the amount of one year's dues,

Marmion Lodge No. 15—Your Committee found it necessary to strike out a clause in these by-laws which provided for the reinstatement of suspended members on payment of \$2.00. This we did on the same grounds as stated above.

We also amended a clause which read as follows—(8) Any member who s three months or more in arrears for dues shall, ipso facto, forfeit all claims to any sick or funeral benefits.

Your Committee struck out from this clause the word funeral, as Supreme Statutes, section 303, provides for the payment of not less than twenty dollars upon the death of a member in good standing.

Section 265, Supreme Statutes says that a page, esquire or knight shall be considered in good standing so long as he is not under suspension from membership for any cause.

Toronto Lodge No. 30—Amendment approved as submitted.

Representative Burns of No. 3, from the Committee on State of the Order, presented the following report, which was taken up clause by clause and adopted:

REPORT No. 1—COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

Your Committee on State of the Order begs to submit;

1. Your Committee take great pleasure in congratulating the Grand Lodge on having such an efficient staff of officers as those elected at the last Grand Lodge session. Their work has been well done, considering the fact that they were all practically strange to the duties of their several offices, notwithstanding that they approached their tasks with fear and trembling.

2. With reference to the appointment of D. G. C.'s we consider, that, to a large extent, the measure of success attained by lodges depends on the standing and worth of the D. G. C.'s appointed, as well as on the officers of lodges, and would impress on the P. C.'s of the different districts, the importance of nominating only such members to fill this office. We think also that the D. G. C.'s and officers of lodges should compel a strict compliance with the Supreme and Grand Statutes as it has been brought to the knowledge of your Committee that some members have been admitted as clerks who, in reality, were engaged at that time in the occupation of bar-tender.

3. We note that the G. C. during the past year had to conduct a considerable amount of unnecessary correspondence, and we are sure this might have been avoided by a better knowledge on the part of the lodges, of the Grand Lodge Constitution and Statutes.

4. Your Committee cannot pass the report of the G. C.'s official visits without regretfully commenting on the position of Calanthe Lodge No. 36, and trust that some steps may be taken to insure better life for Pythianism in such a thriving city

5. We commend the G. C. on the success of his efforts in resuscitating Rokeby Lodge No. 9, Wallaceburg.

6. As to the G. C.'s reference to charters not being on view during conventions, we would respectfully refer to Chapter II. Section 120, of the Grand Statutes, which states that "No convention of a lodge shall be legal unless its charter be displayed in the lodge room whenever in session."

GRAND LODGE SESSION.

7. Your Committee recommend that the next session of this Grand Lodge be held at the City of Windsor during the session of the Supreme Lodge to be held at Detroit in August, 1900.

8. As to the question of joining our American brethren in the uniform rank parade we suggest that the Grand Lodge appoint a special committee to devise a scheme in connection therewith.

9. Your Committee are much pleased that the reports of the G. L. officers have been distributed before this session, as it has given the representatives an opportunity never before offered, of considering fully their contents before meeting.

- 3. As a means whereby the finances of the Grand Lodge may be increased we would suggest that the Supreme Representatives be instructed to bring before the Supreme Lodge, at the session of 1900, a proposition to amend the Supreme Statutes, permitting the Grand Lodge of Ontario to hold biennial instead of annual sessions.

Representative Wilson of 20, from the Special Committee on Endowment, presented the following report, which was adopted:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ENDOWMENT RANK. To the Officers and Members of the Grand Domain of Ontario:

According to the Annual Report, your Committee find that only 12 sections of the Endowment Rank, consisting of 121 members, exist in this Grand Domain with an Insurance of \$228,500. This, your Committee thinks is a very small percentage, and we would urge that more concerted action on the part of the subordinate lodges be taken to increase the membership of said Rank. While

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recognizing the Knights of Pythias as a purely fraternal organization, we feel that it is the duty of every member to provide insurance for those dependent on them. This Rank has been proved to be one of the strongest organizations in existence and is run on the most economical basis. Too much cannot be said in favor of our insurance rank, and while it is not compulsory for members of the Order to join it, yet common sense and justice to those who are dependent upon us for a living, calls for us to iusure our lives in our own insurance branch.

Your Committee would certainly desire to impress upon the delegates $presen_t$ the necessity for personal interest being taken therein. Year after year these rereports are asked for and referred to by delegates who have not sufficient interest in the matter to take up a policy themselves, and while this is the case we cannot expect the lodges to take the interest in it they should.

The Endowment Rank was organized in 1877 and since that step was taken the Board of Control has paid out to the widows and orphans of our deceased brethren some twelve millions of dollars, and is paying annually over one million.

With the close of the quarter, March 31, 1899, the Endowment Rank completes its twenty-second fiscal year.

Eighty-seven sections were organized since Jan. 1, 1899.

During the quarter, twenty-five hundred and fourteen applicants were accepted and admitted to membership, the certificates issued amounting to three million six hundred and sixty-one thousand five hundred dollars, a gain in members over the preceeding quarter of four hundred and forty-nine and in the amount of endowment seven hundred and sixty-four thousand five hundred dollars.

Nearly three hundred thousand dollars was disbursed for death benefits, involving the adjustment of one hundred and forty-eight deaths.

On April 1st, 1899, there were in active operation thirty-six hundred and eighty-five sections, with a membership aggregating fifty-five thousand five hundred. The total endowment in force was one hundred and one million five hundred and forty-six thousand dollars and the cash on hand and investments was four hundred and eighty thousand five hundred and thirty-seven dollars and eighty-

The great strength of the Endowment Rank, in marked contradistinction to organizations where to be a member is to be insured, is, that the Insurance Branch of the Order of Knights of Pythias has a pick from an already selected class-it has a membership (or class) of 450,000 from which to draw, the large proportion of which have already passed through the hands of an examining lodge physician, before reaching the Endowment Rank—thus passing through two sieves. That mere fact alone gives greatly added strength to the Rank over any outside organizations. Then again, its rates are right—they are based on accurate calculations they are neither haphazard or guessed at-they are scientifically right, founded on those experience tables that are known and have stood the test-any lower rates, sooner or later, mean either ruin or re-rating—hence the Board of Control, wise in its day and generation, long ago established the existing scale of rates, and stands alone among kindred organizations in that, while all of them have had to levy from two to ten special assessments, and advance their rates 60, and in some instances too percent the Endowment Rankhas had to do neither—on the contrary it has gone ahead, paying all claims and adding to its surplus. On its own merit, irrespective of the paramount claim which it has upon our membership, the Endowment Rank can come to every Pythian and say: "This is the best, the safest, the surest fraternal insurance in existence." Of this surely we should all be proud.

We would urge upon the existing sections the necessity of having secretaries who are thoroughly alive to their work. Cases are within the knowledge of this committee where they have personally introduced would-be members to secretaries of sections, and they have absolutely neglected to even get them applications, which could have been had for the asking, and good members were lost to the Order thereby. Applications must come through the secretaries, and if they are not alive to their duty the delegates present, on their return to their respective lodges, should see that some one is appointed who is thoroughly competent to attend to the work.

The Committee has in possession cards of rates and also quarterly statements, which they will be pleased to have the Representatives present read, learn, and act upon.

An ounce of example is worth a pound of precept// and we would strongly urge those present to avail themselves of the opportunity to take up membership in the rank, and thus give strength to their alleged enthusiasm in favor of it.

REPORT No. 3-COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

Your Committee on State of the Order, to whom was referred certain parts of the report of the G. K. of R. and S., beg to report as follows:

- 1. Your Committee are surprised to note that no less than 12 lodges had been included in our numerical strength in previous years although several of them had not paid capitation tax since 1895, and we think the proper course was pursued in closing them up.
- We cannot understand why the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal is not provided with the necessary accommodation for storing all the paraphernalia of these defunct lodges, as we consider it very important that this be in the actual possession of the Grand Lodge.
- 3. Your Committee are of opinion that it would not be advisable for this Grand Lodge to enter into any agreement for representation on the pages of Michigan Knighthood or any other Pythian paper published outside of the Dominion of Canada.
- 4. We appreciate the kindly feeling expressed by Bro, H. H. Curtis, of Charlotte, Michigan, U. S. A., and thank him for his courteous address in the interests of Pythian Knighthood.
- 5. (a) We would urge upon all subordinate lodges the election of the best possible man as M. of F., and that he be paid a certain per centage of dues collected as his remuneration.
 - (b) A careful selection of members. Better no increase than poor material.
- (c) More attention should be paid to the ritualistic work, and lodge meetings thereby made more attractive.
- (d) Every member should be induced to take insurance in the Endowment Rank, even though ever so small,
 - (e) Fraternal visits from the stronger lodges to the weaker ones.
 - (f) Visits from Grand Lodge officers, especially the Grand Chancellor. All of which is respectfully submitted.

To remedy this we would suggest that a fine of sufficient amount be placed on lodges who neglect to report before the 1st of March and the 1st of September in each year.

We might add that from a careful examination of the books and reports we find they agree in every respect.

Your Committee to whom was referred communication from Mystic No. 1, with reference to advertising matter for the Order, from Amicus No. 20, to establish a Pythian paper, and circular letters, from Grand Lodges of Ohio, Missouri, and Columbia, beg to report and recommend as follows:

r. That the Grand Executive to have printed a number of pamphlets setting forth concisely the objects of the Order and the benefits to be derived therefrom. That the same be forwarded to the different lodges of this Grand Domain for distribution.

 That we do not consider it advisable, under the present condition of our finances, to recommend the establishment of a Pythian paper in this Grand Domain.

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3. (a) In what bank or banking institution are your lodge funds deposited?(b) To whose credit are said funds deposited?

(c) Are the deposits divided into General Fund and Benefit Fund?

(d) What signatures are required by the bank or banking institution for the withdrawal of your deposits?

With reference to the Deputy Grand Chancellor's reports referred to your Committee, we find them as a whole satisfactory.
